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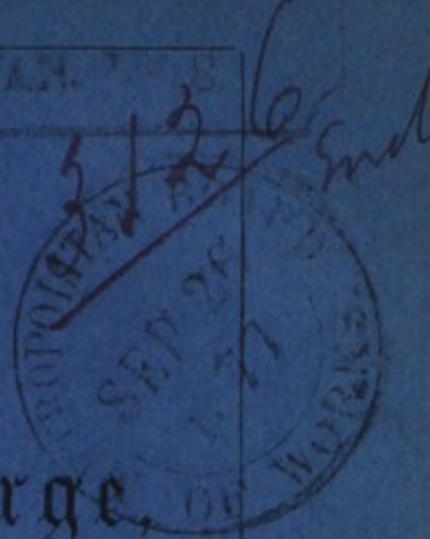

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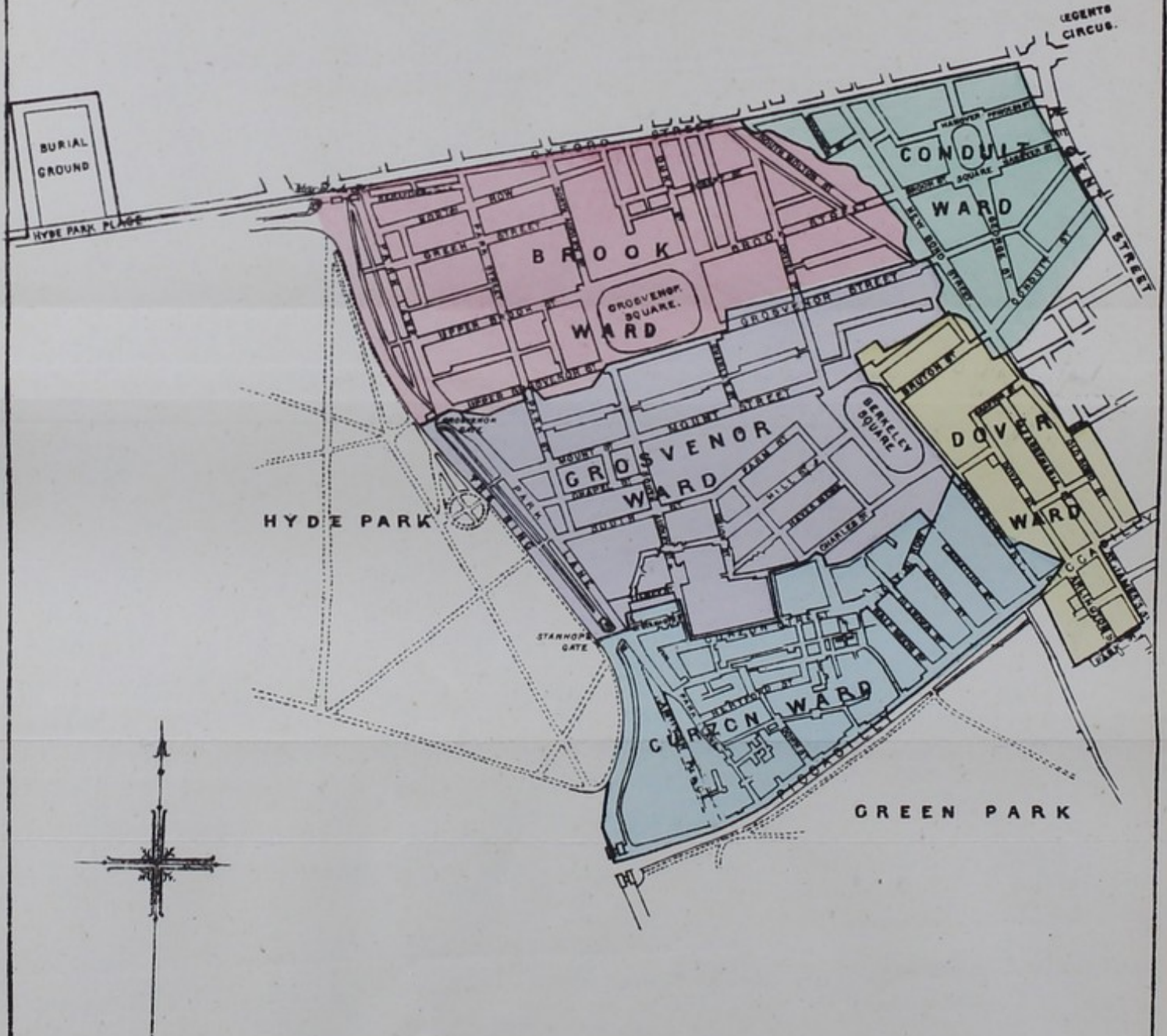

## STANDING ORDERS AND BYE-LAWS

FOR REGULATING

THE BUSINESS AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE VESTRY,

AND FOR CARRYING INTO EFFECT THE PURPOSES OF THE ACTS

FOR THE BETTER LOCAL MANAGEMENT OF THE METROPOLIS.

*(Corrected to 19th July, 1877.)*

## STANDING ORDERS.

I.—The Vestry shall meet at ELEVEN o'clock precisely the FIRST and THIRD THURSDAY in each month. At the hour of Two o'clock the Chairman shall quit the Chair, without any question being put, and thus close the proceedings of the day.

Ordinary Meetings.

II.—An EXTRAORDINARY Meeting of the Vestry may be convened by the Vestry itself at one of its usual Meetings. A SPECIAL Meeting of the Vestry may be called by the Vestry Clerk upon a written requisition signed by NINE Vestrymen, specifying in writing the business to be brought before or the terms of any Motion to be proposed to such Special Meeting. Three clear days' notice of such Special Meeting shall be given to every Vestryman.—The Vestry may at any of its Meetings, upon due notice being given, adjourn between August 1st and October 31st, for a time not exceeding six weeks.

Special &amp; Extraordinary Meetings &amp; Adjournment of Vestry.

III.—A copy of the VESTRY SUMMONS containing the business of the day shall be posted outside the BOARD ROOM in MOUNT STREET and the BOARD ROOM at PIMLICO ROAD, and the Vestry Clerk shall forward a copy of the same to each Member of the Vestry at least three days previous to the Meeting.

IV.—The business of the Vestry shall be taken in order following, that is to say :—

(A) Minutes of last Meeting to be read and signed, and no question to be raised thereon except as to their accuracy.

(B) Boards and Committees to be appointed (Special Committees excepted) at Twelve o'clock.

(C) Deputations seen.

(D) Communications from the Metropolitan Board of Works.

(E) Finance questions requiring the immediate decision of the Vestry.

(F) Reports of Ordinary Committees.

(G) Reports of Special Committees.

(H) Adjourned Debates or Motions.

(I) Motions of which notice has been given. Questions in the order in which they stand, and communications from the Vestry Clerk; but should the communications relate to business on the Agenda, then to mention them at the time when the subject is read from the Chair for discussion.

V.—But on alternate fixed Vestries the business shall be taken in order following, that is to say :—

(A) Minutes of last Meeting to be read and signed, and no question to be raised thereon, except as to their accuracy.

(B) Boards and Committees to be appointed (Special Committees excepted) at Twelve o'clock.

