Description of the Fly.

The Fly is somewhat like a humble bee in appearance. Its body is banded with black, white and yellow. The Female Fly lays her Eggs generally on the back, loins, and legs of Cattle, in May or June, according to weather, locality, and other circumstances. From these Eggs Maggots are hatched, which work their way beneath the Hide and set up inflammation. In November and December these Maggots are first found under the Skin, by January and February they have grown large enough to pierce the Hide, and the perforated swelling or Warble can be seen from outside. A month or two later the Maggot works its way out of the Warble and falls to the ground, where it slowly develops into a Fly.

Practical Men estimate the loss caused by this Fly in the United Kingdom is close on four million pounds.

N.B.—This tin must be thoroughly shaken each time before pouring the Smear out.

Directions.

Apply with a fairly large paint brush, along the whole length of the Chine, so that the Smear flows freely down both sides and flanks of the animal.
