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

Sunday Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> 10 am

A bright morning after a miserable night. We arrived in Bethune 3 am. Gator's left in a large rifle range which has been used as a stable for months. At 2 pm we started to the S.E. & met a continuous line of wounded in ambulance wagons & S.S. wagons but the great majority were slightly wounded or staggers on foot and looking greatly exhausted and dirty. At 3.30 pm we parked on the roadside by a small hamlet. It began to rain heavily and the ground become extremely muddy. The stream of wounded on one side of the road & of reinforcements or reliefs

on the other continued steadily  
Bethune is a mile behind  
to the N. To the East is a  
large coal pit, the refuse  
heap of which is hollowed  
out as an observation post.  
Lt. Kitchener is said to  
have been there this morning.

The guns are booming  
constantly. one 15" is just  
on our left and on our  
right there are several large  
howitzers near a coal pit.

Our bearers left on Saturday  
at midday and are about  
5 miles S.E. of us but as the  
Brigade has not yet engaged  
there has been no call for  
the Tent subdivisions to establish  
dressing stations.

Since we got here there  
has been a great advance  
in the line varying according  
to different reports from 2 or 3  
to 10 miles. Our troops have  
occupied many villages & ta

Bussac

is reported to be again in our  
hands. They say it is a  
case of Neuve Chapelle on a  
much larger scale & that  
we have large numbers of  
cavalry following up the charge.  
The officers slept on the brick  
floor of a cottage kitchen last  
night while the men were  
in or under wagons. We  
have 4 parsons of different  
denominations attached to us  
now. The native parties from the  
various fighting units who have  
come here for supplies (this is  
refilling point) report very  
heavy casualties. The H.I. have  
lost all officers except the  
2nd Lt. & a subaltern & the  
Black Watch are almost  
annihilated the Lt Col Semple  
being reported killed. We  
are using gas and owing  
to our twisted line of defence  
several of our own men  
have been victims. The

German gas attacks have not been very successful. Our Division is supposed to be one of those relieving the First Army Corps this morning so we shall probably be in action within a very few hours. The soaked condition of the ground must have hindered our advance by interfering with the movement of the big guns but all the reports are favorable and we seem to have ample reserves to relieve. One of us passed thro 3000 patients on Thursday. Several observation balloons of a most extraordinary shape are hanging round about and we saw a fight in the air a few hours ago about a dozen planes being engaged. Altho there are trenches within a few hundred yards of where I am sitting on a G.S. wagon the civil population seems unperturbed & continues the daily occupation with an

occasional glance at passing wagons or troops. Garnet & the D.C. landed their car in a large shell hole close to the hamlet but luckily escaped unscathed. It took 20 men to haul it out.

Mon 27/9/15.

~~After~~ ~~the~~ ~~morning~~  
after ~~the~~ ~~morning~~ waiting for orders. At 5 pm. our unit got notice to establish a small dressing station for the walking cases passing constantly along the road to the C.E.S. at Choques five miles away. This was done by my section & we afforded rest & treatment to those of the wounded who were unfit to walk further or who required their dressings altered or fixed. This went on till 11 pm when I lay down for sleep. Before midnight the whole unit was ordered to advance at once to

Vermelles just off the Bethune - Lens road. We reached the road leading up to this village at 3 am. A section having reported to Headquarters was sent to establish a dressing station at le Ratoire some 3 Km further on. The bearers had been collecting since the evening before & either treating the cases themselves or handing them over to another dressing station before evacuation to Choques by the motor wagons of the 7th M.A.C. Several casualties were reported amongst our bearers including 4 in the Bearer subdivision of my section - Staff Sgt Dunn, the senior N.C.O. & 3 men - Jack McLeod & McDonna. The rest of our Tent Subdivisions - 'B' & 'C' remained at the Cross Roads at the Halte until daybreak when the 8th M.A.C. appeared & sent Cathcart

up to assist Hogg & Laming, Ebels, de Beaupré & Goves are still with the Bearers. During our wait the attack which we had expected was preceded with the noise from artillery, machine rifles was deafening & quite close at hand. A 15" howitzer which we have noticed several times in a garden just off our street & makes a deafening report followed by a dimmunda hiss at intervals of 2 or 3 minutes. The hamlet of the Halte is deserted by the original inhabitants but several of the houses (with the windows all gone & shell holes in many of them) are occupied by Headquarters etc. One side street forms a dressing station & it was mounded up during our rest I took a walk round & found it full of dead

At daybreak our Division  
began to be relieved & as  
the troops passed us on  
their way back to the rest  
camp the diminution in  
numbers of all the units  
was painfully evident as  
one remembered the full  
strength Battalions which  
had accompanied us from  
Newville district onwards.  
It is said that the 7<sup>th</sup>  
Brigade has lost 2 Colonels  
& 3 Majors already. Much  
of the shortage is of course  
due to straggling & slightly  
wounded cases requiring  
but little treatment have  
been unable to keep up  
with the main bodies.  
It is believed that each  
Brigade of the Division  
has accomplished its end  
but at terrible cost. As  
the Division is being  
replaced by Battalions of

the Guards it is presumed  
that the advance will  
be proceeded with. I saw  
an encounter in the air  
between 2 German & 2 British  
aeroplanes just at dawn  
but the aircraft had passed  
out of range of my glasses  
before anything happened  
to any of the machines.  
I was then ordered to  
take back my Teat subdw.  
The transport to the rest  
camp near the Division  
& I returned to Sailly-  
Labourse on the Bethune  
road, got parked &  
found billets for men &  
the 2 Mr. Cooke ourselves  
had breakfast before  
midday & settled down  
in a small barn to wash  
shave, sleep, write letters  
& await orders.  
Weather dull & doubtful  
altho dry so far Apr.

Saw the Prince of Wales this morning - a very young looking staff ~~left~~ at the Cross Roads at the Halte.

