### ANNUAL MEETING, 1909.

THE ANNUAL MEETING was held at 26, Devonshire Place, London, W., by kind permission of Dr. G. H. Savage, on Wednesday, February 3rd, at 3 p.m.

The Chair was taken by Dr. G. H. Savage. The speakers were, The Lord Bishop of Croydon, Mr. H. J. Tennant, M.P. (Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade), Dr. Nicolson, C.B., (Lord Chancellor's Visitor in Lunacy), Dr. E. Marriott Cooke and Mr. A. H. Trevor (Commissioners in Lunacy), Dr. Henry Rayner, Dr. G. F. Blandford, Dr. H. Bond, and Mr. H. J. Woollcombe.

A Paper was afterwards read by Dr. Robert Jones, on "The Urgent Necessity of Helping Mental Convalescents."

Letters, regretting their unavoidable absence, were received from the Bishops of London, Chichester and Barking, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Dr. Macnamara, M.P., and others.

There was a large attendance of subscribers and friends.

The Secretary, Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby, read the Report and Balance Sheet for 1908, which are as follows:—

#### REPORT OF THE COUNCIL.

From January 1st, 1908 to December 31st, 1908

Once again the Council of the After Care Association for Poor Persons discharged recovered from Asylums for the Insane has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report, which shows that the work during 1908 has been satisfactory. The proportion of cases successfully treated has been very encouraging and the grateful letters, frequently received from those helped in past years, give the strongest possible evidence of the utility of this Charity, not only in the comfort and aid given, but in the prevention of relapse into insanity. This is so frequent and great a danger, that in the past many have been inclined to regard it as inevitable. That this is not the case has been conclusively proved in numberless cases, in which an efficient restart in life is given.

The most important function of the Association is the finding of suitable occupations for persons, who, although recovered, have often many peculiarities and prejudices. This necessitates the bestowal of an extreme amount of personal care and individual attention upon each case, and the careful investigation of the character and circumstances of those with whom they are placed. All this counts for far more than the mere supplying of temporary homes, clothing and grants for maintenance and tools, important though these may be, and gives full occupation to the staff who are employed in this work.

This also accounts for a considerable amount of the expenditure, and money could not be better spent than in thus ensuring the success of the direct outlay in homes, clothing, etc.

Many of those who are discharged from Asylums and Hospitals for the Insane, are quite capable of work if suitable posts can be obtained for them, but the anxiety and strain of seeking employment for themselves are more than they can undertake at first. The Council particularly wishes to emphasize this point, as often when patients are discharged, they strive to obtain work for themselves, and only apply to the Association when their small means are exhausted and their fitness for again earning their own living is postponed, not infrequently for weeks.

Much trouble and expense might be saved and relapses often prevented if the attention of the Council could be called to all cases that need assistance, immediately upon their discharge as recovered. Some of the County Asylums have small funds at their disposal by which they can partly assist a few of the discharged cases, but most recovered persons require friendly aid by help and advice when they first leave the Asylum or Workhouse, and this can be best afforded by the accumulated experience of this Association—the only Charity of the kind in the United Kingdom.

Kindred Societies. The Council is glad to be able to state that in addition to various Societies doing a somewhat similar work on the Continent, a most successful Association, has been formed in the U.S.A. with branches in several of the States. Miss Louisa Schuyler, the chief originator, had several interviews with the Secretary of this Association as to its working and methods, and from the last report the American Association seems to be making rapid progress and is doing good work. A similar effort is also being started in Japan and full particulars of the working of this Association have been applied for. Information has also been forwarded to Ireland for a like purpose.

Cases. During the past year 388 applications were received, of these 248 were women and 140 men. In 1904, the number was 255, in 1905, 288, in 1906, 308, and in 1907, 348. A few have been declined, as after most careful consideration, it was felt that they would be unable to again bear even the strain of ordinary occupation and the Council is glad to report that the number of those successfully helped was again in advance of the preceding year.

Each case is most thoroughly investigated by the staff before the Council considers it and whenever possible, all likely employers are interviewed. As the Association becomes more widely known, its area is also largely increased and the expenditure of time and money must necessarily be greater, but the satisfactory results more than justify the Council in its greater outlay and while more situations are held for longer periods, it is also well to record that the ready sympathy and kindly advice always to be had from the office has in many cases undoubtedly prevented relapses. A visit or a letter will always ensure im-

mediate attention, frequently preventing breakdowns and encouraging those who in trouble or distress have often no one else to whom they may apply. It is satisfactory to notice the increased number, who have now accounts in the Savings' Bank. Others have repaid the whole cost of their outfits and many voluntarily send small donations, as thankofferings for assistance given to them in their hour of need.

