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In printing the following hospital regulations, for the service in the Peninsula, it is to be observed, that they embrace merely the circumstances which are peculiar to that service. Special reference is made in general.

- 1.<sup>st</sup> To His Majesty's Regulations, and particularly the parts that relate to the sick, to hospitals, and to Medical Officers.
- 2.<sup>d</sup> To the three volumes of orders of his Excellency the Marquess of Wellington, and.
- 3.<sup>th</sup> To the last edition of the book of regulations for regimental hospitals, as originally drawn up by Mr. Knight when Inspector General.

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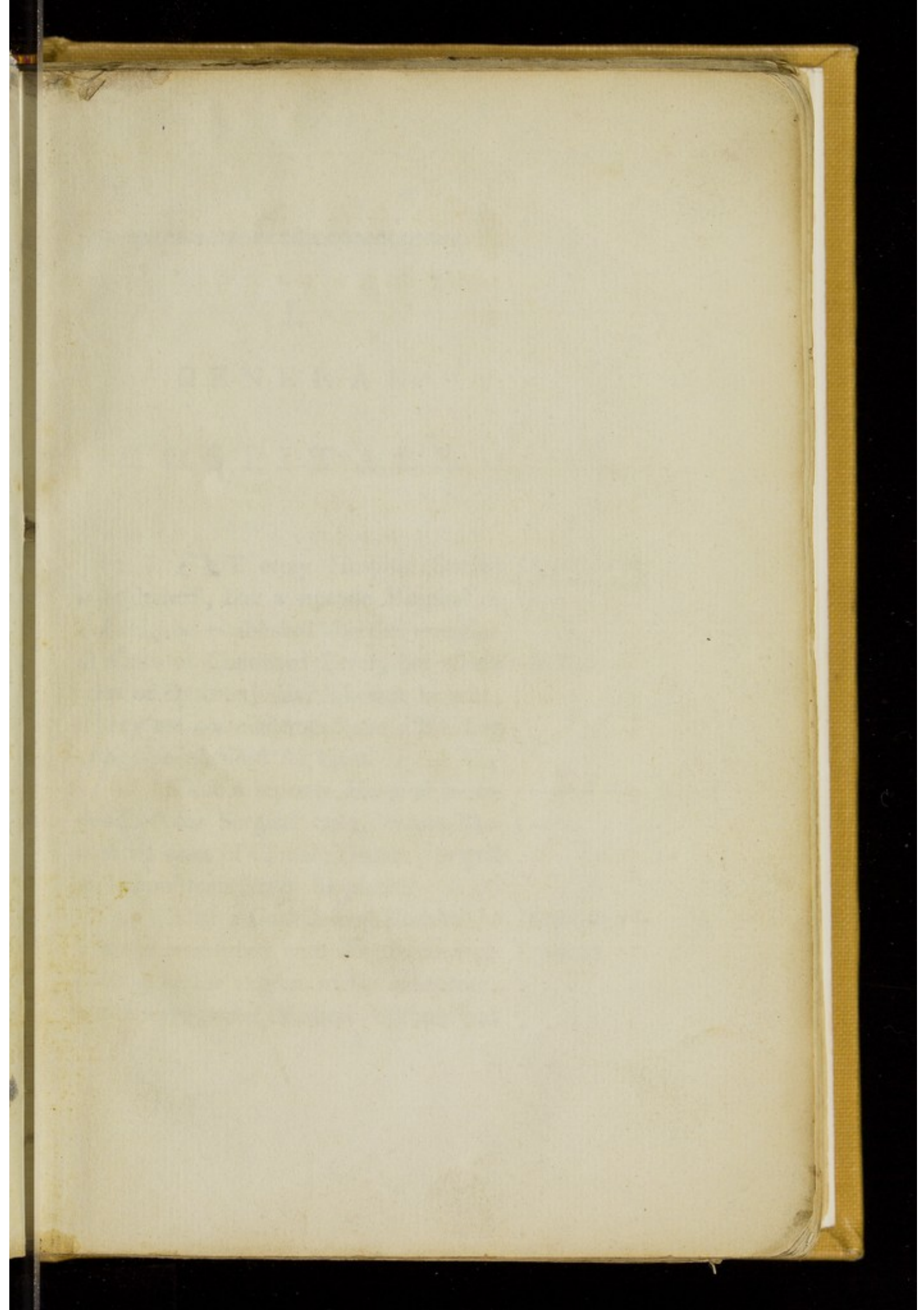
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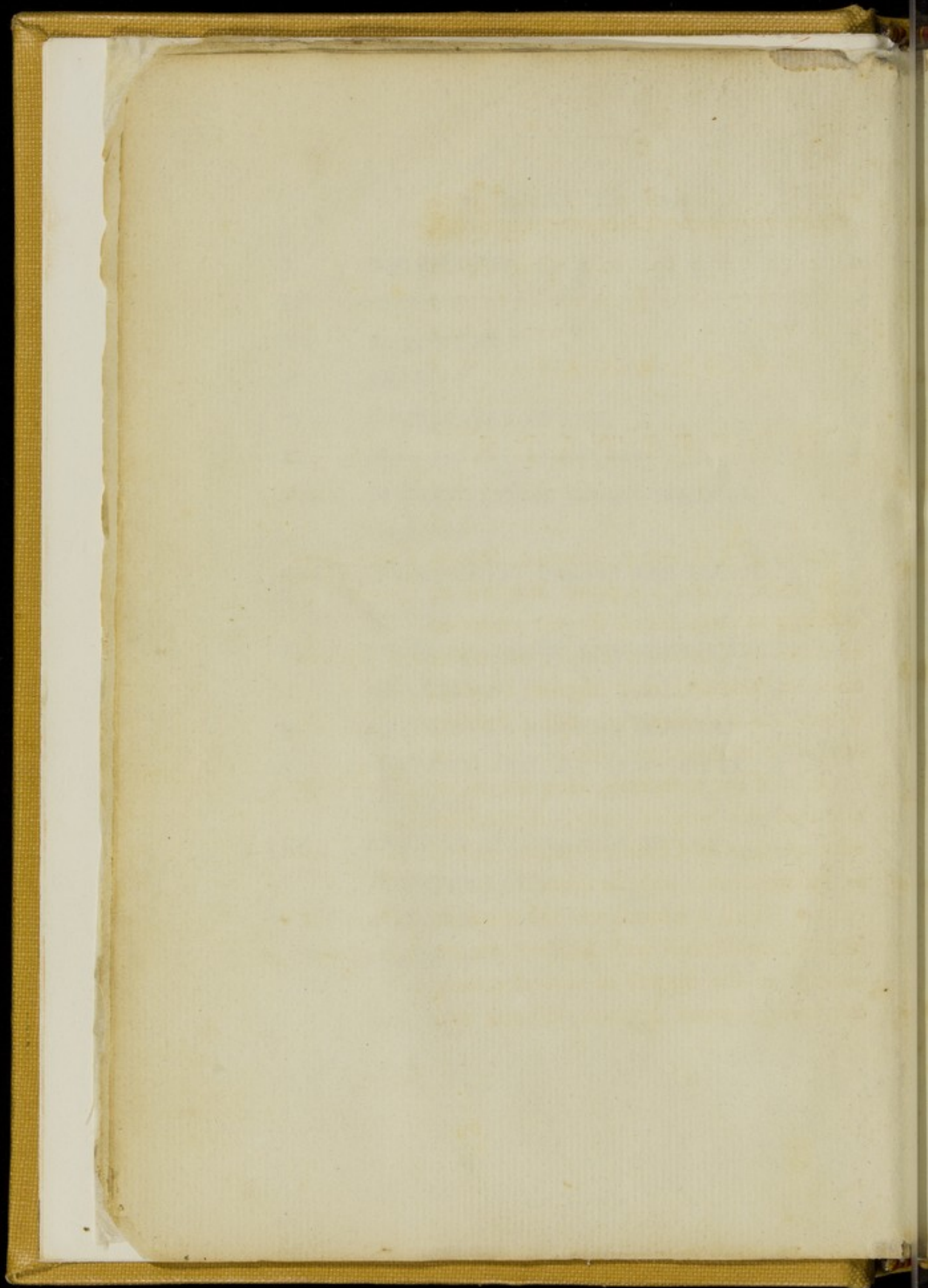

I.  
GENERAL  
HOSPITALS.

1. **A**T every Hospital Station it is desired, that a separate Hospital or Building be established for the reception of Cases of Continued Fever, but where cases of Dysentery may likewise be sent, if they are not numerous, and a Building cannot be obtained for them.

{ Establishment  
of Separate Hos-  
pitals.

*Fever Hospital.*

2. That a separate Hospital be established for Surgical cases, where likewise all cases of Chronic Disease, as well as Intermittents, may be placed.

{ Surgical Hos-  
pital.

3. That a Convalescent Hospital be likewise established with Subdivisions according to the degrees of Convalescence, but always under Medical Officers and

{ Convalescent  
Hospital.



regulations. While it is always advantageous to the service, that an Officer should daily visit and report upon the state of all the meals in every Hospital, this is more particularly necessary in a Convalescent Hospital. The Cooking of the Victuals and the dress of the Convalescents ought to be most strictly examined.

*Time of

4. Every Hospital is to be cleaned out by Six O'Clock in the morning in Summer and eight O'Clock in winter. The Patients to breakfast at eight O'Clock in Summer, and 9 O'Clock in winter, to dine at 12 O'Clock, and sup at Six O'Clock.

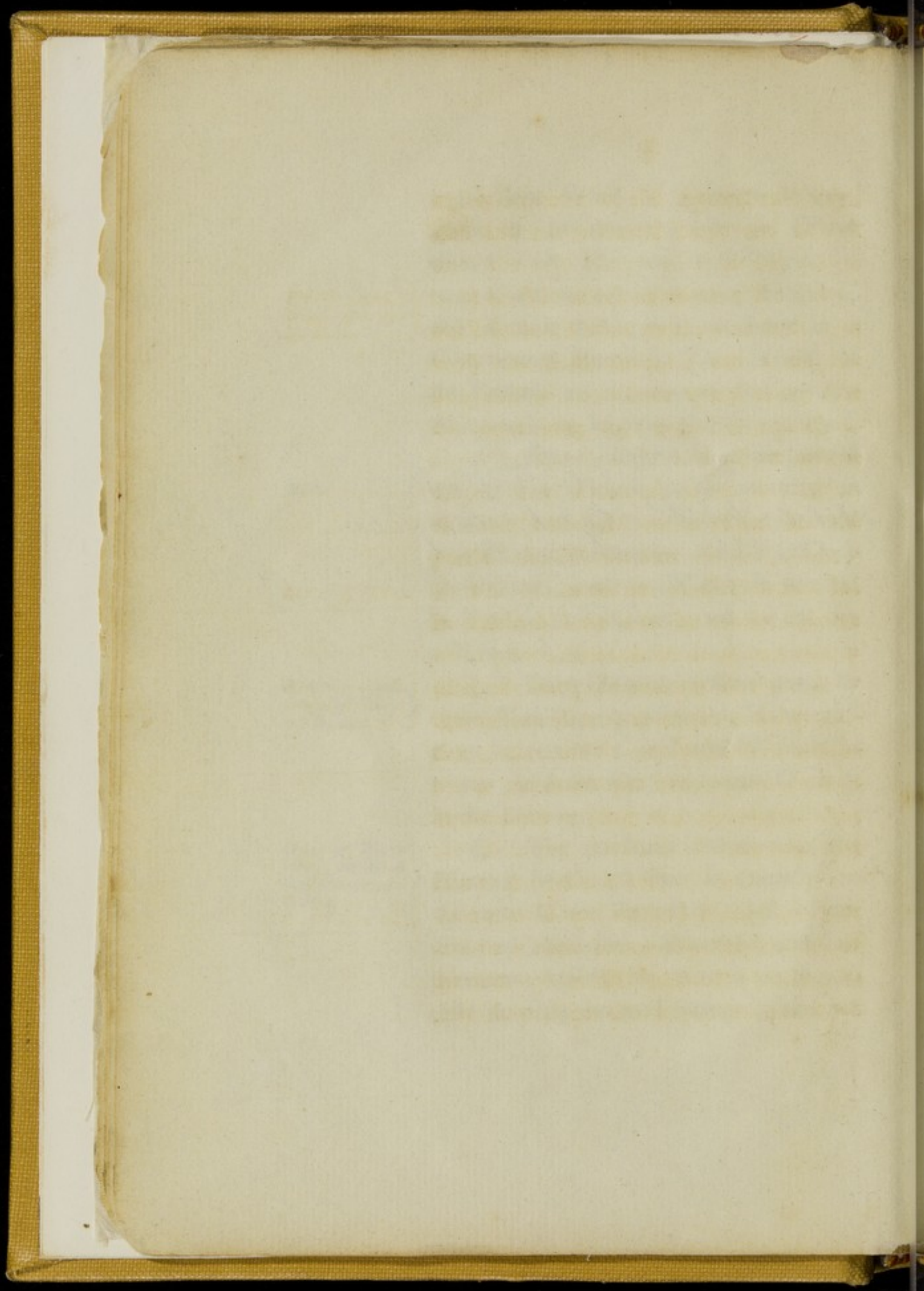

5. Every Medical Officer must be in his Ward by nine O'Clock in the morning in summer, and ten O'Clock in winter, and not later than seven O'Clock in the evening.

6. The particular attention of the Principal Medical Officer is requested to the state of the Pharmacy, and of the Store of Medicines, Materials, and Instruments; to see that there is no waste, and that they are well arranged, and not

liable to damage. He will be pleased to bestow the same attention on the Purveyors Store.

7. Whenever an Officer of the Hospital Staff is reported unfit for duty from sickness, the Principal Medical Officer will immediately report to the Inspector of Hospitals, and the same when he returns to duty.

*Sickness of Officers of Hospital Staff to be reported.*

8. It is an important part of the duty of the Principal Medical Officers of Stations, to see that the Hospital Mates and junior Officers are instructed in their various duties, and that their professional studies are properly directed.

*Instruction of junior medical Officers in their duties.*

9. It is requested, that the Principal Medical Officers in their confidential reports to the Inspector of Hospitals, will state the progressive improvement, which each Gentleman has made in professional acquirements.

*Report of progressive improvement.*

10. On his first coming to a station an Hospital Mate by Commission ought not to be entrusted with a separate charge; Hospital Mates by warrant ought never to have a separate charge,

unless in cases of the greatest exigency, and in no case should Dispensers be left with the sole charge of sick.

*Health and

11. It is requested that the Principal Medical Officer will, in conjunction with the Commandant, call upon the Magistrates to enforce every thing that can contribute to the health and cleanliness of the station, and report to the Inspector of Hospitals when inattention to these essential points exists on the part of the Magistrates.

*Scale of Diet.*

12. The Scale of diet as detailed in Table N.º 19 is to be strictly adhered to in general Hospitals. It is particularly directed that, in making out the daily abstract of diets and extra's, the quantities of each article required shall be written in words on the back of the abstract in the hand writing of, and signed by, the Principal Medical Officer of the Hospital or Division.

*Cleanliness in

13. The Principal Medical Officer will be pleased to see that the Officers of the Purveying Department strictly do their duty, in the important point of

preserving cleanliness in and about the Hospitals ; that they cause all nuisances to be promptly removed from the purlicus of the Hospital at an early hour of the morning ; that they see that the Privies and Drains are kept clean and unobstructed , and that every article of bedding as well as cloathing of the Sick be washed and if necessary scoured and baked.

14. There having been great and general complaint in the Army on account of the very incorrect manner in which , not only the Names of men in Hospital , but even their Companies , Battalions and Regiments , have been taken at the Hospital Stations , the Principal Medical Officer is requested to give every aid to the Purveying Officer in order to obtain these correctly , and to direct every Officer under his superintendance Medical as well as Purveying Officers to be most precise and correct in this part of their duty.

15. There ought to be only two days for discharging in the week ; and

*Days of Dis-  
charge.*

Tuesday and Friday will be found most convenient. On the day before that on which men are to be discharged, the Medical Officer in charge of a Ward or Subdivision must send a correct nominal return of the men to the Purveyors Office, and he must do the same of every man who dies, as soon as the death comes to his knowledge.

16. It is requested that particular attention may be paid to the decent interment of the dead.

*Arms, accoutrements, and  
necessaries, of  
men in Hospital*

17. It is the order of the Commander of the Forces that the utmost care be taken of the arms, accoutrements, and necessaries, of men in Hospital, and that the Purveying Officers be accountable, that those of different corps be kept separate and distinct. Whenever a man is dismissed from the Convalescent Hospital to the depot, the regular ticket of his arms, accoutrements, and necessaries, should accompany him. It would be desirable, that the Purveyor had some receipt for them, to enable him to answer future references.

