Dear Dr. Ray,

Many thanks for your kind letter of the 28th ult. The war has been very upsetting for all of us, and a number of my friends like yourself are out with the Territorial Forces.

Dr. Derry called in the other day to see me. He has gone off to France on the British Red Cross staff for service in a base hospital.

The chief thing I wanted to speak to you about was Dr. Mohamad Eloui Pasha, whom you may remember you mentioned to me in conversation the last time you were at the Museum, as being an expert in ancient Arab MSS. Do you know him personally? It is probable I may want him to make a translation of certain parts of some Arab MSS. on surgery that I know are in the Khedival Library. Could you let me know a proper address where a letter would find him, and if he is generally in Cairo during the winter?

Mr. Wellcome was very interested when I told him you were probably going on foreign service, and he told me to wish you

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every good luck, and to give his kind remembrances to you. He is a good deal better than when he first came back from Egypt, though he is not yet thoroughly fit.

I sincerely trust you will have a good time when you go on foreign service, and will keep well, and come back safely. I am afraid the war is going to be a long one, but there is no doubt about the ultimate success of the Allies.
