To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Metropolitan Borough of Hammersmith.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,—I submit herewith a report upon the health of the Borough and the work of the Public Health Department during 1943. In accordance with instructions of the Ministry of Health the report is in abridged form and consists for the most part of a series of tables and statistics dealing with the vital services.

Generally speaking the health of the Borough has remained satisfactory despite the continuance of war-time conditions.

The death rate for the year was 14.1 as compared with 14.0 in the previous year and the birth rate 19.2 as compared with 17.8 in 1942. This birth rate is the highest recorded for the Borough since 1923.

Compared with the previous year there were 69 less cases of infectious diseases reported, although the number of cases of scarlet fever notified increased from 282 to 410. Cases of diphtheria were 7 fewer at 53. No deaths were recorded from either of these diseases.

Objectors to diphtheria immunisation would do well to ponder the following simple record of facts. In 1934 the number of cases of diphtheria notified was 549 and there were 25 deaths from the disease. In 1935 the immunisation scheme was started in the Borough. In 1939 104 cases were notified and four of the children died. In the year under review 53 cases were notified, none of which proved fatal.

Cases of measles and whooping cough decreased by 64 and 150 respectively. 201 cases of tuberculosis were notified and 72 deaths from that disease occurred during

the year as compared with 200 and 104 during the preceding twelve months.

The work of the Infant Welfare centres continued throughout the year on a peace-time basis and additional ante-natal clinics had to be started to cope with the large numbers of women attending. The total attendances at Infant Welfare clinics was 6,952 more than during the previous year and attendances at the ante-natal clinics increased by 1,416 over 1942.

The Infant Mortality rate and the Maternal Mortality rate for the year were slightly lower at 58 and 1.6 respectively.

The work of the sanitary inspectors was continued throughout the year under very difficult conditions. Scarcity of labour and materials was acute; nevertheless, on the whole, satisfactory results were obtained.

I should like to record my appreciation of the support and co-operation I have received from the members of the staff of the department. In addition to their normal duties most of them have been called upon to undertake Civil Defence duties after hours and at week-ends. This they have done ungrudgingly.

I should like also to express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee and the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee for their support and encouragement throughout the year.

During the year 205 cases received massage treatment, the total number of treatments being 1,816.

Milk for Expectant Mothers and Children.—During the year the scheme by which the Council provide free one pint of milk a day for all expectant mothers and children under five where the family income does not exceed 10s. 0d. more than the scale of the Ministry of Food entitling them to free milk was continued.

33,488 quarts of liquid milk and 9,823 packets of dried milk were supplied under the scheme during the year.

Dinners.—Free dinners have been supplied by the Council to expectant mothers and children under five recommended by the Assistant Medical Officers through the Londoners' Meals Service at Communal Dining Centres in the Borough.

During the year 4 adults were referred to the Centres and 370 dinners were supplied at a cost of £20 0s. 10d.

All the above nurseries have been recognised by the National Society of Children's Nurseries for the purposes of training for the Nursery Nurses' Certificate.

In addition to the nurseries that have been opened by the Council under the auspices of the Ministry of Health, there is in the Borough a day nursery organised by a large industrial undertaking for the children of its work-people. The nursery has accommodation for 150 children and is under the general supervision of the Medical Officer of Health. The firm receive a grant from the Ministry, paid through the Council, of 1s. per day for each child attending.

Residential Nursery.—The residential nursery, opened by the Council in February, 1941, at White Lodge, Iver Heath, Bucks, has accommodation for 8 babies and 30 children from one to five years. All the accommodation has been fully occupied during the year by children of Hammersmith parents.

The nursery is recognised as a training centre by the National Society of Children's Nurseries.

CHILD LIFE PROTECTION.

Public Health (London) Act, 1936.

At the end of the year there were 30 foster-children being cared for in the Borough, and 30 names on the list of foster-mothers.

The Health Visitors are responsible for visiting the homes of all foster-children in their various districts.

During the year 21 foster-mothers were removed from the register for various reasons and 25 new foster-mothers were registered.

RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION.

The Infestation Order, 1943, dated 6th May, 1943, was made by the Minister of Food under the Defence General Regulations, 1939.

On the 11th June the Minister issued a direction to the Council to submit to him a report on the extent to which the Borough was infested by rats and mice. The Borough was surveyed by the Sanitary Inspectors and reports submitted to the Minister during August.

On the 29th October the Minister further directed the Council to proceed on and from the 6th December with the treatment of the Council's sewers. This was carried out by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor and the Medical Officer of Health working in co-operation. Civil Defence personnel from the Light Rescue Service assisted in the work. As a result of this treatment it is estimated that 21,000 rats were destroyed in the Council's sewers.

On the 9th November the Minister further directed the Council to proceed with all necessary action for the remedying of all infestations by rats and mice within the Borough.