18. No expence for the Repair of Buildings at Hospital stations, nor any considerable expence whatever, is to be incurred by the Purveying Officers, before an estimate of the probable amount is made out, and approved of by the Inspector of Hospitals.

*No expence for Repairs to be incurred without an estimate approved by the Inspector of Hospitals.*

19. It is to be distinctly understood by every Medical Officer, that no communication can be received from them, unless transmitted through the Principal Medical Officer of the station or Division.

*All communications from Medical Officers to the Inspector of Hospitals to be transmitted through the Principal Medical Officer.*

II.

D E P O T.

20. It is requested, that the Principal Medical Officer will cause the depôt to be visited daily by a Medical Officer, in order to keep a watchful eye over the health of the convalescents. It is most desirable, that they should be furnished with a warm breakfast, a well cooked dinner with vegetables, and if possible, with supper; they should be

provided with beds or mats to sleep upon, and particular attention should be paid by the Medical Officer to the cleanliness of their persons and Barracks that their cloathing is sufficiently warm and that they use as much exercise as is conducive to their health. Upon all these points, which are of the greatest importance as means of preventing disease, and obviating relapse, the Medical Officer will communicate and advise with the Commandant. Whenever relapse is frequent he will strictly investigate the cause and report to the Principal Medical Officer for the information of the Inspector of Hospitals, and likewise to the Commandant.

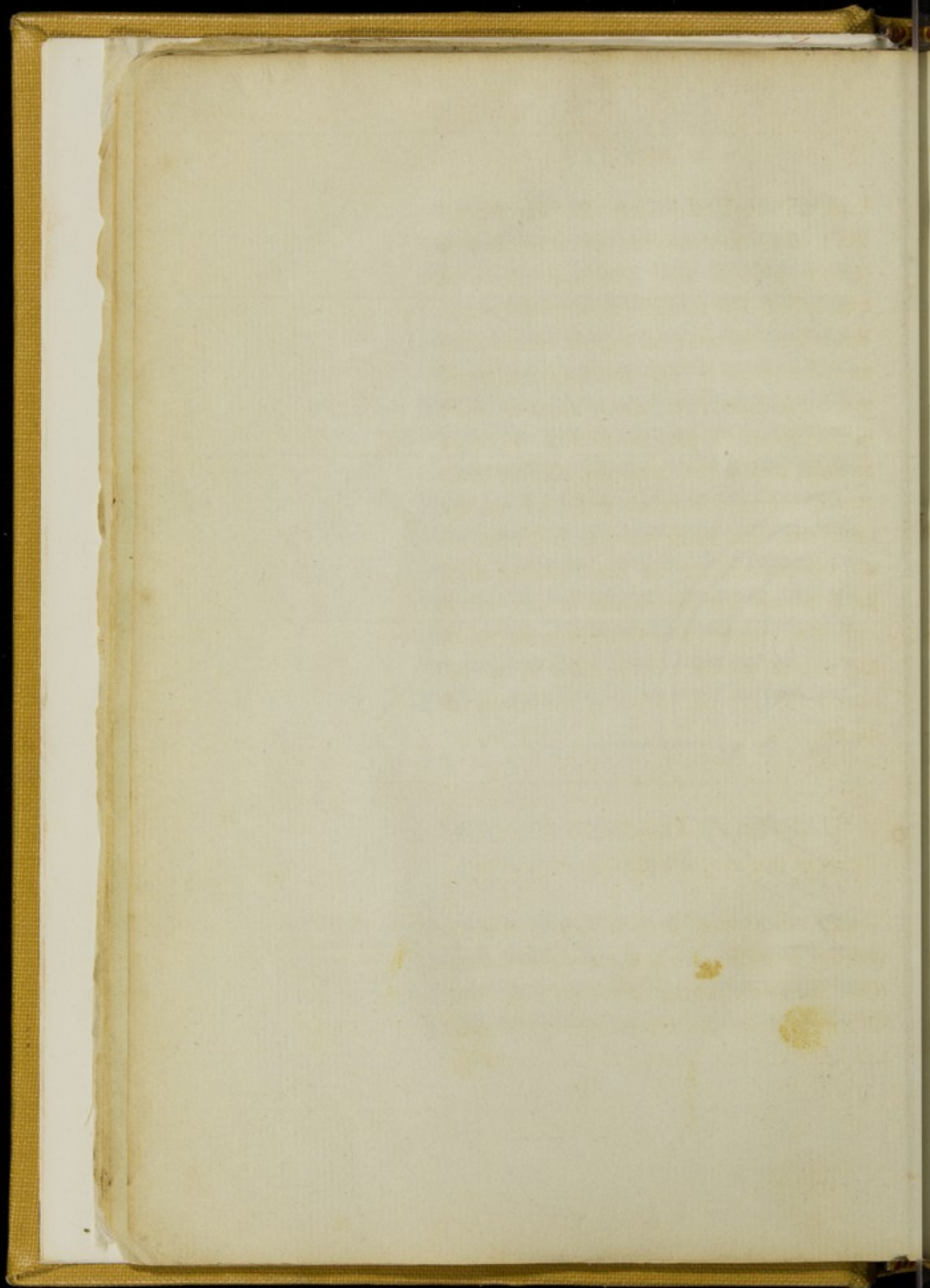
## SICK OFFICERS AT HOSPITAL STATIONS.

*Sick Officers of the junior classes may be Supplied with Wine, &c.*

21. Whenever Sick Officers of the junior classes at an Hospital station require Wine or Comforts, they may be issued to them under the Orders of the

Principal Medical Officer. But His Excellency the Commander of the Forces having ordered that Hospitals shall be established for the reception of Sick and Wounded Officers; all Officers will in future be received into the Hospitals prepared for them who may choose to avail themselves of the accommodation. At large Stations and when it can be done a Convent or seperate Building will be fitted up for them. At small stations a House or suitable apartments in the Hospital will be fitted up for their reception.

The duty of attending such Sick Officers as remain in Quarters is to be considered as secondary to the Hospital duties.

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I V.

CONVEYANCE OF SICK.

22. Before any body of Sick is sent to another Hospital Station a communication must be made to the Principal Medical Officer of that station informing him of the number and description of Sick to

be sent and the probable day of arrival in order that he may prepare for their reception.

Returns to  
accompany  
them.

23. Whenever Sick or Wounded are sent to the Hospitals at any other Station Returns after forms N.<sup>o</sup> 7 & 9 must be made out. N.<sup>o</sup> 9 will be furnished by the Principal Officer of the Purveying Department at the station. These returns are to be taken in charge by the Senior Medical Officer proceeding with the Sick. This Officer must always be directed to make out a return of the deaths that occur on the march and present it to the Senior Medical Officer of the station on his arrival.

Mode of deliv-  
ering over Sick  
to Officer proceed-  
ing in charge.

24. The Medical Officer proceeding in charge of Sick should whenever it is possible have twenty four hours notice given to him. A Medical Officer of each Hospital or Subdivision should accompany and deliver over the charge of his own patients to the receiving Officer. He ought to see them carefully put into the carts and give an account of their cases and when they are to be embarked he must

see them put into the boats, accompany them on Board, and deliver them over to the Medical Officer of the Ship destined to receive them. The removal of the whole to be under the superintendance of a Staff Surgeon who is specially to report to the Principal Medical Officer the manner in which this duty is performed.

25. The Staff Surgeon is likewise to see that the Officers of the Apothecarys and Purveying Departments have regularly supplied and delivered over their respective stores.

26. A report must be made to the Inspector of Hospitals by the Principal Medical Officer at the Station to which the Sick have proceeded of the Condition in which they arrived with a return of Deaths during the conveyance.

27. The Principal Medical Officers of Stations are particularly requested to observe that all men of a Regiment, Detachment or Division, or proceeding from another Hospital Station to that under their charge who may die during the

period of removal are to be accounted for in the returns of the Hospital to which they are proceeding. They must not appear among the Deaths of the Hospital on the face of the return, but added to the bottom of the column of deaths, and stated to have died in conveyance; their Names Companies Regiments &c. to be accurately detailed, in the same manner as those who die in Hospital.

28. The conveying Officer will not only report deaths occurring in this manner to the Principal Medical Officer of the receiving station but also at the same time forward a report to the Inspector of Hospitals of any such occurrences.

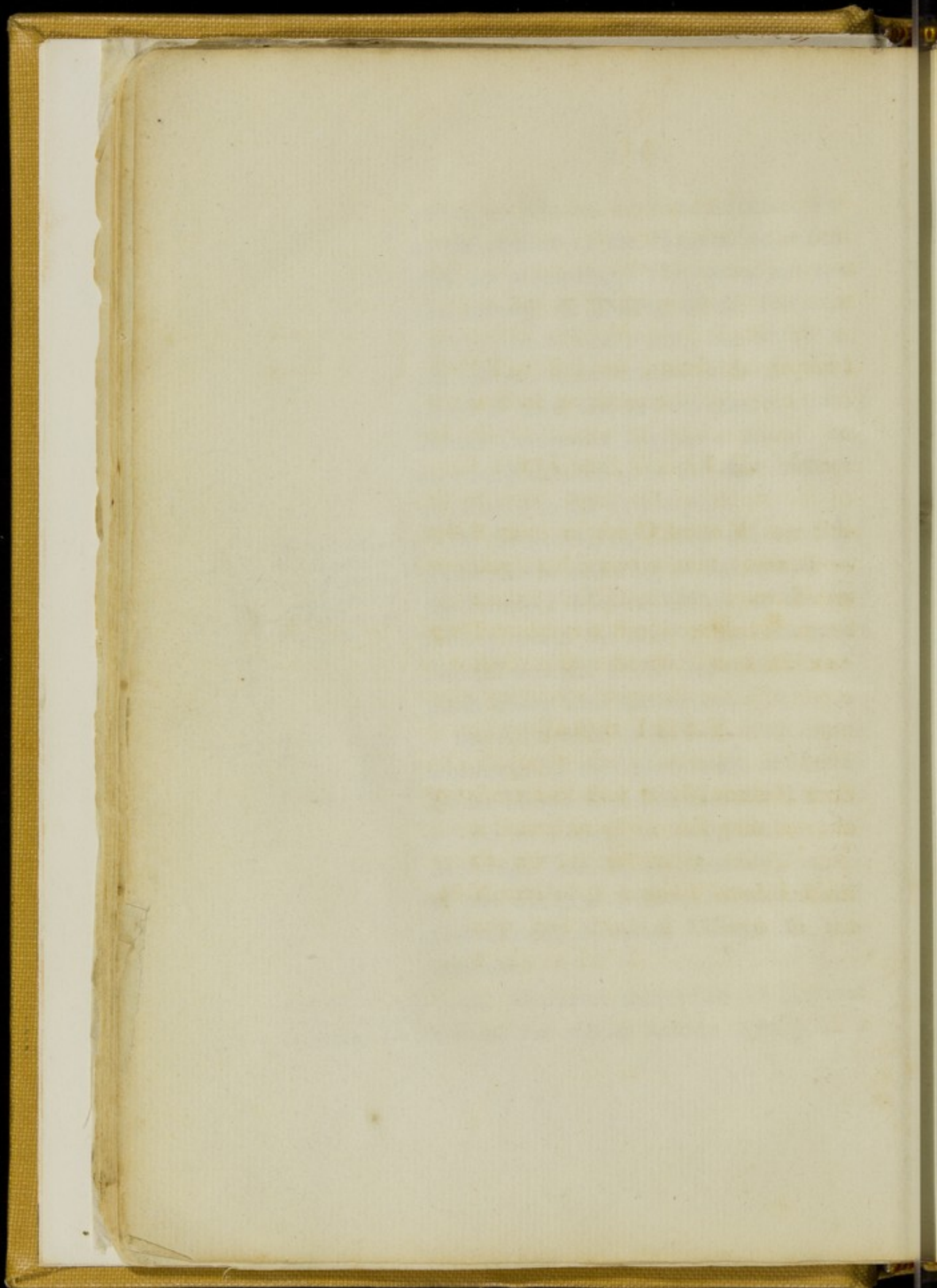
29. All deaths happening at out posts whether under the denomination of Convalescent Hospitals or Convalescent Villages are on no account to be omitted in the Morning, Weekly, and Monthly, returns of the Hospital Station to which such Convalescent Hospitals Villages &c. are attached.

30. Whenever men reach an Hospital without the regular Returns N.<sup>os</sup> 7 & 9

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or when these returns are defective or irregular, when men die on the Road whose names cannot be learnt, or whenever there is an appearance of neglect in the Medical or Military Officer accompanying them, the Principal Medical Officer of the receiving station will not fail specially to report to the Inspector of Hospitals, and send a Copy of his report at the same time to the Principal Medical Officer of the station or Division from whence the Sick were transferred.

*the Inspector of Hospitals and also to the Principal Medical Officer of transferring Station or Division.*

31. Whenever there are deficiencies of necessaries of Sick sent to a Station a report by the Purveyor specifying them must be transmitted to the Inspector of Hospitals. Unless a report to the contrary is made, it is presumed that every man is sent into Hospital with the regular ticket according to the General Orders dated Badajoz 17<sup>th</sup> Dec.<sup>r</sup> 1809.

32. It is requested that, the Principal Medical Officer will give along with the Monthly Statement of prevailing diseases, a short meteorological Statement; and that the state of health of the Inhabitants may be enquired into and mentioned.

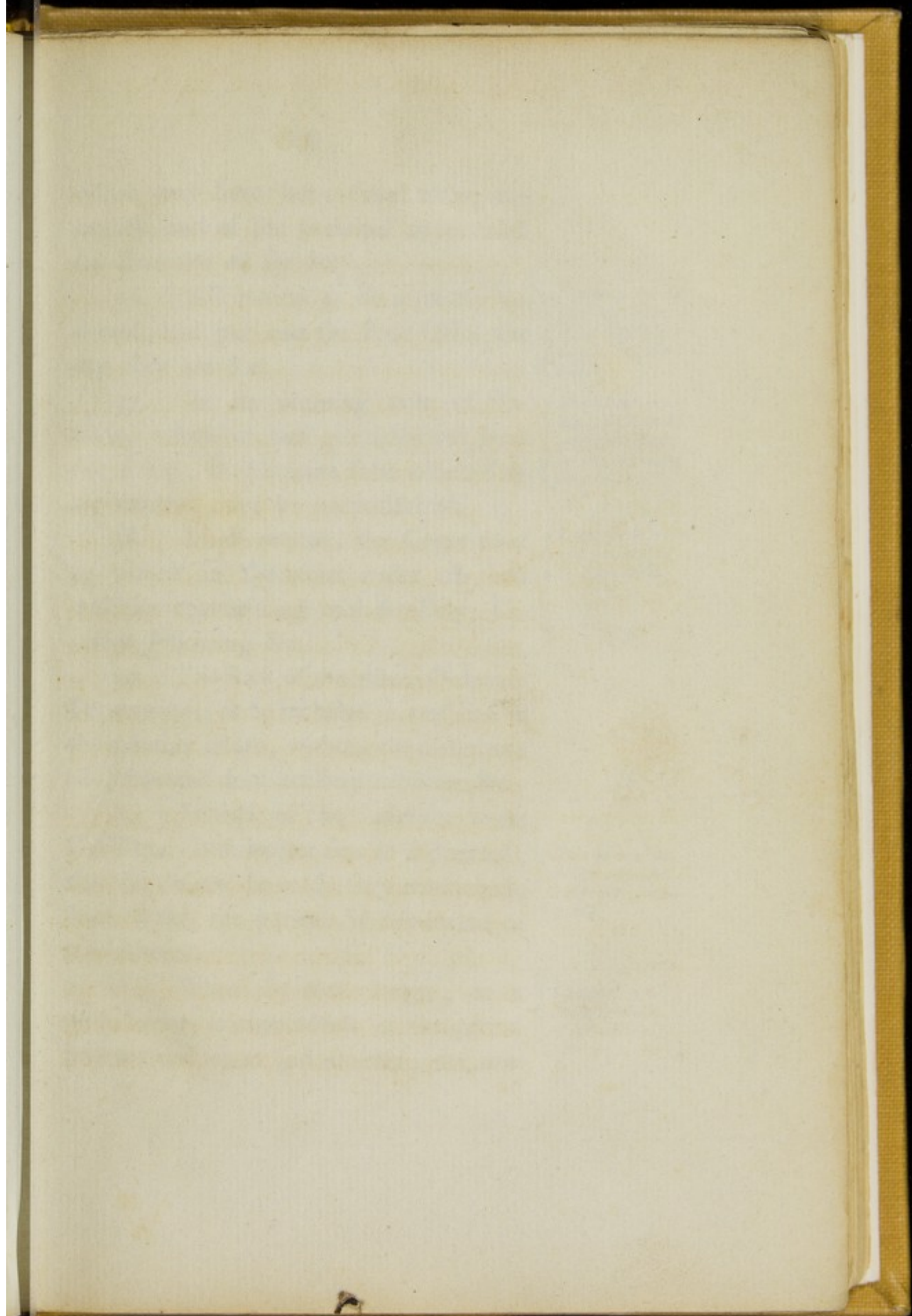
33. In the fortnightly return of Medical Officers, and also in the monthly; the duty on which each Officer is employed, is to be stated. All casualties and changes of every kind, which occur between one return and another, to be stated at the end of the return. This applies to all returns as well as that of Medical Officers.

