Take responsibility for safer sex

There is still no cure for HIV. If you catch the virus, it will have a significant impact on your health and your life. Always using condoms or not fucking are the most reliable ways to prevent new infections.

Whatever your own HIV status, you can't rely on your partner to take responsibility for preventing the spread of HIV.

Many HIV-negative men expect HIV-positive men to take responsibility by always disclosing their status or using condoms; many HIV-positive men expect HIV-negative men to be responsible for protecting themselves.

Sex without condoms doesn't 'just happen' – you both know when you are about to fuck without condoms.

If you know you are HIV-positive, you have a responsibility for safer sex because you can pass on the virus.

If you are HIV-negative, you have a responsibility to look after your own health.

If you are not sure of your HIV status, you have the responsibility to ensure that your behaviour does not endanger yourself or your partner.
