Do you know of any good copier of pictures in Leiden who would undertake to make us a copy of the portrait of Boerhaave in the Senate Hall of the University. I think it is the best portrait I have seen of him, and if we could get a copy done a little smaller than the original at a moderate cost, I should be very glad to have one to put among the portraits of Dutch medical men. If you do not know of anyone in Leiden, I will write our friend, Van Gils, who man know of a suitable man in the Hague.