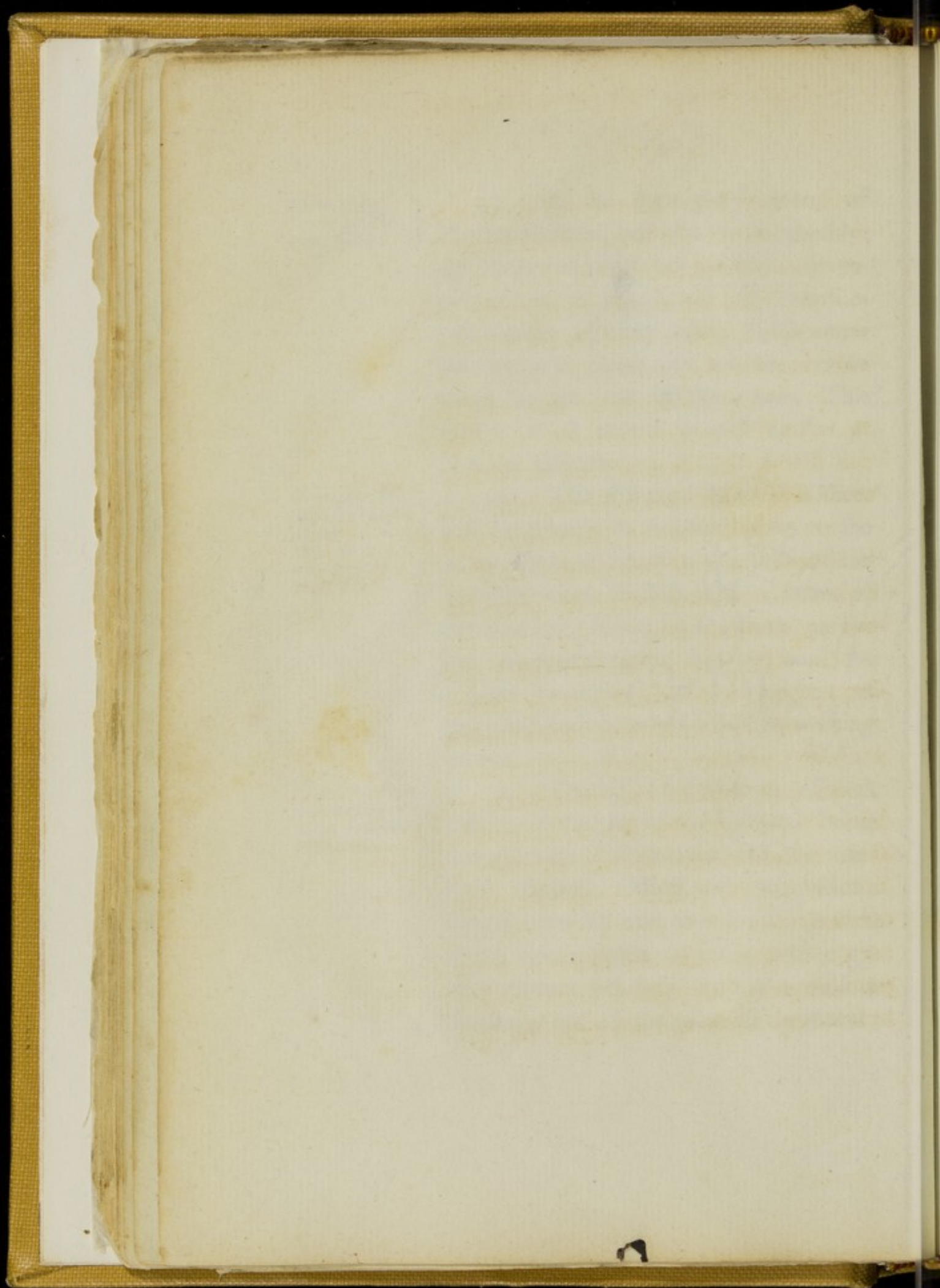

34. The Principal Medical Officer will be pleased to forward direct to the Army Medical Board a duplicate of the monthly return of Sick with a return of the Medical Officers in attendance on the Sick annexed thereto, but not until the original transmitted to the Inspector of Hospitals shall be notified to him as being correct.

35. Besides the Statement of each Officer in charge of an Hospital being transmitted, it is essential that the Principal Medical Officer of the station, should from his own observation, as well as the reports made to him, give a general account not only of the prevailing diseases; but of the plan of treatment,





which may have been found most successful, and of the principal appearances on dissection of the dead.

36. All returns to be regularly indorsed, and put into the Post Office the day they are due. *Returns to be put into the Post Office the day they are due.*

37. In the morning state of Stations, whenever men are admitted from the Army, the Division from which they are received must be particularized. *Divisions sending Sick to be particularized in the morning State.*

38. In all returns, the Corps must be placed in the exact order of their seniority commencing with Artillery, Cavalry following &c. *Corps to be placed according to Sencority.*

39. The Sick of the whole Ordnance Department, to be included in one line in the monthly return, without the distinction of horse and foot artillery artificers &c.

40. Instead of the indefinite terms Debility, Convalescent &c. it is directed, that the disease be at the time mentioned, from which the patient is debilitated or convalescent. *The terms Debility convalescent &c. indefinite.*

41. When diseases change, or a new disease is superadded in the period between one return and another, the new *Change or supervention of Disease.*



disease to be stated after the first; thus Feb. Inter. et Cont. Feb. Inter. et Hydrops &c.

42. It is desired, that as correct a classification of disease as possible be obtained, thus Fevers should be made Continued, Remittent, Intermittent or, Typhus, as they occur.

43. In all Returns, Wounds are always to be distinguished from Ulcers and the scite of the Wound or Ulcer to be always noted in the return.

44. In mentioning the duration of a disease, the period must be dated from the first attack of illness, with the patients corps &c. which ought always to be correctly learned from the returns transmitted with the sick.

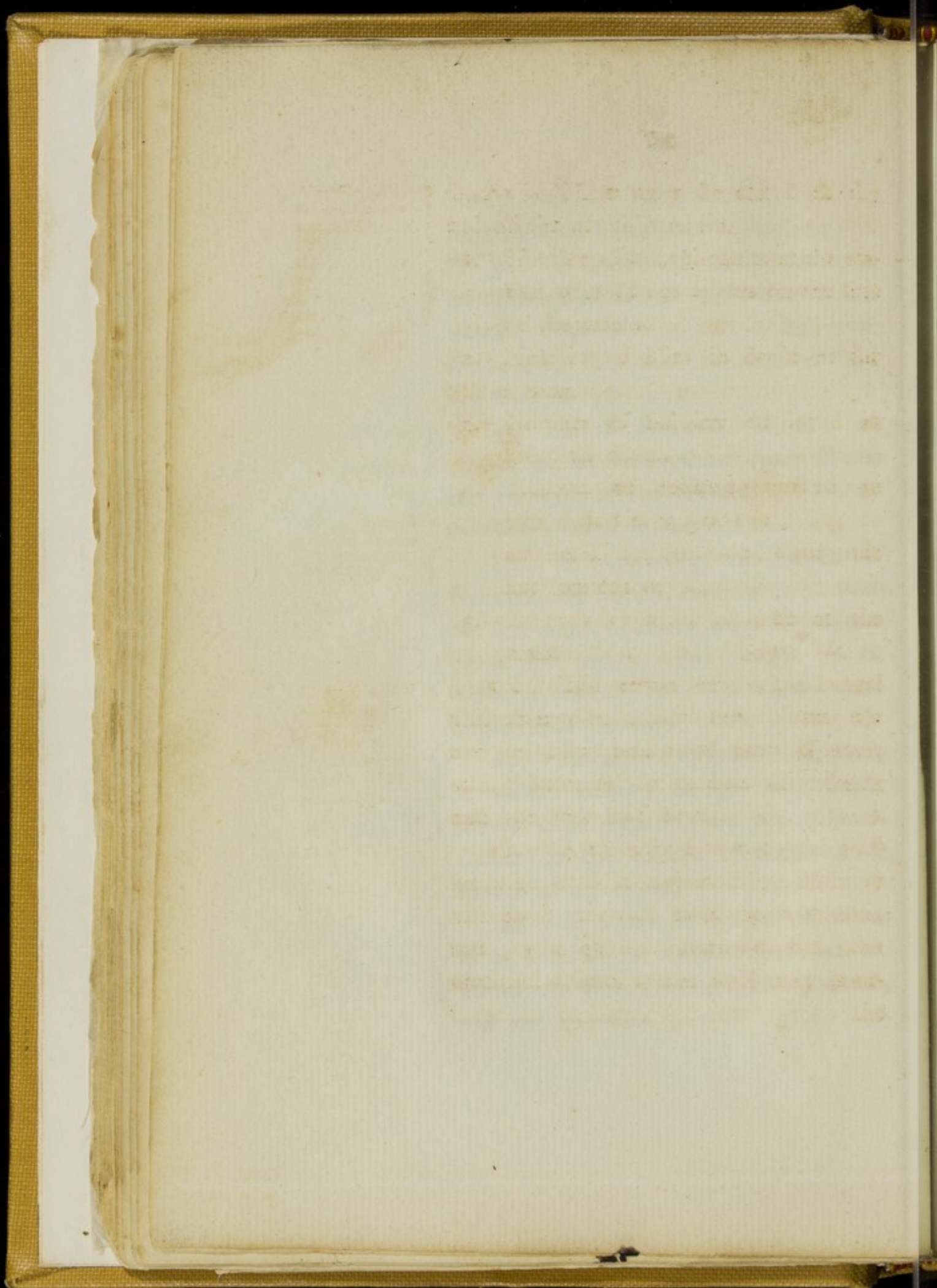
45. Accidents, from whatever cause, or sudden deaths, though they ought always to be reported, are not to be included in the column of deaths from disease in any return.

46. In a note at the end of all returns it is to be stated "included are Prisoners of War, Deserters, extra Patients, and invalided men."

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47. It is to be generally understood, that all medical returns from hospital stations are expected to agree with the military ones delivered in by the adjutant general at head quarters. Therefore the medical officers in charge, will do well occasionally to compare returns with the Commandant of their stations, as when a difference is found, an explanation will be called for.

*Medical Returns to agree with Military ones*

48. It being essentially necessary, that the number of sick men transferred from one Hospital to another should be ascertained, a note must always be added to the monthly sick return stating distinctly the number of men included under the head "Admitted," that have been received from other Hospitals, and the number included under the head "Discharged," that have been sent to other Hospitals, or to England for the benefit of change of climate; so that, a distinction may be drawn between those men who have returned to their duty, and those who have been otherwise disposed of.

49. There must be stated at the end of the monthly return.

1.<sup>st</sup> Number of Convalescents at the station who do not appear on the face of the return.

2.<sup>nd</sup> Number of Men in depôt at the station.

3.<sup>rd</sup> Number of Soldiers employed in Hospital duties.

4.<sup>th</sup> Number of Soldiers marched to join their Corps, or proceeding to another Hospital station, during the last fourteen days.

