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
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
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PREFACE.

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THE ensuing pages contain a series of Photographs taken during the prevalence of Plague in Bombay and during the period that the preventive measures for its extinction had been placed by the Bombay Government in the hands of the following Committee:-

Brig.-General W. F. Gatacre, C.B., D.S.O. P. C. H. Snow, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, I.C.S. Surg.-Major H. P. Dimmock, I.M.S. C. C. James, Esq., A.M.I.C.E.

There is little doubt that Plague existed in Bombay, unknown, in the early part of August, but how and whence it came is still an unravelled mystery.

At that time, Bombay contained \$50,000 inhabitants at least, and by the end of February the population had been reduced to one-half, by the people flying from the City through fear of the pestilence; the effect of this was to entirely paralyse trade, and the resultant loss to the City and the Country generally can never be estimated.

On the 2nd of March 1897, when the Bombay Plague Committee was appointed, deaths from Plague in the City had reached the appalling number of 19,849, with a daily average mortality of 152, and there seemed little immediate hope of the death-rate being reduced, as the tide of returning population had set in ; however, the beginning of April showed a satisfactory reduction in the total deaths for that month, being 3,578 as against

The month of May showed a still further reduction, the mortality being 2,331, and by the 15th of June, Plague had practically disappeared, this being the more satisfactory as at this time the population of the City had increased to at least 750,000.

The probable number of deaths from Plague in the City of Bombay alone, from August to the end of June, is 27,597.

Some views have been inserted of Plague operations outside Bombay, over which the Committee held control. The Committee are much indebted to Captain C. Moss, Gloster Regiment, who took the majority of the Photographs, and to Mr. M. E. Couchman, Mad. C. S., and to Vety.

Mr. F. B. Stewart, Photo Artist, Poona, compiled the Album for the Committee, and holds the copy-right.


