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


## Safe Disposal


\*2/5ml



1. Dismantle works.




2. Put the needle in the barrel.



3. Push the plunger back down the barrel.

If you have 1ml. syringes, put them in an empty drinks can and crush the opening shut.



# Sharp

Used needles are dangerous, so make them safe.  
The best idea is to **take them to a needle exchange.** They'll give you a new supply. Dial 100 and ask for **Freephone Drug Problem.**