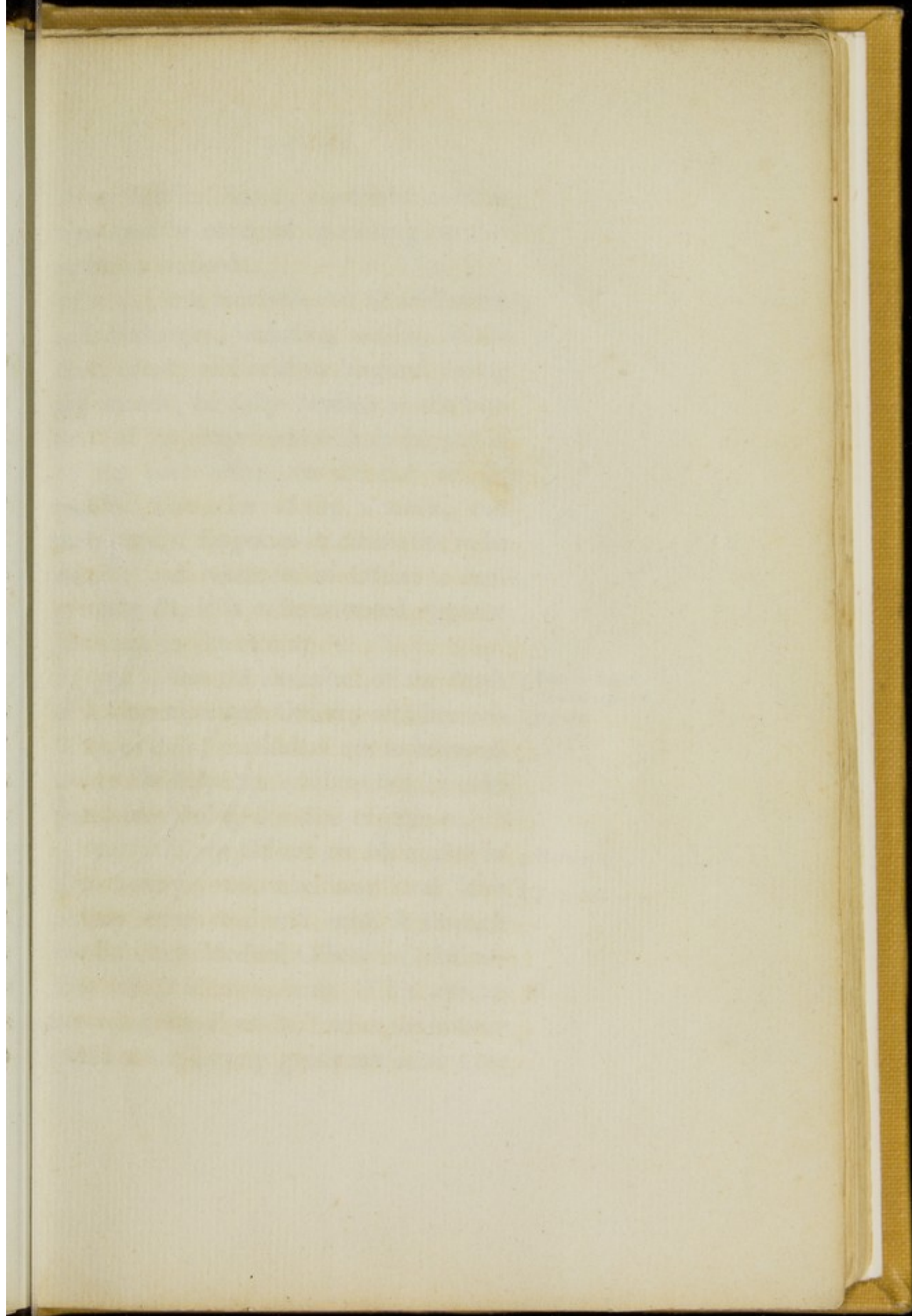

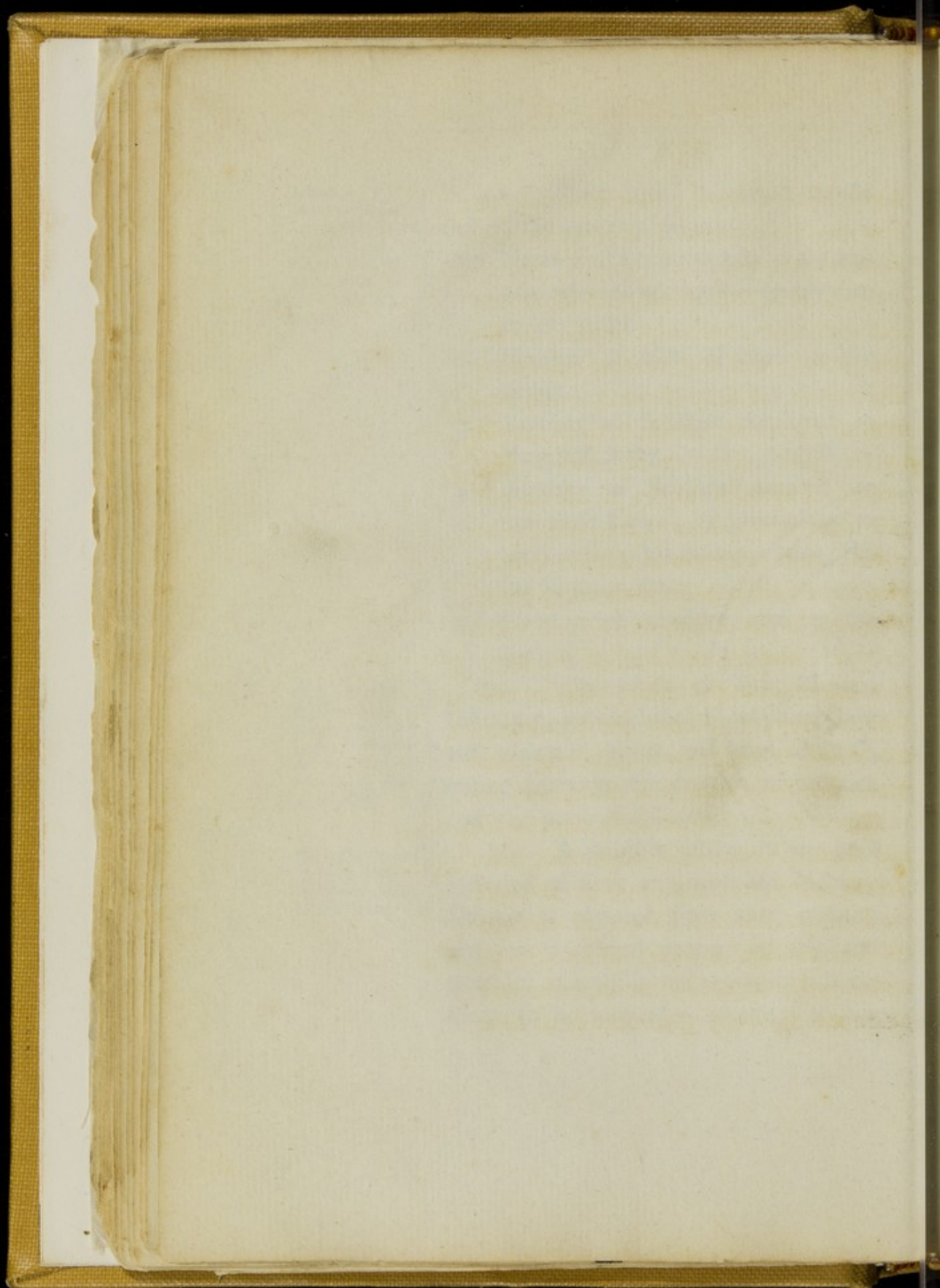

50. The return of Sick Medical Officers may be included in the fortnightly and monthly return of hospital staff, stating however the diseases of the sick and the period of illness.

51. A monthly return to the 31.<sup>st</sup> inclusive of Sick and wounded Military Officers is required from every station, and as a general return of sick and wounded officers in the peninsula, is ordered to be forwarded monthly to the





Army Medical Board, the utmost correctness must be observed in making out this return at stations.

52. It is required, that all admissions and discharges, including deaths, invalided, cured, and sent to England during the month, be fully detailed at the bottom of the return which is to be put in to the post office on the 1.<sup>st</sup> of the month. The scite of the wounds, and their state if dangerous or otherwise, to be stated; and whenever an Officer is dangerously ill, it is to be so stated opposite his name in the return.

53. On the occasion of the death of a Commissioned Officer, whether military or civil, particulars are to be reported to the Inspector of Hospitals by next post, mentioning the date of decease.

54. Every Officer on his arrival in this country, or who may not have already done so, will send in through the Principal Medical Officer of the station or division a return of his services according to Form N.<sup>o</sup> 20 at the bottom of the return, every gentleman must state

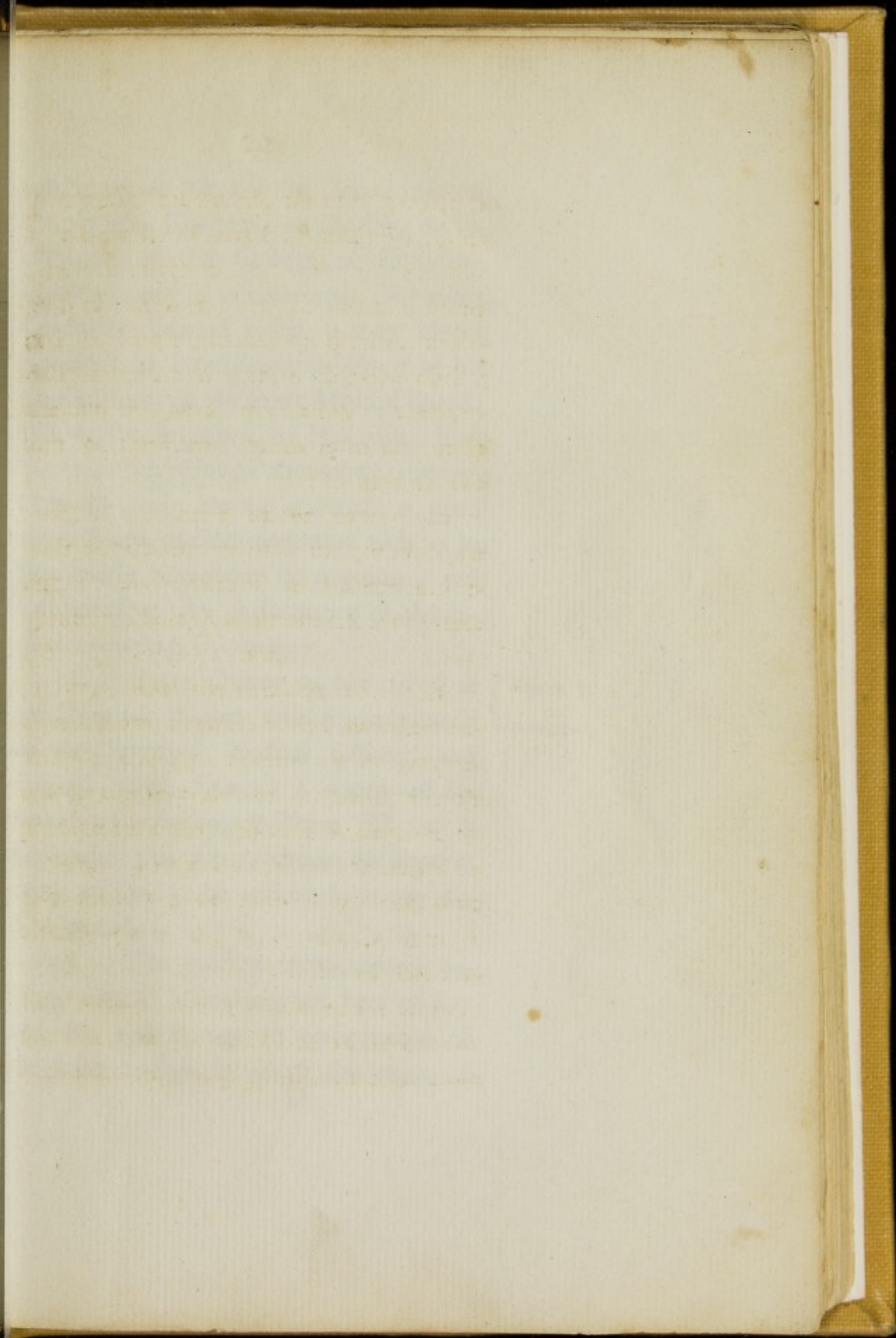
as follows: "From the period of my entering the service I have, (or have not) been on half pay, and no part of my service as above stated has been in the militia or local as assistant Staff Surgeon in Ireland, and of the total period of my services — years have been on foreign service; and of them, — years in the West Indies. „

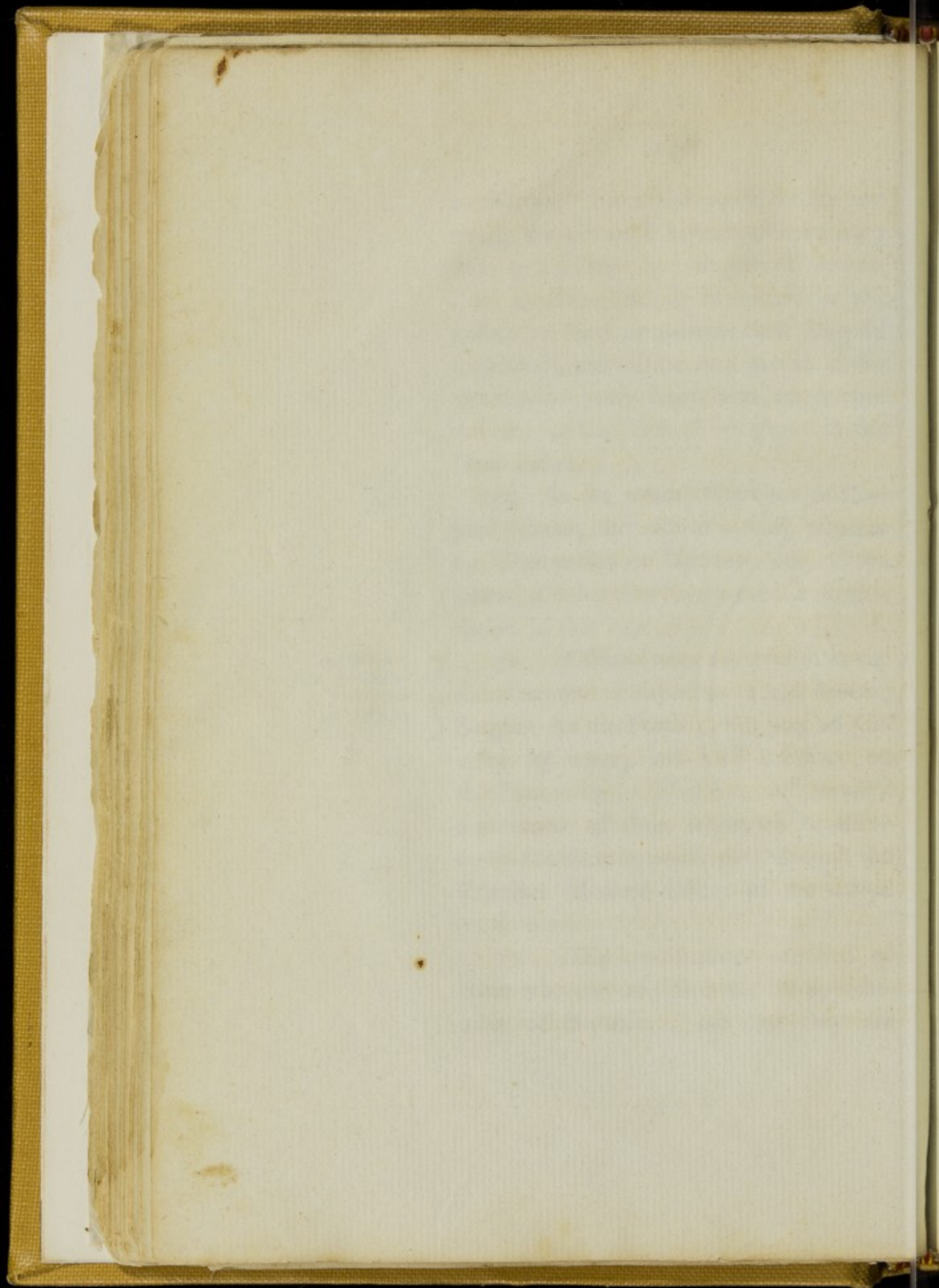
55. In the return of services of Hospital Mates, they are to specify whether by Commission or Warrant; and if the latter, whether they have passed an examination in this country.

*Candidates

56. Officers who are candidates for the situations of Physician to the Forces, Surgeon to the Forces, Surgeon to Cavalry regiments, and Staff Surgeons on the Portuguese establishment will forward a statement of their respective qualifications for these appointments through the Principal Medical Officer of the station or division.

57. The qualifications required of those who are candidates for the appointment of Physician, are that they are





graduates of one of the Universities of Edinburgh, Glasgow, or Dublin, or Licentiates of the College of Physicians London; and it is necessary, that every Candidate forward either a copy of his diploma, or a certificate on honor of his qualifications, to the Army Medical Board, and to the Inspector of Hospitals. Staff Surgeons are required to produce testimonials of their having received a good surgical and medical education and to be particularly conversant in Anatomy, and habituated to the performance of the capital operations of Surgery.

58. Every Officer on his arrival at an Hospital Station will report himself to the Principal Medical Officer; and through him, forward a return of his movement according to Form N.<sup>o</sup> 10. A book after this form, should be kept at every station to be referred to at any future period.

59. The greatest inconvenience having occurred in making out lists of Pay and Bât and Forage in consequence of the loose manner in which the names of

the Medical Officers are transmitted, it is requested, that in future, every Officer on transmitting his return of movement, will write his name and surname at full length.

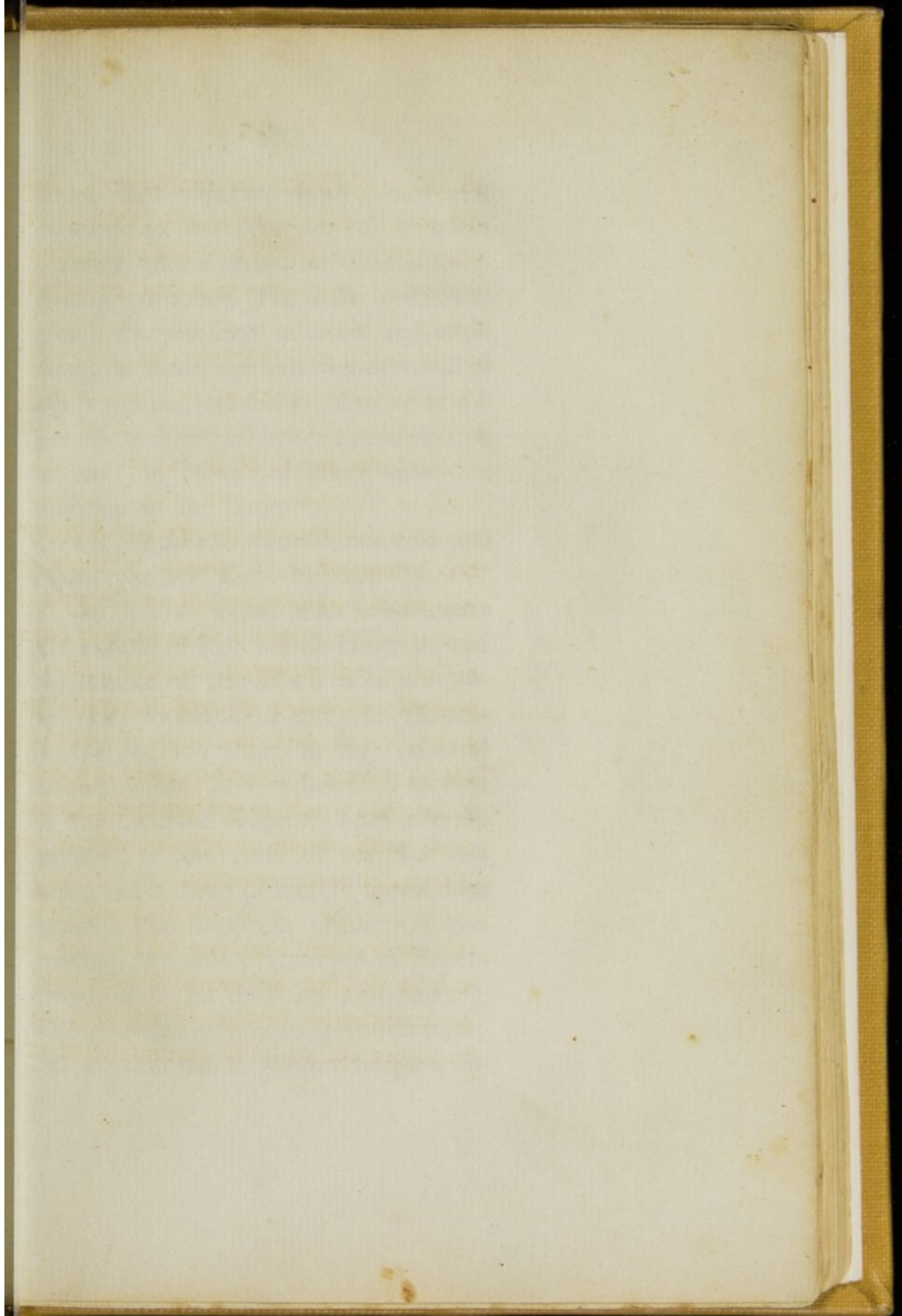
R E P O R T S.