Thurs. Sept. 30th

On Tuesday I collected the sick of the Brigade area the Division having "come out". At 2 pm I was sent to the trenches beyond Vermelles to attend to some men who had been left stranded in an advanced trench for 4 days with no food or worse than that no water. They were utterly exhausted but food & rest will bring them round all right. At Vermelles the houses are all in ruins & several cemeteries have been found & burial services were in progress. The railway line beyond Vermelles

is lined on either side by a belt of hedge which forms a useful shelter for weapons & men. The entrance to the communication trenches is on the nearer side of the railway. I crossed the railway & found myself facing about 4 miles of very flat country covered with lines of trenches. The "Long Trench" where we had been ordered to form a dressing station was prominent & absolutely exposed to fire of all kinds. When I was up there our artillery was very active but the return fire was very slight & consisted of shrapnel at long intervals. Some of it landed near us but it was never very alarming & did no damage. When I had finished

There I rode back to Vermelles. it was dark when I left. 7 pm - and almost the first thing I did was to land my mare in a shell hole but fortunately neither was hurt. It was pouring by this time so the road was very treacherous. I had to walk her all the way. As soon as I reached H. Q. I found the unit just preparing to move. We set out before 10 pm for some unknown destination. Apparently the idea was to take back the Division for some distance to rest & fill up. for our equipment must have been extremely heavy. All the way it poured like blazes & the roads were very heavy. It was 3 am before we reached our billets at

Offenhem. The billets were very poor but as we were all dead but we slept soundly till about 10 am when we were awakened by the arrival of an orderly with messages. De Beaujeu was sent to report at Hdqrs as billeting officer & I was sent to the O.C. Column for orders for the march. This was rather difficult to find and when I got orders for the unit to march at 2:15 I had to return at full gallop to get them turned out in time. The breakfast had to be postponed & no one had any food. We marched till 7 pm. when we reached our old billets in the school at Berquette. food was waiting us. the first that day we got to bed by 9:10.

The first part of the journey I had to take refuge in an ambulance wagon as after my gallop back I developed sudden acute symptoms suggesting acute appendicitis but they died down in an hour or two & I got out & walked the last 10 miles. A tablet of morphia was my only "food" that day. This morning we breakfasted at 9 am & are now resting more or less.

Sat. Oct 2<sup>nd</sup> 1915.

Godewaersvelde Station 11 am. Yesterday forenoon I collected the sick of the Brigade area. They were spread over a wide area & the finding of the various units was rather difficult. I then took them to the 8<sup>th</sup> C.P.S. at Aire, it is a Canadian Hosp<sup>t</sup> & I found the first Coln.

in charge a very nice gentleman. On the way I had heard that the Brigade was to move that morning and I had hurried. However when I got back I found the men still there the wagons however having departed by road. Nothing much happened in the afternoon which I spent working up some accounts of correspondence & fixing up my kit. We had an excellent dinner at 8 pm & I went to bed alone at 10, Cathart having gone off with the transport. At 10:30 I was not asleep & was called out by my servant to see the D/C at once. Orders had arrived. We held reveille at 4:30 this morning & breakfast at 5:15. We entrained at Bequette Stn before 8 & got here (Godewaersvelde) at 10. I am left here to wait for the cook's wagon to direct

if to our bulleting area at  
Houthoupe some 12 K. away,  
we are close to the Belgian  
frontier & this station is  
the Customs place on the  
railway. A change in  
the accent from that of  
the other parts of France  
we have been in is  
easily appreciated but one  
can easily make oneself  
understood in the shops where  
I have bought soap &  
chocolate while waiting.

The 74<sup>th</sup> arrived after us  
& Max table one of my old  
Australian Eastbourne friends  
is waiting for his coat's  
coat as I am.

It is a glorious day  
after a very frosty night  
- the first frost we have  
experienced in France.

It was bitterly cold  
when we turned out  
this morning.

The Mont de Cats is half-  
a mile to the S.E. of this  
station; it was stormed  
by the German cavalry  
early in the war. We are  
opposite a different part  
of the fighting line now  
bare about 2.2 kilometre  
west of Ypres (13-14 miles).

The last night I spent  
at Vermelles I noticed the  
two square girder erections  
at Loos & I see them  
described in Sunday's Times  
as the "Tower Bridge".  
Loos is now in our hands  
but formerly these erections  
made useful observation  
posts for the Germans  
owing to their construction.  
The destruction was impossible  
altho our artillery shelled  
them again & again.

Later:

At midday the cook's cart arrived at Goedwaervelde and I set off for Houtkerque via Watou passing thro part of Belgium but emerging into France again a couple of kilos from our destination. On either side of the frontier is a Bourgeois train case of Belgique but there is no wire fencing at this part as there is at many European frontiers. Just inside Belgium we found a large aircraft station with workshops cleverly concealed amongst the trees. Houtkerque is the usual insubstantial village of N. France in flat low-lying country. Our main am wagons are in a pleasantly situated orchard west of the village, and our tents am awnings have been erected under the trees. The nights are now bitterly cold, the days bright & warm.

Sunday, Oct 3<sup>rd</sup>.

A lovely day after a very frosty night. Church parades are being held & I am taking the Messian formists to the service in a field close by.

Monday Oct 4<sup>th</sup>.

Tuesday Oct 5<sup>th</sup>.

Moved from Houtkerque to Reminghelot this afternoon via Watou & Poperinghe. We were to remain in the latter town but it has been shelled yesterday & today so our Division is going further to the S.E. The Tower of the Town Hall has been packed early this morning & several houses in & near the square are also damaged. There is a heavy German bombardment going on.

in the direction of La Boisse.  
Saw Capt. L. Mackinson  
of the 10th Yardons in Popovitch,  
~~Heath~~ Reminghelt in  
all night brewery as  
bathing establishment &  
large school as hospital  
School in very filthy  
condition sweet two days  
will be spent in cleaning  
it.

Thurs. Oct 7<sup>th</sup>.

Orders came in the  
morning for a tent-sub.  
to proceed to Boeschep  
where the "Self-Inflicted"  
hospital is to take over  
the bath's & Rest Station.  
Check & myself sent on  
next morning. One of the  
padres says he met a  
Colonel Chaplain who  
states he has been chaplain  
to the 10th Yardons for many  
years - must be the  
Rev. Col James Smith

On inquiry at some of  
the patients about the  
hospitals, I find that the  
10th Yardons are only  
2 1/2 miles away & may  
have a chance of locating  
them up.

Friday, Oct 8<sup>th</sup>.

Started for Boeschep at  
7:30 am. got in at 9:30.  
29<sup>th</sup>. Tent sub in charge  
& nobody knows much  
about the place - as the  
53rd who held it for  
2 months left a few days  
ago. Have had a lot  
of worry finding the places  
out & getting things  
squared up.

Saturday Oct 9<sup>th</sup>.

Started bath's & shop.  
Baths in brewery & as  
we have no water filter  
it has been a lot of  
trouble finding out how  
things are worked & paid  
for.

