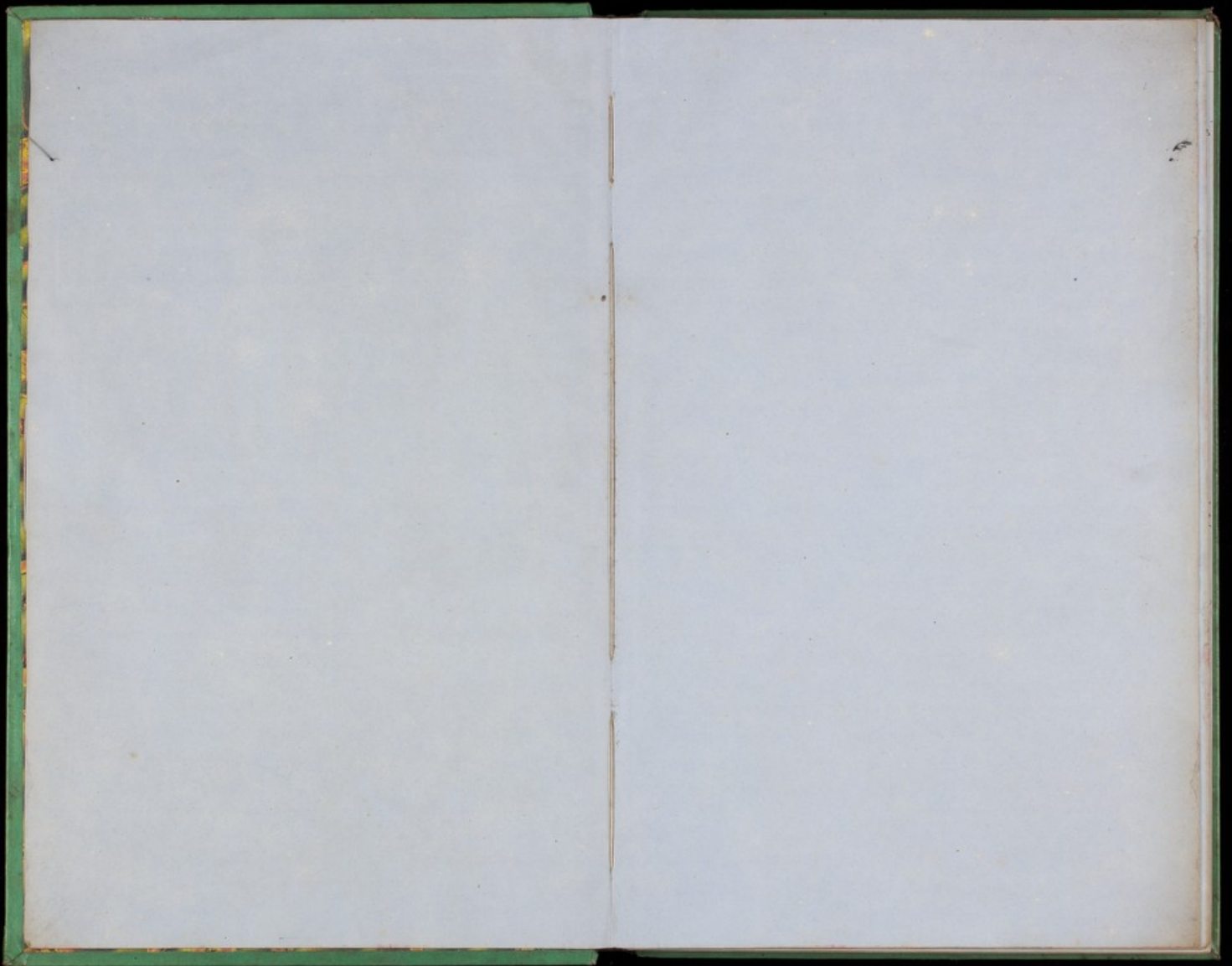

Friday 22<sup>nd</sup>

Thompson, Miss, has been unusually cheerful &amp; chatty lately, looking beautifully, as she relates the absurd freaks of her youth &amp;c. Her own mixture &amp; pills have been discontinued for the present. She takes Castor oil as before. She weighs 7 lb. 6 oz.

Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup>

Texas, Miss, quite tells me yesterday that if I did not comply with her request I should be going at St. Leonard's for her, before another week expired, she would have me punished and imprisoned for a month! That her detention beyond that period would be illegal and that I should be liable to furnishment, as well as Dr. Scrimgeour. Her voice, at night, as she has a practice of clipping her ears with cotton wool, when she goes to bed. Sometimes accuses her maid of interfering with her boxes &c. -

Lawford, Miss, complains of want of sleep. says she has a "hicc" at her back, a perfect hicc; that she feels as if there was a looking glass in her back.

McCabe, Miss, has been in bed three days in her session. Thought and ill attended.

Loone, Miss, had a colic attack yesterday, and remains in bed.

Thompson, Miss, Catarrhia appeared yesterday evening. has talked all day, giggling &c. Ideas devoted to herself & her past life. Thinks she can never be right again, that her friends do not want her back; talks of going to Australia &c. Bowels have not been acted upon for five or six days.

McCabe, Miss, very amiable and pleasant today, musing a kitten. She wishes to send her "Loving true" travel. Is looking forward to seeing her brother.

Martin, Dr., a good deal excited about going at once to see me a two individuals in London. Regards it as imperative that he should see about it immediately.

Penny, Mr., has been assaulting and fighting with his attendant. Is inclined to be abusive & overbearing.

Thompson, Miss, has rec<sup>d</sup>. two letters from home today, and is in a bright happy mood.

Will maintain that cartoon remarks in the first number of "Broadway" were meant in ridicule for her. Likewise picture in "Punch" &c. She now takes food very well & generally she sleeps well.

Thursday 28<sup>th</sup>

Went to Christy Minstrel performance in Fiebert last night, viz: Messrs Hoare, G. W. White & Penny.

Baldwin, Miss, troubled with cough, & retching at times. Will take a medicine stimulant and expectorant (page 100)

Belmont, Mr., has been obliged to move yesterday the last day or two. Has kept her rooms, in consequence of the cold which hangs about her. Is in a literary humor & her bedroom presents a library of books, papers, letters, &c. in utter confusion. Gladly doing in her appearance. Will take a medicine as above.

White, Mr., has had a turbulent interview with D. K. in which he (D. K.) became clamorous to retirement, flourishing a stick & threatening to imprison D. K. in twenty-four hours.

He goes to the Wells today, with me, meaning to call at Agents Office & effect the purchase of Miller's Iron for £1000.

Friday 29<sup>th</sup>

Reeson, Mrs., D. K. reports that she is very well indeed & likely soon to be discharged. Mr. B. has resolved not to seek marriage with her, desiring to avoid the chance of becoming innocent, as she might run the risk of being taken in a parliamt. stage.

Carlisle, Carl., again troubled with simple diarrhoea. Rx. Plumb. et Op. has been prescribed. Has no pain nor griping. Looks as well as usual.

Miss Cbe, Miss, the visit from her mother to which she has  
been looking forward, came off yesterday.  
Miss R. was natural & amiable at first,

Martin, Mr., visited his friend at Edinburgh on Saturday.  
He was a confirmed delusion that two of the  
attendants here are in the conspiracy against  
him, one of whom is Mr. <sup>Stedden</sup> & therefore, to  
prevent their mind in league with the  
Esquadroneer of Hoolham. Dr. R. states  
his belief that Mr. Gessier has to do with

singing in a bad scratch of song, & behaving  
generally in an extraordinary & playful way.

Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup>

Ms. Cole, Miss, became greatly excited soon after dinner yesterday, striking her maid & violently abusing her like P<sup>r</sup>. She sent for me; I found her in her agitated state: she asked for my name, my birth place &c. I demanded to know if I had gone by any other name. She then said she did not believe a word I said, & evidently had it in her mind that she had been placed here for fugitive purposes; she shouted frantically, "I would rather lie with twenty men, more than the other, than with you once!" She screamed the name of acquaintance, of whom she seems to entertain the suspicion that lies here, in disguise: the name of Duke of Edinburgh, occurs also. She declared that nine tenths of the women of the land were impostors, and that she would drive the poor women into prostitution for the purpose of making them slaves, & she said the more virtuous.

