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

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Metropolitan Borough of Bethnal Green.

I have the honour to submit my report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Borough for the year 1958.

Staff. At the beginning of the year, the Department was still three short of its establishment of nine public health inspectors. In April, one of the Inspectors left to take up another appointment and for the remainder of the year there were four vacancies. During the year, the Council approved the appointment of a pupil public health inspector for training with the Department.

The work of the Public Health Department is summarised in the report which follows and the L.C.C. Divisional Medical Officer, Dr. G.O. Mitchell, has again kindly supplied me with some particulars of the personal health services which are, of course, the responsibility of the London County Council.

I am pleased to have this opportunity to thank the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their support and encouragement during the year. I am also grateful to my colleagues in other departments for

During 1958 the Registrar General estimated the population as 49,830, which is 1,110 less than in the previous year.

The death rate was 11.4 per 1,000 persons as compared with a rate of 11.3 for 1957. Both births and deaths depend to some extent on the proportions of young and old people and of males and females in the area, and in order to make comparisons between one area and another the Registrar General gives Area Comparability Factors which take into account these variations in age and sex. Using this factor the adjusted death rate for Bethnal Green would be 11.4 as compared with 11.7 for England and Wales.

The birth rate during 1958 was 17.4 as compared with 15.7 during the previous year. The adjusted rate for comparison with other areas is 16.2 as compared with 16.4 for England and Wales.

The infant mortality rate was 18.4 as compared with the rate of 22.6 for England and Wales. It is, in Bethnal Green, however, calculated on a very small number of infant deaths and is consequently subject to large variations from year to year and as an indication of child care the figure should be used with some caution.

The causes of death are shown in Table 1, which follows. Notification of Births

Arrangements continued in operation during the year whereby the London County Council furnished to the Borough Council a weekly return of births (including stillbirths) notified to them as the Local Health Authority under the National Health Service Act, 1946.

During the year 889 live births (467 male and 422 female) were notified and in addition there were 18 stillbirths (12 male and 6 female).

These figures represent corrected totals after the addition of inward transfers and the deduction of outward transfers and the difference between these figures and those set out previously is due to the fact that births must be registered within 6 weeks and it is not uncommon for a child to be born and notified in one calendar year but not actually registered until the following year.

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SECTION B

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE BOROUGH

Water Supply

Water for domestic purposes in the Borough is obtained in all cases from the Metropolitan Water Board.

Bacteriological and chemical examination of the water is carried out at frequent intervals by the Metropolitan Water Board.

Notices were sent to the Board in 76 cases where wastage of water due to defective pipes or fittings was observed.

During the year 641 new premises were certified as having a proper and sufficient water supply in accordance with Section 95 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1936.

In addition to the supply from the Metropolitan Water Board, there are five wells used for purposes other than drinking. These are:-

Sanitary Inspection of the Borough

Following the 1,869 complaints of insanitary conditions, defects were found requiring the service of Intimation Notices in 1,045 cases. Of these Statutory Notices were required in 400 instances and legal proceedings were instituted in 42 cases. In addition, 28 notices in accordance with the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1955, three under Section 26 and twentyfive under Section 27, were served. In twentyfour cases the necessary work was carried out by the Council and the expenses incurred recovered from the owners of the properties.

In connection with the supervision of drainage works a total of 2,497 inspections were made during the year. 44 notices in accordance with Section 25 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1955, were served and in twentyone instances the necessary work was carried out by the Council and the expenses incurred recovered from the owners of the properties.

Factories, Workshops and Workplaces

The provision of the Factories Acts, 1937 and 1948 are administered by H.M. Inspector of Factories of the Ministry of Labour and National Service, in conjunction with the local sanitary authority. Close co-operation is maintained between the two, and defaults found in the course of visits to factories are notified between one and the other according to the body responsible for remedial measures.

The principal duties of the sanitary authority are the enforcement of Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 of the Factories Act, 1937, insofar as non-power factories are concerned, and Section 7 only in respect of power factories.

