The embracing figures, protected by the use of a condom, are the centre around which the birds and other creatures circle in the endless cycle of life and death.



The shield, which represents protection, is decorated with the seeds from the tree of life and hope.



The two honeysuckle birds sharing the one sunflower are symbolic of the beauty of nature, while the two headed serpent represents life and death.



This image, which I call the Soap Tree, represents cleanliness and the purity of air and water.