(C) Deputations seen.

(D) Communications from the Metropolitan Board of Works.

(E) Finance questions requiring the immediate decision of the Vestry.

(F) Adjourned Debates or Motions.

(H) Reports of Special Committees.

(I) Reports of Ordinary Committees and communications from the Vestry Clerk.

VI.—No MOTION shall be brought before the Vestry unless NOTICE thereof has been given in writing and been read at a PREVIOUS MEETING, or unless a NOTICE thereof in WRITING has been given to the VESTRY CLERK ONE WEEK AT LEAST previous to the day of Meeting on which it is to be discussed, except on such matters as may arise out of Reports of Ordinary or Special Committees.

Notice of Motions.

VII.—No Motion or Amendment shall be put from the Chair unless reduced to writing and seconded; and no Motion or Amendment, having been seconded, shall be withdrawn without leave of the Vestry.

Mode of putting Motions or Amendments.

VIII.—Whenever an Amendment is made upon any Motion, no second Amendment shall be taken into consideration until the first Amendment is disposed of. If the Amendment is carried, it shall then be put as an original Motion, upon which a further Amendment may be moved; if the Amendment be negatived, then a further Amendment may be moved to the original Question, so far as it applies thereto; but the original Motion having been adopted cannot be superseded by any other Amendment. No Member shall be permitted to move more than one Amendment to a Motion.

Amendments how dealt with.

#### BYE-LAWS.

I.—Every Memorial must be sent to the Vestry Clerk to be laid before the Vestry, the same to be considered the following Vestry to that to which it is presented, when a Deputation may attend if they think fit,—only one Member of which shall address the Vestry, except in reply to questions from Vestrymen.

II.—Whenever Boards or Committees (Special Committees excepted) are appointed by the Vestry, notice thereof shall be given in the Summons, and the appointments shall be made the first business after the Minutes of the previous Meeting are signed.

III.—No Officer of the Parish shall in any way take part in the election of Vestrymen or Auditors of Accounts otherwise than required so to do by Act of Parliament.

IV.—No person shall be eligible for appointment as a salaried Officer of the Parish who has been a Vestryman within the preceding six months.

V.—All printed Papers, of which copies have been sent to each Member by order of the Vestry or a Committee, may be taken as read before the Vestry.

VI.—Any Motion, of which notice has been given, shall be proposed by the Member who has given it; in case of his absence, any other Member having his written authority may move it; but in case it is not taken up, it shall be considered a dropped Motion, unless postponed by leave of the Vestry.

VII.—In case it is thought advisable to adjourn the discussion of any question after debate, the Motion for adjournment must not be made later than a quarter of an hour before two o'clock.

VIII.—No Member shall speak more than once on the same Motion, Amendment, or point of Order; but the Member making the original Motion shall have the privilege of reply; only such reply shall be strictly confined to the remarks of the previous speakers, and shall be made immediately prior to the Question being put from the Chair for decision.

IX.—Upon all Questions of Order, the decision of the Chairman shall be final.

X.—Every Notice of Motion shall be dated and signed

by the Member giving it, and be preserved by the Vestry Clerk.

#### XI.—ELECTION OF CHURCHWARDENS AND SIDESMEN.

*First.* That a Selection of names to be nominated be made and seconded at a Meeting of the Vestry previous to the day of Election; the day for holding this Meeting to be determined by the Vestry.

*Second.*—That every Member of the Vestry be at liberty to propose the names of as many Candidates as there are vacancies, the same being duly seconded.

*Third.* That the Election be confined to the Candidates nominated, except where the number nominated is the same as the number to be elected and a vacancy by death or resignation occur between the days of Selection and Election.

*Fourth.* That any observations relative to the Nomination of any Candidate may be made either at the time of Selection, Nomination, or Election.

*Fifth.* That when the Nominations are in excess of the number to be elected, the Vestry, by successive shows of hands, if necessary, reduce the number of Candidates to the number to be elected, by striking off the lowest after each show; but that every show of hands be subject to the ordinary right of any Member of the Vestry to demand a Poll.

*Sixth.* That when the Candidate or Candidates are reduced to the number to be elected, it shall be moved and seconded and put to the vote, that the Candidate or Candidates left on the list, be elected Churchwarden or Churchwardens, or Sidesman or Sidesmen, as the case may be.



XII.—ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE METROPOLITAN  
BOARD OF WORKS.

*First.* That a Selection of Names to be nominated to be made and seconded at a Meeting of the Vestry previous to the day of Election; the day for holding this Meeting to be determined by the Vestry.

*Second.* That every Member of the Vestry be at liberty to propose the names of as many Candidates as there are vacancies, the same being duly seconded.

*Third.* That the Election be confined to the Candidates nominated, except where the number nominated is the same as the number to be elected, and a vacancy by death or resignation occur between the days of Selection and Election.

*Fourth.* That any observations relative to the nomination of any Candidate may be made either at the time of the Selection, Nomination, or Election.

*Fifth.* That when the Nominations are in excess of the number to be elected, the Vestry shall by successive shows of hands, if necessary, reduce the number to the number to be elected, by striking off the lowest after each show, but that every show of hands be subject to the ordinary right of any Member of the Vestry to demand a Poll.

*Sixth.* That a division called for after any show of hands shall be confined to, and taken upon, the names submitted to the show of hands immediately preceding such call for division.

*Seventh.* That when the numbers are reduced to the number to be elected, it shall be moved, seconded, and put to the vote, that the Candidate or Candidates, left on the list, be elected to the office or offices in question.

XIII.—APPOINTMENT OF VARIOUS COMMITTEES, MEMBERS OF BURIAL BOARD, AND COMMISSIONERS OF BATHS AND WASH-HOUSES.

That these Appointments be conducted as heretofore, by show of hands, unless a Poll is demanded.

XIV.—OFFICERS' SECURITIES :—

*First.* In future, all expenses of Bonds and Securities given by Officers or Servants holding situations under the control of the Vestry, or its Committees, shall be borne and paid by the individual elected (except in special cases where ordered otherwise), and all such Bonds and Securities shall be prepared by the Parish Solicitors.

*Second.* The Securities given by the Officers and Servants, whether now in office or hereafter to be appointed on behalf of this Parish, shall be examined every year, in the month of April, by the Parish Solicitors ; and, in the event of their not being in a satisfactory state, the parties whose Securities are insufficient shall be called upon to give fresh Securities ; and the Solicitors shall report what they have done therein, in writing, to the Vestry.

*Third.* Any Officer or Servant, having given security, shall be bound to give notice of any want or insufficiency which shall come to his knowledge in reference to his sureties.

XV.—That the Parish do not undertake the care of any Footway, Roadway, Mews, or Sewer, until the Surveyor of the Vestry has certified that the same has been properly constructed, and his certificate has met with the approval of the Vestry.

XVI.—That after the Minutes and Reports have been read, Members of this Vestry be allowed to put a question to any Member of any Board or Officer present or within call; but no discussion shall take place thereon.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

The Report of the Surveyor on the Works of Road Maintenance, Paving, Lighting, Cleansing, Watering, Improvement and Sewerage, is submitted herewith, as also the Report of the Medical Officer of Health on the Sanitary condition of the Parish; together with an Abstract of the Accounts of the Vestry which were allowed and signed by the Auditors in May last; and the Financial Statements furnished by the Board of Guardians of St. George's Union, and the Abstracts of the Vestry Poor Rate Account for the two Half-years ended Lady-day, 1877.

