HIV infection and the following conditions are

STD - Sexually Transmitted Disease

Syphilis and Chancroid both cause genital ulceration which allows the virus to enter the body more easily.

CANDIDA - Yeast Infection

Recurrent or persistent vaginal Candidiasis that requires repeated therapy may be the first sign of immune dysfunction.

PID - Pelvic Inflammatory Disease

Infections in the ovaries, tubes, endometrium, pelvic abscesses, etc. In the HIV Positive Woman the infection is often severe requiring longer hospitalizations and more frequent surgeries.

PREGNANCY

The impact of pregnancy on the course of HIV infection is debatable. The transmission rate of HIV to infants is about 30%. Pregnant women who are HIVinfected should be closely monitored during pregnancy.

HPV-NEOPLASM - Human Papilloma Virus

Refractory and persistent lower genital tract disease in women may be a marker of HIV disease. HIV-infected women seem to be susceptible to unusually aggressive HPV disease. There is a strong association between HIV positive status and abnormal PAP smears.

HSV - Herpes Simplex Virus

The Herpes virus is more persistent and often requires higher doses of acyclovir.
