The After-Care Association

THE ANNUAL MEETING was held at London House, St. James's Square, S.W. (by kind permission of the Bishop of London) on Thursday, February 11th, at 3 p.m. The Chair was taken by the Bishop of London. The other speakers were the Bishop of Barking, Sir John Batty Tuke, M.P., M.D., Dr. Nicolson, C.B., Dr. G. H. Savage, Dr. E. W. White, Dr. H. Rayner, Dr. E. M. Cooke, Dr. G. W. Mould, and the Rev. H. Hawkins. There was a large attendance of subscribers and friends.

The Secretary (Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby) read the Annual Report of the Council for 1903.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL.

From January 1st to December 31st, 1903.

The Council of the After-Care Association for Poor Persons discharged recovered from Asylums for the Insane has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1903.

The work of the Association during the past year has again been very encouraging. The proportion of cases successfully started in life has increased, and the reports frequently received of those helped in past years are most satisfactory. The Council feels that this is strong evidence of the usefulness of the Society, not only in the aid and comfort given but in the prevention of that relapse into insanity, which is so great a danger that many persons are inclined to regard it as inevitable. This, however, is by no means the case, when an efficient start in life is given.

The most important function of the Association is not merely the supplying of country homes, of clothing and of money, but the extreme amount of care and attention that has to be given to the character and circumstances of those with whom the cases are placed, and the finding occupations to suit persons who have often many peculiarities and prejudices.

Many cases discharged from Asylums and Hospitals for the Insane are quite capable of work if found for them, but are unable to stand the anxiety and strain of procuring it for themselves. The Council wishes to call particular attention to this point as it is often overlooked when cases are discharged, so that their small means are spent before they apply for help from the Association, and their fitness to earn their own living is postponed very often for weeks. Much trouble and expense might be saved and relapses often prevented if the attention of the Council could be called to all cases that need work immediately upon their discharge as recovered. Some of the County Asylums have small funds at their disposal by which they can partly assist some of their discharged cases, but most of these cases require friendly aid to help and advise them when they first leave the Asylum or Workhouse, and this can be best afforded by the experience and assistance of this Association—the only Charity of the kind in Great Britain.

During the past twelve months there were 250 cases before the Council. In 1902 they were 221. The number successfully

helped was also greater in this than in any previous year. Of these 155 were women, and 95 men. Many have been assisted as in the past, by being boarded out in cottages in the country, grants of money, clothing, and finding occupation, or in other ways as the Council has thought best. Other cases have been declined, as it was thought, after most careful consideration, that they would never again be able to bear the strain of even ordinary occupation.

In addition to the above, several cases both male and female, not coming under the rules of the Association, have been assisted. This, of course, also adds largely to the claims on the time of the staff, and the expenditure on postage, etc.

All cases are thoroughly investigated by the officers of the Association previous to being brought before the Council, and where possible, all employers are interviewed. Sometimes as many as twenty or more visits have been made by a member of the staff in connection with a single case. This means a very considerable expenditure of time and money, but the Council has been well repaid for this extra work by the most satisfactory manner in which a very large majority have retained the situations found for them.

The total amount of subscriptions, donations, and contributions for maintenance, etc., in 1903 amounted to £648 3s. 7d. In 1902 they were £772 17s. 4d. The decrease in the receipts is not however due to falling off in the number of subscribers, but chiefly to the fact, that no entertainments or sales of work were held for the Association in 1903.

The boarding out of suitable convalescents in cottage homes in the country has been continued with success. The homes are inspected by the Secretary before anyone is sent, and they are also visited by him at short intervals. These homes are mostly situated in various parts of the South of England.

The Council experiences much difficulty in finding suitable cottage homes, which increases year by year. The cost is considerably enhanced by the fact that experience has shown that the best results are obtained in homes receiving not more than *three* cases. The weekly payment for maintenance has had to be considerably raised, and the Council earnestly appeal for increased funds to meet this extra outlay.

The Guardians of Wandsworth and Clapham, Kensington, Paddington, Fulham, Hammersmith, Stratford-on-Avon, Lambeth,

St. Giles', Camberwell, Brentford and Hendon, have all subscribed to the funds of the Association. The Guardians of Tetbury have given a donation for a special case.

WOMEN.

- [1051.] A respectable young woman from a County Asylum, an excellent situation was found for her, and she afterwards sent a donation to the funds of the Association.
- [1057.] A young girl with respectable, but poor parents, was placed by the Association in service in the country at good wages.
- [1068.] A lady, after a stay of two months in one of the Association's Homes, a very suitable situation was found for her.
- [1076.] A young woman, very respectable but far from strong, was boarded out for six weeks, and a light situation found for her, she has since greatly improved in health and is now receiving good wages.
- [108d.] A capable middle aged woman, after some difficulty a situation was found for her in an Institution.
- [1095.] A domestic servant after a rest in a Cottage Home, had so much improved in health, that she was able to return to her former situation.
- [1097.] A young girl, mother dead, a situation was found, where she is very happy and much liked by her employer.
- [1102.] A young servant, she spent a month in one of the Cottage Homes and was then placed in suitable service.
- [1113.] A respectable young woman, she spent six weeks in one of the Cottage Homes in the country, and afterwards a good situation was found for her.
- [1120.] A respectable young woman, formerly worked in a factory, some clothing which had been pawned was redeemed and she returned to her work.
- [1125.] A general servant, who had been for many years in an Asylum, after a rest in a Cottage Home she went to an excellent situation.
- [1127.] An elderly woman, who had once held a good position, was boarded out in the country and afterwards satisfactorily placed in service.
- [1131.] A young woman, a total orphan, brought up in one of the District Schools, she was boarded out for three months by the Association and an excellent situation found for her in a seaside town.

MEN.

- [1056.] A respectable middle aged man, his rent was paid for eight weeks and a small sum allowed weekly to his wife while he was an out-patient at one of the London General Hospitals. When he was physically able to work, a situation was found for him.
- [1075.] An old man with an excellent character, his board and lodging were paid for some weeks, until another Society, with the aid of a grant from the Association, were able to raise a small pension for him.
- [1090.] A young man, a situation was found, and clothing which had been pawned was redeemed.
- [1093.] A respectable youth, a situation with good wages was found for him and an outfit provided.
- [1109.] A respectable young married man. After a rest in one of the Cottage Homes he greatly improved in health and returned to his home.
- [1110.] A very steady young man, married. He spent four weeks in one of the Cottage Homes and returned to London quite well. He found work at once.
- [1118.] A young man, was boarded in a Home in London for six weeks, when he found a good situation.
