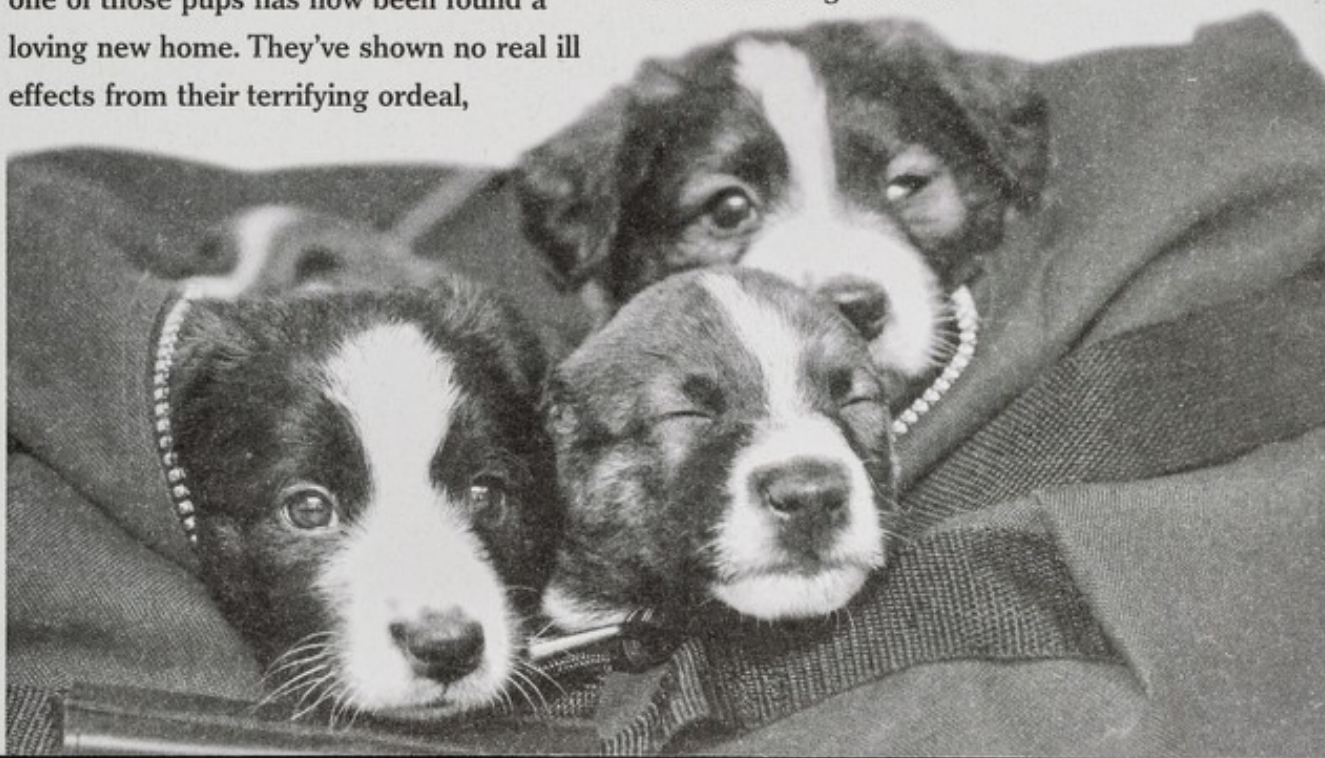

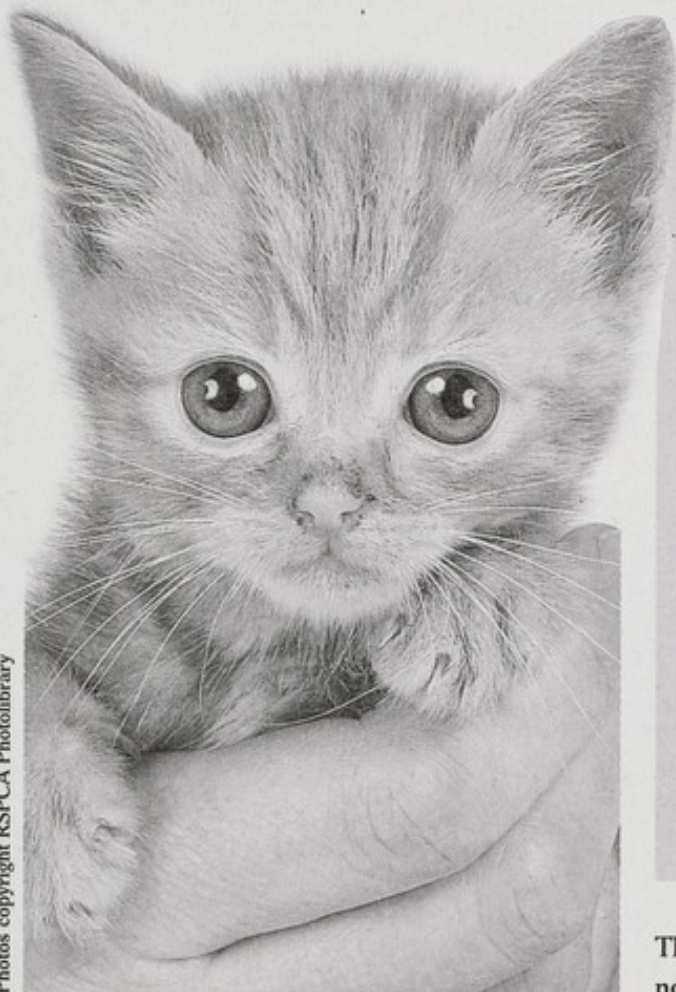
Thanks to the RSPCA's efforts, every one of those pups has now been found a loving new home. They've shown no real ill effects from their terrifying ordeal,

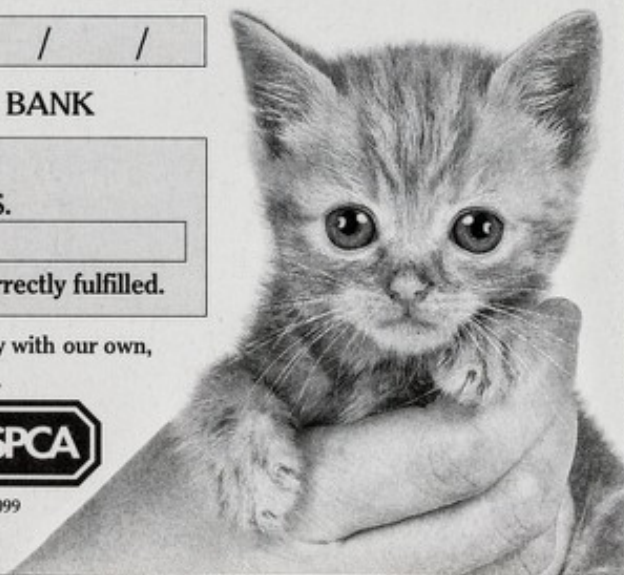
