



TO THE MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND COUNCILLORS
OF THE METROPOLITAN BOROUGH OF STOKE NEWINGTON.

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1956, as required by the Ministry of Health.

The advent of new legislation, particularly the Clean Air Act, has added to the work of the staff of the Public Health Department.

The number of new sanitary complaints received was 1,543 as compared with 1,562 in 1955, showing a decrease of 19. Nuisances were remedied in 755 cases, either by the service of Sanitary Notices or by verbal representations by the Sanitary Inspectors.

The Registrar-General's estimate of the civilian population in 1956 was 50,420 as compared with 50,470 in 1955, while the number of births allocated to Stoke Newington in 1956 was 850 as compared with 778 in 1955, thus showing an increase in the birth rate from 15.41 to 16.66.

The number of deaths of children under one year of age was 18 as compared with 14 in 1955, showing an increase in the death rate from 17.99 to 21.17. The causes of death were Bronchitis 1, Prematurity 5, Pneumonia 2, Congenital Malformations 5, and Other Causes 5.

There were 5 deaths from Motor Vehicle Accidents during the year. Fortunately no young children were involved, making 1956 the fifth successive year in which no young children were involved in fatal accidents.

Deaths due to other accidents totalled 6, and showed a decrease of 5 as compared with the previous year. 2 males and 4 females were involved and deaths were caused by Bronchopneumonia following falls, and Drowning in the bath during an epileptic fit.

Suicides totalled 7 and involved 6 males and 1 female.

Deaths of Stoke Newington residents totalled 533 as compared with 538 in 1955, and the death rate decreased from 10.66 to 10.57. The causes of

death were Tuberculosis 3, Cancer of all Sites 107, Vascular lesions of Nervous System 62, Heart Diseases 166, Pneumonia 28, Bronchitis 47, Suicides 7, and Other Diseases 113.

The number of deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis decreased by 1, while the number of deaths from Cancer of the Lung decreased by 11 as compared with the previous year.

Notifications of Infectious Diseases totalled 453 as compared with 1,000 for 1955. There were no cases of Diphtheria, but 4 cases of Poliomyelitis were removed to hospital. The ages of the patients suffering from this disease ranged from 1 to 30. 13 cases of Food Poisoning were reported and involved persons in various age groups. Particulars regarding these cases will be found in the statistical part of the Report.

643 specimens were sent for examination to the Laboratory at County Hall and I would like to express my thanks to Dr. Tomlinson and his staff for their help.

During the year, 3,222 enquiries were attended to at the Public Health Department counter relating to various subjects. Health Education was carried out by means of poster display and the distribution of leaflets. In addition to this, a further series of film shows took place during January, February, March, October, November and December.

The investigation into Atmospheric Pollution has continued throughout the year. At the latter part of the year, the Clean Air Act became law and certain parts of the Act became operative. Reports on the various implications of the Act have been submitted to the Public Health Committee who is making a detailed survey of these.

204 samples of Food, Drugs and other articles were taken under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955 of which 57 were formal samples, and 147 were informal samples. Only one sample was found to be adulterated. A list of the various commodities taken for analysis will be found in the statistical part of this Report.

5 complaints of foreign bodies in food were received in the department and particulars of these are to be found in the food section of the Report.

Dr. C.F. Stott, the Deputy Medical Officer of Health, has continued to assist the department throughout the year.

I also wish to express my thanks to His Worship the Mayor and to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for the help and support they have given me during 1956.

Finally, my thanks are due to the staff of the Public Health Department for their assistance throughout the year.



#### RODENT CONTROL

During the year, treatment of both surface and sewer infestations continued.

Surface infestation by rats continued at a comparatively low level and was in most cases remedied during the course of treatment as normal procedure. Baiting was with Warfarin based bait which has confirmed its effectiveness as a rodenticide.

Mice infestations continued to form the major portion of complaints received.