All the while she paced wild & agitated violently about the room, jerking up the skirts of her dress, skipping & trampling.

She also made me a two attacks upon myself, throwing me nelly, & hitting me and me decent blow upon eye. She then after calmed down.

Martin, Dr. busily engaged drawing up a statement. Solemnly asserts that there will be an explosion very soon. Is constantly occupied puzzling his mind as to the meaning of speeches made by such patients as Mr. Davis, Mr. Palmer &c. When he thinks he has discovered a clue, he is delighted

Martin, Dr., has come to the conclusion yesterday that the cooperations seen at sea about his identity, and accounts part of the circumstances of his knowledge of German, French, his travels on the Continent, the somewhat Russian figure of his head.

Cotton Mr. committed a violent assault on Mrs. Perry yesterday, striking her in my presence with all his force on his back with his clenched fist. Whitehead, Mr., conceives, says he has heard it, that some person has given her the surrounding ground & garden, which she speaks of as "The Rising Star": expresses her gratitude to the generous donor, & her unknown, - writes to Mr. Cotton to thank him.



December,

Friday 6<sup>th</sup>

Giff, Mr., struggled stoutly when being taken to bed last night: & he was bathed in tears & beseechingly begged to be allowed to sit up until 1 am. when the carriage would come for her & she would return to her child.

Jansen, Mr., slept a great deal ~~to-day~~ yesterday last night. Look bright, & better this morning. He Din & Frank never looked at his papers, &c.

Martin, Dr., with great ceremony he has deposited with me a written & testament sealed with his seal & countersigned by mine, the contents of which are unknown to me. He is firmly persuaded that a crisis in his case is approaching.

Thompson, Miss, her aunt & sister spent Wednesday & part of Thursday with her.

She repeated the story of her delusions & foolishness, &c. — She now says that she is "infinitely better", and she intends to commence and work here at her German &c. She was accused by her sister that the letters of the latter were not meant in her case, & she felt more confident now. So amusing herself in writing out a sensational story.

Melsted, Mr., has been quieter & more calm than these two or three days.

White, Mr., abusing & threatening D. H. & his back, and behaving amiably towards her.

Saturday 7<sup>th</sup>

Cassiot, Mr., at present has stirred up a good deal of Mr. Hoare, there been out of bed nearly every day lately, but continues in a dreamy, listless way, and given to foolish & prying.

Hoare, Mr., restless & prodigal of energy. At times he uses coarse & unbecoming language & makes obscure allusions.

He is always intent upon ribald jokes, and his conversation is rambling and frivolous. He is but a drinker & gambler. Enjoys excellent bodily health; last he looks & flourishes, & becomes a carbon point.

Jansen, Mr., yesterday & today has been his usual brightest & clear: still taking his nourishment sparingly. The over-ripeness of the chest looks worse. Perspiration diminished.

Monday 9<sup>th</sup>

Basset, Capt., singing & porting last night: all silent again this morning.

Fairie, Mr., attempted to strike violently with a heavy stick one of the attendants, who was passing with a tray in his hands. Mr. F. tells me today that he was shaking hands with Miss Talorah, the gardener's daughter, at the moment when the attendant intended upon him & tried to interfere with him!

Kay, Capt., suffering from severe chapping of the back of hands: a glycerine lotion is in use.

Hobart, Miss, complains of neuralgic pains in face, and tenderness about gums, which have been touched.





December.

Monday 16<sup>th</sup>

Hampden, Knoll Hill, in her recent paroxysm has been more violent & destructive, dashing chairs about, upsetting furniture &c.

Siemens, Mr., in a conversation held with him yesterday, he confessed that he had never been happier in his life before, than he is at present, imitating the simple habits of an agricultural labourer, man, and reflecting on religious matters.

He expressed a disposition to carry his views into the subject of matrimony, but avoided making any positive statement. A brace of pheasants - he here has arrived & yesterday he engaged his mind on others he should dispose of them, not caring to partake of them himself.

Orsted, Miss, has had several hours sleep each night since admission. In wayward & peculiar fashion she wanted to be brought out into a paroxysm of clamorous importunity, stamping her feet & shouting at doors.

