


second floor




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THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION

The Smithsonian Institution was founded in 1846 through the bequest of an English scientist, James Smithson (1765-1829), who left his fortune to the United States "to found at Washington, under the name of he Smithsonian Institution, an Establishment for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men."

One of the oldest American scientific and cultural institutions, the Smithsonian is governed by a Board of Regents composed of the Vice President of the United States, the Chief Justice, three Senators, three Representatives, and six private citizens. The chief administrative officer is the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution.

MUSEUM HOURS

Museums open daily 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Closed Christmas Day.

Telephones, information, checkrooms, and sales shops are located at each entrance.

This building houses exhibits illustrating the cultural and technological development of our Nation from colonial times to the present. Significant treasures of our Nation's history—civil and military—as well as famous inventions and machines from practically every field of technology are on display. Permanent exhibits include such other subjects as stamps, coins, graphic arts, and some of the decorative arts.

The vast collections under the care of the Museum of History and Technology form one part of the United States National Museum. The other part is the Museum of Natural History, which displays collections in the field of anthropology, geology, and zoology.

The exhibits in the Museum of History and Technology are located on the first, second, and third floors. On the basement level are a cafeteria and snack counter. Lunch is served, September through March, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., and lunch and dinner are served from April through August. The snack counter is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., September through March, and until 9:30 p.m. during the rest of the year.