Sunday Oct 10<sup>th</sup>

Still bathing. Spent you  
few patients. (Col. ~~Reid~~)  
Church service in lower  
hall of hosp. today.

Hosp. large & roomy -  
two floors - old cinema  
house used for British  
concerts last winter.

Saw J. H. Reid for a  
few minutes yesterday;  
he is Sanitary off. 14<sup>th</sup>  
Division & was riding  
thro' on business.

Lieut. Iron is here &

I see MacCallum  
frequently.

Sunday, Oct 11<sup>th</sup>

Last of Germans left here  
a year ago today; had  
a graphic description of the  
street fighting between  
British & German cavalry  
by the hostess of an  
Estaminet. Lots of the  
people here can speak

a little English as our  
soldiers have been here  
for a year except for a  
few weeks when it was  
occupied by Frenchmen.

Orders came this morning  
to hand over to 26<sup>th</sup> I.A.  
other move back to  
headquarters so have  
packed up ready to  
move when they arrive.  
Everything much cleaner  
& equipment in much  
better order than when  
we arrived.

Big mails lately & I  
have been lucky.  
within the last few days  
have had two parcels  
& 6 or 8 letters.

Still nice weather -  
bright & dry but cold.

Frosty nights now &  
gradually getting more  
wintry. Pretty country  
here - several windmills  
& well wooded.

Tues Oct. 12<sup>th</sup> Reminghelst  
Came back to Hdqrs last  
night. Groves is in a dug-out  
near St Eloi with some men  
shaving quite an exciting time  
This afternoon I got permission  
to "exercise my horse" so I  
made straightway for the  
4<sup>th</sup> Gordons & found them a  
mile or so beyond Ouderdom  
on the Ypres road. Dismounted  
& asked a private if any of  
the old "Mr." Camp men were  
about & got the reply that they  
were practically all gone.  
Then a corporal came past  
on a bike & I thought I knew  
the face, he seemed to  
recognise me & dismounted  
it was Asher Elgin.  
He brought up Eben Burns  
now a Sergeant. We had  
a long conversation about  
Variety days & V. men in the  
Batt. Pratt had just gone  
to the Base wounded & so

previously <sup>i.c.</sup> missing now killed 25/9/95  
had Joe Reid - the latter  
seriously this time I believe  
Ginger Sangster is posted as  
"missing". I <sup>reported "dead" early in</sup> saw where <sup>March</sup>  
God Anchinachie is buried <sup>1916</sup>  
- just midway between Ypres &  
Reminghelst (H. 21. a. 0.0)  
(on Sheet 28).  
Had to find new billets when  
I got back & am now in a  
wee room behind the Estaminet  
au Sullen. Faing & de Beaufre  
are running the Hoepf; Hogg  
Eberls & Groves at the Baths  
one being occasional day  
sent "up" and Cathcart  
is adjutant & Transport Officer  
so I am unattached & have  
been detailed as Sanitary Off.  
& the duty is sorely required,  
but will not need much  
attention after the scheme is  
in working order.  
The work of the Ambulance is  
now routine & there is nothing  
of a critical nature likely to happen.

~~Wed~~ Oct 12<sup>th</sup>

The Division went in today some casualties will come in early in the forenoon so I come out as an extra "hand" when necessary. As there is nothing much doing round Ypres at present we are not getting many wounded altho we are supplying the whole Division.

Thurs, Oct 17<sup>th</sup>

Nothing worthy of note. Had an officer admitted this morning dead from the Grenade school - he had mistaken it and went off in his hand disemboweling him. Poor devil; he was buried just outside the churchyard amongst the trees this afternoon in the space allotted to English soldiers. Two long rows of graves lie side by side.

Friday, Oct 22<sup>nd</sup>

On Wed. even I was detailed to relieve the M.O. of 1<sup>st</sup> Royal Fusiliers on the following day. On Thursday morning I rode off with a groom to take back my horse. A note from the M.O. had said that the best road was via Dickelbusch & Voormezel but at the turning a mile beyond D. I was stopped by a sentry & told I couldn't ride further. However, I went on to Voormezel where a Colonel of the <sup>Germans</sup> ~~Staffers~~ told me that the ridge between the cross roads & V. is very dangerous & that had it not been a misty morning we should certainly have been "strafed". About half a mile beyond V. in a N.E. direction I was directed over a footpath by a S.M. so I sent back the mounts & proceeded on foot carrying my baggage & blanket.

I crossed the canal & found  
Bedford House where the 28<sup>th</sup>  
F.P., a battery of artillery &  
the 7<sup>th</sup> Gordons were stationed.  
I met the Corp. from the Regt.  
& he gave me a note from  
the M.O. Then we walked  
to the H.Q. on a knoll beside  
the canal about a mile from B.H.  
The reserve camp. is there in  
tents & the Dressing Station is  
also there - all very comfortable.  
In the afternoon Col. Price took  
me round all the our trenches to  
the right of the Canal. I went  
to bed at 10 pm. the officers having  
all gone up to the Trenches but  
within half an hour casualties  
were reported so I had to get up  
& finally got to bed in my  
little Trench tent near to the  
Dressing Station about 2 am.  
This morning I awakened at 9  
& saw the numerous morning  
sick.

Monday, Oct 25<sup>th</sup>  
Things have been remarkably  
quiet on this front since  
I came & casualties have  
averaged six or seven a day.  
Routine, morning sick,  
sanitation, water, with  
casualties as they occur.  
This afternoon a trench  
mortar exploded in a fire trench  
on the bluff to the left of  
the canal & killed two  
wounding three. Two of  
the wounded were slight  
cases & were brought to me  
at once but the third  
was reported as being very  
serious & incapable of  
being moved till dark.  
I went up with some  
bandages & morphia &  
found his injuries were  
- left foot blown off,  
right leg broken above ankle  
right ~~arm~~ <sup>to arm</sup> broken, wounds  
very dirty & patient much  
collapsed.

He had had gas for most  
of the month with no effect  
so I gave gas by hypodermic.  
He soon got depressed.  
I splinted the right leg  
for a cast & left him to  
be brought down at  
dusk but as I expected  
he died quietly in a few  
hours.

Tuesday, Oct 26<sup>th</sup>

Rain ~~is~~ increased  
ground in a frightful  
state - at least a  
foot in depth along the  
paths from Dressing Stn.

Sat. 30/10/15.