Factories and Workplaces in this Borough carrying on a variety of trades number 1,446, and a total of 646 inspections and reinspections were made during the year.

127 investigations were made in regard to drainage and applications under the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947,

OUTWORK

Outworkers (Section 110(I)(c))

Twice yearly, February and August, the Factories Act, 1937, requires all employers of outworkers in the Borough to forward to the Local Authority a list giving the names and addresses of all persons employed by them in homework during the previous six months.

Of the 405 names of outworkers which appeared on the lists received in August, 91 were given as residing within the Borough; in addition 121 names of outworkers residing in Bethnal Green were forwarded from other boroughs.

In addition, on 379 occasions rubbish which had been dumped on open sites, etc., was sprayed with insecticide prior to removal.

The furniture and bedding of 69 families removing to Borough Council flats were disinfested.

Personal Cleansing Station

During the year, 27 adults and 1 child had baths for verminous conditions at the Personal Cleansing Station, simultaneous disinfection of clothing being carried out.

In addition, 21 adults and 16 children received treatment for Scabies at the Station. Public Health Inspectors visit and advise in all cases of Scabies and in those cases where verminous conditions persistently recur.

During the year the mobile bathing equipment for the cleansing, by consent, of aged persons in their own homes where the persons concerned are so enfeebled as not to be able to attend at the Personal Cleansing Station was used on thirty occasions.

Laundry Service for Incontinent Persons.

During the year, the Council approved the provision of a laundry service for incontinent persons in accordance with the provisions of Section 122 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1936. An arrangement was made with the Hackney Borough Council for the laundering to be carried out at the Hackney Disinfection Station at a charge per garment.

Only actually contaminated articles of bed linen and personal clothing of incontinent persons are accepted for laundering. A twice weekly service is provided and collection and delivery is carried out by the Disinfecting Staff.

The arrangement is working satisfactorily and the service fills a most needed want.

The laundry of two persons was dealt with during the year under review.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949

During the year, 327 complaints of infestation by rats or mice were received and in most cases smoke tests of the drainage of the premises affected were carried out by the rodent operatives under the supervision of the Public Health Inspectors. One notice under section 4 (1) of the Act was served.

Systematic baiting and poisoning was carried out by the Rodent Operatives at 307 domestic premises and at 190 business premises, with satisfactory results.

In accordance with the suggestion of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, all sewers under the control of the Council were baited twice during the year, involving a total of 1,284 manholes. Positive results were obtained in 681 instances.

National Assistance Act, 1948

Under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act, 1948, as amended by the National Assistance (Amendment) Act, 1951, provision is made whereby a court of summary jurisdiction may make an order for the removal of ill, infirm or incapacitated persons who are not receiving proper care and attention.

Whilst this provision is necessary in order to deal with unusual and very difficult cases it is one which should be resorted to only when all else has failed.

During the year under review it was found necessary in two following cases to use the powers of the Act:-

- 1. Miss L.S., aged 78 years, was found to be infirm and physically incapacitated and living in insanitary conditions. She was in need or urgent hospital treatment and was unable to devote to herself, and was not receiving from other persons, proper care and attention. She refused to enter a hospital voluntarily and, in her own interests, there was no alternative but to apply for a removal order, which was granted by the Magistrate.
- 2. Mr. E.H., aged about 75 years, was found to be infirm and living in insanitary conditions. He was unable to devote to himself, and was not receiving from other persons, proper care and attention. He refused to enter a suitable institution and, in his own interests, there was no alternative but to apply for a removal order, which was granted by the Magistrate. Mr. H., settled down very happily in the Home to which he was admitted and expressed no desire to leave.

During the year, 28 other cases were brought to the notice of the Department where aged persons were in need of attention. It was possible in a number of these to provide necessary care for these old people in their own homes and the Home Help service provided by the London County Council was again helpful in this connection. In other cases where it was not possible to make satisfactory provision in their own homes the old people were persuaded to enter a hospital or an institution.

