Dear Mr. Wellcome,-

A few evenings ago I attended a lecture delivered by Mrs. LePlongeon upon 'The Ruins of Yucatan'. It occurred to me that you might be interested in the subject and I therefore asked the lecturer to let me have particulars of any works published on the subject. I enclose copy of Mrs. LePlongeon's communication to me together with pamphlets on the books which have been published by the lecturer and her husband. If you do not already possess the works on this subject and wish me to obtain same will you please kindly let me know.

Dr. LePlongeon, as far as I can understand, holds some sort of government commission on the investigation of these ruins, and he has taken casts of many of the stone images found in Yucatan, also the inscriptions on the facings of the ruins, with the object of having duplicates of figures, etc., in the New York Museum.

It is our intention to get in touch with Dr. LePlongeon so that on his next expedition we may have an opportunity of supplying medical equipment.

Dear Sir,-

In order that the matter may not be overlooked, I myself herewith forward to your address the circulars promised last evening at the museum. We have four or five other volumes not yet printed, and some there are already out of print - for instance, Dr. Le Plongeon's "Sacred Mysteries" which originally sold at \$2.50, and now brings from \$8.00 to \$15.00 at auction when second-hand copies can be found. Our works are published by ourselves, under Dr. LePlongeon's direction, and are to be purchased directly from us, as they can be mailed where desired on receipt of price.

If you happen to be acquainted with collectors of curios, perhaps one of these might like to acquire a string of ancient Maya currency, in the shape of a string of red beads - I believe they are 59 in number. These are the only specimens we have come upon, and we value them at \$300.00. Cogolludo, in his "History of Yucatan" mentions this currency as follows, - 'Conchas colorados sartas al modo de rosarios' - or, as I am not sure that you, Sir, speak Spanish, 'red shells which were brought from abroad, and which were strung as rosaries'. Mineralogists do not seem to be agreed upon the character of the beads in question, but the natives appreciated them so highly that they used to line them with gold to protect them from too rapid friction, although gold was rare among them, for there are no mines in Yucatan. The specimens in our possession were procured from a governor of Campeche, Don Manuel Garcia, who had them from a cacique, in whose family they had been for some generations.



Below you will find particulars of Dr. Pettigrew, as desired:-

Thomas Joseph Pettigrew, F.R.S., F.S.A., F.L.S., born, 1791, died, 23rd November, 1865. In 1812 he passed the examination of the College of Surgeons, and soon after was appointed Surgeon Extraordinary to the Dukes of Kent and Sussex. He was a celebrated archaeologist, and antiquarian, and wrote several works on these subjects. He also wrote several biographical works, an anatomical work on the base of the skull and brain, and papers on hydrophobia, cholera, etc. He was one of the founders of the ~~Society of Antiquaries~~ Archaeological Association, a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons, a doctor of philosophy of the university of Göttingen, and a member of several continental medical societies.

From autograph letters in our collection it appears that in 1817 he was residing at Bolt Court, Fleet Street, probably the house of his <sup>in</sup> Father, who was an apothecary practising in Fleet Street; in 1852, he was living in Saville Row, and in 1856 and 1857 in Onslow Crescent, Brompton.

In 1834 he published a history of Egyptian mummies.