The Council's sewers were treated twice during the year in accordance with the recommendation of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Details are as follows:

First Treatment (No.23)

Prebaiting Poison Baiting Check of Poison Bait 11th and 12th June 1956 13th June, 1956 14th June, 1956

275 manholes were baited and 183 showed "takes" of pre-bait. The estimated kill based on "takes" of poison bait was 505.

Second Treatment (No.24)

Prebaiting Poison Baiting Check of Poison Bait 3rd and 4th December 1956 5th December, 1956 6th December, 1956

265 manholes were baited and 98 showed "takes" of pre-bait. The estimated kill based on "takes" of poison bait was 435.

The treatments are confirming that the rat population has reached a point where it is being "contained" but not reduced by the present system of treatments.

Arrangements are being made to apply the Ministry's latest recommendation, i.e. an extension of baiting periods and it is also hoped that it will be possible to carry out a Warfarin treatment at a later date.

The latter treatment will be dependent upon the Council's Sewers being fitted with new baiting trays and access ropes. Provision has been made in the current estimates by the Public Health Committee and the fitting will proceed as soon as the necessary labour is available.

#### OUTWORKERS

Outworkers - Employers of outworkers in certain classes of work are required to keep lists of the names and addresses of all outworkers employed by them and to send twice annually (in February and August) copies of such lists for the information of the local authority. From this information, the local authority is able to take steps to ensure that the places in which the outworkers are employed are not injurious or dangerous to the health of the workers and that goods are not distributed from premises where there is dangerous infectious disease.

#### COMPLAINTS OF FOREIGN BODIES IN FOOD

#### Unsound Biscuits and Cheese

Complaint was made to the department by a resident regarding the unsound condition of some biscuits and cheese. On examination the biscuits were found to be infested with insect excreta and webbing, and the cheese a dark brown colour and obviously very stale. Representatives of the manufacturers examined the food and the complaint was reported to the Public Health Committee who ordered a prosecution.

## Portion of Cigarette in Loaf of Bread

A complaint was received of the presence of a cigarette end in a sliced loaf. The suppliers were interviewed and admitted that the loaf had been baked by them. Between 1947 and 1954 four complaints had been received regarding this company's products, and a prosecution was ordered in respect of this new complaint.

#### Portion of Metal in Bun

A bun containing particles of metal was submitted to the department for examination. The Sales Manager of the bakery concerned stated that the tray on which this particular bun had been baked had been newly rivetted and had apparently passed into the Bakery without being thoroughly cleansed and washed. The bun had been submitted to the Public Analyst who reported that the metal particles were iron filings. Instructions were given for legal proceedings to be instituted.

### Dirt in Loaf of Bread

Complaint was received regarding extraneous matter in a loaf of bread purchased in the Borough. In the opinion of the Public Analyst, the matter was a mouse dropping. Enquiries were made in the Borough in which the bakehouse was situated and revealed that while a number of complaints of alleged mice droppings in bread had been received, on analysis the result had been either charred dough or edible grease. After consideration, it was decided that a warning letter be sent to the firm supplying the bread.

#### Particle of Glass in Sweet

A resident purchased from premises in the Borough, a quantity of lemon sherbert sweets and noticed that a small piece of glass was mixed with the sweets. A Public Health Inspector visited the shop and examined a full bottle of the sweets and an empty bottle which had contained the sweets of which complaint was made, but both bottles appeared to be unbroken. Instructions were issued for legal proceedings to be instituted against the shopkeeper.

The District Public Health Inspectors carried out systematic inspections of all food premises in the Borough. 13 Notices were served under the Food Hygiene Regulations. These Notices covered the following items:

Insufficiency of First Aid Kit
Food in Storage Rooms left uncovered

Further inspections of the premises in respect of which the Notices were served, have shown the work required to have been completed or in course of completion.

The total number of visits made by the Public Health Inspectors to Food Premises during 1956 was 1,191.

#### Method of Disposal of Condemned Food

When a shopkeeper in the Borough has any food for condemnation, he advises the Public Health Inspector who visits the premises, inspects the food and subsequently issues a Condemnation Certificate.

The food is then collected by a vehicle from the Public Health Department and taken to either Tottenham or Ashburton Grove for disposal.