During the year there have been 24 Special and Ordinary Meetings of the Vestry. The average attendance at these Meetings has been 60 Members. There have also been 97 Meetings of Committees of Vestry. A Return of the Attendances of Members at both Vestry and Committee Meetings between 1st June, 1876, and 13th May, 1877, is printed in Appendix No. 1.

### SALE AND PURCHASE OF LITTLE CHELSEA WORKHOUSE.

The Board of Guardians, having declined to seal the Agreement, which had been arranged by the Solicitors for the two bodies, concerned, for the purchase of this workhouse for the sum of £40,000, the consideration of the matter has been postponed by the Vestry until October next.

### EXTENSION OF CHELSEA EMBANKMENT.

The Vestry, in October, 1876, hearing that the Metropolitan Board of Works were about to bring a Bill into Parliament for extending the Thames Embankment to Westminster, again resolved to memorialize the Board to take advantage of the opportunity of including in the Bill powers for completing the Embankment and Roadway up to the Chelsea Suspension Bridge. The Memorial was presented by Deputation to the Board, and subsequently a reply was received, stating that the Board, having considered the Memorial, was unable to accede to the request contained therein.

The Vestry then again, by letter, urged a reconsideration of this decision, more especially with regard to the continuation of the paved footway and the lighting, but they regret to have to report that the Board again declined to accede to their request.

The Vestry, after the failure of these efforts, fixed four additional lamps on the portion of the embankment between the boundary of the parish and the Chelsea Suspension Bridge, which are lighted at the parish expense.

FIRE BRIGADE STATION IN NEIGHBOURHOOD OF KNIGHTS-  
BRIDGE GREEN OR SLOANE SQUARE.

The Vestry having been asked by a Deputation, from the Westminster District Board of Works, to join in an application to the Metropolitan Board of Works for a Fire Brigade Station to be placed in the neighbourhood of Knightsbridge Green, after consideration, by writing, urged on the Metropolitan Board the necessity for the erection of a Fire Brigade Station in the vicinity of Knightsbridge or Sloane Square; and the Board, in reply, informed the Vestry that the funds now applicable to Fire Brigade purposes will not admit of any addition to the number of stations at present; that should, however, increased funds be placed at the disposal of the Board, the Board will probably be in a position to increase to some extent, the number of stations; and in that case the claims of the neighbourhood of Knightsbridge and Sloane Square shall be duly considered.

GAS SUPPLY TO PUBLIC LAMPS.

Six Resolutions of the Vestry, under this head, were printed in last year's Report. In continuation, the Vestry have now to add that they have arranged with the London Gaslight and Coke Company for a reduction in the number of lighting hours for the public lamps in the district supplied by them from about 4500, to 3836 hours per annum. They also accepted an offer of the Company to transfer the services from the cannel to the common gas mains. Whilst the arrangement for reducing the number of lighting hours, will prove a saving in cost to the parish, the alteration in the services makes the charge for gas supply somewhat heavier. The Vestry feel assured, though, that



the marked improvement in the lighting of the district will give general satisfaction,

The Gaslight and Coke Company having, as reported last year, applied to the gas referees to prescribe and certify the mode of ascertaining the quantity of gas consumed by the public lamps, the following notification was issued by the referees, viz. :

“PARISH OF SAINT GEORGE, HANOVER SQUARE.

“*Supply of Gas for Public Lighting by Measurement.*

“NOTIFICATION BY THE METROPOLITAN GAS REFEREES.

“WHEREAS the Gas Light and Coke Company have under the powers of section 38 of the City of London Gas Act, 1868, required that the gas for public lighting within the parish of St. George, Hanover Square, shall be supplied by measurement, and have further required the Referees to prescribe and certify the mode of ascertaining the quantity of gas consumed by the public lamps in the said parish.

“We therefore in compliance with this requisition do prescribe and certify as follows :—

“1. The gas shall be measured by a meter to be attached to every twelfth public lamp, and the average consumption of the whole of the lamps to which meters are attached, shall be taken to represent the consumption of each public lamp supplied.

“2. The meters shall be wet meters, of the best and most improved construction, and made by makers of acknowledged reputation.

“3. The meters shall work, when new, with such friction

that the excess of pressure on the inlet over that on the outlet shall not exceed one-tenth of an inch of water.

“4. Each meter shall be placed in an iron box, of suitable construction and made water-tight by proper lids, to be let into the ground near the foot of the lamp column.

“5. Each lamp shall be furnished with a proper burner, governor and cock of the best construction.

“Similar burners, governors, and cocks shall be affixed to all the lamps metered and unmetered.

“Each burner shall be so constructed, as to consume such quantity of gas per hour as the parish shall determine, with a pressure beneath the burner corresponding as nearly as may be to that hereinafter prescribed.

“Each governor shall be so adjusted, as to maintain beneath the burner to which it is attached such pressure as will cause the said burner to consume the above-mentioned quantity of gas per hour, and shall be of such size and construction as to maintain this pressure, certainly and uniformly, under the usual variations of pressure in the mains, and to be in full action whenever the pressure at its inlet is not less than five-tenths of an inch of water.

“The clear way through the cock when fully open shall in no part have a sectional area less than one twenty-fifth of a square inch.

“6. The pressure of gas beneath the burners shall, in default of any other amount being mutually agreed upon between the parties, be fixed at two-tenths of an inch of water.

“7. At intervals, not exceeding three years, every meter shall be taken out, examined, cleaned, tested, and put in order if necessary. Testings for friction and for percentage of

error may also be made *in situ* (by proper apparatus contrived for the purpose) at more frequent intervals, at the option and at the expense of either party.

“If at any time the friction of a meter shall be found to exceed one-tenth and a half of an inch of water, or the percentage of error shall be found to exceed the limits fixed by the Sales of Gas Act, the meter shall at once be taken out, and returned to the maker for re-adjustment, so as to reduce the friction to an amount not exceeding one-tenth of an inch of water, or to correct the error of registration.

“8. The arrangements for lighting and extinguishing the lamps, and for the repair of the posts and lanterns, the situation of the metered lamps, and the provision, fixing, and maintenance of all meters, governors, and other requisite apparatus, must be settled by agreement between the parties.

“9. By section 85 of the City of London Gas Act, 1868, both the local authority and the gas company are entitled to have access to the governors for the purpose of examining the same, and any dispute with reference to the affixing, operation, or inspection of governors is to be referred to the determination of the chief gas examiner. But we recommend that every governor and burner shall be taken down and re-tested at least once a year, and that when the consumption of any governor and burner is found to vary to the extent of half a cubic foot per hour from the quantity of gas intended to be consumed, such governor and burner should be returned to the maker for re-adjustment.

“10. The register of each meter shall be read and recorded at regular intervals by two officers going round together, one on behalf of the company, the other on behalf of the parish, and their joint record shall furnish the data from which the average consumption is to be calculated.

“This record shall be taken at such intervals as the parties shall agree on, but not less frequently than once a quarter.

