Information about having an HIV test

How do I know if I have been at risk of HIV?

HIV can be passed from one person to another in a number of different ways:

- Through contact with infected bodily fluids such as blood, semen and vaginal secretions. This may happen during unprotected sex (sex without a condom)
- Sharing needles or equipment for injecting drugs, tattooing and body piercing
- Through a blood transfusion or blood products which have not been screened for HIV in another country. Blood products in the UK have been screened for HIV since 1985
- From an infected woman to her baby before or during birth, or during breastfeeding

Why should I have a test?

- HIV can cause serious life threatening infections in the body known as AIDS.
- If you know you have HIV you can receive specialist HIV care and treatment, which could stop you from developing AIDS.

- If you know sooner about your HIV infection it is likely that you will live a near normal life expectancy
- Also if you know you have HIV infection you can take steps to reduce the risk of passing it on to your partner(s)
- If a woman is diagnosed with HIV she can still have a baby who is HIV negative, or not infected.

When is the right time to have an HIV test?

- The right time to test is three months (12 weeks) after you think you may have been exposed to HIV.
- The first three months after exposure to HIV is known as the WINDOW PERIOD
- If you test during the three month window period and it is negative, you must have a second test afteryou have completed the window period to ensure you are definitely not infected with HIV.
