FROM ASYLUMS FOR THE INSANE.

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Members and friends of the Association was held at 5, Hyde Park Square, W., on Monday, February 8th, 1897, (by kind permission of Mr. and Mrs. Bonham Carter). The Chair was taken by the Venerable W. M. Sinclair, D.D., (Archdeacon of London, and Canon of St. Paul's) who was supported amongst others by Dr. Henry Rayner (Chairman of the Council), Revs. Canon Elwyn, M. R. Neligan, Henry Hawkins (Hon. Sec.), F. H. A. Hawkins, and F. Mann., Dr. Nicholson, Dr. Alexander, Dr. R. Jones, Dr. Chambers, Dr. O. Wood, Dr. Bower, Dr Mickley, H. Gardiner Hill, Esq., M.R.C.S., E. Parker Young, Esq., M.R.C.S., J. P. Richards, Esq., M.R.C.S., and N. A. Jephson, Esq. There was a large attendance and much interest was shown in the proceedings.

The Secretary (Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby) read several letters that had been received from friends, who for various reasons were unable to be present at the Meeting, amongst whom were Dr. G. H. Savage, (Treasurer), Dr. Needham, Dr. Norman Kerr, Dr. E. W. White, Dr. Shuttleworth, Heurtley Sankey, Esq., M.R.C.S., and the Medical Superintendents of several Asylums.

The Secretary then read the report which was as follows :--

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL.

From January 1st, to December 31st, 1896.

The Council for the After-Care Association for Poor Persons discharged recovered from Asylums for the Insane, have much pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for 1896.

They again thank all those by whose kind assistance the work of the Association has been carried on, and are glad to be able to report satisfactory work and progress during the past year. They once more repeat that the work undertaken by the Society can never be expected to become very popular in the strict sense of the word; nor can its progress be judged by comparing it with other charities, as its difficulties are very much greater. But there is scarcely any work more needed, and the Association is the only one in the country that offers the special help afforded by it, to those poor people who have recovered from Insanity.

During the twelve months just passed there were 135 cases before the Council, as compared with 121 in the same period in 1895. Being an increase of about 12% for the year. Of these, 106 were women and 29 men. Cases have been asissted, as in the past, by being boarded out in cottages in the country, grants of money, clothing, and finding occupation, and in other ways as the Council have thought best. Some few cases have had to be declined, as it was thought, after most careful consideration, that they would never be fit for the struggle of life again.

In addition to the above, several cases, both male and female, not coming under the rules of the Association, have been assisted in other channels. This, of course, adds largely to the claims on the time of the Secretary, and the cost of the postage, &c. But the Council consider the time and money well spent.

The number of members of the Association has increased. But the total receipts from Subscriptions and Donations, show a decrease during the past year which may be principally accounted for by certain large Donations received in 1895, not having been repeated. In the spring of 1896 a legacy of £188 18s. 1od. was received by the Association under the will of the late Miss Foveaux, who, during her lifetime was a warm friend of the work. A much larger number of Subscriptions and Donations are needed to do justice to the Association, and more funds are asked for the expansion of the work.

During 1896 the Association lost the help of Mr. F. C. Pawle as Treasurer, but are glad to report that their old and valued friend, Dr. G. H. Savage, kindly consented to fill the vacancy. The Bishop of Peterborough, Canon Elwyn, Dr. Needham, Dr. J. W. Ogle, Dr. Nicholson, and F. D. Mocatta, Esq., have kindly become Vice-Presidents. Vacancies upon the Council have been filled by the Rev. J. Grant Mills, Leicester, M. Reid, Esq., and Mrs. Macartney. It was with the deepest regret that they accepted the resignation of Miss F. Davenport Hill of her seat upon the Council, through continued ill-health.

The Councial having decided to appoint Local District Secretaries, the following have consented to serve:—Mrs. Heurtley Sankey (Oxford District), Mrs. Leach (Manchester District), Mrs. Pooley (Rochdale District), Miss Anderson-Moorshead (Andover District), Mrs. Courtenay (Sevenoaks District), Miss I. Guildford (Nottingham District), Mrs. Bousfield (Bedford District), Dr. Bailey (Northampton District), Mrs. Russell (Lincoln District), Miss Swain (Northwood District), Mrs. Mackenzie (Balham District), Mrs. Hartland (Gloucester District), Miss Argles (Peterborough District), Mrs. Greenwood - Taylor (Derby District). They wish to thank Miss R. Powell, Mrs. Spooner, and Mrs. Maclean (Hon. Local Secretaires), who have resigned office during the year. They will be glad to hear of other ladies and gentlemen willing to help in this most useful way.

In July, 1896, a Special Meeting of Members was held under the presidency of Dr. Rayner, when a new Constitution for the Association was drawn up and passed. The Council now meet on the first and third Tuesday in each month.

In the early part of the year a Concert was kindly given by Dr. Eager and some of the staff of the Suffolk County Asylum, on behalf of the funds of the Association.

The Council are glad to state that, during the past year, more lady guardians have become members of the Society. The Wandsworth, and Clapham, and Paddington Boards of Poor Law Guardians are annual subscribers, and those of St. Pancras, Fulham, Cheltenham, Chelsea, Paddington, Kensington, Nantwich, West Ham and Kingston (Surrey) have given donations from time to time towards cases chargeable to their respective Unions. It is hoped that many other Boards will help in the future. They are always glad to welcome any guardians as members of the Association, believing that much mutual good may be arrived at by co-operation between public and private bodies whose work is to benefit the poor.

The boarding out of suitable Convalescents in Cottage Homes in the country has been continued with much success. Several new homes have been added to the list during the past year, but more Cottage Homes where Convalescents can be received are much needed at the present time. In all cases the care of Convalescents, while in the Homes found by the Association, is entrusted to a lady in the neighbourhood, when practicable. The Homes are inspected by the Secretary before anyone is sent, and they are also visited at short intervals.

Bell, Stewards, May & How), the "After-Care" Working Association, Miss Saunders (Haywards Heath), Mrs. Macartney, and other friends for gifts of clothing. Their warmest thanks are also due to Dr. Newth, Dr. Gasquet, Dr. Duke, Dr. Footner, Dr. Alliott, and Miss M. Marsh (Nottingham) for their kind help; also the various Local Secretaries, and all who have in any way forwarded the interests of the Association.

The Council consider the work done during the past year has in every sense been the most successful in its annals, but must again repeat that what is now wanting, and is almost vital to the ultimate success of the Association, is the warm co-operation and assistance of the Medical Superintendents of the various Asylums and Guardians of the Poor throughout the Country. It is sincerely hoped that many more will join and help the Society during the year 1897.