“11. In the event of any disputes or differences arising between the parish and the company, as to any matters or things connected with the arrangements of the meter system (except such as are provided for by section 85 of the Act), such disputes or differences, shall be referred to an arbitrator to be agreed on between the parties, or failing such agreement to be nominated by the gas referees for the time being ; he shall investigate such disputes or differences, and shall decide thereon ; his decision shall be binding on both parties, and his charges shall be paid as he may award.

“12. The referees being required to prescribe and certify the mode of measurement “from time to time,” it shall be competent for either party at any time after the system has been in full operation for one year, to make a further application to the gas referees for the time being, who shall thereupon examine into the working of the system, and order any modifications therein which they may deem just and reasonable.

The Vestry, acting on the above notification, have entered into a contract with the Gaslight and Coke Company for the supply of gas, and have also contracted with Messrs. Wright & Co., of Millbank, for the supply and fixing of meters, governors, &c., and for their future maintenance for ten years. The meters and governors are being fixed, and the Vestry have made all the necessary arrangements for lighting and extinguishing of lamps, &c., in the

districts of the parish supplied by the Company, by workmen in the employ of the parish, from the 30th June, 1877.

These arrangements necessarily involve a large outlay for first cost, but the Vestry trust that an improvement in the lighting, and a saving in the annual expense will be the ultimate result of the change in the system.

#### BURIAL BOARD.

A return of the money paid out of the Poor Rate, and from Rent Accounts, to the Burial Board, since its formation, up to 25th March, 1877; and a return of the number of interments in the Cemetery at Hanwell, for every year or part of a year, showing the number of parishioners, non-parishioners, and paupers, are printed in Appendices Nos. 5 and 6.

A plan, showing the laying out of the Cemetery, can be seen at the Board Room, Mount-street, and full particulars of charges, &c., can also be obtained at the above Office.

#### BATHS AND WASH-HOUSES.

A return of the money paid out of the Poor Rate to the Commissioners of Baths and Wash-houses, up to the year ended March 25th, 1877, is printed in Appendix No. 7. This return shows the sums paid every year by the Commissioners for redemption of capital, interest of money borrowed, and rent of premises; together with the amounts received for rent of premises let off; the amount of loan outstanding, the dates when the loan will be paid off, and the dates of the expiration of the leases of premises held by the Commissioners.

The Baths are situated in Davies Street, Berkeley

Square, and in Buckingham Palace Road, Pimlico. They are not open on Sundays.

#### SANITARY REPORT.

The Sanitary condition of the Parish has been watched over by Dr. Corfield, the Medical Officer of Health and Analyst, who has presented monthly reports to the Vestry upon the subject. Complaints of nuisances have been examined into by the Inspector of Nuisances. The Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health will be found at page 67.

#### WATER COMPANIES' ACCOUNTS.

A Statement of the Accounts of the Grand Junction Water Works Company, and the Chelsea Water Works Company, for their financial year, ended in March last, has been forwarded to the Vestry Clerk in accordance with the Provisions of "The Metropolis Water Act, 1871," and may be inspected by any Ratepayer, free of charge.

#### SACRAMENTAL ALMS' FUND.—PARISH CHURCH.

The money collected at the Offertory of Holy Communion, is under the control of the Rector and Churchwardens, who, during the past year, continued the monthly payment of seven shillings each, to the aged poor persons who remained on the list of recipients. The amount distributed during the past year (viz., from Ascension Day, 1876, to Ascension Day, 1877) was £256 4s.

By the death of Mrs. Nasmyth, of No. 44, Queen's Road, Bayswater—formerly a parishioner of this Parish—an important addition has been made to the list of charitable bequests, the particulars of which will be found on page 46.

#### DEATH OF THE REV. HENRY HOWARTH, B.D.

The Vestry regret to have to report that the Rev. Henry Howarth, B.D., who was, during a period of 31 years, Rector of this Parish, and *ex officio* Chairman of the Vestry,

died on 25th August, 1876. The Rectory, which is in the gift of the Bishop of London, was accepted by the Rev. Edward Capel Cure, M.A., Rector of St. George's, Bloomsbury; and he was inducted into the office on 3rd December, 1876.

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### PARLIAMENTARY.

The Metropolis Gas Companies' Bill reported as referred to a Select Committee in the last annual report, was not passed.

#### POOR LAW AMENDMENT BILL (1876).—CLAUSE 34.

The effect of this Clause, as amended in Committee, appeared to be to transfer the present Audit of the Vestry Accounts from the Auditors elected by the Ratepayers, to an Officer of the Local Government Board. The Vestry, through their Parliamentary Committee, communicated with the two Members of Parliament for Westminster, and urged them to see that the Clause was so altered as to exempt the Metropolis from its operation. Similar action was taken by many of the Vestries and District Boards of the Metropolis, and the result was that the Clause was amended in the way desired.

#### VALUATION BILL (1877).

This Bill was again introduced into Parliament by the Government, and the Vestry, having considered the same, passed the following resolutions with regard to some of the Clauses which they forwarded to the President of the Local Government Board, viz. :—



On section 86.—For empowering the Local Government Board to direct, from time to time, what particulars shall be contained in a rate book.

That the large and indefinite powers proposed to be conferred thereby on the Local Government Board may be uncertain in their operation.

On section 89.—To enable the Local Government Board to make rules and orders for carrying out the Act.

That though this section seems to follow on the lines of the existing law, yet it must be borne in mind that the law originated in the necessity of giving the Local Government Board powers for the amendment of the Poor Laws—a local purpose.

By this Act the basis of rating for Poor Law purposes is taken as the basis of the Income and other Government Taxes, and that by these indirect means it will fall within the province of the Treasury, as the General Taxation Authority of the Kingdom, to guide and control the regulations of the Local Government Board, hence it indirectly gives it indefinite powers, the result of which it is difficult to foresee.

The Bill was withdrawn.

#### METROPOLIS TOLL BRIDGES BILL (1877).

This Bill was brought into Parliament on behalf of the Metropolitan Board of Works, to enable the Board to provide for throwing open to the free use of the public certain Toll Bridges within the Metropolis.

The Vestry petitioned Parliament against the Bill, as

they deemed it unwise, at the present time, to further increase the debts of the Metropolis for such a purpose.

The Bill has become law.

#### METROPOLITAN STREETS IMPROVEMENT BILL (1877).

This was a private Bill, introduced into Parliament by the Metropolitan Board of Works, for the purpose of enabling the Board to make certain new street improvements within the Metropolis, the gross estimated cost of which amounted to £4,566,040.

The Vestry, looking to the very heavy amount of the existing debt of the Metropolis, protested against the Bill, and also presented a Petition to Parliament against it.

The Bill has been passed.

#### GASLIGHT AND COKE COMPANY'S BILL (1877).

By this Bill it was proposed to repeal Sections 30 and 51 of the Gaslight and Coke Company's Act, 1876, Section 30 imposing upon the gas referees the duty of prescribing and certifying the maximum amount of impurity, in each form, with which gas supplied by the Company shall be allowed to be charged; and Section 51 imposing a forfeiture of £50 for each station at which, on an average of three days, the gas supplied by the Company is of less purity than it ought to be under the Act.

