Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Year 1899.

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Thirtieth Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish.

BIRTHS.

The Births registered during the year numbered 154, a diminution of 28 over the previous year, 1898.

The following Table gives the number of Births registered in each month of the year :--

These 154 births will produce a birth-rate of 11.8 per 1,000.

In London, during the year 1899, the births registered numbered 133,120, giving a rate of 29.4 per 1,000 of the population. This is the lowest London birth-rate on record.

DEATHS.

The total Deaths registered in the Parish during the year 1899 were 358, an increase of 53 over the previous year, and due to the greater number of deaths in the Charing Cross Hospital.

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^{*} To these 148 Births occurring in the Parish must be added 6 belonging to St. Martin's, which took place at the Bear Yard Receiving Ward, making a total of 154.

These 358 deaths include those non-parishioners who died in the Charing Cross Hospital, and must therefore be omitted in estimating the death-rate; but, on the other hand, the deaths occurring in Public Institutions outside the Parish of persons belonging thereto must be added. The death-rate for the year 1899 will therefore be 14.1 per 1,000 of the population.

In London, the deaths in the year 1899 numbered 89,689, and corresponded to a rate of 19.8 per 1,000 of the population, the average death-rate in the ten previous years having been 19.6.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.

Of the 185 deaths of parishioners occurring within and outside the Parish, 33 were under 5 years of age, equal to 17.8 per cent. of the total deaths. The deaths of Infants under 1 year of age numbered 27, equal to 14.6 per cent. of the total deaths, and 175.3 to 1,000 registered births.

In London, during the year 1899, the deaths of Infants under 1 year of age to 1,000 births were 167.0.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—The principal Zymotic Diseases are Smallpox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Typhoid Fever, Typhus Fever, Puerperal Fever, Cholera, and Diarrhœa. The number of deaths occurring in the Parish from this class of disease was 30. This number includes those nonparishioners who died in the Charing Cross Hospital. After deducting these, and adding those parishioners who died in Public Institutions outside the Parish, the mortality due to St. Martin's would be 14, against 11 of the previous year. *Vide* Table 5.

SMALL-Pox.-No case was notified from this disease.

In London, this complaint caused three deaths during 1899.

MEASLES.—Three deaths from this malady occurred in the Parish and two in the Charing Cross Hospital, and of this latter number one was a non-parishioner, and there was one death of a parishioner recorded in the Sick Asylum.

SCARLET FEVER.-No death occurred from this disease.

DIPHTHERIA.—Four deaths from Diphtheria took place in the Charing Cross Hospital, all non-parishioners, and a death of a parishioner from this complaint occurred at Martlett's Court.

WHOOPING COUGH.-No death from this complaint was recorded.

TYPHOID FEVER.—Ten deaths from this disease occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, all of which were non-parishioners, and one of a parishoner outside the Parish.

TYPHUS FEVER.-No death was recorded from this malady.

PUERPERAL FEVER.—One death occurred in the Parish from this complaint.

DIARRHEA.—Nine deaths from this disease were registered in the Parish, three of which were non-parishioners.

For all other causes of death, vide Tables.

INQUESTS.

During the year 1899, inquests were held in the Parish in reference to the deaths of 43 persons, of whom 10 were residents, and also 4 inquests were held respecting the deaths of parishioners outside the Parish.

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NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

During the year 1899 the number of cases of infectious diseases notified in accordance with The Public Health (London) Act, 1891, was 65, as against 38 of the previous year. On referring to Table 7 the diseases will be found specified, and the localities wherein the cases occurred.

The fees paid to the Medical Practitioners for forwarding the notifications of these 65 cases amounted to $\pounds 6$ 10s. 6d., which sum is refunded to your Vestry by the Managers of the Metropolitan Asylums Board.

DISINFECTION AFTER INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

During the year 70 rooms and the contents thereof were disinfected by your Contractor, at a cost of $\pounds 82$ 5s. 2d.

It is satisfactory to state that no claim for compensation has ever been made in respect of articles damaged in the course of disinfection. The Public Health (London) Act, 1891, renders the Sanitary authority liable for any such injury.

CASTLE STREET SCHOOLS, LONG ACRE.

In the latter part of the year, owing to the prevalence of Measles amongst the scholars of the infants' department of the above schools, I deemed it advisable to close that department for a time.

A requisition addressed to the Managers of the schools, signed by two Members of the Vestry—your Chairman and Mr. Dudley W. H. James—was sent, and was as follows:—

The Vestry of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields.

To the Managers of the Castle Street Schools, Long Acre.

Gentlemen,

Acting under the advice of the Medical Officer of Health, we two Members of the Vestry require you to close the infants' department of your schools for three weeks, with a view to preventing the spread of disease, namely, Measles.

Out of 160 scholars, 55 were said to be suffering from the complaint. So far as I could ascertain 14 of these cases belonged to St. Martin's, the rest were in the districts of the Strand Board of Works and St. Giles'.

I had the schoolroom thoroughly disinfected, and afterwards white-washed.

The above facts were reported to the Local Government Board and the London County Council.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF SUSPECTED CASES OF DIPHTHERIA AND TYPHOID FEVER.

In the month of February your Public Health Committee requested me to report as to the advisability, or otherwise, of giving medical practitioners in the parish power to obtain at the Vestry's expense examination by a Bacteriologist of material from suspected cases of infectious diseases. I reported in favour of such facilities being given to medical practitioners, as often cases of Diphtheria and Typhoid in their early stages are difficult to diagnose, and only a bacteriological examination could clear up the doubt.

