in friend chert In July I wrote you of the receipt of the shipment, your gift to the Sanato. ruim. I have not been able amidst my days of strenous work to find the lessure to write you what use has been made of the splendid assortment, so liberally provided. I began this work three years ago with large hopes but with-only two beds, because it seemed to we the needs of pour consumptives in this country could no longer be ignored. We have now a building of stone with 26 rooms and eight rooms in a wing and two detached rooms and two shellers. This is the third season and we have had patients from Germany, Russia, Egypt Roumania and all parts of Syria. Jerusalem Juffa Damaseus Nazareth. Elc. He have a head nurse from Scotland and a Lynain nurse from Jerusalem. the allendants are Syrian. It

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is a matter of the ulmost difficulty to get any one to serve these unfortunate patents, the terror of the disease has so fastened clark upon the whole people. We are therefore greatly handi capped. and the cost of administration is thereby donebled. The maller of medicines has also been a very serious dem. We are most sincerely and heartily grateful to you for thus aiding us. The Supply of Malt Extract has been a very great boon, and we will soon begin upon the Cod liver Oil and Malt supply as the weather grows colder. I wrote my cousin Mr W. E. Curtis of the fine bag which I suppose way intended specially for my use. The patients are greatly interested in the way all the drugs are packed for export, especially in the urgenions arrangements of the contents of the First Wid package, Ou account of the nature of the hospital we are excled from companionship and the cheer affords the patients by visils-from outsiders. We have hard work to keep them cheered up and interested. He have an incubation and

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a phonograph and a few widoor games, but as many we very advanced cases we find it difficult to know first how heat to make them happy. We have had a little ellostem slave girl all summer whose disease was completely arrested and who was sent home last week. We have another, an arrested case who has no home to return to and we have no means to support her, but I am keeping her and have faith to believe in some way She will find some one to care for her while she helps us to care for the patients. One lovena here slept fire nights an outcast because of her desiare, in the dry hed of the Beinet river, her bed the pebbles, her fullow a stone She then had a livy but, wellient roof as Sheller and her nearest neighbers kept threatening to pour coal oil on her and the hut, so she daved not sleep left they should burn her up alive, Another woman comes to me this coming Friday She has Slept in the open five weeks as is one would shellen her. Such cases are most distressing, and

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we long for the means to take all these in even though they are not able to pay. We do the best we can and if faithful God will send enough to supply all our needs. Such help as yours is a very great encouragement for I chen do not ful as if I was working alone. Ten Forter spoke often to me of your visit to America. I wish that it had been my good fortune to have seen you in Washington. My consin Me Custo asked me to slop and see you in Loudon, but I passed through before your return, I go to America this spring and perhaps I may be allowed to have the opportunity of thouking you in person for your great krudness to my wards. and myself.