Yesterday was Kaiser's  
birthday & the Saxons who  
are opposite us struck  
up a board inscribed  
"the war will finish at  
eleven o'clock today."

Some exciting air fights  
this morning & a German  
plane crossed overhead  
flying very low - it descended  
suddenly out of a cloud  
& reentered it before it could  
be hit.

Thurs 4<sup>th</sup> Nov,

Came "out"  
Wed. 10<sup>th</sup>

Went in again to trenches  
a mile further north.

Headquarters in a "wood" consisting  
of branchless stumps of  
trees. Dressing Stn half-a-  
mile away in a small  
piece of wood which  
is shelled daily probably  
because the late occupants  
have shown lights or  
smoke, he therefore  
decided to move & our  
"move" was much  
interrupted by nos

or three successive strafes in one afternoon, we had to take sudden refuge in the broken down dugouts of the late headquarters.

Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> Nov.

Going out tonight after 10 days occupation

Bombs fell on the roof of my Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> dugout at midday when I was Rode back arriving midnight glorious night. Shawin

Dec. 25<sup>th</sup> Xmas day.

Still away back.

Living on numbers. We have been going to Serbia, Egypt & S.W. Africa in the last few weeks. Now we are supposed to move at 5.30 am.

Tomorrow to Popingale & Boscilly. De Beaufo & Bretherton have been on leave & altho the latter had a good time with his wife in Bristol, the former felt out of place in London & seemed rather disappointed.

We had a good meal today after a week of very little news - I had four letters.

The mens dinner was at midday - roast pork & beef, vegetables ad lib. plum pudding, apples, oranges, nuts, beer & wine. The carving & waiting was done by the Sergeants & Officers & much to the mens' amusement.

The sports at 2 pm. were thoroughly enjoyed by everyone & "B" section did splendidly especially Lance-Cook Watts & Muir. General Milford came along in time for the obstacle race which he enjoyed greatly. Tea at 4.30 & prizes at 5.30. Good prizes & everyone happy. Then concert - free easy & an hour's pictures.

Our dinner at 7.30 was one of the best.

A long, tiring & thoroughly enjoyable day.

At 9 pm. all orders for our impending move were cancelled & this completed our happiness as nobody looked forward to clearing out so soon after our holiday.

Have visited St Omer four times in all since we came back here.

Sunday, 26/12/15.

Still more rumours. Why were the complete arrangements for the move cancelled? Does it mean Serbia?

27/12/15.

We have the honour of a visit from Sir Douglas Haig. His car is stationed outside Brigade Headquarters with the distinctive Union Jack on front.

The Brigade is to be inspected by the GOC of the Division & General Caffer at 10.30 am tomorrow.

As I am still in sole charge at our little Hospital, I will not be on parade.

Garnet tells us we are going back to Reims district but again this is only a rumour.

4/1/16.

I march to St. Omer tomorrow morning at 2 am to catch the 6.40 for Poperinghe. Cathcart & de Beauvoir left with the transport yesterday morning & Jany & Groves went off this morning to take over the Dressing Stations at Brandhoek & Ypres asylum.

Dr. Cook left for Enfer on Tuesday morning. The beginning of 1916 has been miserably wet & cold until today when it is bright & dry.

We had a lecture on the new trench area on Monday afternoon & the description is not encouraging.

Wed: 12/1/16.

Arrived in Poperinghe  
at 11 am, 5<sup>th</sup> inst.  
Found breakfast ready &  
set the men at it. They  
were cold & irascible having  
been on open trucks for  
3 1/2 hours between St Omer  
& Pop. The headqs are  
in a vacated convent  
- three large floors &  
an attic - plenty  
accommodation for personal  
patients. "C" section is  
collecting. Sainy de  
Beaufé at Brandhoek  
& Gyroves at Ypres  
asylum. On the Thursday  
night we all went to  
see "The Lancies" - at  
least four of us went  
- O/C, Hogg, Lament & I.  
The show was splendid -  
it puts new life in one  
to see a good variety  
again.

I am O/C Hospital here -  
see the numerous morning  
sick of neighbouring units  
in the morning & at 11 am,  
Sainy's patients at 11 am,  
all wounded are sent  
directly to P.C.G. from Sainy.  
On Monday<sup>12/1</sup> went up  
to Brandhoek with the  
cars at 11 am - good  
quarters - plenty accommodat  
Then on to Gyroves in  
the asylum. He is in  
the cellars where there  
is ample accommodation  
but the life is a  
dreary one. Then up  
to the mill where there  
are no less than three  
Regimental Aid Posts.  
A very quiet night  
& nothing doing on the  
Menin road otherwise  
known as "the Red bed  
Road to Hooge".

We get about a dozen cases of trench foot per day - all in 1st or 2nd stage so far & none very bad. Lack of exercise is the cause - the men are confined to the fire trench for 48 or 96 hours on end. They wear long gum boots but are often wet when put on. No hot food is possible as a brazier means trench restarting. Fortunately the line is short & frequent reliefs are possible.

Daddy Cook came back from leave early this morning. Cathcart goes on Friday & the two S. Ms. on Saturday, & the E.C. suggests going himself next time.

We got the news of the completion of the evacuation of the Dardanelles yesterday & it created very little excitement. Even the sinking of the Persia was only remarked upon. People who have been on leave remark on the fact that soldiers look much more serious over the war than they have done up to a few months ago. The most optimistic person in the soldier on leave from the handclips of the trenches. Air raids on St. Omar & Hazebrouck took place yesterday but the damage was practically nil.

Thurs. 20/1/16.  
Brandhoek!

Came up here this pm with Breth. & took over from Sam. This is not half bad.

A convent school  
with three rooming places  
- one for dressings &  
two bands. Both of  
I have a room in the  
schoolhouse with two  
ancient nuns & our  
servants do the cooking  
in the kitchen behind.  
The first convoy has  
just come in - mostly  
sick & we anticipated  
a quiet night.  
Half of a dozen  
bearers are at the  
asylum.

Fri 27/1/16.

Contrary to expectation  
we had a very  
busy night. The second  
convoy came in at  
11.30 & the third at  
3 am & both were  
full up with wounded

several serious.  
A working party had  
got caught by accident.  
It was nearly 6 am  
when we finally got  
to bed.

Sat. after:

Many memos today.  
Had a visit from  
General Caffery  
& well pleased.

Lates

Leave granted  
as from 5.30 am  
24/1/16.

Teddy Eberts  
relieved tomorrow  
& I have the night  
in Pop.