The Council's Rodent Officer resigned during the year. Operatives have been engaged and one of the Council's Sanitary Inspectors has been placed in charge of operations.

The circular aims at securing the maximum improvement in housing conditions and defines the work which comes within the scheme.

The Borough Engineer and Surveyor and the Medical Officer of Health report jointly upon all applications and make recommendations as to the issuing of certificates to the Town Clerk.

EXHUMATION AND RE-INTERMENT OF BODIES.




The immunisation of children at the Borough Welfare Centres and at the schools by L.C.C. doctors continued during 1943.

TUBERCULOSIS DISPENSARY.—The work of the Tuberculosis Dispensary was continued at the Hammersmith Hospital under the arrangement made with the London County Council and the British Post-Graduate Medical School. Under this arrangement the Dispensary is housed in a suite of rooms at the Hospital, the British Post-Graduate Medical School provides the Medical Staff and the Borough Council the nursing and clerical staff. Five sessions, at which patients are seen by appointment, are held each week.

The work carried out at the Dispensary during the year shows a considerable increase as compared with pre-war years.

The number of cases notified during the year was 201. Total attendances numbered 3,924 and 3,528 physcial examinations were made. In 1938, when the number of cases notified was 192, the number of attendances at the Dispensary was 2,799 and examinations 1,806. The number of X-ray examinations made during 1943 was 1,724 against 275 in 1938 and the number of A.P. refills given in the same periods was 1,439 and 311.

New Patients.—During the year 1,000 persons attended for examination for the first time, 468 males and 532 females. Of these 219 were under the age of fifteen and 781 were adults. Of the total 368 were referred to the clinic by local practitioners for the purpose of consultation and 106 by the National Service Medical Boards. Three hundred and thirty-four were "contacts" of persons suffering from tuberculosis. Of the "contacts" examined 12 were definitely cases of tuberculosis, whilst 322 were non-tuberculosis.

Total Attendances and Examinations.—The total attendances of persons for the purpose of examination, observation or treatment, numbered 3,924, and physical examinations were carried out in 3,528 instances, *i.e.*, in 90 per cent. of the total attendances.

Home Visitation.—The Tuberculosis Officer made 13 visits to homes of patients for the purpose of examination and investigation of the home conditions.

The Health Visitors visit cases of tuberculosis on notification, and thereafter as far as possible at intervals of six months or less, as may appear advisable. During the year 2,323 such visits were made.

During the year 39 definite cases were transferred from other areas into the Borough and 69 moved out or were lost sight of. Eleven were written off the register as being cured.

Mass Radiography.—As part of a campaign for the early detection of symptomless tuberculosis arrangements were made by the Government for the use of miniature mass-radiography units. One such unit was allocated to the London County Council and commenced work during the year at St. Luke's Hospital, Chelsea.

A number of the large industrial undertakings in the Borough were invited to allow their employees to undergo examination by the unit, transport to and from Chelsea being provided by the Borough Council. The managements of a large number of the firms proved most cooperative and in all 2,444 men and women submitted themselves to examination.

Tuberculosis Allowances.—The Government scheme for the payment of allowances to persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis who have to give up remunerative employment to undergo treatment came into force on 30th June, 1943.

The allowances cover payments to patients for their own maintenance and that of their dependants, discretionary allowances in certain cases towards meeting special liabilities and allowances of pocket money, &c., to persons with no dependants whilst undergoing treatment in an institution.

The assessments of the allowances to be paid are made by the London County Council, but all inquiries are made and administrative work carried out by the Dispensary staff. An Assessment Officer attends once weekly at the Dispensary to assess all new cases and to review old ones when any change in financial circumstances has occurred. Payments are made by the Borough Treasurer's Department. The machinery has worked well and the co-operation of all concerned has resulted in the smooth working of the scheme.

During the six months the scheme was in operation 129 cases were considered—113 patients were granted allowances and 16 cases were found to be ineligible. 99 maintenance allowances, 12 discretionary payments and 14 special payments were made. The total money paid to patients during the six months amounted to £1,935.

FOOD SUPPLIES

Unsound Food.

One seizure of unsound food was made during the year:—

1 lb. 6 ozs. of mushrooms.

A summons was issued and a penalty of £2 was imposed.

A quantity of unsound food was voluntarily surrendered during the year of which a large proportion was salvaged for use as animal and chicken food or recovery of fats for trade purposes other than for human consumption.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938.

800 samples of various food and drugs were submitted to the Public Analyst during the year by the Council's Sampling Officer for analysis; 2 were found to be inferior and 19 were adulterated. Legal proceedings were taken in respect of 7 of the adulterated samples, and penalties and costs amounting to £18 2s. 0d. were imposed.

PHOSPHATASE TEST.

36 samples of milk sold under the special designation "Pasteurised" were submitted to the phosphatase test during the year. The results of these examinations showed that the pasteurising process had been properly carried out in each case.
