Please accept our cordial thanks for so kindly having the model of Walker's midwifery forceps made for this Museum. I have duly received them from Messrs. Gardner & Son, and the model seems to be excellently made, and will quite answer our purpose.

I have today remitted the makers a cheque for the cost of same.

I had not seen these forceps before, and it will interest you to know that on comparing them with a pair we have in this Museum which were identified by Mr. Alban Doran as Chapman's forceps, I find they are exactly the same in design and measurements. Our pair is an original pair in steel, and is stamped on the lock with a large crown and a star which will probably be the maker's mark.

Any time when you are in London if you could make it convenient to call at this Museum, I should be pleased to show these to you, and I feel sure our collection of forceps would greatly interest you.

for 'Walker'; it was Dr. Walker's Forceps that I understand you have a  
specimen of in your Museum. They are figured in an article on "The  
Invention and Evolution of Midwifery Forceps", by Sir A.R. Simpson which  
was published in the 'Scottish Medical and Surgical Journal' for December  
1900. On page 481 is an illustration with an inscription "Dr. Walker's  
Forceps, from a pair in the Edinburgh Obstetrical Museum. They are very
