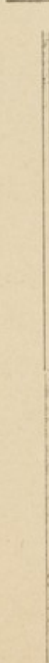

## THE SPORTSMAN'S ROLL OF HONOUR.

I BELIEVE I am correct in stating the Lieut. C. Kelleway who is reported wounded is the first Australian Test Match cricketer who has been hit. At any rate, of those seen in this country. The nature of his wounds I have not heard. He was the extremely slow batsman of the 1912 team, and not a bad fast-medium right-handed bowler. He made centuries in Test Matches at Old Trafford, 114, and at Lord's, 102, against the South Africans, and finished second in the Australian averages to W. Bardsley, with 360 runs, average 60, for 7 innings, 1 not out. Ten wickets for 239 was his bowling average for 862 overs.

Corporal Kilner, the Yorkshire professional, had a very narrow escape recently. While carrying bombs, shrapnel round his body he was slightly wounded in the right wrist. He played first for Yorkshire in 1911, making the very modest beginning of 6.6 runs per innings for 10 innings. In 1912 he played 24 innings for 2573 runs each, with a highest score of 85 not out, a vast improvement. In 1914 he made 1,232 runs for Yorkshire in County Championship matches, with a highest of 160, and an average of 30.6. So that if the slight wound does not affect his wrist play, and we are ever to see county cricket again, he promises to be one of the players of the future.

I was very sorry indeed to note the death, from wounds received on the same day, July 8th, of the Old Rugbeian, Capt. R. L. Pillman, Q.O. West Surrey Regt. He is the younger brother of the famous Rugby international, Lieut. C. H. Pillman, 4th Dragoon Guards, and unfortunately an erroneous report that C. H. had fallen gained ground in town last week. Capt. R. L. Pillman was also an English international, having gained a place in the pack against France in the last international Rugby match played, that of 1914 in Paris. He was a member of the Blackheath pack who would have won many more English caps.

The welter-weight boxer, Sergt. Tom McCormick, who was last week reported to have been killed in France, had beaten, among other men, Johnny Summers and Sergt. Basham, the former holder of the Lonsdale belt. McCormick rejoined the Army on the outbreak of war.

Capt. G. H. Heslop, Middlesex Regt., who is reported missing, believed killed, is the fine all-round cricketer who obtained 900 runs for Lancing College in 1914, and who had good bowling feats to his credit. He was the cricket captain at Lancing.

Capt. J. L. Williams, the very well-known Cardiff and Wales wing three-quarter, has died of wounds. To say that he will be very much mourned and missed in Welsh Rugby circles is to state a platitude, but only those who are intimate with the Rugby game will know how very popular indeed was this young wing three-quarter. He came into the Welsh XV. in December, 1906, on the right wing, against the South Africans at Swansea (E. T. Morgan's last match, of 16, for Wales), and the defeat was in no way due to any fault in his performance. From, and including, the following spring he

and Llewellyn of whom this can be said, with the single exception of Bryn Lewis, who was not such a favourite of the Welsh selectors as he ought to have been. Last week's heavy toll of Rugby internationals, the deaths of three having been reported, makes Williams the fifth Welsh and forty-sixth Rugby international to lose his life in this war, exclusive of Frenchmen, whose proud record is not yet to hand.

much of him as a player, and considered him quite up to Trials form, but it was much harder to get into a Rugby Union Trial during the last three or four years of the game than it was a dozen years ago to get into the English XV.—a fact not always recognised. Sojourn for a spell in the backwoods of Canada had served splendidly to fit Capt. Hannam to be an officer in the King's Army, wherein he carried on the glorious tradition of the spirit of our Public Schools, which he imbued into the Clifton Club XV., and for which it was justly famous in the West. The deceased is one who will be long mourned. He was, in his official capacity, President of the Gloucestershire Rugby Union, and Chairman of the Bristol and District Cricket Association; in fact, just the sort that any sporting centre can ill afford to lose.

Capt. H. M. S. Carpenter, Duke of Wellington's (Yorkshire) Regiment, who was killed in action on the 6th inst., had been captain of the Kingston Rowing Club for the past three years, and at an earlier stage of his long connection with the Club he had been hon. secretary. He rowed in the K.R.C. first eight on many occasions at Henley and other regattas, and came nearest to success at the premier meeting in 1905, when, in the Thames Cup, Kingston beat in succession Keble College, Molesey, and London, but lost the final to Thames by a length; his last appearance at Henley was in 1912. A good oarsman and sculler, and a capable club organizer, "Chips" Carpenter will be greatly missed by river men.

A famous Association footballer, Capt. O. E. Wreford Brown, of the Northumberland Fusiliers, has succumbed to wounds received. He was a member of a renowned sporting brotherhood, and the sixth son of Mr. William Wreford Brown, of Clifton, Bristol. Educated at Waynflete and Charterhouse, the late gallant officer was in both the cricket and football teams in 1896; subsequently, he played cricket for the Old Carthusians and Free Foresters, and has also assisted Gloucestershire County. He played a good deal of football for the Corinthians and the Old Carthusians. He lost one of his brothers, Capt. C. W. Wreford Brown, D.S.O., of the same regiment, in June of last year. Capt. O. E. Wreford Brown, who was a member of the London Stock Exchange, was a younger brother of the famous footballer, Mr. O. Wreford Brown, who played several times for England against Scotland, Ireland, and Wales, and who was a prominent member for a number of years of the Corinthian F.C.
