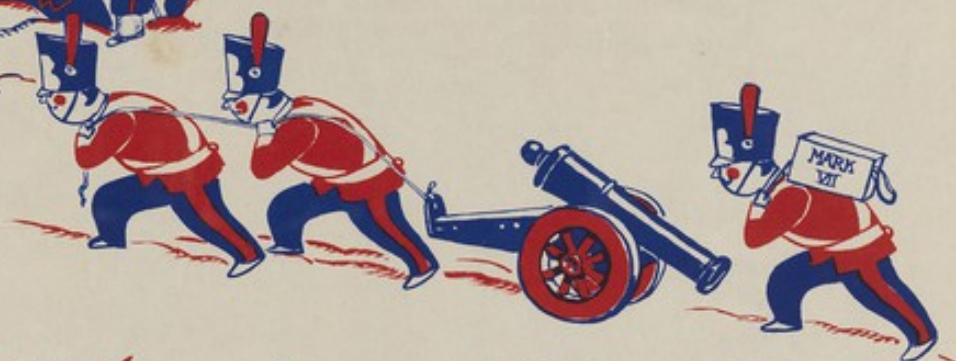
## THE WOUND -