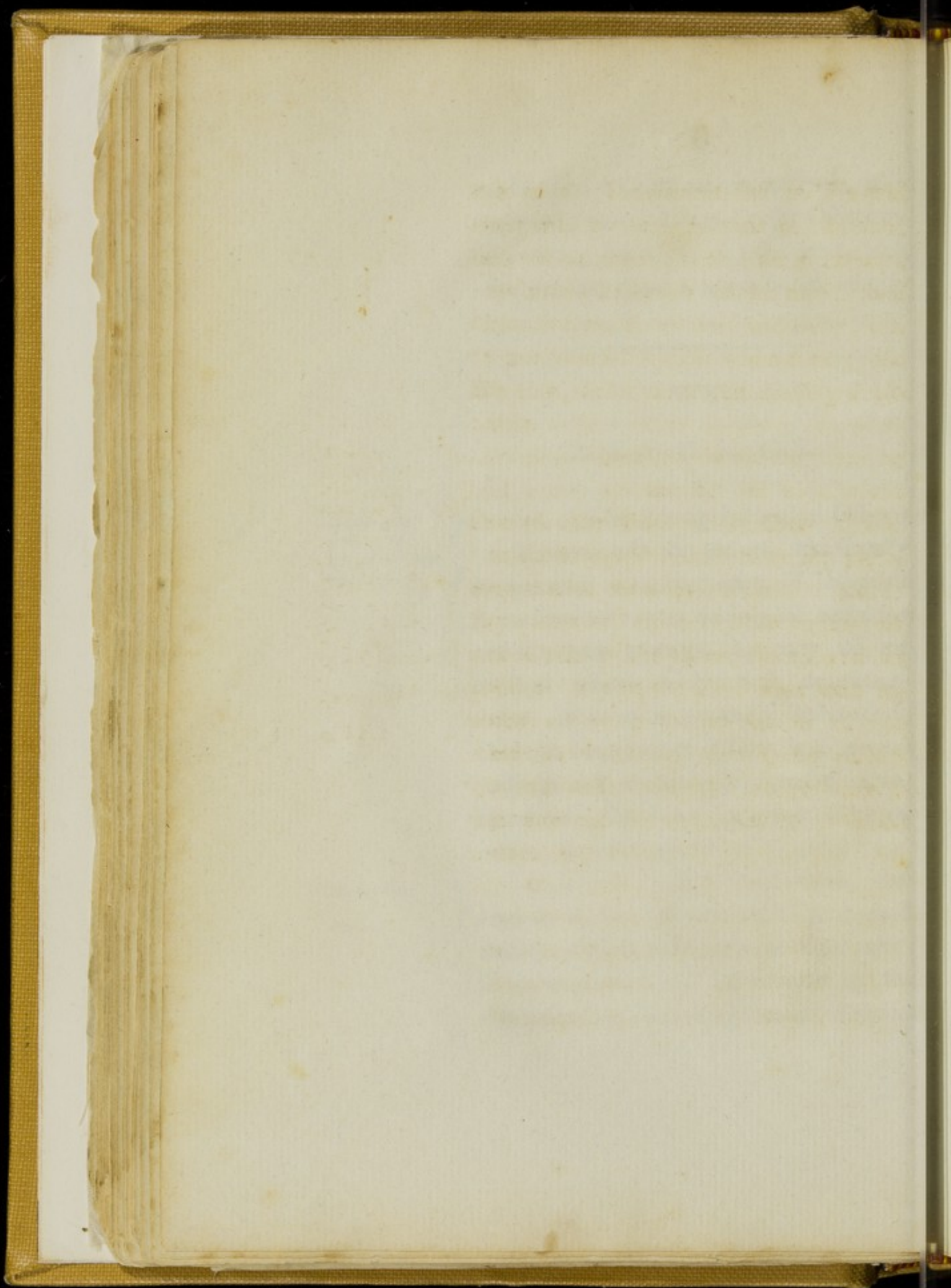

60. The Principal Medical Officers of Stations will be pleased occasionally to transmit to the Inspector of Hospitals a confidential report stating the education abilities and attention to duty of the medical officers under their superintendance. It is to be generally understood, that the Inspector of Hospitals is principally guided in his recommendations for promotion, by these reports, and by no means, by mere seniority.

*Inspection  
reports*

61. It being determined that henceforth the Inspectional Officers shall strictly perform the duties of their rank, it is requested that on completing the inspection of each Regimental Hospital





under their superintendance, they will forward to the Inspector of Hospitals a report which should embrace the following particulars. The Site of the Hospital, the provision of stores and medicines, the mode in which Sick are dieted by the Surgeons, the quality of the wine and provisions furnished by the Commissariat, as well as those purchased under the direction of the Surgeon.

62. Particular attention must be paid to the practice of the Medical Officers.

63. The report must also notice the number of Sick in each Hospital, and the number of Deaths which have occurred since its establishment, with the proportion of mortality in the principal diseases which have occurred. The state of the Hospital Register must also be noticed, if the cases of the Sick are kept, and a detail of morbid appearances entered. The Inspecting Officer will also examine the weekly accompts of Expenditure, and that these are corresponding with the quarterly contingent accompts, and see that each Regimental Surgeon has



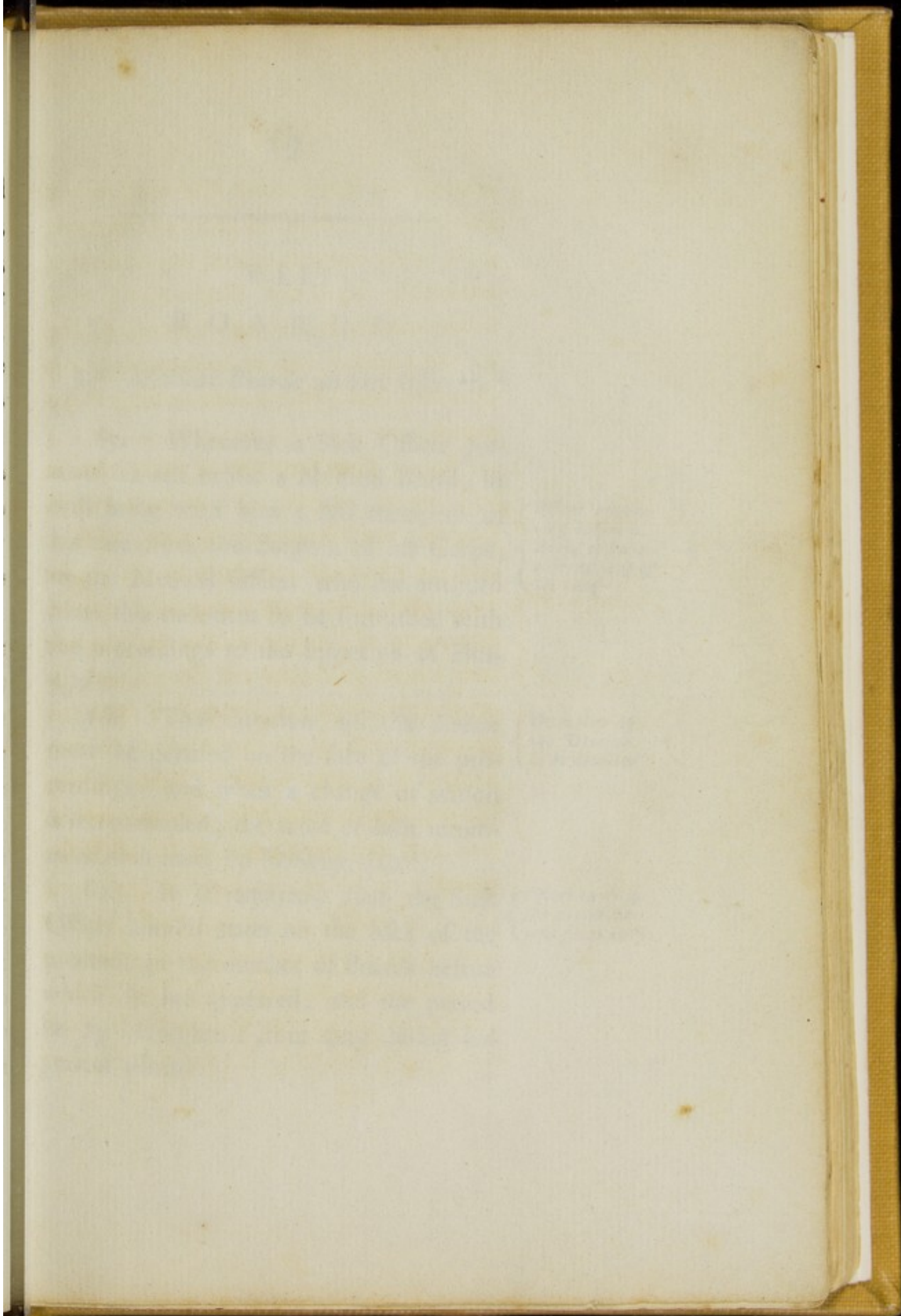

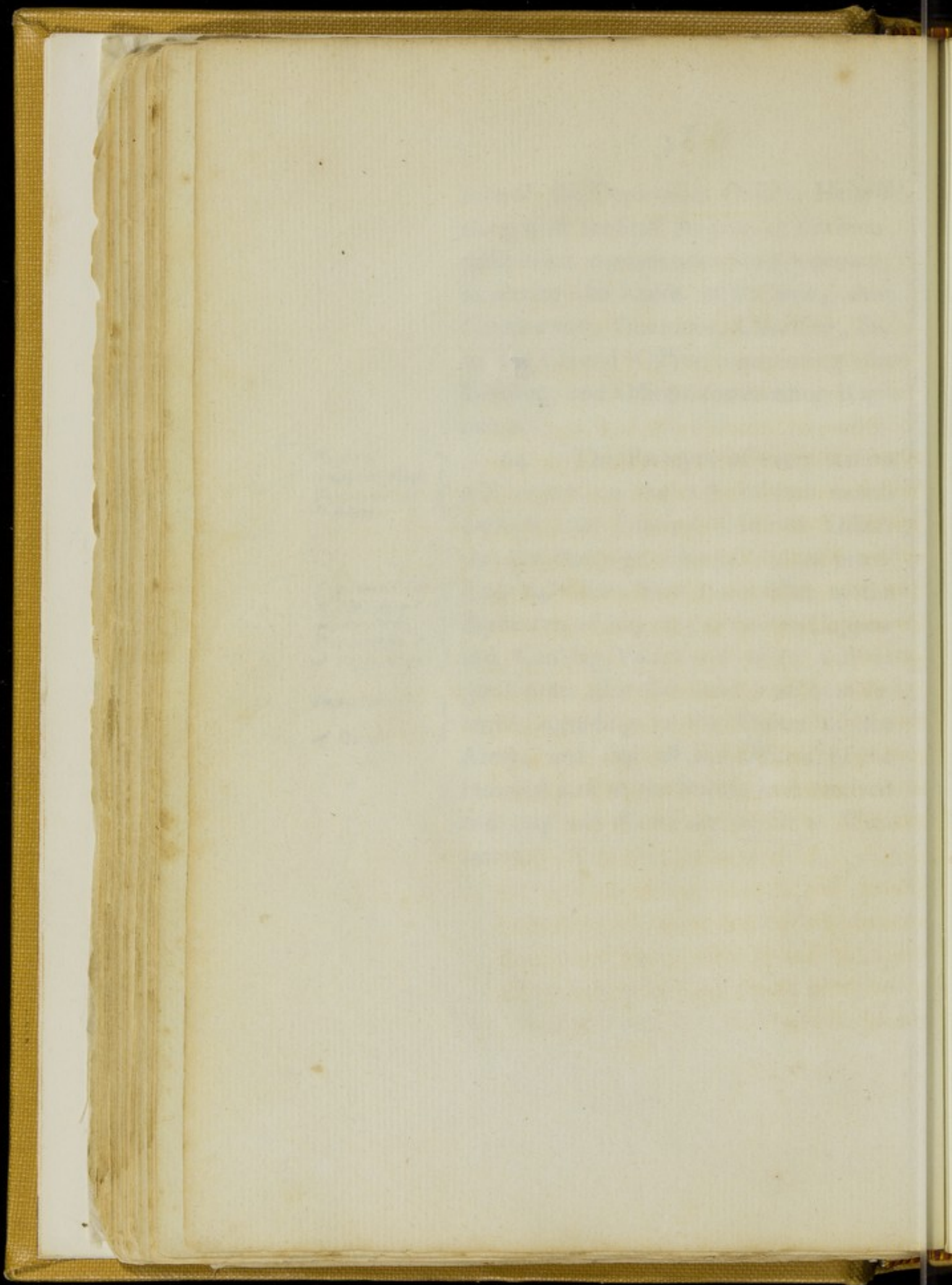

64. The Purveyor of every station will report on the 1.<sup>st</sup> of each month through the Principal Medical Officer that the stoppage accounts to the preceding 24.<sup>th</sup> have been transmitted to the Paymasters of Regiments; that the Coppers and Cooking Vessels are tinned and in good order that the Dead have been interred according to the Orders of the Army; and that all the Officers of the Hospital staff at the Station have received their pay and allowances as far as Warranted.

## B O A R D S.

1.<sup>st</sup> *Medical Boards on Sick Officers.*

65. Whenever a Sick Officer presents himself before a Medical Board, he will bring with him a full statement of his case from the Surgeon of his Corps, or the Medical Officer who has attended him: this statement to be forwarded with the proceedings to the Inspector of Hospitals.

66. The duration of the disease must be detailed on the face of the proceedings; and when a change of station is recommended, the cause of such recommendation must be likewise stated.

85. Whenever there are men at a station who appear to be unfit for active service, or to require change of climate, a board will assemble on the 1<sup>st</sup> of each month to enquire into, and determine upon their respective cases. They will forward their proceedings according to the annexed form.

