In reply to your kind note of the 13th inst. with reference to the relics of Edward Jenner, the loan of which you so kindly obtained for the Historical Medical Museum, I should have returned them to you several weeks ago, but last October just before we closed the Museum a lady, whom I think you introduced, Miss Mockler-Perryman, called here.