Had a warm bath (hot) on Saturday morning. Is shy & timid. Dislikes being touched when I asked to be allowed to feel her pulse. Is of decided nervous temperament. Spleen & Fovelle conducted in the society of Miss Lampe.

Dukes, Mrs., same of former appearance, and is not albuminous. Has a waddling sort of gait, swinging her arms a good deal. Has alternate days of rilliness and calmness.

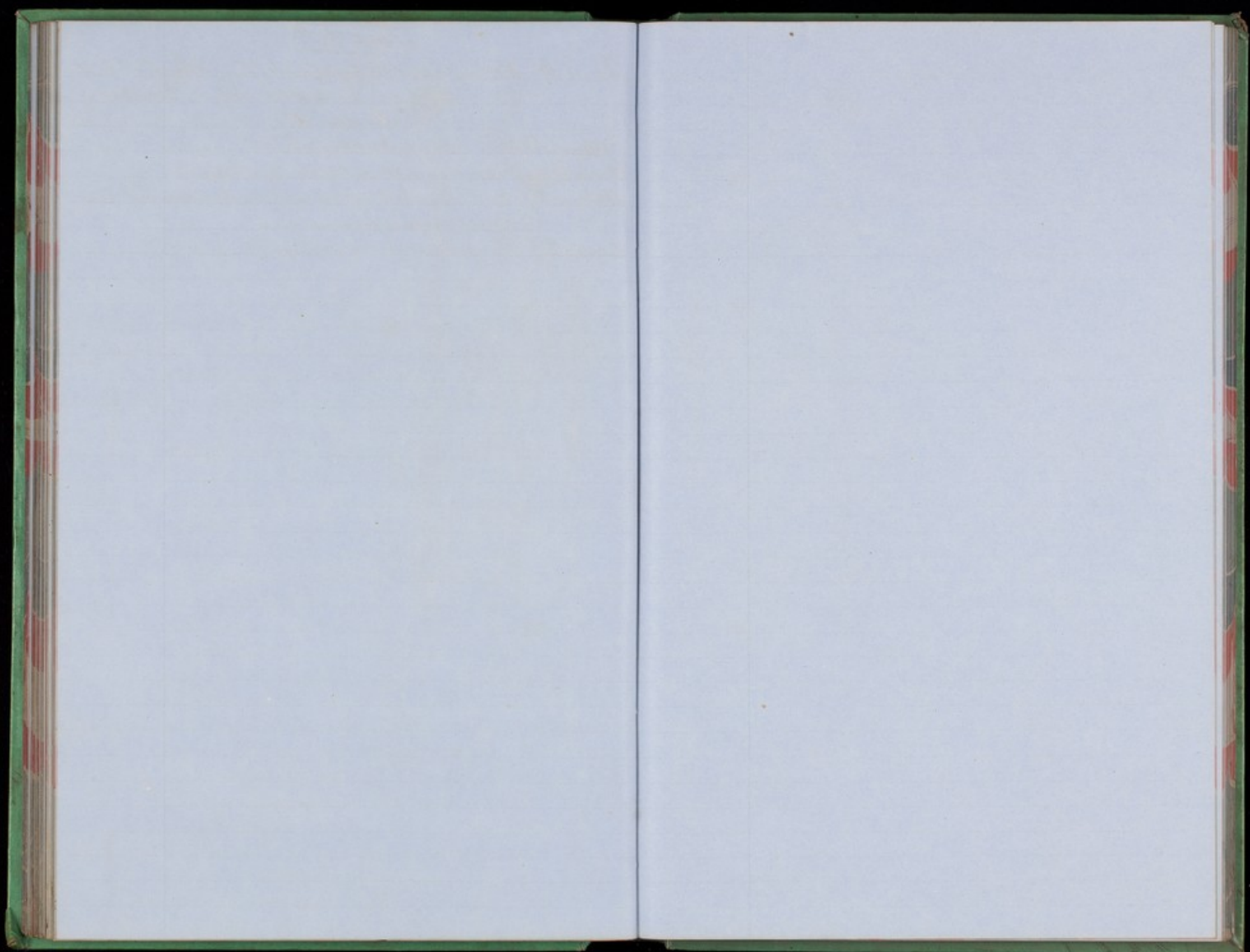