86. Although it is very desirable, that the hospitals should be cleared of old and obstinate cases which have resisted all the usual remedies; yet in the winter season, it is highly necessary, to take into consideration, whether a sea voyage may not be extremely prejudicial to particular classes of disease. It may also be reasonably doubted, whether a change from the climate of Portugal to that of England in the winter season can be salutary to patients much debilitated by long continued Intermittents, Chronic Dysenteries and the whole class of Pulmonic Diseases. 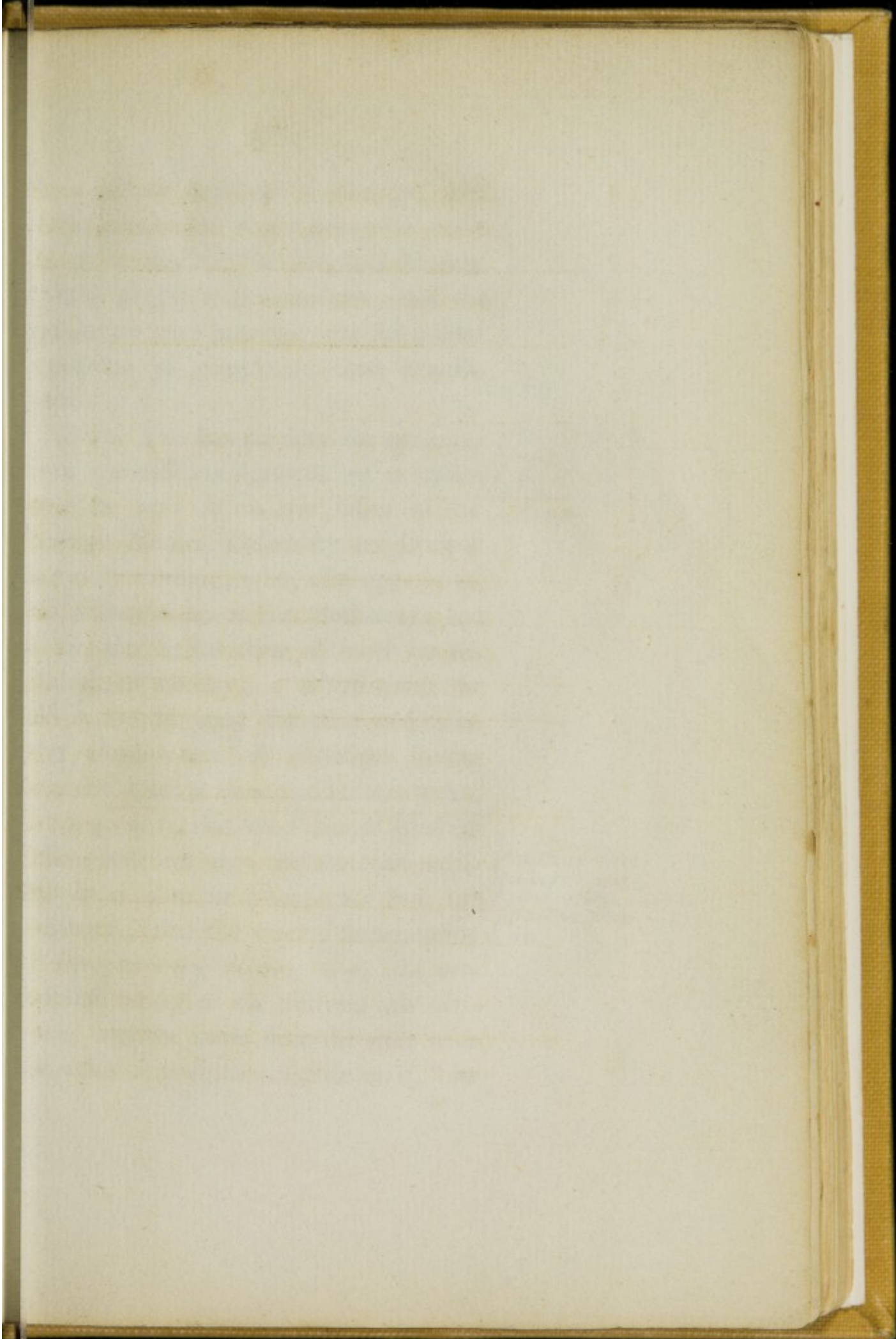
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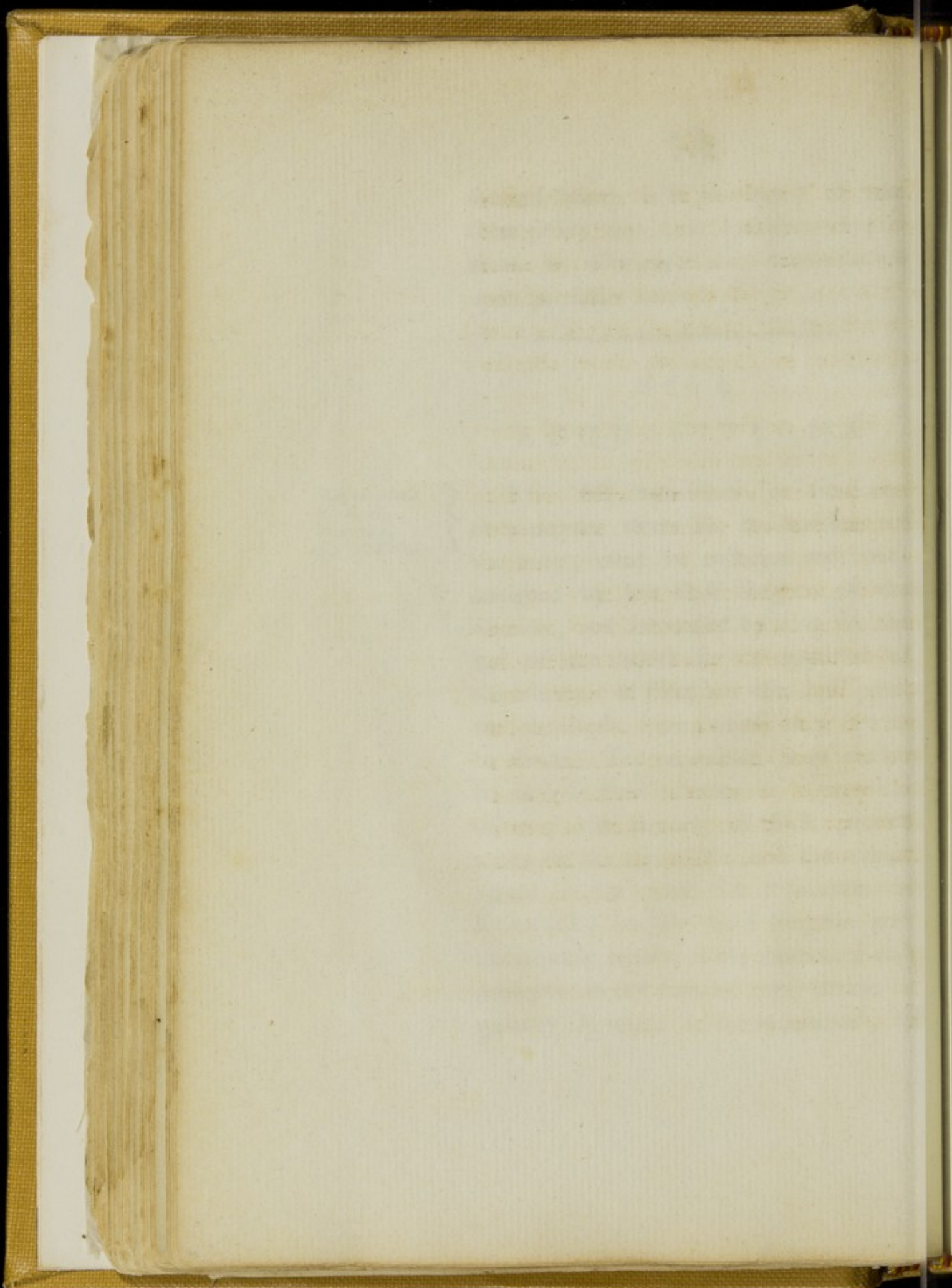

87. All requisitions for medicines or purveyors stores for the divisions of the army, must be collected and countersigned by the Staff Surgeon of the division, and forwarded by him on the 1.<sup>st</sup> of each month for the approval of the Inspector of Hospitals who will point out the depôt from which they are to be drawn. The requisition must always be in the hand writing of a medical officer; the number of Sick present stated on the top of it; and the receipt signed at the time the requisition is forwarded; but the Staff Surgeon will immediately report, if the apothecary and purveyor do not forward every article in quantity as stated in the requisition, if





there are any breakages or damage, and if the requisition is not promptly made up at the depôt. The Principal Medical Officer of the station will see, that the apothecary and purveyor use the utmost expedition in completing these requisitions.

88. The Requisitions for medicines from the different hospitals of a station must be sent in to the office of the Principal Medical Officer by ten O'clock on Sunday morning, who, after approving, will deliver them to the apothecary; and direct, that he has them all ready by ten O'clock on Monday, at which time, the officers should send for their medicines. The consumption of medicines having been very great at many stations and corps, it is requested, that the Principal Medical Officer will see that the store of medicine is in a secure place apart from the pharmacy, that the weekly consumption of the pharmacy accords with the prescription books of the different sub divisions, and the issues from the store with the requisitions which are made on it. The

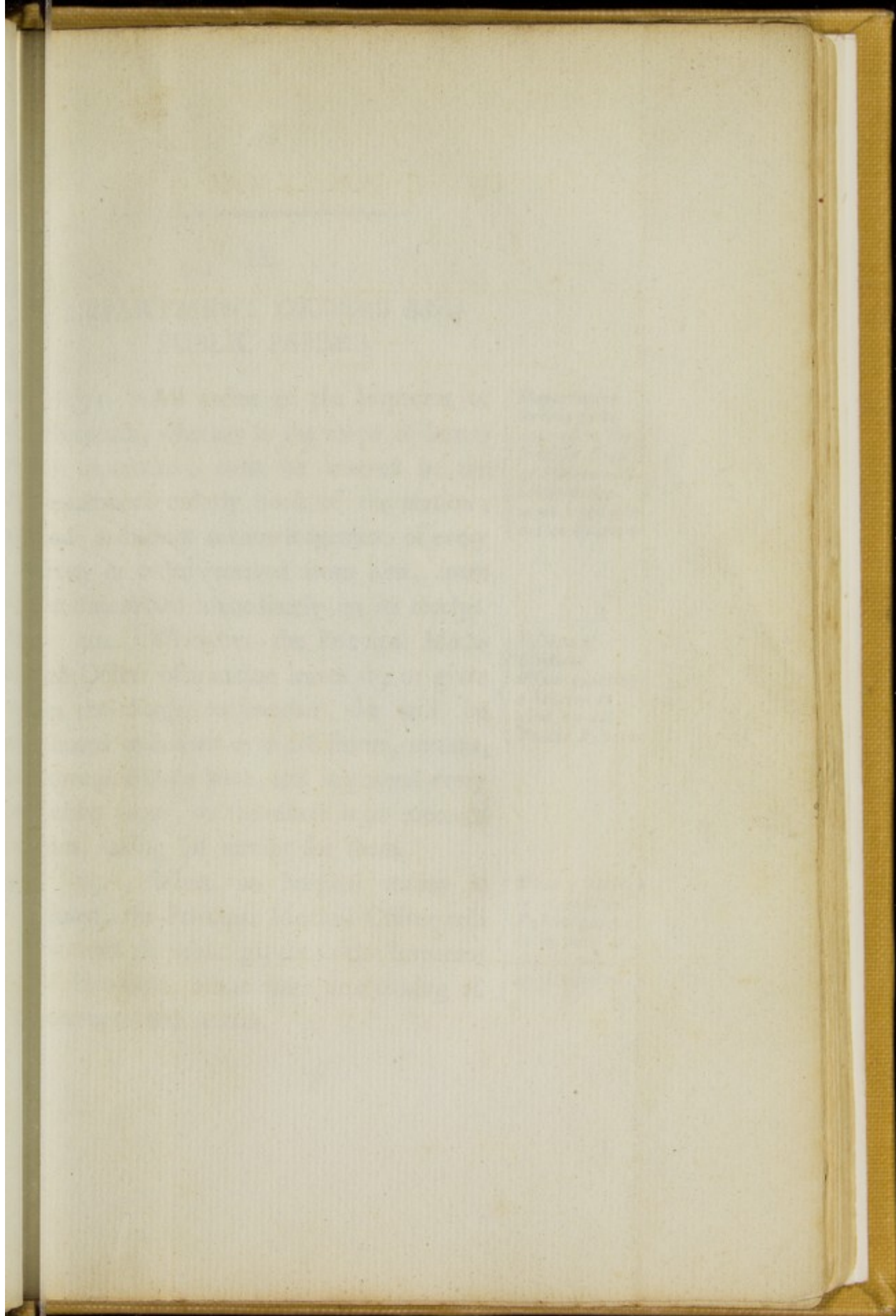

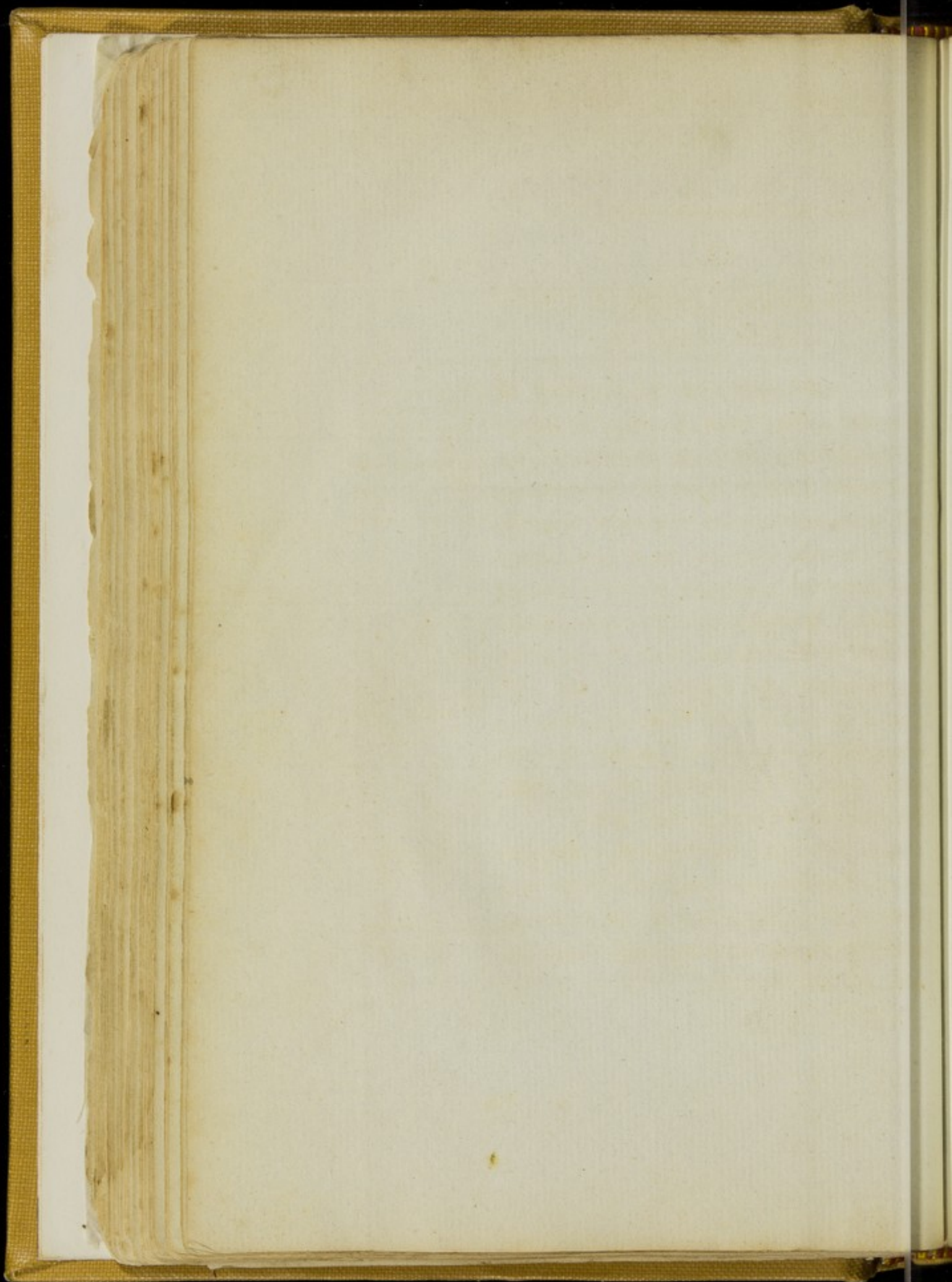












## IX.

DEPARTMENT ORDERS AND  
PUBLIC PAPERS.

91. All orders of the Inspector of Hospitals, whether in the shape of letters or otherwise, must be entered in the department orderly book of the station; and a distinct acknowledgement of every letter or order received from him, must be transmitted immediately on its receipt.