Feb 1st:

Leave ended today:  
a glorious weeks respite.  
Train held up at  
Stafford last night owing  
to the greatest or rather  
most vigorous Zeff. raid  
we have had. London  
got the wind up a bit  
Crossing since. Held  
up a Boulogne till  
tomorrow night.

Staying Hotel Louvre -  
dusty a bit & crowded  
with British Officers  
back from leave

6<sup>th</sup> / 2 / 16. Sunday.

Settled at Broadlock  
again with Hogg.

Everything running  
smoothly but unfortunately  
Sgt Page my right  
hand goes off tomorrow  
on leave. Expecting an  
artillery strafe by our  
heavies.

12 / 11 / 16. Sat.

Algic Groves is with me  
now & Breth at asylum.  
Big night last.

Heavy artillery duel  
on our left.  
We got "gas alert" this  
pm (9 o'clock) but  
nothing happened here.

Ge has been on  
leave since Sat. morn  
& Hogg went off on  
Wed. morn.

Stafe about badly  
treated cases was  
cleared up this pm  
after a couple of days  
discomfort on the part  
of Algic & myself.

The early part of  
the year has been  
remarkably open & dry.  
The last two days  
have been miserably  
wet & the flat ground

here becomes sudden  
at once.

Friday 18<sup>th</sup> Feb.

On Sunday a big  
artillery duel took place  
& De Beaufort came up to  
help us - about 110  
wounded between 5 pm  
& 8 am Monday.

Some exactly on Mon.  
night.

Have been struck by  
small proportion of  
fatal wounds arriving  
here. Two deaths  
here early on Mon.

Mon & one on  
Tues morn - one double  
compound fract. of leg  
& two penetrating chests.  
One of the latter had  
nothing to identify  
him & was buried as  
unknown.

Inquiry completed  
May 10<sup>th</sup> & grave  
requisitioned

The Ye returned on  
Wed morning after our  
rush was over and  
horses began at once.

The last two nights  
have been very quiet.  
One hermia cerebri  
died this morning.

Two verticillariae sent  
down as "measles" and  
several pediculoses as  
"scabies".

Hogg came back early  
this morning & there  
will be various changes  
in a day or two.

Popham has been  
shelled & bombed often  
of late. Four successive  
air-raids last night  
but practically no  
harm done.

During the recent  
strafe the bluff and  
several hundred  
yards of trenches

were lost & the 3rd  
Division were brought up  
suddenly from Army  
reserve after only  
a few days rest.  
They expect to take place  
in a push from the  
Bluff to Salthay Wood.

Sat 19/ii/16.

Went riding this pm  
while passing thro  
Reunyhelt met John Smith.  
He has just been up  
here three days & is  
with the 53rd F.A. in  
our old quarters.

Monday 21/ii/16.

Spores was exchanged  
today for a new officer  
of the 43rd just arrived  
to take the place of poor  
Mitchell killed Monday  
morning & he is to  
be here for a few

days "instructor" &  
then proceed to the  
asylum. He is a  
Scottish - Australian of  
all things - a native  
of Aus & a grad. of Edinb.  
Not very companionable  
& a grumbler newly  
arrived from Blight &  
of course surprised at  
the type & amount of  
our work.

9/iii/16.

Have had four days  
in No 12 cells  
Horebrouck - never again.  
Bluff retaken a week  
ago & they had a  
couple of busy nights  
in the dressing Stns

14/iii/16.

Had a surprise visit from  
Jeans and Johnnie Kinton  
who have been at No 60  
in the college here for the

last month. Had an enjoyable yarn. We are moving tomorrow. The first definite word of it came last night. The supposed arrangements have been altered at the last moment owing to the fact that "everyone" "knew" of the move & its date so that there might have been accidents during the changing over of Divisions. The Canadian Corps is changing with ours & we first take over from 1<sup>st</sup> Div. a dozen miles south & in a few days go on to "Ballool" to take up Div. Rest from the 3<sup>rd</sup> Division. Lovely spring weather now. The Verdun show has almost died down now apparently - a three-weeks struggle on a large scale. The French seem thoroughly satisfied & I think rightly so. On the whole, things look brighter all round than for some time

Had one case of C.S.M. the other day & numerous "suspects" have gone down since. We will all be glad to get away from the "expensive" salient for a while. Our new quarters are on <sup>the</sup> ~~the~~ <sup>Swear</sup> the Lychaet ( ) ridge which for some extraordinary reason stopped the Boches on their advance to Calais in November 1914. There was absolutely nothing to keep them back then. Things are vastly different now however.

Thurs. 23/III/16.

Meteren: \*

Landed here last Sat. & expected to move on to Bailleul in a day or two but we are still here and expect to be for some time - a week perhaps. This is quite a nice little village and would be quite nice as a summer station. Went to Mont des Cats last Sunday & had a good look round.

Baillet 9/10/16.

Came on here on the 1<sup>st</sup> and started running Divisional Rest. "B" Section is at it again & I have been kept tied up. Broth. & de Beaufré look after a large ward each & I have a small one on the ground floor and see all the admissions & dispose of them. Hogg is with the 12<sup>th</sup> R.F. & Cathcart with the 9<sup>th</sup> E. Surreys - his first R.M.O. stint. I am going to the 12<sup>th</sup> N. Staffs. on Tuesday, to relieve the M.O. I expect for one week. They say the Canadians have lost some of the ground at St Eloi captured by the 3<sup>rd</sup> Division. The town is crowded with Australians now - big loose-linked & slovenly with some splendid specimens of humanity.

Have met Hargreaves, Jammie Wood & Tibbles since coming here. Laurent has come back from Paris & the Parisians are more optimistic than ever.

The Ambulance will be ousted in a day or two, I expect - to St Jan Chiffelle with tents & huts.

no Wolverhampton 18/10/16.

Relieved Waugh at 1<sup>st</sup> North Staffs on 11<sup>th</sup> & joined them at Khandaker Farm. Came in on Friday night & relieved Cathcart with 9 E. Surreys. Very quiet here - much different from last time. Living in the Dressing str on road between Lookers Farm & R.E. Farm. Nasty road for snipers - very few casualties.

A week ago came the order everyone on leave now has to return before the 18<sup>th</sup>.

Why? Is it for the crossing  
of the mobile army?

Two French corps have gone  
north on account of the  
massing of Bosch between  
Ypres and Dixmude.