The Council, as years pass by is more and more convinced that personal influence, is the essential factor in dealing with cases recovered from mental illness, and of course, of this no record can be given. Some slight idea may be gathered from the fact that in 1908 about 610 visits have been paid and more than 4,060 letters written to or about cases only, while over 620 interviews have taken place in the office.

Finance. — The total amount received in 1908 was £1,054 16s. 11d. In 1904, £818 12s. 2d. was received, while in 1905, owing to a legacy of £200, the receipts were £1,064 5s. 3d., in 1906, £972 4s. 7d., and in 1907, including a legacy of £500, the total amounted to £1496 7s. 3d.

Branches.—The Council is glad to state that two new branches have been formed in 1908, one in connection with the Kent County Asylum, Barming Heath of which Mrs. Wolseley Lewis has been elected Hon. Secretary, and one for Oxford County for which Mrs. Heurtley Sankey has kindly promised to act in a like capacity. It is hoped that more may be formed in 1909 in various parts of the country. The Council ventures to hope that more help of this kind may be forthcoming in the future.

**Entertainment.** A drawing room concert was kindly organised by Miss Evelyn Vickers in February, which resulted in the sum of £9 14s. 8d., being handed over to the Association for which the Council offers her its most sincere thanks.

Collecting Boxes and Cards.—The Council is pleased to state that the Collecting Boxes and Cards have brought in the amount of £25 178. 8d. during the current year.

#### A Few of the Cases Helped during 1908.

#### WOMEN.

- [1717.] A married woman, after a month's convalesence in a Cottage Home, near the sea, she returned to her husband. Subsequent visits from one of the Staff proved that she had again taken up the care of her children and home in a most satisfactory manner.
- [1726.] A young girl from a country Asylum. She was received into a Cottage Home for a month, and was then placed in service. At first satisfactory, she later came under bad influence and ceased to do well, she was again received into a Cottage Home, and again was placed in service where she has now been for some time, and is very happy and much liked.
- [1736.] A domestic servant, a situation was found for her after some weeks in a Cottage Home, where she did well and is now earning good wages.
- [1738.] A respectable woman past middle age, who had never before held a situation for more than a very short time. Owing to her lack of experience it was difficult to find a suitable situation for her, but after a long rest in one of our Cottage Homes, a situation was found. There she still is most happy, and has repaid the Association for clothing supplied to her.
- [1755.] A very superior woman. After five weeks in one of the cottage Homes, a situation was found for her, where she did well. She comes to see us from time to time, and is very contented.
- [1768.] A young girl. After six weeks in a Cottage Home a situation was found where she is doing well.
- [1777.] A most respectable young woman with a high personal character, but a most difficult and unhappy temper. She went to a Cottage Home for six weeks, and her conduct there was all that could be desired. Two situatians were subsequently found for her.
- [1780.] A gentlewoman, formerly a governerss. After a rest in a country Cottage Home, a vacancy was found for her by a lady who had been interested in her sad and difficult case. She writes most gratefully and is very happy.

  [1795.] A girl from a very undesirable home. She was supplied with an outfit and placed, failed and was placed again. Here she did better and is still doing well, and has begun to repay the cost of her clothes.
- [1799.] A middle-aged woman. After a few weeks in a Cottage Home, a situation was found where she does well, having settled down immediately.
- [1804.] A most respectable woman, whose former mistress was able to give her an excellent character. She was convalesced in a Cottage Home, and then returned to her friends for a time. A situation was then found for her where she is much valued.

# [1844.] A woman from the North of England. After a short rest in a Cottage Home a situation was found. She gives complete satisfaction, and appears quite settled.

- [1851.] A young girl from a very poor cottage in the country. She was sent to the Seaside for five weeks, and then went to a situation found by her mother. She is doing well, and writes regularly to the Office.
- [1872.] A superior young woman. Her weak physical health made it necessary to keep her in a Cottage Home by the Sea for rather a long time, but when a situation was found she proved herself quite deserving of the care bestowed on her.
- [1865.] A highly respectable girl, for whom, after a few weeks in a Cottage Home, a situation in the country was found, where she is much liked.

#### MEN.

- [1722.] A very deserving man, afflicted with blindness. By co-operation with another Society he was taught a trade, and work found for him.
- [1764.] A respectable married man. Some work was found for him and relief in kind sent in for about five weeks. At the end of that time he obtained work at his own trade and called three months later to report that he was prospering, and to thank the Association for the help that had been given him.
- [1838.] A very respectable young man, who was sent to a Cottage Home for some weeks. He then returned to his work in excellent health.
- [1840.] A married man whose wife was, to a great extent, the breadwinner, but who was much distressed by his own inability to contribute. A grant was made to enable him to stock and start a sweet stall.
