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

Condoms

Any man can use Condoms. It is important to use them every time, and to use them correctly.



Spermicides

Most couples can use Spermicides effectively if they are prepared to use them every time.

Pills are especially good for couples who want a very effective temporary family planning method. Pills are very convenient.

Condoms are best for couples who want protection from STDs.
Condoms are easy to carry and use.

Spermicides are very helpful for couples who want a temporary and convenient method.



How can I learn how to use the family planning methods you offer? It is important to take one *Pill* every day as directed. Women who are breastfeeding should use *Minipills*. Follow the instructions in the *Condom* packet carefully. Use a new *Condom* for every round of sexual intercourse. Follow the instructions in the *Spermicide* packet carefully. Use another dose for each round of sexual intercourse.



What else do I need to know about pills, condoms and spermicides? Pills may cause some side effects, such as headaches or nausea. These effects are not harmful and often go away in a few months. The Condom has no side effects, although some couples find that it decreases sensation during sexual intercourse.

Spermicides may sometimes cause mild irritation in the vagina, but many couples enjoy the extra lubrication they provide.

Customers also want to know about other safe, effective, and convenient methods:

Injectable contraceptives are effective for two to three months at a time. Trained service providers give the injection.

The IUCD (Intra-Uterine Contraceptive Device) is inserted inside a woman's uterus, preventing pregnancy for up to six years.

Norplant is six small plastic rods that are inserted under the skin of a woman's arm, preventing pregnancy for five years.

Voluntary Surgical Contraception is a permanent method for men or women who have all the children they want.

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