A Russian Division is being  
equipped and trained in  
France. One Australian  
Division is in the trenches  
near Armentières.

There are rumours that  
the spring offensive is not  
far off, but it is as  
likely to begin on the Hun  
side.

noticed Chalmers Hunter lost an  
eye & killed & Prebald Mackenzie  
wounded lately. I suppose  
the latter was with the  
Northumb. Fus. at St. Eloi.

19/iv/16.

Went round the trenches with  
the adjutant ~~from~~ <sup>yesterday</sup> pm. I had  
various gazes at the Bosch  
through periscopes. Nothing doing

not a Hun to be seen. Got  
skipped at on the way back -  
from Sfraudhoek mole.

Wagh turned up at 6.30  
pm. just after the sick  
parade and I cleared out at  
once. Walked to Kandahar  
Farm, got a lift to Demoutré  
& got a Ford from Col. Hayden  
to run me over to St Jans  
Chapelle whither "the 72<sup>nd</sup>"  
moved yesterday.

This morning my servant heard  
I was back and hearing I  
was billeted in "the chateau at  
the top of the hill" he went  
out in search and landed  
in the officers rest station on  
Mont Noir.

Macpherson a Bauffshire man  
& Aberdeen grad. was with  
us last night & went on  
to 74 today.

he are billeted in a splendid  
chateau to the east of the  
village: it is beautifully

got up but there is not much furniture left. It is the summer residence of a wealthy tile manufacturer and he is still in that town. Nice gardens and tennis court etc more or less neglected now.

We have got a roaring fire of logs in one of the big rooms. Daddie Cook is at the piano in his element.

The others are at poker round the table. <sup>25/IV/16. Bombs on Baillet</sup>  
<sup>13 Motors destroyed no Amtrons.</sup>

St Jans Chapelle 31. IV. 16.

We have had a week of glorious weather - very warm.

Riots in Ireland all this week.

Bosches are aggressive; our Division had a gas-attack last night and were driven out of front line trenches but regained them by bombing. W. Kents & N. Staffs seem to have suffered heavily. ? 300 gassed and 150 or 200 wounded.

Gassing reported over most of line wind and conditions very

favorable for the Hun.

13/V/16.

Still here; nothing doing: stale. Steffer on special leave - daughter very ill.

Visit from brother's brother: staff-college lieut. never on peninsula.

two Australian divisions here and three to come. He says "first thing must be to capture hills and we will do it". This is regardless of the fact that a dozen divisions failed at Loos.

19/V/16.

Knight and a Supt of 73 FIF. got M.E. & M.M. perfect for work during gas attack. Australians allowed Bosch to occupy trench for two days, capture 1 officer 20 OR & two Stokes guns. Various small attacks. One s. of Armentieres while 9<sup>th</sup> Div was being relieved. Seaforth & Gordons met them on Harafat & prevented entry.

Lovely weather still. Aircraft very busy.

Thurs 16/6/16.

Have got leave warrant from Saturday morning & hope to get away all night but there are possibilities of a sudden stoppage as there is an air of suppression - a sort of uncertainty in the air. Mural all-round activity but nothing on a large scale. The new biplane has made its appearance & certainly strikes one as being very fast & very strong. We are still at St Jans but may move any day. De Beaufre left for good on Sat 20th & we expect the new arrival soon. Cathcart came back from Ireland today.

Wed 7/4/16.

At home: Three further days - cold & wet. Hampshire struck a mine. Kitchener drowned west of Orkney. Monday after - consternation all thro' country. Going south tomorrow night.

Canadians have had trouble on south of Salient - from Hooge to the Y.C. canal.

Sunday 18/6/16.

Left London a week tomorrow morning after a glorious few days in Camb. visiting Derwent water. Met Spencer Maslin in Folkestone & spent the day with him as we were being up. Stay up in Boulogne as well & get back on Wed. F.F. now in new camp built by ourselves on Baillou - Neuve Eglise road. I take over the Dressing Str at Lindenbock from 5<sup>th</sup>. In tomorrow with Cpl Hunt & a dozen men. Cook & I went there yesterday & it looks all right. Good dugouts well roofed. Gas attack again two nights ago & a terrific bombardment followed - about 400 casualties all told - over 200 gassed. Great aerial activity (.90 thro' Lindenbock) S. Lovely weather. Canadians have retaken their ground except Hooge village.

George Lamy is convalescing in London after his op. for appendicitis & is supposed to have got married yesterday with Teddy (on leave) as best man.

Saturday 24/VI/16.  
Lindenhoek: F.D.S.

Came here on Monday with Corp: Hunt & a dozen bearers & 1 sunbeam car. Nice spot: good dugouts. Quiet time on whole.

Very noisy last night & several shells close to dugouts & on the roads. Our trench mortars are doing well.

Had the skiffer & Brown two days ago & the latter got very windy when they sent some shrapnel over crossroads.

Hogg has gone to 41<sup>st</sup> Division.

Had a note from John Anderson who is now in the 41<sup>st</sup> H.F.R. Jack is supposed to have gone to Mesopotamia.

26/VII/16. Monday:

Came back to H.Q. today being relieved by Bretherton. Roads & batteries heavily shelled again last night but no appreciable result & we are giving them about 50:1.

Have had excellent views of shelling etc as one can see from Voormezele & the towers of Ypres down to Plugstreet from the Lindenhoek crossroads.

Wednesday: 5/7/16.

The big push is now on down on the Soume - French to the south, British to the north. The reports are most promising & the Loos show has taught our people many things. I expect there will be enormous casualties as usual.

We came to this camp east of Loere & just north of the convent today. It is a mud field but

will be all right after a week or so, with numerous tents & marquees for patients & personnel. Algie, Dixon & Keane are in the A.D.S. in Kennel village & it is very strong & commodious place - or rather places. We are collecting from the left Battalion of the 24<sup>th</sup> Division & the two right Battalions of the 50<sup>th</sup>. There are not many casualties at present.

Sunday 9/VII/16.

Got unexpected orders last night to move today & back to our own old camp of all places. The Anzacs are still here & we are concentrated for the night. The move is due to the fact that our last move was a regular thinning out of the line in this area & the Bosch got to know of it from a Dane in the U.S. forces who deserted south of Amantieres. The

Bosch attacked almost immediately & drove the U.S. back for over a mile & beyond their advanced d.s. They were not supported however & the U.S. easily drove them back in a few hours.