The Vestry unanimously agreed to ask the Metropolitan Board of Works to oppose this Bill, in the interests of the Metropolis. The Metropolitan Board petitioned Parliament against the Bill; and the Committee to which the Bill was referred, reported the Preamble as not proven.

During the year 25 communications have been received from the Superintending Architect of the Metropolitan Board of Works, notifying the applications made for the consent of the Board to the erection of porticoes, bay windows, additions, or other alterations to property within the line of area in this Parish. A list of these communications, with the opinion of the Vestry, and the decision of the Metropolitan Board of Works upon each application is submitted in Appendix No. 9.

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Seventy-three applications for permission to build or alter vaults, areas, dung pits, and other works, abutting upon or under the public way, have been considered by the Vestry. A list of the various applications, with the decision of the Vestry, is printed in Appendix No. 10.

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#### ALTERATIONS IN NAMES OF STREETS, AND RENUMBERING OF HOUSES.

The Metropolitan Board of Works, during the year, have renumbered a portion of Warwick Street—Grosvenor Road (abolishing subsidiary names)—and a portion of Grosvenor Place.

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## LIST OF CHARITIES.

## LYON'S ESTATE CHARITY.

The Vestry are interested, so far as the portion of the roadway of Oxford-street in this Parish is concerned, in the rents and profits of certain lands at Kilburn and St. Marylebone, which were left, about the year 1592, by John Lyon, the founder of Harrow School, towards the repair of the road, from Edgware to London, and the road, from Harrow to London. The rents and profits are paid annually to the Edgware Highway Board by the Keeper and Governor of Harrow School, and by that Board distributed amongst the various local authorities having jurisdiction over the roads. The total sum apportioned to the southern half of Oxford-street for the year ended 31st December, 1876, was £171 19s. 7*d.*, and the portion credited to this Parish, by the St. Marylebone Vestry, (who have charge of the whole road,) in their precept upon this Parish, was £103 0s. 5*d.*

## GENERAL STEUART'S CHARITY.

By will, dated 21st May, 1726, General Steuart left the sum of £5,000, Irish currency, in the hands of Trustees for the benefit of the Parish of St. George, Hanover-square; the sale of this stock, realized the sum of £4,484 16s. 1*d.*, and land was purchased in South-street, and an Endowed School erected thereon. This school is now carried on by a Board of Managers, in conjunction with the Subscription School of the Parish of St. George, Hanover-square, in South-street, under an arrangement sanctioned by the Court of Chancery; but the funds of the Charity, which consist of £4,800, 3 per cent. Consols, and the School House and premises in South-street, let for £105 per annum, are

entirely under the control of the Trustees of the Charity. There are 24 boys in the School, who are clothed and taught the common rudiments of education, with the prospect of a reward of £10 towards an apprenticeship.

The Trustees meet twice in the year to select children to fill up vacancies, and upon the general business of the Charity.

#### WILKIN'S AND TEAGE'S CHARITY.

Mrs. Mary Wilkins, in 1771, left the sum of £50, the interest of which was to be used for the benefit of poor persons in the Parish not receiving relief.

The sum of one hundred pounds was left by will by Mrs. Teage, in the year 1774, to the Minister and Churchwardens of the Parish for the time being, to be placed out at interest upon real security, or in the public funds, or in the purchase of lands or hereditaments, and the interest or produce, to be from time to time applied by the Minister and Churchwardens, and their successors, in the purchase of bread and coals, to be distributed by them to the poor of the Parish on every St. Thomas's Day for ever.

£160 Consols have been purchased with these two Charities, and realize together £4 16s. per annum, which is distributed by the Rector and Churchwardens in the manner provided.

#### H.R.H. THE DUCHESS OF GLOUCESTER'S CHARITY.

H.R.H. the Duchess of Gloucester, by will, dated 29th January, 1857 (proved in the same year), left a sum of money for the benefit of poor persons in this Parish, and a like sum for the benefit of the poor residing in the vicinity of Grosvenor Chapel.

The sum of £253 17s. 7d. is invested in Consols, which produces £7 12s. 4d. per annum, and is distributed by the Rector and Churchwardens to the poor of the Parish.

And a further sum of £253 17s. 7d. in Consols, which produces £7 12s. 4d. per annum, with regard to which, the Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales, have made an order, appointing the Rector and Churchwardens Trustees, during the tenure of their several offices, and their respective successors, to administer the Charity, and the dividends accruing are to be applied for the benefit of such poor people residing in the Parish, with preference to those, who reside in the vicinity of Grosvenor Chapel, or in case any ecclesiastical district shall be hereafter assigned to the said Chapel, the income of the Charity is to be applied, for the benefit of the resident poor of such district.

#### TOMLINSON'S CHARITY.

Mr. Matthew Tomlinson, by will, dated 28th September, 1835 (proved the same year), gave a freehold house in Stafford-street ("Goat" P.H.), and the accruing rent therefrom, that his Executors should annually clothe four poor men and four poor women in this Parish, and likewise three poor men and three poor women of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields; one of the Overseers of the Poor of each Parish to have access to the accounts of the Trustees. The poor persons to be clothed on the day of the month on which the Testator died.

This Charity is in the hands of five Trustees. The house realizes £75 per annum, and a sum of £81 10s. 3d. is invested in New 3 per Cents., which realizes £2 8s. 8d. per annum.

## WILLIAM TERWIN'S CHARITY.

Mr. William Terwin, by will, dated 2nd December, 1824, left the sum of £350 Consols to the Rector and Churchwardens, the interest of which was to purchase bread, to be distributed annually, in January, in that part of the Out Ward of the Parish called Neat House.

The sum is invested in Consols, and realizes £10 10s. per annum, which is distributed by the Rector and Churchwardens.

## MRS. NASMYTH—1876.

Mrs. Nasmyth, by Will, dated 15th May, 1869, bequeathed the residue of her Estate to the Rector and Churchwardens for the time being, to be invested by them in their names in the Consolidated Three per Cent. Bank Annuities, or upon Government or Real Securities at interest, in trust to pay and distribute the dividends and interest arising therefrom half-yearly as they shall become due and payable, in relief or gifts to the deserving poor, born or residing in the said Parish, who shall not at any time have received, or be then in the receipt of Parish relief. Every unmarried person selected to be paid the sum of £1 half-yearly, and every married person selected the sum of £2 half-yearly. It being Mrs. Nasmyth's wish that as many shall participate in the bequest as the annual produce thereof will admit of when distributed at the said rates, and further, that the selection of persons from among the deserving poor shall at all times be under the entire control of the Rector and Churchwardens for the time being, but so, nevertheless, that they shall select as recipients in the proportion of two married persons, widows, or widowers, to one unmarried person.

The residue of the Estate amounts to £3,935 19s. 3d. and this sum has been invested in New Three per Cent Annuities.

