When the Horse is much out of condition the dose should be slightly decreased.

Pay particular attention to this:—In 24 hours after giving the Ball it is most likely that lameness or larking of feet will ensue; this is a desirable effect, and acts beneficially upon the system; he should now have all the water he will drink, and be walked out for an hour, and if during this exercise the purgative effect is not so much as desired, give him a brackish castor till it is produced.

When giving the Ball, if hard, hold in the hand before a fire till soft.

When Horses are reticent and there is a difficulty to give them a Ball, beat the Ball on a stone into a coarse powder and mix in cold Grout or Beer, and give as a Drink. The Ball will not dissolve.

For Sheep beat the Ball on a cold stone into a coarse powder, mix in a quarter of a pint of cold Grout, and give as a Drink.