Still good news from the South. Rumours are numerous & weird, some believe nothing until "official". It depends on what happens there whether we will go down to assist or start a containing movement here to draw troops. The Anzacs expect to march to St. Omer & entrain for the Somme. Meantime we are standing by ready & willing.

Sunday 23/VII/16.

Meteren:

Came here on Thursday & took over hosp. & 100 sick. The Amb. came along next day. We were relieved by

the 60<sup>th</sup> F.A. & I met Kirtou  
& Jens Davidson again.  
We are really going down  
south now. The Division moves  
tomorrow night after dark.  
The Angas division (5<sup>th</sup>) &  
one of ours were ordered  
to capture the front line over  
a two-mile front & hold  
it. They went through four  
lines & captured a village  
& had 13,000 casualties  
mostly from our own fire.  
Some old mistake!

Ardnick railhead bombed  
& whole of 2<sup>nd</sup> Army reserve  
army<sup>th</sup> destroyed.

Lainy returned at last &  
looks fairly well.

Friday: 28/VII/16.

Oissy:

Left Meteren 7 pm Monday & marched  
to Bailloul west to outtrain.

Finished just in time not to  
get dinner in Bailloul. Train  
left at 11:30. I travelled with

Graves, Bretterton & Eberts & we  
slept most of the way.

Detained at Longeau & started  
our march. It took two hours  
to get clear of Auviers - a  
large prosperous, fairly clean  
& attractive city (about 200,000).  
Fed by the roadside at Dreuil  
about 1 pm & reached Oissy at  
6 pm. I marched all the way -  
about 16 miles & enjoyed it.

This is a horrible little village  
built mostly of mud & wood.  
The chateau and grounds must  
have been rather nice about  
a dozen years ago, but are now  
in disrepair & dilapidation. The  
loch makes a good bathing place.  
Our people are doing well  
down here. Of wounded at one  
of the C.C.s 10 to 1 were  
Bosch prisoners & our infantry  
have now gone beyond Pargies.  
We are at least 25 miles from  
the line in the rest area &  
expect either to be put in the

push up to take over some  
more line from the French  
south of the Somme. The latter  
is more probable. S.H.Q. is  
temporarily a few miles from  
here for the push. Casualties  
probably amount to about  
150,000 by now, but everything  
is looking satisfactory.

Thurs 3/VIII/16.

Left camp 10.30 am Monday  
& marched to Ailly station  
for 2 pm train, a broiling hot  
& dusty day & most exhausting  
march. Waited on a shelterless  
dusty enclosure till 6 pm  
for train. Detrained at Mericourt  
9 pm & marched to Corps  
D.S. at Dives copse. Dead  
stied on arrival. Moved  
off with bearers, Algie & Teddy  
next morning to Marlicourt  
& had dinner of a sort.  
Marched off with whole Brigade  
to Sandpit on Albert Bray  
road.

Got settled there by 10 pm.  
Tuesday & have awaited  
orders to move since  
we are two miles due  
south of Albert within half-  
a-mile of the original British  
front line. In front the first  
village captured by us  
is quite near. The  
whole district is a mass  
of troops. The 51<sup>st</sup> (Highland)  
Division is quite near us.  
The weather continues  
unbearably hot & dusty  
& to make it to pour  
with perspiration. We are  
sleeping in an ambulance  
wagon & the men are  
bivouaced. I have 108  
bearers with 6 M.C.s, three  
horse amb. wagons, 197 water  
cart & motor cyclist.  
Friday, 11/VIII/16.

Moved from Sandpit to  
Broufay on Tuesday even.

On Sunday & Monday last I visited the original Bosch line at Frecourt & Mametz. I was much interested in everything. The villages are flattened, trenches smashed up & dugouts crumpled in. The remaining dugouts are splendid - well timbered & usually 20-30 feet under ground. Huge numbers of unexploded shells, rifle grenades, hand grenades, trench mortars etc - both ours & Bosch. One or two dead Boscches about - they do smell a bit after a month.

Bronfay Farm is the Corps Collecting Post for walking wounded & the Bearers Divisions are parked alongside. Two false sets of orders were issued re reliefs in the line & then a couple


of nights ago the 74<sup>th</sup> went to Bernafay wood. I took up the relief keeners last night - by horse ambulance through Carnoy almost to Montauban & then on foot. The whole place is a mass of shell holes & swarming with troops & guns. We hold the line from the south edge of Delville wood to opposite Guillaumont Stn. It was quite lively there.

23 | viii | 16.

On Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> we relieved 74<sup>th</sup> at Bernafay wood. Clearing from two R.A.P.s. near Waterloo Farm. Fairly constant stream of cases - many local casualties from working parties on new communication trenches. Troubled with slow clearance by cars. Collecting Post on right of us - Dublin French got a direct

Padre Poole joined in here

hit from a 5.9 & one M.O.  
4.05 men killed & two M.O.s  
wounded - including Knight  
of 73 badly crushed & eardrums  
burst. The French gunners are  
splendid - there was a battery  
of 4 45's & two 6" dated  
1850 just outside the Dressing  
Station & altho heavily  
shelled by the Boches they  
went on firing steadily.  
The D.S. was an old Bosch  
dug out with two entrances  
about 30 feet underground,  
long wall alley



we spent 3 days & nights there  
& suffered one man killed  
& four wounded. Then back  
to Brouay Farm for a night &  
on to Carnoy for another night  
- the night of the Divisional  
strafe.  
At midnight on Saturday

Friday & I relieved 73 at  
the Briqueterie Collecting Post  
- a new place to do duty  
for Dublin trench. There we  
cleared from two R.A. Posts  
on "sunken road" belonging to  
the regiments immediately in  
front of Guillaumont - in the  
quarries. Usual steady stream  
of wounded & sleepless nights.  
Terrific bombardments by us  
several times - Sgt. Hunt  
& I got caught in one while  
prospecting for the heavers  
East of Jones wood & near  
Arrow head copse & had to  
lie low in funk holes for  
nearly three hours as the  
Boches were replying  
vigorously to our fire.  
They sent about half a  
dozen shrapnel & HE  
around the Briqueterie  
twice daily regularly.  
Warrant of 1st North Staffs  
was killed there on Saturday  
Friday

We were relieved by 20th Div  
& Johnnie Kilton relieved  
us at midnight last  
night & we marched back  
to Bronay & joined up  
with the Brigade again  
this morning at the Citadel  
half way to Meaulte.  
One night we had 20-30  
wounded brought in from  
No Man's Land; they were  
in an awful state - usually  
wounded a second time,  
swarming with flies & maggots  
& the stench was appalling.  
Explored Jones wood one day  
with Sergt Hunt - there were  
dead Tommies & Boches  
every few yards - mostly  
lying there since several  
weeks & an indescribable  
maze of smashed in dugout  
equipment, clothing, machine  
guns, an odd horse  
artillery gun & a couple  
of motor lorries etc.

broken down trees & crumpled  
in trenches. Horrible  
smell from decaying dead  
& dense myriads of flies.  
The Boche still cump the  
wood regularly - quite  
unnecessarily as we have  
only a couple of communications  
trenches running through it now.

