This Hospital was organised by Miss M. Bromley-Martin for French wounded soldiers.

It has been authorised by the Anglo-French Committee, and accepted by the French Government, and by General Joffre as a Military Hospital.

The Management and Staff are entirely British, and the surgical stores are sent out from England.

The wounded are brought to the Hospital from the front, about 60 miles distant, by rail and motor ambulance. A large proportion of the cases are very serious, and the French Authorities are more than satisfied with the results obtained.

The Hospital, except for the customary grant from the French Government of two francs per day, per patient, is supported entirely by voluntary contributions. In consequence of the recent terrible fighting near Verdun, the Hospital is full to overflowing, and its resources are being taxed to the utmost.

Unless money is forthcoming, the work cannot continue, and our French friends, who have given of their best, must be refused our help, at the moment when they most need it. Will you do what you can for them, by giving a donation, or a monthly subscription however small?