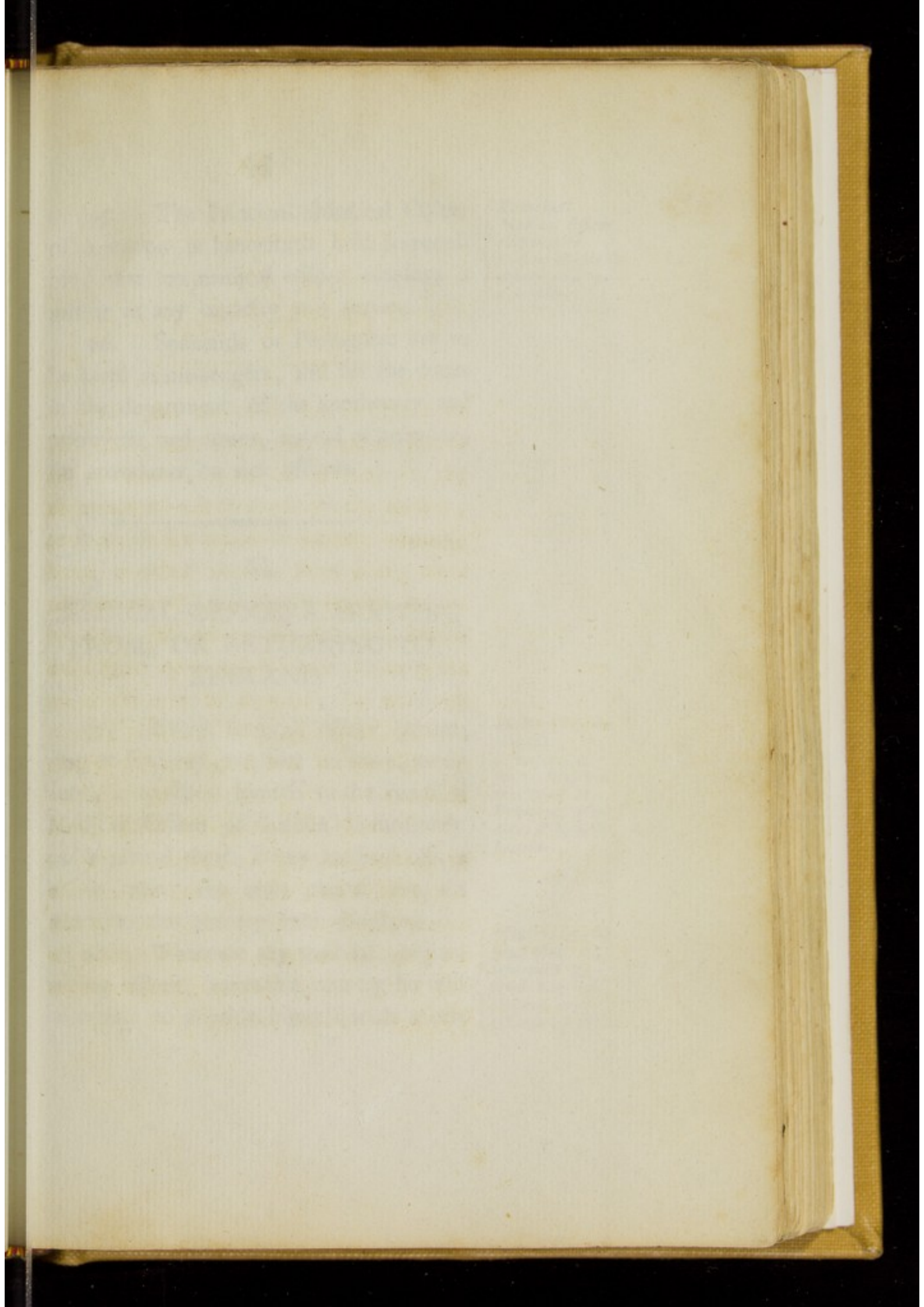

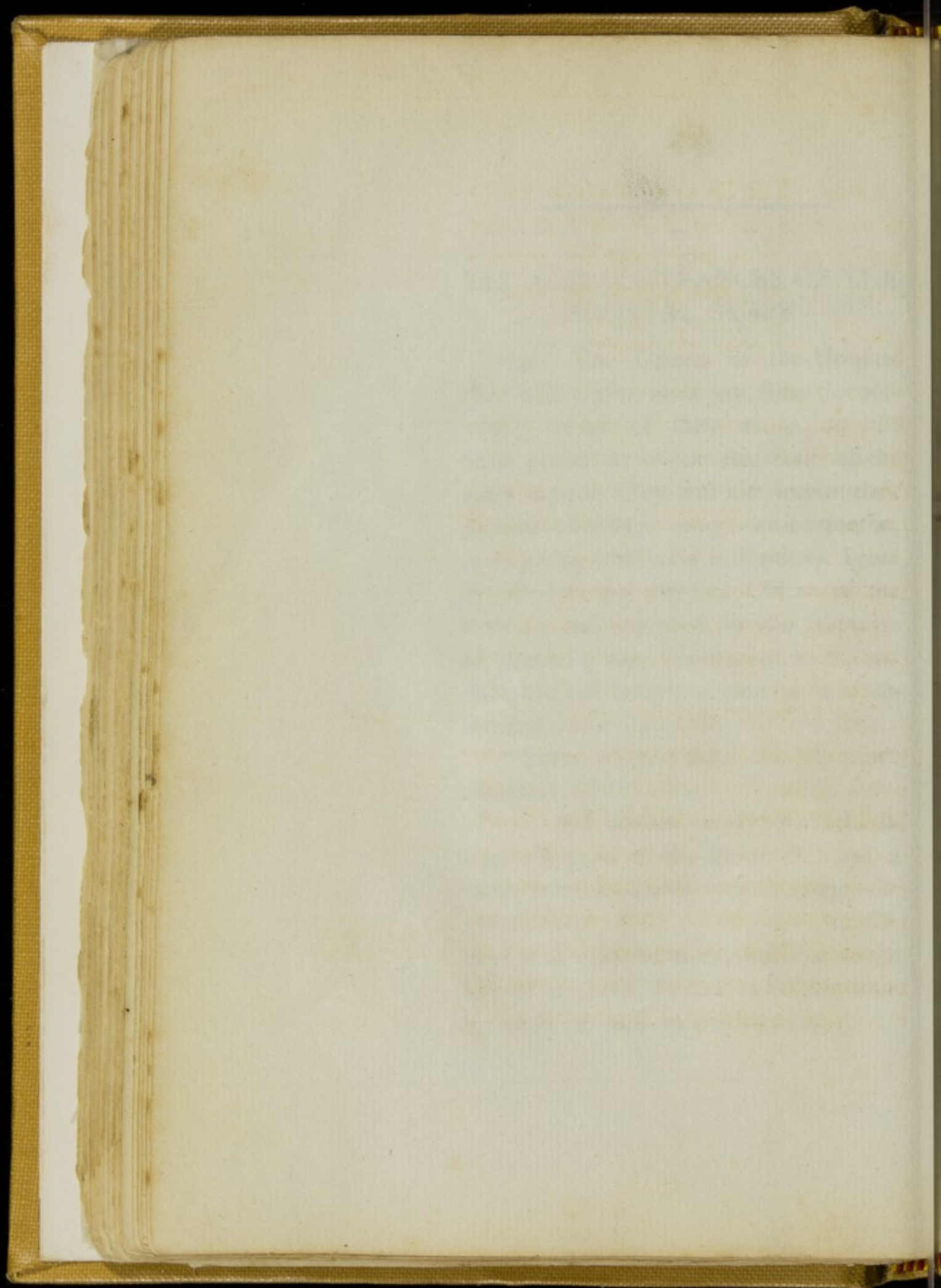
PAY AND ALLOWANCES OF THE  
HOSPITAL STAFF

94. The Officers of the Hospital Staff will receive their pay from the purveying officer of their station to the latest period to which the Staff of the army is paid. They will also receive their servants allowance every three months, upon giving certificates in duplicate signed by the Principal Medical Officer of the station, and approved by the Inspector of Hospitals after the annexed form, and their bāt and forage as soon as it is authorized to be issued.

### XI.

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS ARRIVING FROM, OR RETURNING TO, ENGLAND.

97. Every medical officer proceeding to England, whether on leave, or on duty, is to report himself to the Principal Medical Officer at Lisbon immediately on his arrival there. Every medical officer is to make the same report on his return to this country from England.

100. All letters to the Inspector of Hospitals are to be addressed to him at "Head Quarters," and whenever there is not a regular post for their immediate conveyance, they must be forwarded by the nearest party of the corps of guides.

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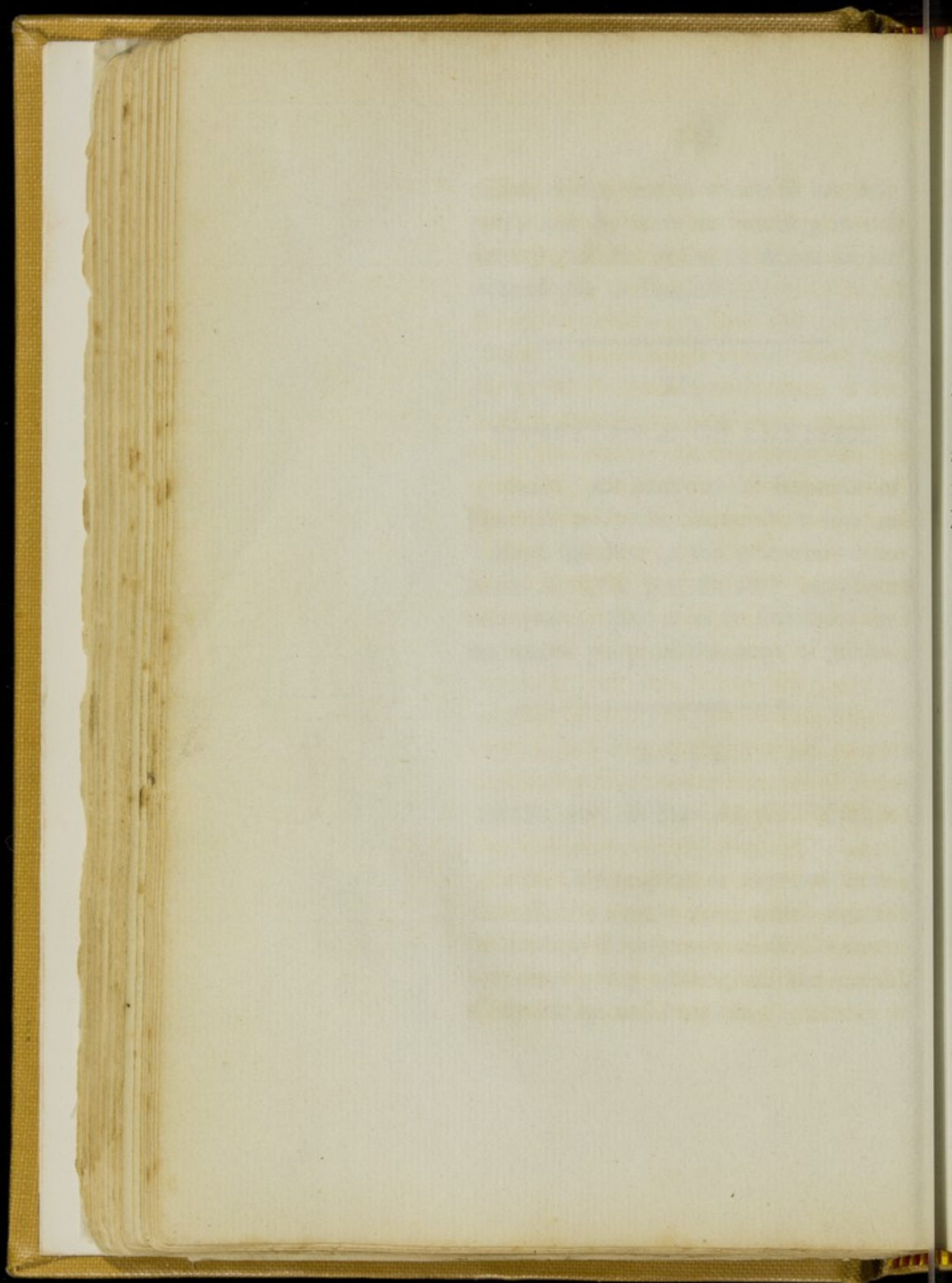
## XIII.

### PRINCIPAL MEDICAL OFFICER.

101. Information is expected from this officer on every thing which regards the Medical Topography of the Country; and every thing relating to the health of the station and hospitals.





102. He is to submit to the magistrates any thing which may tend to the improvement of the health and police of the station.

*To Communicate with the Magistrates every thing respecting the health &c. of the Station.*

103. He will see that the clinical case books, prescription books, histories of extraordinary cases, detail of remarkable appearances on dissection, and all the records of the station are carefully preserved, an inventory of them kept, and an examination of them occasionally made. It is to be clearly understood that the detail of appearances on dissection is invariably to be accompanied by an accurate history of the case.

104. He will see that whatever morbid preparations are made at the station are carefully preserved, and a reference to the case marked, as detailed in the clinical register.

105. He will give every facility and aid to the Physician and Surgeon in Chief, but these officers, who have distinct and separate duties assigned to them by the Inspector of Hospitals, are in no manner to interfere with the Principal Medical

Officer of any station in his arrangements; he being responsible only to the Inspector of Hospitals.

106. The Principal Medical Officers at hospital stations, and also the superintending medical officer of divisions and regimental hospitals, will afford every facility to the chaplains of the army in the performance of their duties, and they will always send for them whenever a patient requires their assistance.

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#### X I V.

#### P H Y S I C I A N S.

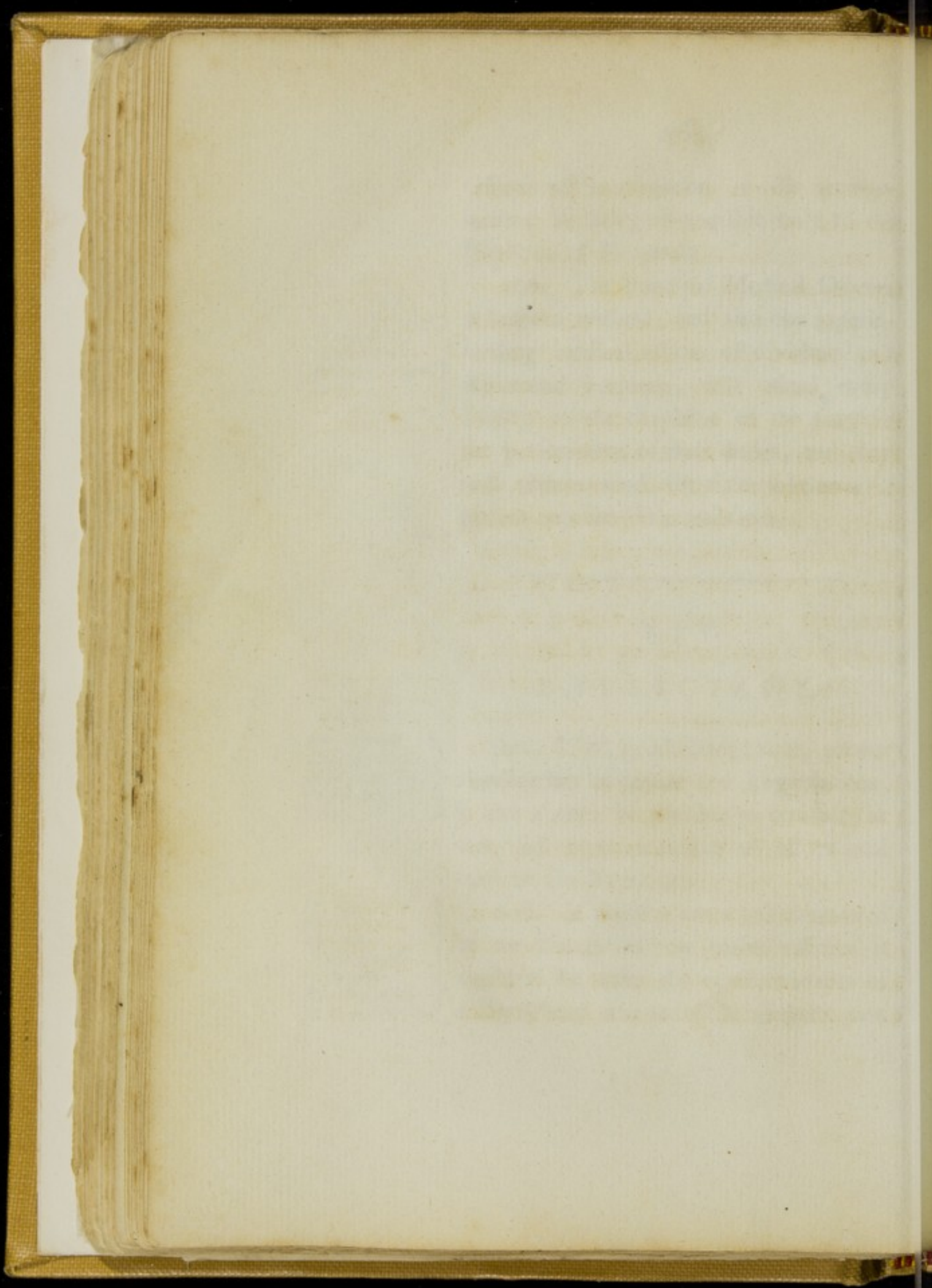
*Care of all Medical Cases to be committed to the Physicians.*

107. With good arrangement, proper classification of disease and its gradations, it will always be possible to commit the care and superintendance of all medical cases to the Physicians.