Sunday 3/9/16.

Division came into  
action again on Wednesday  
morning & Algie & I proceeded  
with an advance party at  
daybreak to the Quarries  
behind Montauban. It was  
raining heavily & had been  
for more than 24 hours &  
the roads were in a filthy  
state. The dugouts are Boche  
& better than any we have  
had. Accommodation for 30  
stretchers cases under cover.  
We took over from the 33rd  
& 14th Div Bearerers.

For clearing wounded we worked a right & left sector. One post in Carlton French near Longeval & clear the R.A. Posts. there, with a relay at "Green dump" in the valley. The other aid posts are near Waterloo farm south of Delville Wood & the relay is at the "Shrine" on the Longeval road & is also the R.A.P. for the Batt. in support. The first night was fairly normal but the cases had to accumulate at the Quarry, as motors couldn't get within miles of the horse ambulances. were held up for long periods by transport & shelling. On the second night (Thursday) we had our first taste of gas shells & they upset us horribly. The gas rolled into the quarry & day out & took some time to clear as there was no wind.

None of the patients had gas-helmets & it was a business rushing round to find helmets for them. We all felt sick & giddy afterwards & the stomach was irritable & easily upset. Smoking made things much worse, I discovered. On Friday night we had two similar attacks, but we were better prepared. The R.A.P.s went over the top that night & we had 104 of their wounded (excluding walking) from 7 pm to 7 am. At one time there were 50 stretcher cases & 40 walking awaiting removal.

Sunday 10/9/16.

Algie & I rested till Monday at Mametz & went back to the Quarries that pm with our own men. We had a fairly quiet night & the wagons kept us clear. The # 55<sup>th</sup> Div relieved us without much

difficultly on Tues. night  
& we retired to Mametz after  
dusk. Slept the night there  
& moved back again to Buire  
next day. Transport moved  
3 am Thursday with 8/c  
& Micky. Rest of us entrained  
at Edgchill siding between  
Buire & Dernancourt at 4 pm

Left Eaucourt yesterday pm & entrained at Abbeville leaving 8 pm. Detrained Bryas stn. at midnight & got into Valhonn - overcrowded. Raining in torrents all the time & the same today. We are taking over the line on the Viny ridge apparently.

Thurs 5/X/16.

Left Valhonn for Hondain on Sunday 24<sup>th</sup>. Bad weather while in Eaucourt: visited St Pol - not a bad town with fair shops & a good canteen. Moved on to "les quatre cents" on 25<sup>th</sup> - good place with huts of French build & plenty accommodation.

Joined 1<sup>st</sup> North Staff to relieve Macleod on leave the same night. Moved up

to Camblain l'Abbe with them at daybreak next morning. Stayed a week there in inferior billets.

On Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> with the Brigade moved in & we came up to the support lines near Cabaret Rouge.

George & Teddy are running the  
A.D.S. there - a nice place

This line is unnaturally  
quiet. Neither side has  
much energy to spare from  
the Somme now. Several

ZOUAVE VALLEY: Came up here from

say he is in H.Q. at the base.  
Apparently he does not expect to come  
back, so here I remain. Shouldn't

Tues. 7/XI/16.

LOAN TREE REDOUBT. Went back to Camblain on Wed. 18/XI/16. Left there on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup>.

- for NOEUX-les-Mines - a putrid day. Spent a comfortable night in good billets there. On to PHILOSOPHE next morning, the place the transport spent the night over a year ago. The place is not much knocked about really & the billets could be made fairly comfortable with shutters & braziers.
- A few civilians have come back & do washing & keep small shops. The 72<sup>nd</sup> came up from the Vimy area several days after the Batt.

They have an A.D.S. at le Brebis where  
the Regt transport is 2 baths in  
Meziyartse quite near Philosophie; the  
H.Q. are in Braquembourg near Noeux  
les Mines. The adjutant & I rode into  
Bethune one day & did some shopping.  
The square is smashed about a  
bit & almost deserted but otherwise  
there has not been much shelling.  
The Div. line is divided into "Loos"; "14 Bis"  
& Hulluck & we are on the left - the latter  
to be relieved the W. Kents in the line on Tues.  
31<sup>st</sup> & came into this support line last  
night (6<sup>th</sup> Mon). The trenches are about the  
worst I have seen chiefly owing to neglect  
as they have been changing hands at  
short intervals all summer. Most of  
the accommodation both here & in the line  
is insufficient & poor. The Batt. had  
a quiet time on the whole - about a  
dozen wounded in the six days. The  
Boech "aerial mortar" is the latest introduction  
- it is shaped like a rifle grenade -

Came back to Philosophie on 18<sup>th</sup> after a fairly quiet time in putrid weather. Aerial darts rather less troublesome. On Tues. midday I got a notice that the permanent WO - Lieut. H. Blythe - would report that he would relieve me - which he did & I went back to the F.A. at 5 pm.



**Newspapers** (registered), singly, ½d. each 6 oz.; (unregistered) same rates as other wholly printed matter, *i.e.*, ½d. every 2 oz.



**Newspapers** (registered), singly, ½d. each 6 oz. ; (unregistered) same rates as other wholly printed matter.

**Parcels.**—Not exceeding 3 lb., 6d. ; exceeding 3 lb. but not exceeding 7 lb., 9d. ; exceeding 7 lb. but not exceeding 11 lb., 1/- . The dimensions allowed are :—maximum length, 3 ft. 6 in. ; maximum length and girth combined, 6 ft.

**Money Orders** (Ordinary) not over £1, 2d. ; £3, 3d. ; £10, 4d. ; £20, 6d. ; £30, 8d. ; £40, 10d.

**Money Orders** (Telegraph) — Same commission as above plus fee of 2d. and cost of telegram of advice.
