bear Sir. Your Circular recieved and studied with much intrest. I will give you a fiew hints from a long life of experience in the practice of medicine and Surgery. And if you desire furt further elaberation , I will gladley give them in the future.

When a boy Father lived in Hercimer County New York state. Our Cow had a caked bag and a welch farmers wife told him to use Polk root as a police and give her a tea of the same in her slop, The cow got well remarkible quick. I have used Phitolaca, (Polk Root) for forty four years in Raked brest, always with success. I well remember Father asked her how they first found out its value. Her answer was that in Wales a Farmer was plowing up an old hedge on the road side where a quantity of Polk bushes grew and exposed a guantity of the roots, and a Cow having a Caked bag was seen eating the roots, and the cake disapered almost amediatly

The Squaw went to the river near at hand, washed her self and the popuse, then lay down on the grass for few moments when she arose and indian packed a big bundal on her back with Popuse on top and they marched on tem miles away to the reservation. In a flew days we visited the reservation and I hunted up my first case -as a witness- of Otstetrics. I was piloted to

books while treating the sick in the wild and wolley west.

I think that incidences of my life of forty four years of practice of medicine and Surgery in western America would be very intresting, especially to Englesh-Men. Twenty two years in southwestern Minisota in an earley day, when I kept twenty five horses tired out and Thehold Fever was in almost every house for fifty miles each way and never lost a case. Emergancy cases caling for treatment never known to publishers, both in medicine and Surgery. But I will now closw this somewhat rambling letter.