#### PEST HOUSE CHARITY.

This Parish, together with the Parishes of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, St. Clement Danes, St. James, Westminster, and St. Paul, Covent Garden, are interested in this Charity, which was founded by Earl Craven, in 1687. The Charity, in 1868, consisted of property at Craven-hill-gardens, Craven-hill-mews, and Craven-mews, let at rents realizing £183 14s. per annum; and £15,537 cash, being the purchase-money due for premises belonging to the Charity, taken for the purposes of the Metropolitan Railway Company; and £395 7s. 8d. Bank 3 per Cent. Annuities, remaining on the credit of "Attorney-General *v.* Earl Craven." The Charity was originally demised by the Earl Craven, for the benefit of poor persons suffering from the plague.

A scheme for the management and regulation of the Charity, and for the application of the income thereof, was approved by orders of the Court of Chancery, on 30th May, 1864, and 19th February, 1868. Under this Scheme, the Incumbents of each of the Parishes interested, are by virtue of their offices, always to be Trustees.

In addition to which, Trustees have been appointed by the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales, upon the nominations of the several Vestries, in the following proportions, viz. :—

One of the appointed Trustees from each Parish is to go out of office every fourth year, but shall be eligible for re-election. The duties of the Trustees, Receiver, and Clerk are laid down in the Scheme, and the application of the income is as follows, viz. :—

“After providing for any costs or expenses which may from time to time be directed by any Court or authority of competent jurisdiction to be paid out of the funds of the Charity, and paying the current expenses of the management and administration of the trust, in pursuance of this Scheme, the Trustees shall, until the further order or direction of the Court of Chancery, from time to time pay three-fifth parts (not exceeding £600) of the net annual income to the Treasurers or other the persons for the time being acting in the administration of the funds of King’s College Hospital in Portugal-street, Lincoln’s-inn-fields, and the remaining two-fifth parts (not exceeding £400) of such net annual income to the Treasurers or other the persons for the time being acting in the administration of the funds of Charing-cross Hospital in Agar-street, Strand, such payments to be received by the said Hospitals respectively on the conditions hereinafter mentioned :—

“I. The Governors of King’s College Hospital shall set apart twenty-four beds, and the Governors of Charing-cross Hospital shall set apart sixteen beds, in a convenient part or parts of their respective Hospitals, and shall receive therein such patients (herein called in-patients), being sick and otherwise qualified according to the provisions hereof, as shall be sent by the Trustees with in-patients’ orders as hereinafter provided.

“II. The said Governors respectively shall also receive

and supply with advice and medicine as out-patients all poor persons resident in the said several Parishes who shall be sent by the Trustees with out-patients' orders at the customary times for the attendance of out-patients.

“ III. The Secretaries of the said Hospitals respectively shall give immediate notice to the Clerk of all vacancies in the number of the in-patients, and of any person being rejected as an in-patient.

“ IV. All in-patients requiring medical or surgical aid, and being fit cases for Hospital treatment, shall be received by both Hospitals indiscriminately, whether suffering from contagious or infectious disorders or not (small-pox alone being excepted), and shall be treated in all respects in the same manner as the other patients received into the Hospitals respectively.”

The orders for admission as in-patients or for treatment as out-patients in the Hospitals, are granted by an Order Committee, consisting of five Trustees, one member of the Committee being elected from each Parish interested.

A new Scheme is to be obtained, if by the falling in of leases or otherwise the net income of the Charity shall exceed £1,000, or if at any time, from change of circumstances or otherwise, Her Majesty's Attorney-General should be of opinion that further arrangements are desirable.

#### SAMARITAN FUND.

In the year 1862 the sum of £50 was left by Lady Williams to the poor of this Parish. The sum having been

handed to the Clerk of the Governors and Directors of the Poor, they, under the authority of the 13th section of "The Parish Local Act" (7 Geo. IV., cap. cxxi.), on the 21st May, 1862, resolved:—

"That a book be provided, called the Samaritan Fund Book, in which the amount should be entered; that the money be kept in the Clerk's hands, and disposed of, from time to time, by this Board, the sums given being signed by the presiding Chairman of the day."

Subsequently the Board further resolved:—

"That a box be placed at the House in Mount-street, with the following inscription,—'Samaritan Fund of St. George, Hanover-square, for the Relief, by Gift, of such Poor Persons as the Poor Board cannot, by law, assist with Money;' and

"That the Governors and Directors of the Poor, for the time being, constitute a Committee for the distribution of the Samaritan Fund."

Upon the formation of St. George's Union, the Fund was handed over to Trustees, for the benefit of the poor of this Parish. The box is retained at the Mount-street Workhouse, and the funds arising therefrom are distributed by the Trustees, upon the recommendations of the Board of Guardians of St. George's Union.

## SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit this my Third Annual Report of the various Works which have been carried out during the year ended Lady-day, 1877, also a statement showing the actual cost incurred in each department.

## MAINTENANCE OF ROADS.

At the commencement of this year owing to the long continued rain towards the close of the preceding one, many of the roads of the Parish were reduced to a very bad condition, and consequently the amount of material required to put them into their present state of repair has been greatly in excess of what was anticipated would be necessary.

The expense under this heading, therefore, is much greater than it has been for several years past.

Last Christmas I explained to the Committee of Works, that I had then already exceeded my estimate; but as more road material was required, and in as much as the contract price for its supply was lower, by 1s. 7*d.* a ton, than it would be the following quarter, the Committee directed me to obtain as much granite as possible at the reduced price: The purchase of this additional material has, of course, added considerably to the past year's expense.



The following thoroughfares have been converted from flint roads to granite roads :—

Hindon Street.

Denbigh Street (from Warwick Street to Belgrave Road).

Eccleston Street (from Ebury Street to King's Road).

Upper Eccleston Street.

Lowndes Street.

Halkin Street West.

Belgrave Square (West and East Sides).

#### UXBRIDGE ROAD.

A considerable improvement has been effected by the raising of that portion of the Uxbridge Road between the Marble Arch and Stanhope Place. Previous to the alteration, the footway on the north side of the road was nearly three feet above the level of the roadway, and was in consequence exceedingly dangerous to foot passengers. The roadway, however, has been raised to within a few inches of the curb of the footway, which is now perfectly safe. The cost of the work has been about £400, towards which the Parish of Paddington has contributed the sum of £100.

#### GROSVENOR ROAD.

The portion of Grosvenor Road between St. George's Square and Ranelagh Road, although raised in the spring of '76 an average height of 3 ft., to prevent the overflowing of the Thames, has since been raised an additional height of about 6 inches, in order that the property adjoining might be rendered as secure as possible from flooding during high tides. The cost of this additional work has been about £100.

The following statement shows the quantity of material used in the maintenance and repairs of the various roads in the Parish, and the total amount expended, including labour:—

### THE STEAM ROLLER.

The steam roller has worked continuously on the granite roads, and occasionally on flint roads. The horse roller has also been used on flint roads as often as circumstances would permit.

The total area of streets rolled has been about 237,349 superficial yards, part of which has been done by hired rollers.

### WOOD PAVEMENT.

#### PICCADILLY.

The wood pavement laid in Piccadilly by the Improved Wood Pavement Company in 1873, and subsequently, has worn exceedingly well. The pavement generally is in excellent condition. Owing to a leakage in one of the water-service pipes, the foundation of that portion of the pavement between Park Lane and Hamilton Place was partly washed away. The pavement itself, however, was in perfectly good condition; but the entire portion has been relaid by the Company at their own expense.

