Birmingham's list of young gay clinics**

When you decide you are ready to start having sex, and this will be different for everyone, there are certain things you need to consider. Given that gay men are the group most affected by HIV, the virus which can lead to AIDS, young gay men should practice "safer sex". The easiest way to protect against HIV is not to have intercourse; however, if you choose to have intercourse it is important that condoms and lubrication are used every time. Condoms prevent HIV which is present in the bloodstream, semen (and the vaginal fluid of women) passing from one person to another. If you fail to use a condom it is important that the next time you have intercourse you resume condom use straight away.

Many young gay men assume that their partners have the same HIV status as themselves, but you can not know for sure without testing for HIV, and these types of assumptions have led to many new people becoming infected. Even if you are with someone who is older and more experienced at who insists on not using condoms, it is important that you use condoms to protect yourself and, in doing so, them. If you have any concerns about HIV or sexual health in general it is best to talk to someone about it. There are specialist services listed overleaf which can provide you with information and support.
