It was with great pleasure that Mr. Wellcome and myself visited your exhibition at Burlington House this morning, and we were exceedingly interested in a number of the objects resulting from your last year's excavations.

Several appeal to us very strongly on account of their medical interest, namely the Papyrus with quotation from Hippocrates, the Papyrus with quotation from Galen, and the botanical Papyrus with a representation of "Comfrey."

There are also two small bronze scale beams, several unguent spatulae and forceps. Would it be possible for us to obtain any of these objects by purchase for the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum after the Egyptian Exploration Funds' Report is issued, and they have finished with them?