I was further requested to communicate with the Director of the Laboratories of the Conjoint Board of the Royal College of Physicians and the Royal College of Surgeons, Victoria Embankment, with a view to making arrangements for the carrying out of this scheme. I had several interviews, when it was finally arranged that they would provide the necessary materials for such examination, charging a fee of 3s. 6d. for each case. Your Committee accepted these terms, which were approved of by your Vestry.

In order to make known your decision to the medical practitioners, letters were addressed by your Vestry Clerk and myself to those residing in the parish, and also to those residing on the fringe thereof, informing them of the fact, and giving details as to the mode of procedure. The following are the copies of the letters :-

Sir,

I am directed by the Vestry to inform you that they have recently had under consideration the question of whether it was desirable that they should make arrangements by which Medical Practitioners in the District could obtain, without expense to themselves or their patients, examination by a competent bacteriologist of material from suspected cases of Diphtheria and Typhoid Fever, with a view of aiding the diagnosis where the same did not clearly disclose the disease from which it was anticipated the person was suffering, and being of opinion that it is of great importance in the interests of public health that every reasonable facility should be provided for promptly dealing with even suspected cases of infectious disease, the Vestry have made arrangements by which, in all cases where approved by the Medical Officer of Health for this Parish, they will be enabled to secure an examination of suspected matter at the Laboratory of the Conjoint Board of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons.

The conditions under which this examination will be made are as follows :---

The examination will only be made on the written application of the Medical Practitioner called in to attend on any patient; such application to contain briefly the particulars of the case and to be transmitted to the Medical Officer of Health at this address.

If the Medical Officer of Health is satisfied that the case is a proper one for the Vestry to bear the expense of the examination, sterilised tubes and swabs will be provided by him, and an order will be given with which the tubes and swabs should be transmitted to the Laboratory of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, Examination Hall, Victoria Embankment, W.C.

The fee will be paid by the Vestry.

The result of the examination will be communicated to the Medical Practitioner through the Medical Officer of Health, immediately on receipt of the report from the Laboratory.

I enclose a memorandum prepared by the Medical Officer of Health as to the taking of suspected matter.

The Vestry rely upon your cordial co-operation in giving effect to these arrangements, and trust that you will see that no case in which the diagnosis is clear will be submitted.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS IN SUSPECTED CASES OF DIPHTHERIA AND TYPHOID FEVER.

DIPHTHERIA.

Dear Sir,

For the purpose of obtaining a specimen of exudate in cases of suspected Diphtheria for Bacteriological Examination, I beg to submit to you the following suggestions :--

The patient should be placed in a good light. Remove the cotton wadding stopper from the tube containing the iron wire. Depress the tongue with a spatula and rub the cotton wadding pledget fixed at the end of the rod, gently, but firmly against any visible exudate; or, in other cases, including those in which the exudate is confined to the larynx, pass the pledget as far back as possible and rub it firmly against the mucous membrane of the pharynx and tonsils.

Still keeping the wire in one hand, withdraw the stopper from the tube containing the solidified blood serum, then rub the pledget once or twice over the serum, taking care not to break the surface. Replace the plug, and then return the wire rod with its pledget to its tube, which should also be restoppered at once.

Label the serum tube.

Pack the two tubes in the box, taking care to put a little wadding at each end.

TYPHOID FEVER.

In order to obtain the blood for examination in cases of suspected Typhoid Fever the following is the mode of procedure:—

The skin of the back of the index or middle finger is first washed with soap and water and then with alcohol when available. Meanwhile the finger can be prepared by causing congestion in one of the usual ways, viz.: by tying a piece of tape, not too tightly, round the root of the finger. The tightened congested skin, just above the root of the nail should now be sharply pricked with a clean needle or fine lancet. A pretty deep puncture can be made with a sharp needle without causing the patient much pain. Or, if preferred, the lobe of the ear, after compressing it, may be pricked to obtain the blood.

Then take one of the small tubes from the test tube and draw up a sufficient amount of blood to fill, or nearly fill the small bulb, then draw the blood from the point of the pipette, and seal off in the flame of a candle or gas, or even of a wax vesta.

Always obtain two such tubes if possible.

Return these to the test tube and reinsert the cotton wadding plug.

Label the tube containing the pipettes.

Pack the two tubes in a box, taking care to put a little wadding at each end.

Up to the present time only two applications have been made for a bacteriological examination—one was a case of suspected Diphtheria, which proved to be a genuine case of the disease; the other Typhoid Fever, which was, on examination found not to be the complaint suspected.

This Table shows in a summary form the number of lives saved or the number lost in the year 1899, as compared with the preceding decennium, under each of the more important headings in the list of causes.

The net loss of life in the year 1899 amounted to 727; in other words, had the average death-rate in 1889-98 continued throughout the year under present notice, 727 lives would have been saved which, as it is, have been lost by death. In the year 1899 there was, as compared with the decennial average, an excess of 545 deaths from influenza, 189 from enteric fever, 1,013 from diarrhœal diseases, 565 from cancer, 143 from premature birth, 455 from diseases of the circulatory system, 279 from diseases of the urinary system, 301 from accident, and 34 from suicide. The following diseases accounted for a mortality below the average :— Diseases of the nervous system by 1,021 deaths, whooping-cough by 714, measles by 697, diseases of the respiratory system by 663, and scarlet fever by 557.