The Old People's Welfare Committee, comprising representatives of the Council and the various local organisations and social settlements, continued to provide all possible assistance to old people in the Borough by the provision of clubs, home visitation, meals-on-wheels service, chiropody service, holidays and outings, etc.

Offensive Trades

There are three premises in the Borough registered for the purpose of carrying on offensive trades. One being the business of fur skin dresser and two poultry slaughterhouses. Twentytwo visits of inspection were made to these premises.

The use of the animal slaughterhouse that had been licensed for many years was discontinued during the year.

Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Act, 1951

This Act provides for the licensing by the local authority of all premises used for the manufacture and/or storage of filling materials to which the Act applies, and for the registration of certain premises where such materials are used in upholstering, stuffing or lining of bedding, toys, baby carriages, etc.

There are no premises in the Borough where rag flock or other filling materials are manufactured but 44 premises are registered for the use of such materials in the trades conducted therein.

Pet Animals Act, 1951

The operation of this Act is probably of more importance in Bethnal Green than in any other London Borough on account of the Sunday morning dog market which has been held in Bethnal Green for many years and which serves both vendors and purchasers throughout the whole of the County of London and even beyond.

During the year 15 licences were granted in respect of shops and 51 licenses in respect of stalls.

Eleven warning letters were sent in connection with various infringements of the Act.

Clean Air Act, 1956.

During the year, the Council forwarded proposals to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government for approval to the making of an order declaring 136 acres of the Borough as a Smoke Control Area. The Ministry has since given provisional clearance to these proposals.

A large slum clearance area, comprising 373 privately owned dwellinghouses, comes within the proposed smoke control area and in view of the fact that its clearance is not likely to be completed until 1960, the suggested date for the coming into operation of the Smoke Control Order is 1st September, 1960.

Atmospheric Pollution

A station for the monthly measurement of deposited matter and of sulphur dioxide is installed on the roof of a building at one of the Council's Depots. The apparatus used is in two parts, one instrument being a deposit gauge for the measurement of ash and grit, etc., in the atmosphere and the other a lead peroxide instrument by which the amount of sulphur dioxide is measured.

In addition, a second station for recording the daily measurement of pollution by sulphur dioxide and of smoke is installed at the Town Hall.

The results obtained from the instruments at the two stations are communicated to the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research.

Hairdressers and Barbers

Section 18 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1954, requires the registration of premises and the persons carrying

on the business of hairdressers or barbers thereat. At the end of the year, 53 premises were registered and 85 inspections were made to them during the year.

Food and Drugs Act, 1955

During the year legal proceedings in respect of food unfit for human consumption were taken as follows:-

Selling loaf of sliced wrapped bread which contained two large pieces of metal.

Defendants were fined £5, with £10.0s.0d costs.

Having in possession for the purpose of sale 32 lbs. of margarine intended for but unfit for human consumption.

Defendants were fined £20, with £3.3s.0d costs.

During the year sixteen complaints were received from members of the public who alleged the unsatisfactory condition of food purchased by them. The following were the foods concerned:-

Bread. Meat Pie. Cheese. Milk. Acetic Acid.

Canned Salmon. Fruit Salad.

The vast majority of the complaints were in respect of the presence of foreign matter in the foodstuff concerned.

These complaints were fully investigated and all necessary action taken. In the case of one of the bread complaints legal proceedings were taken and the result is shown above.

In addition a complaint was received concerning the sale of sherbet in very fragile glass phials. This potential source of danger to children had previously been pointed out to the manufacturer who had promised to discontinue the sale of this line in 1956. He had, however, now re-issued the article and had endeavoured to make them safe by wrapping the glass phial with a sticky label.

Upon being informed that the phials were still a danger to young children who in endeavouring to open the phials would often break the glass; the manufacturer decided to cease the sale of sherbet in these containers.

Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955

Summonses were taken out against an occupier of food premises in respect of the undermentioned offences:-

- (i) Regulation 5. Carrying on food business in unsanitary premises, the use of which, because of the condition thereof, exposed food to risk of contamination.
- (ii) Regulation 6(2). Allowing wooden containers intended for containing food in couse of food business to become contaminated.
- (iii) Regulation 14 (1)(a). Failing to keep water closet at food premises in clean and efficient order.
 - (iv) Regulation 14 (5). Failing to maintain in a prominent and suitable position near sanitary convenience at food premises a clearly legible notice requesting users to wash their hands after using convenience.
 - (v) Regulation 23 (1). Failing to keep clean the floors, woodwork and walls of food rooms.
- (vi) Regulation 23 (1)(b). Failing to keep food rooms in such good order, repair and condition as to prevent risk of infestation by mice.
- (vii) Regulation 24. Allowing refuse and filth to accumulate in food rooms where food was stored.

The Justices imposed fines totalling £21 in the case of summonses (i), (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi), and granted an absolute discharge in respect of summonses (v) and (vii).

Preservatives in Food

The routine practice under which all samples of milk, butter, margarine and cheese submitted to the Public Analyst, are examined for the presence of a preservative was continued throughout the year and in no instance was a preservatrive found to be present.

Ice Cream

During the year, 12 applications for registration for the sale of ice cream were approved and 18 premises were removed from the register upon ceasing the sale of ice cream.

At the end of the year there were 151 registered premises in the Borough. 219 inspections of these premises were made during the year and in 5 instances notices were served concerning insanitary conditions.

9 samples of ice cream were submitted to the Methylene Blue' test and graded as follows:-

Grade 1 6
Grade 2 1
Grade 3 1
Grade 4 1

The samples of ice cream Graded 2, 3 and 4 were all from the same manufacturer in the Borough. After examination it was found that a defect in the equipment was responsible for the unsatisfactory condition of the ice cream.

Basement Bakehouses

In accordance with Section 54 of the Factories Act, 1937, during the year the six basement bakehouses in the Borough, in respect of which certificates of suitability had been issued, were examined. In five cases it was considered that the conditions justified the continuance of the certificates but in the case of the sixth bakehouse the occupier was notified that the certificate of suitability in respect of his premises would cease to have effect after a period of twelve months.

Food Poisoning

Notifications (corrected) totalled three.

No food poisioning organisms were isolated. Suspected food in two cases in same household, was canned salmon; but the batch of tins from which the salmon was purchased was found in sound condition.

There were no deaths.

Milk in Schools

The arrangements for sampling milk at London County Council Schools continued without variation. A total of 19 samples were submitted for examination, all of which satisfied the prescribed tests.

SECTION E

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASE

The total number of notifications of infectious disease, excluding Food Poisoning, during 1958 was 342, as compared with 1,077 in 1957.

All four cases of poliomyelitis were paralytic. One of these did not reside in the Borough but the disease was diagnosed in a Bethnal Green hospital.

The number of cases of other diseases notified is shown in Table 10 which follows, and requires no special comment.

The arrangement whereby any variation in the original diagnosis is notified by the Hospital Authorities continued in operation during the year, and Table 10, which gives details of cases notified, has again been prepared with a column showing the corrected figures for each disease after taking into consideration the latest information supplied by hospitals.

Mass Radiography

During the year, a Mass Radiography Unit of the North East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board carried out a survey in the Borough from the 23rd September to 13th October.

The first week of the survey was spent by the Unit in visits to four of the largest housing estates in the Borough. The response to these visits was most disappointing, only 588 persons attending for examination. For the other two weeks the Unit was based at the Town Hall where sessions were held for the general public and for organised groups from factories, offices, etc., when 2,242 persons attended.

The total of these figures, 2,830, compares with 2,716 persons who were X-rayed when the Unit visited Bethnal Green during 1955.