#### PARK STREET.

The Improved Wood Pavement Company have laid down in August, '76, about 1,117 yards of their pavement in Park Street, between Mount Street and Grosvenor Street, at a cost of £837 15s.; the expense of which was paid by His Grace the Duke of Westminster.

#### VICTORIA STATION.

I may also mention that the specimen piece of wood pavement laid in the Wilton Road, at the entrance to Victoria Station, in December, '75, although subject to considerable traffic, shows scarcely any perceptible signs of wear.

### MAINTENANCE OF FOOTWAYS AND CARRIAGEWAYS.

There have been constantly employed during the last year, in the various repairs, &c., four masons and four paviours; they have re-laid certain portions of the foot and carriageways which were worn, sunk, or broken, using new materials, supplied by contract, where the old was not fit to re-lay; they have also made good the pavements disturbed for gas, water, new buildings, alterations, &c.

They have used, during the year, 1,129 yards super. of York paving, and the cost has been as follows:—

### ASPHALTE.

The Société Française des Asphaltes has, during the year, paved the following footways with Asphalte, which has been carried out at the rate of 5s. 6d. per yard super., including the Portland cement concrete foundation, 3 in. thick, and ¾ in. of asphalte.

The work has been done in a very satisfactory manner.

## LIGHTING.

The streets under the control of the Vestry have been lighted by gas supplied by the Gas Light and Coke Company and the London Gas Company.

The Vestry having considered it desirable to obtain, as far as possible, a supply of gas of a uniform quality throughout the Parish, made application to the London Gas Company

to have the district supplied by them with cannel gas changed to common. The Company having agreed to this, the necessary alterations of services have been made, and the whole of the lamps in the Out Wards hitherto supplied with cannel gas will in future consume common gas, except thirteen, which are still burning cannel, but are charged for by the London Gas Company as burning common.

The following Table will exhibit the number of lights in each district,—the cost, quality, and quantity of gas consumed per burner :—

### CLEANSING THE STREETS.

The cleansing of the streets has been done by men in the employment of the Vestry. The sweepings in the In Wards have been removed under contract by Mr. T. Hobbs, Jun.; the sweepings in the Out Wards have been carted from the streets by the Parish carts to the Parish Wharf, and thence barged away by contract.

With the view of preventing disagreeable smells which were complained of, the principal thoroughfares have, as occasion required, been thoroughly washed, and the effect has proved so beneficial that during the past summer I have not received a single complaint.

#### WATERING THE STREETS.

The spreading of the water in the streets of the In Wards has been done by Mr. T. Hobbs, Jun.; in the Out Wards by the horses and carts belonging to the Vestry.

The water for the In Wards is supplied by the Grand Junction Water Company, and that in the Out Wards by the Chelsea Water Company.

#### STOCK OF PLANT AND MATERIALS.

The valuation of the plant and materials, consisting of 1 steam roller, 1 horse roller, 28 horses, 27 slop carts, and 14 water carts, 12 water vans, 4 shoot carts, &c., &c., the property of the Vestry, at *the expiration of the* parochial year was £8,246 0s. 7d.

On the 25th of March, 1876, the number of horses in stock, the property of the Parish, was twenty-seven. Since then one horse ("Turpin") has been sold by auction, and realized £36 15s. Two horses have been purchased (August, 1876) at a cost of £140. The number of horses in stock, therefore, at the end of the past year (Lady-day, 1877) was twenty-eight; the value of which I estimate at £1,782.

#### STABLE ARRANGEMENTS.

The cost incurred, under this heading, in the maintenance of the Parish Plant, together with the keep of the



above horses, including all labour and expenses for the year ended Lady Day, 1877, has been £4,423 19s. 7d., viz:—

The average number of horses working per day during the year was 27, exclusive of Sundays.

#### SEWERS.

The sewers in the Parish have been cleansed, repaired, and flushed from time to time by the workmen in the employment of the Vestry. New gullies have been fixed for carrying off surface water, and gullies and ventilators have been trapped and repaired in all cases where necessary.

The Committee of Works having given instructions, as occasion offered, to fix ventilators over all man-holes which

were found unprovided with gratings, not only to promote the better circulation of air in the sewers, but also to prevent the accumulation of coal-gas at those places, I have had a proper ventilator fixed in every case where such is found.

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MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

The year 1876 was a very healthy one for the Parish, and for London generally, in spite of the fact that an epidemic of small-pox was prevalent. Table I. shows as usual the number of deaths in each quarter of every year from 1868, and it will be seen that the gross total of deaths recorded in the Parish in 1876 (that is to say, during the 52 weeks ending Saturday, December 30th, 1876), was 1868, almost the same as that of last year, but still a larger number than that recorded during any year since 1871, and larger than the average of the last eight years; but this is accounted for by the large number of persons who died in Public Institutions, viz., 573, a larger number than in any year of which we have record: our share, according to population, of the

deaths occurring in Public Institutions throughout London, was only 362. To find our corrected total of deaths, we

must take the difference between 573 and 362, viz., 211 from 1868, which leaves 1,657, a lower corrected total than either last year or the year before (See Table I A).

I estimate the population of the Parish at the middle of the year 1876 at 90,833, which is to the estimated population of London almost exactly as 1 to 38 $\frac{2}{3}$ .

Our corrected death-rate has therefore been 18.2 per

thousand per annum, or lower than either last year or the year before (Table I A.)

The general London death-rate was 22.3 per 1,000 in 1876, showing a decrease on 1875, when it was 23.7, and being nearly 2 per 1,000 less than the average of the years since 1840.

The death-rate in greater London was 21.3 per 1,000. The average rate in "London and 22 other large towns of the United Kingdom" was 23.7 per 1,000,—and all of these "22 other large towns" have also a higher death-rate than this Parish, the nearest to it being Brighton (population, 100,632) with a rate of 19.6 per 1,000,—and the farthest from it Salford (population 138,425) with a rate of 31.9 per 1,000.

The corrected death-rate of the Western Districts was as usual lower than that of the other divisions of London, and was 21, or 2.8 higher than ours.

Table II. shows that the birth-rate, 23.88 per 1,000, was somewhat smaller than it was in 1875. It is always very small in this Parish. The London birth-rate was 36.5 per 1,000, and that of the other 22 large Towns varied from 28.7 in Dublin to 49.3 in Salford, the general average for

London and these towns being 37·7 per 1,000: Brighton, which had the lowest death-rate of any large town in England in 1876, had also the lowest birth-rate, viz., 30 per 1,000.

On the other hand Table II. shows that the number of deaths of Children under one year was less than in either of the three preceding years, and that the percentages of such deaths to the Registered Births,\* and to the total deaths were also less than in either of those years—a very satisfactory fact. The percentage of deaths of Children under one year of age to Births registered, viz., 15·09, was rather less than it was in London generally, viz., 15·7, and was, in fact, less than in any one of the 20 large English Towns mentioned by the Registrar-General, except Portsmouth, where it was 14·2, so that it is clear that the infantine mortality of the Parish is small, although it would be still smaller were it not for the infanticides committed in the Parks and in the Serpentine.

able to prepare. It shows that the number of violent deaths is increasing, and that the percentage of violent deaths to total deaths is much greater in this Parish than in London generally; the number of inquest cases, although, of course, greater, is small in proportion to the number of violent deaths, for whereas in London generally there were in 1876 nearly twice as many inquest cases as deaths from violence, in this Parish there were only 148 inquest cases to 108 deaths from violence.

