

Sir:

During February, 1914, this office received from Mr. Henry S. Wellcome, the founder of the International Historical Medical Museum, a letter setting forth the purposes of the museum, and requesting the aid of this Bureau toward securing such objects as might be suitable for preservation therein.

This office is in receipt of information that in one or two towns of the northeast coast of the island of Samar, Philippine Archipelago, there is a native obstetrical chair peculiar to this region and apparently unknown elsewhere. The chair is constructed of bamboo and wood, and, as it occupies a space of about one cubic meter, will probably be quite expensive to transport from Samar to London. Information is respectfully requested as to whether it is desired that a specimen of this obstetrical chair be forwarded, and if so, whether the cost of forwarding will be paid by the Museum.




