I hereby confirm your engagement for such duties as I may appoint during my forthcoming season's work in the Sudan, the engagement commencing on November 1st 1911 and to terminate (except as hereinafter provided) at the end of my season's work.

Your salary to be at the rate of _____ per week. Your travelling and living expenses during the time you are employed out of England will be paid by me

You are to devote the whole of your time and best energies solely to my work and to faithfully carry out my instructions and the instructions of any person or persons who may be authorised to act for me and will not without my previous consent in writing engage in any other work or employment whatsoever, whether such work be for remuneration or otherwise.

All work done, discoveries made, researches undertaken, and information procured, either during working hours or at any other time, either upon my premises or elsewhere, in connection with any work in which you or others have been or are engaged for me, is to be considered as strictly confidential and as my sole property, and shall not be communicated in any way to others than myself or my authorised representatives, without my written permission.

During the exercise of your work, manuscripts, printed and other books, drawings, photographs, engravings, and other things in connection with my work, may pass through your hands, and all are to be dealt with confidentially and with the greatest care, as responsibility will rest upon you for such as are placed in your charge.

All apparatus, appliances, instruments, manuscripts, books, sketches, tracings, paintings, relics, objects, specimens, plans, pictures, photographs, prints, negatives, engravings, drawings, memoranda, information, papers, notes, documents, or any copies or reproductions of same, and all other things of whatsoever nature in connection with your work for me, or in connection with work done for me by others, or in connection with anything which I may hold in trust for others, or in which I may be interested together with others, which you may acquire either by purchase or in any other way whilst in my employment, are to be regarded as strictly confidential and as my sole property, and no use shall be made by you either during your employment or at any time

You are not to make purchases (for yourself or for anyone else other than myself) of any antiquities or other objects of archaeological interest in connection with any work in which you are engaged, or in which I am interested, without my previous written consent.

All photographs taken by you and sketches drawings or pictures made by you while in my service, whether during working hours or otherwise, shall be regarded as my sole property, and if it be necessary or desirable that you sign any documents to secure to me full rights in all such things, you shall sign such documents and do all such things as may be required without further remuneration, the expenses of such documents to be borne by me.

The employment mentioned herein may be determined by me at any time without notice in case of misconduct or if the conditions herein are not strictly adhered to by you.

Dear Mrs. Aitken,

Thanks for your letter of the 28th inst. to hand this morning from which I gather you are willing to undertake the work in classifying the pottery fragments. If you wish, I am quite agreeable to your suggestion to make the remuneration at the rate of one shilling per hour for the time you work at the flat. I think I mentioned to you that it is absolutely necessary that all work done and the whole matter should be strictly confidential. 