The percentage of the deaths of persons of 60 years and upwards to the gross total of deaths was 24·36, or a little less than last year; as usual, this is a considerably higher percentage than that for London generally, which was 20·08; another fact which speaks well for the health of the Parish.

Table IV. shows the calculated populations with the births, birth-rates, deaths and death-rates of each of the three Sub-Districts. Usually, the birth-rate of Mayfair is less than that of Hanover Square; in 1876, however, not only was the reverse the case, but that of Hanover Square was much lower than it was in 1875, while that of Mayfair was much higher, that of Belgravia remaining nearly the same, thus:—

The correction for the deaths in Public Institutions raised the total of Hanover Square, and lowered it in the other two Sub-Districts; and the corrected death-rates were all less than they were last year, that of Mayfair being as usual the lowest, and that of Belgravia the highest.

Table V. shows that the number of deaths from the principal infectious diseases and from diarrhoea was 174, a much smaller number than the average and than the number for 1875, but larger than the numbers for 1873 and 1874; the number for each disease is also smaller than the average except that for the continued fevers, which is however smaller than the number for 1875.

The 174 deaths from these diseases are equivalent to a rate of only 1·9 per 1,000 persons living; while the general London rate was 3·6, and that for the 20 large English towns 4·1; the rate amongst those towns varying from 2·2 in Brighton to 8·5 in Salford.

*Small-Pox*, which was epidemic in London, caused two deaths in the Parish during the year, besides the deaths which occurred in Hospitals, and the Inspector's Report book shows that it occurred in 19 other houses: in all the cases efficient disinfection was carried out.

I extract from my report for the month of January 1877, the following summary of the mortality statistics of the small-pox epidemic in London during the year:—

“There were 735 deaths in London from small-pox in the 52 weeks of 1876; of these 544 were certified, 325 as unvaccinated, and 219 as vaccinated, while the remaining 191 were uncertified as to vaccination. There are several reasons why many cases are not certified as to vaccination, one being ‘that in the present state of the law some parents are inclined to give no information about unvaccinated cases,’ and another, that many medical men do not consider it incumbent on them to give the information. All the deaths, however, which take place in the Hospitals are certified as to vaccination, so that the relative mortality can safely be calculated from them; of the 735 deaths, 338 took

place in the Metropolitan Asylum Hospitals, viz., 204 of unvaccinated, and 134 of vaccinated people; or unvaccinated 60 per cent., and vaccinated 40 per cent. of the deaths; so that 20 per cent. more of the deaths from small-pox in hospitals came from the unvaccinated population, than came from the vaccinated population, which is about *nine* times as numerous."

As the deaths from each of the other infectious diseases were fewer than last year, and except in the case of fever (including typhus, enteric or typhoid, and simple continued fevers) fewer than the average, there is little to be said about them; I must remark however, that only 2 out of the 22 deaths from scarlet fever, and only 1 out of the 33 deaths from "fever" were reported to the Inspector, showing again the absolute necessity of my being provided with the returns of deaths from infectious diseases; this has since been done, so that I now receive immediate information, and am able to take measures to prevent the spread of these diseases.

No less than 55 houses in which there were cases of scarlet fever, and 8 which were infected with enteric (typhoid) fever were reported to the Inspector, and the proper precautions taken, permanent sanitary improvements being carried out in several instances.

#### VACCINATION.

By the courtesy of the Public Vaccinators, I am enabled to give the following return of the numbers of persons Vaccinated or Re-vaccinated by them during the year 1876.

The number of complaints (not including dust complaints) was fewer than in 1875, and the number of nuisances attended to also fewer, but the number of disinfections after cases of infectious disease, and of articles disinfected at the hot-air chamber was very much greater, chiefly on account of the large number of cases of small-pox.

Although 56 notices were served, it was only necessary to take out one summons; this was against the owner of a house the drains of which were in so deficient a state that they produced a nuisance both in the house itself and in the neighbouring house. The owner was summoned for non-compliance with the order, and the case was proved to the satisfaction of the magistrate, who made an order for a new drain to be laid throughout, and for the defendant to pay all the costs.

Early in 1876 I made a special Report on the condition

of Street's Buildings, May's Buildings, and Lancashire Court, which resulted in my reporting Lancashire Court to the Metropolitan Board of Works as a suitable area to be dealt with under the Artizans' and Labourers' Dwellings Act, 1875. The Metropolitan Board, however, declined to deal with it under that Act; and various sanitary improvements have been carried out at several of the houses since.

Several cases of enteric fever occurred in Grosvenor Mews during September, soon after the commencement of extensive alterations in the sewerage of a large block of buildings; by thorough disinfection, with suitable sanitary improvements in some of the houses, the epidemic was stamped out; but I would take this opportunity of urging that when any such alterations to drains, &c., are contemplated, the sanitary officers ought to be made aware of it.

The slaughter-houses, cow-sheds and bakehouses of the Parish are regularly inspected, and kept in a cleanly state. No license was opposed by the Vestry at the annual licensing of slaughter-houses and cow-sheds, but the license of one slaughter-house was withheld on account of non-compliance with a bye-law of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

I am happy to be able to say that the helmet making in the Government cap factory, which has been a considerable nuisance to the inhabitants of Claverton Street, Pimlico, from the vapour of naphtha which escaped, has been removed to a part of the premises where it is much less likely to cause any nuisance.

I have analyzed the water supplied by the Grand Junction and Chelsea Water Companies from time to time, and found it to be of average purity, except during the winter months, when the filtration was inefficient, on account of the heavy floods in the river.



The common gas supplied by the London Gas Company has been examined by me from time to time at their testing room, and has always been found to be above the required standard of illuminating power, to contain occasionally faint traces of ammonia, and to be free from sulphuretted hydrogen.

For the information of the Parishioners, I may mention that a hospital carriage for removing persons suffering from infectious diseases is kept at the workhouse, in Mount Street; but those who are in a position to bear the expenses of their support should apply at the London Fever Hospital, Liverpool Road, Islington, where they can be accommodated on favourable terms.

Of the above samples only 8 were brought by private purchasers, viz.: 5 of butter, 1 of Swiss milk, 1 of milk, and 1 of whisky; and 2 were samples of milk procured by myself at houses where there were cases of enteric fever, and the milk-supply was suspected: they were neither of them watered.

Notice of intention to submit for analysis was given by the Inspector in two instances, at shops where adulterated samples of milk had previously been obtained. In the one instance the sample was found to be skimmed, but not watered; in the other, the sample was watered to the extent of 25 per cent.: the vendor was prosecuted, convicted, and fined 30s. and costs.

The two adulterated samples of butter contained other fats not injurious to health; one of them was brought by a private purchaser.

The three adulterated samples of tea were sold at a very low price, and contained a small proportion of "lie tea;" they contained no leaves other than those of tea.

The three adulterated samples of coffee contained chicory, one in very small quantity; the other two being labelled as containing it.

The two adulterated samples of mustard contained wheat-flour.