Contacts or Carriers of Infectious Disease - Sickness Benefit

Circular 115/48 of the Ministry of Health empowers the Medical Officer of Health to issue certificates to persons who have been in contact with or who are carriers of infectious disease, thus enabling them to claim sickness benefit under the National Insurance Acts, when he deems it necessary to exclude such persons from work. It is only exceptionally that it is necessary to require a contact or carrier of infectious disease to stay away from work and during the year under review no certificates were issued.

It was however necessary on one occasion to exclude a food handler from her place of work whilst she was a contact of a case of infectious disease. This woman, who was not entitled to National Health sickness benefit, applied to the Council for payment of loss of earnings and the consent of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government, in accordance with Section 228 (1) of the Local Government Act, 1933, was obtained to the payment of an agreed amount.

SECTION F

MISCELLANEOUS

Burial of the Dead

In accordance with Section 50 of the National Assistance Act, 1948, the Council is responsible for the burial or cremation of the body of any person who had died or been found dead within the Borough, and where no private arrangements are being made for the disposal of the body. Authority is given to recover from the estate of the deceased person, or from any person who, under the Act, was liable to maintain the deceased immediately prior to his/her death, the expenses incurred in carrying out the duty, in so far as these expenses are not covered by any grant under the National Insurance Act, 1946.

During the year 10 burials were arranged by the Department at a cost of £92.5s.Od., of which £65.12.3d. was recovered up to the end of the year.

Mortuary

The arrangement between the boroughs of Hackney, Shoreditch, Stoke Newington and Bethnal Green whereby the Hackney Mortuary is the main mortuary for use by the four boroughs with the Bethnal Green Mortuary being maintained as a reserve for use in emergencies is working satisfactorily.

Pharmacy and Poisons Act, 1933

The provisions of the Act and the Poisons Rules relating to the sale of poisons specified in Part II of the Poisons List were administered during the year.

During 1958, the names of 43 persons were retained on, and five persons added to the Council's list of Persons entitled to sell Part II Poisons.

All applications are investigated to ensure compliance with the Act and Poisons Rules.

Swimming Baths

Il samples of water were taken during the year from the Council's Swimming Baths, 10 of which were submitted for chemical analysis and 1 for bacteriological examination. The reports showed that the water consistently maintained a high degree of purity.

International Certificates of Vaccination and Inoculation

Arrangements continued during the year for the authentication by the Medical Officer of Health of Certificates of Vaccination and Inoculation. These certificates are required by persons proceeding abroad from this country and the purpose of the authentication is to provide information to health authorities abroad that the signature of the person issuing the certificate is that of a registered medical practitioner.

Land Charges Act, 1925

Information concerning sanitary notices and Orders outstanding on premises in the Borough and also details of drainage systems is provided to the Town Clerk in respect of applications under the above Act.

Enquiries in respect of 222 premises were dealt with during the year.

SECTION G

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES OTHER THAN THOSE PROVIDED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL

1. (a) Laboratory Facilities

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Public Health Laboratory Service (directed by the Medical Research Council for the Ministry of Health) at the laboratory, County Hall, S.B.L.

This laboratory is available for both medical and sanitary bacteriology. A stock of specimen outfits is maintained at the Public Health Department and these are issued to medical practitioners upon request.

(b) Ambulance Facilities

The London County Council which undertook responsibility for the provision of ambulance transport within the administrative County of London on the coming into force of the National Health Service Act, 1946, continued to provide this service during 1958.

The following Hospitals in the Borough continued to be administered by the North East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board:-

The London Chest Hospital designated a Teaching Hospital and under the control of a Board of Governors, is also situated within the Borough and the Tuberculosis Dispensary established at this Hospital, which serves Bethnal Green and part of the Borough of Hackney, continued to function during the year.

The Little Folks Home at Bexhill, which is associated with the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Children, has a complement of 40 beds.