108. If slighter cases are committed to the charge of the junior officers it ought to be under the superintendance of a Physician; and even the slightest case

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ought to have the benefit of his advice occasionally.

109. A formulary of medicines for the use of all the hospitals on this service having been prepared and arranged from the communications and experience of the medical officers, it is to be observed throughout all hospitals general and regimental. It being intended annually to correct this formulary, in order to include all improvements, which experience may prove to be advantageous. Communications from the senior officers and particularly from the Physicians of the army, are requested on this subject.

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## X V.

### PURVEYORS.

110. It is the duty of the officers of this branch of the medical department to provide the supplies and stores for the hospitals, and to keep the

accounts of these ; they are also the pay-masters of the officers of the Hospital Staff, and from them the latter will receive their pay, bāt and forage, and servants allowance.

111. The head of this branch is the Commissary General of Hospitals.

112. The deputies of the purveyor at the hospital stations superintend, and are responsible for, the due care and distribution of supplies and stores.

113. They are responsible that the Diets of the Sick are properly prepared, and that they are ready at the hours prescribed by the Department Orders.

114. It is also the duty of the Purveyor to procure the necessary number of attendants for the sick, but these are entirely under the orders of the medical officers, and can only be removed or changed by them.

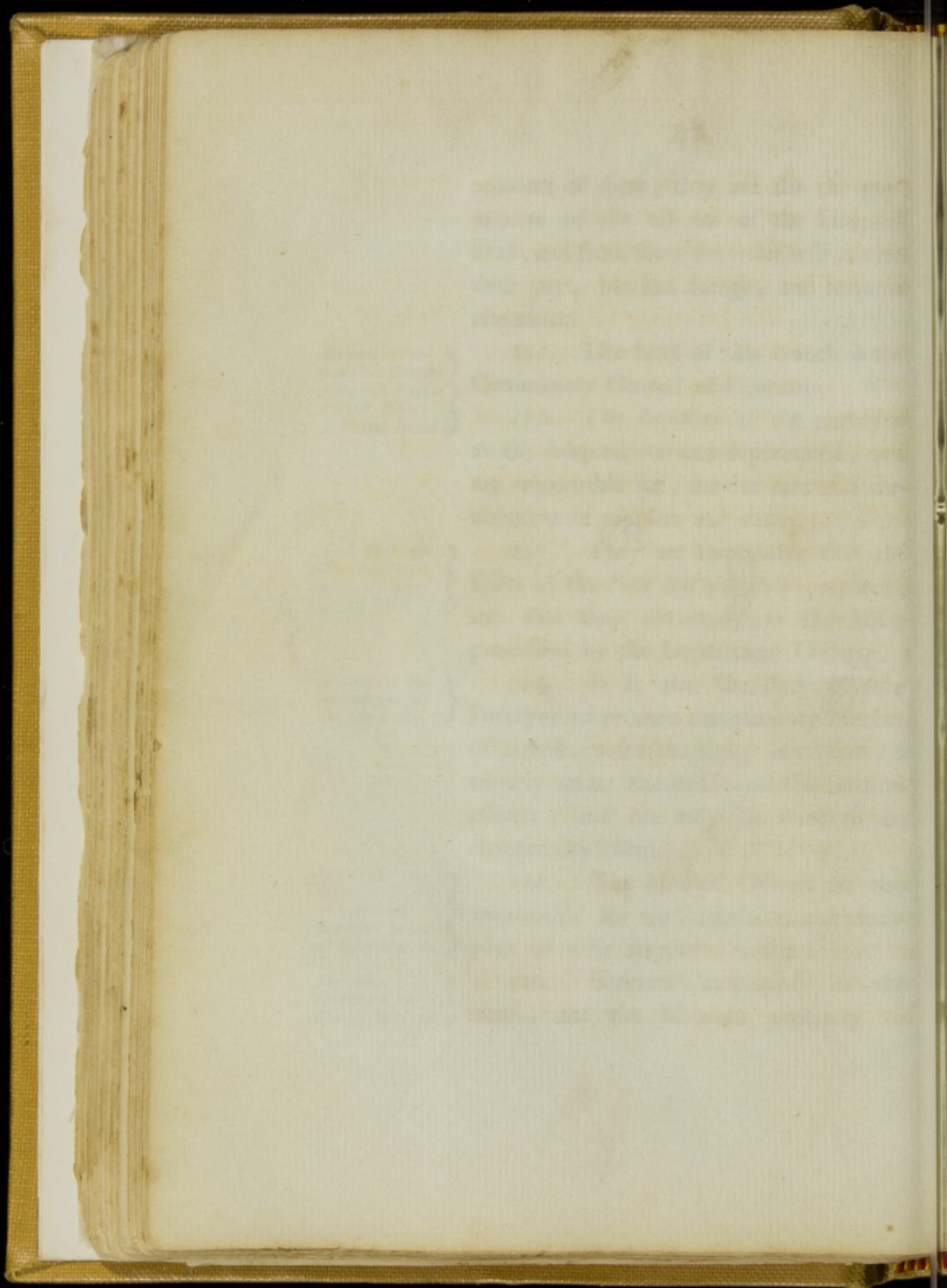

117. The Purveying Officer is responsible for the cleanliness and good order of every part in and about the Hospital, excepting the Sick Wards; the Pharmacy, and Apothecary's Store.

118. Although the Principal Medical Officer is responsible that a greater number of servants are not employed than the regulations of the army allow, yet it is the duty of the purveying officer to represent to the Principal Medical Officer, whenever the number is beyond the establishment.

*To report to Principal Medical Officer when Servants exceed the Establishment.*

119. Although the purveying officer should always be present, it can never belong to him to preside at the admission of patients, that duty belongs to the Resident, and Orderly Medical Officer of the day, who are to examine the accuracy of the mens names and diseases, as marked in the admission ticket, and to ascertain the casualties that may have

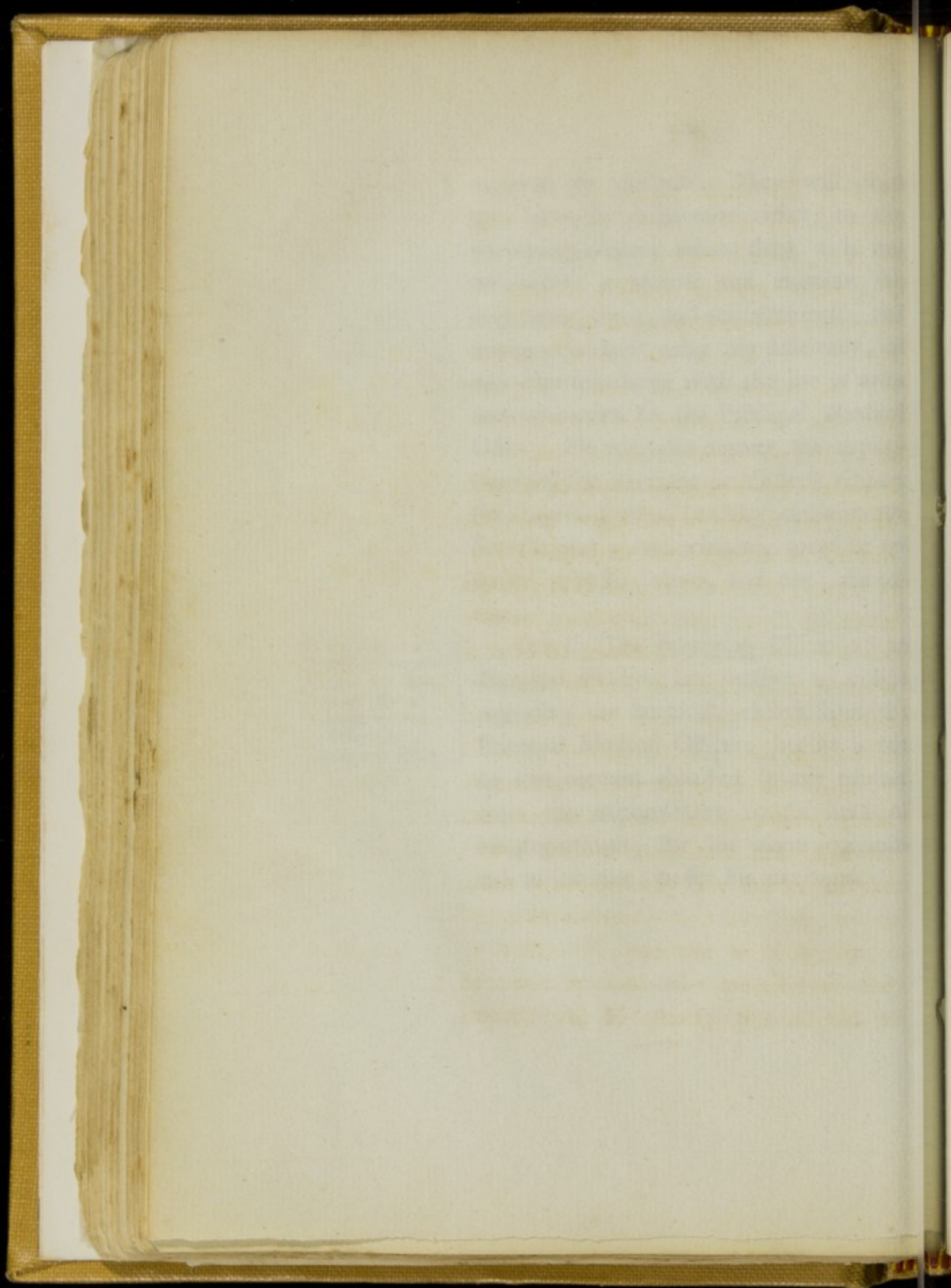

occurred on the road. They will then give over the admission ticket to the purveying officer, whose duty it is immediately to receive and examine the necessaries, arms, and accoutrements, and to report without delay any deficiency, or non correspondence with the list of arms and necessaries to the Principal Medical Officer. He will also answer the requisitions of the Resident or Orderly Officer for hospital dresses, bedding, and servants, for the sick, and whatever may be required to bathe, clean, and diet, the patient.

120. The Purveying Officer at an Hospital Station can receive no orders regarding the hospital, except from the Principal Medical Officer; but he is not on that account absolved in any manner from the responsibility to the head of his department, for the stores committed to his care, or for his accompts.

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## XVI.

## APOTHECARIES AND DISPENSERS.

121. The important duty of preparing and compounding medicines, is to be performed by the dispensers under the direction of the apothecary, or when the number of dispensers is not sufficient, by hospital mates appointed to that duty.

122. An orderly man may be allowed to clean the pharmacy, utensils &c. but he is on no account to be allowed to attempt any medical duty beyond the dressing of a blister, or the application of a poultice.

123. It is the duty of the Principal Medical Officer, the Physicians and Surgeons to taste, and examine occasionally, the preparations and prescriptions, as made up by the apothecary and dispensers.

124. The apothecary is never to make an issue from his store, without the sanction of the Principal Medical Officer.

*The Principal Medical Officer, Physicians, and Surgeons, to taste and examine the different medicines.*

125. The dispenser will send in his requisition for medicines for the pharmacy weekly to the apothecary; and at the periods directed the apothecary will report if the dispensers keep the pharmacy in good order, the medicines are well arranged, and the prescriptions are promptly and accurately made up.

126. Whenever a supply of medicines is required for a station, the requisition made out by the apothecary, is to be forwarded to the Inspector of Hospitals, by the Principal Medical Officer; who after approval will direct from what depôt it is to be issued.

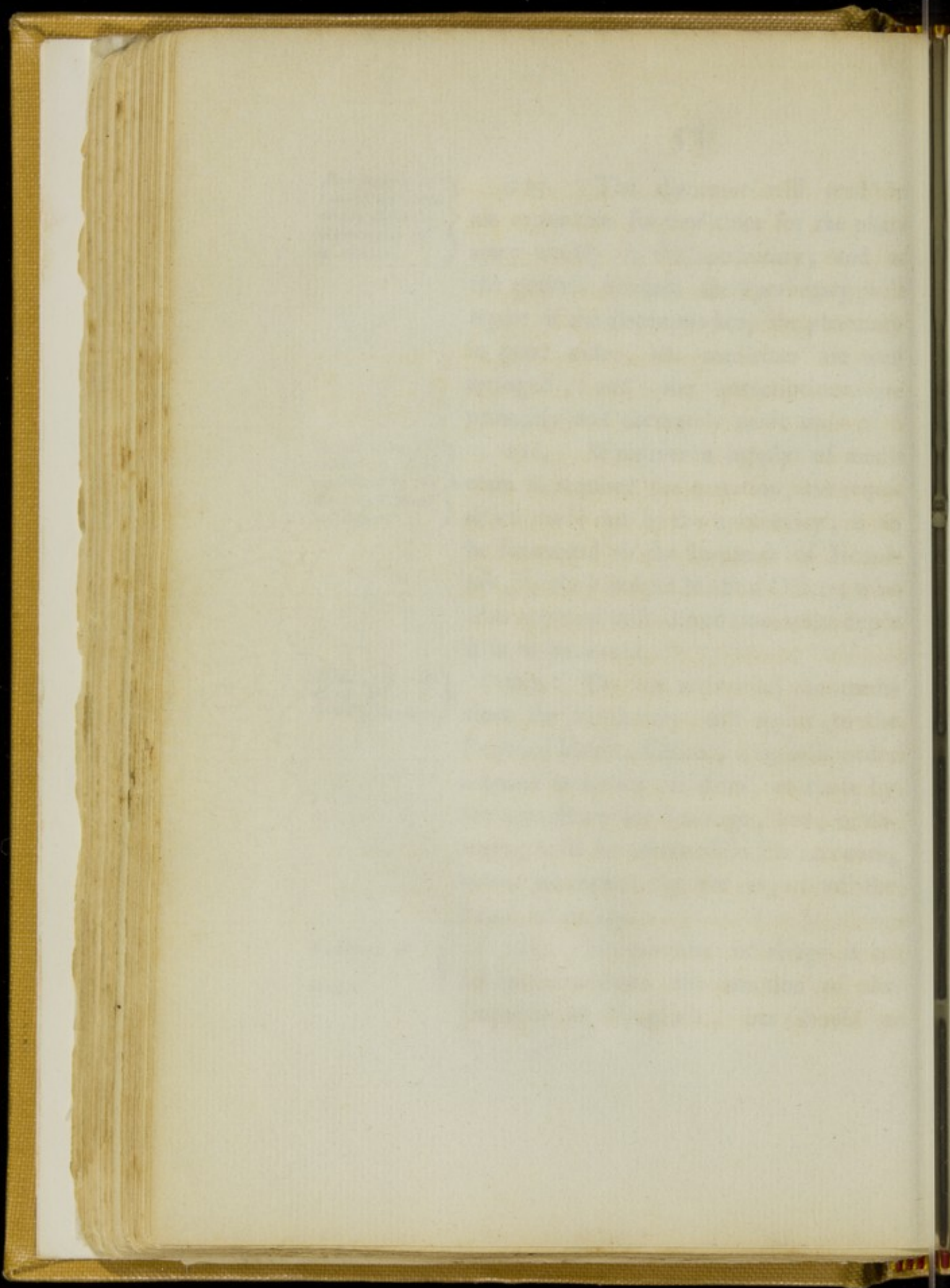

127. On the arrival of the medicines the apothecary will report to the Principal Medical Officer, who will order a board of survey on them; no claim by the apothecary for breakage, loss, or damage, will be admitted in his accounts, unless sanctioned by the report of the board of survey.

128. No purchase of drugs is to be made without the sanction of the Inspector of Hospitals, but should a





medical officer wish in a particular case to use a medicine not in the store, it may be purchased by the apothecary, under the sanction of the Principal Medical Officer.

129. The Apothecary at a station is responsible for the regular dispensing of medicines, and that requisitions from divisions of the army, and other hospital stations are promptly complied with. When the state of his stores does not enable him to supply all the articles required, he is to report the deficiencies to the Inspector of Hospitals through the Principal Medical Officer.

*Apothecary responsible for the prompt issue of medicines.*

130. The Principal Medical Officer, as well as the Physicians and Surgeons, are required to visit the Pharmacy frequently, and to see that the duties are conducted in a proper manner.

131. The Apothecary is responsible for the proper packing of the medicines, materials, and instruments, that are sent from his store to a distance.

132. He will report monthly to the Principal Medical Officer, and give a

list of articles nearly expended, or which are likely to be wanted.

133. At the monthly board, the apothecary will present every drug, or preparation, which may appear to him from damage or decay to be unfit for use. These are to be examined by the board, and if found unfit for use, destroyed in their presence.

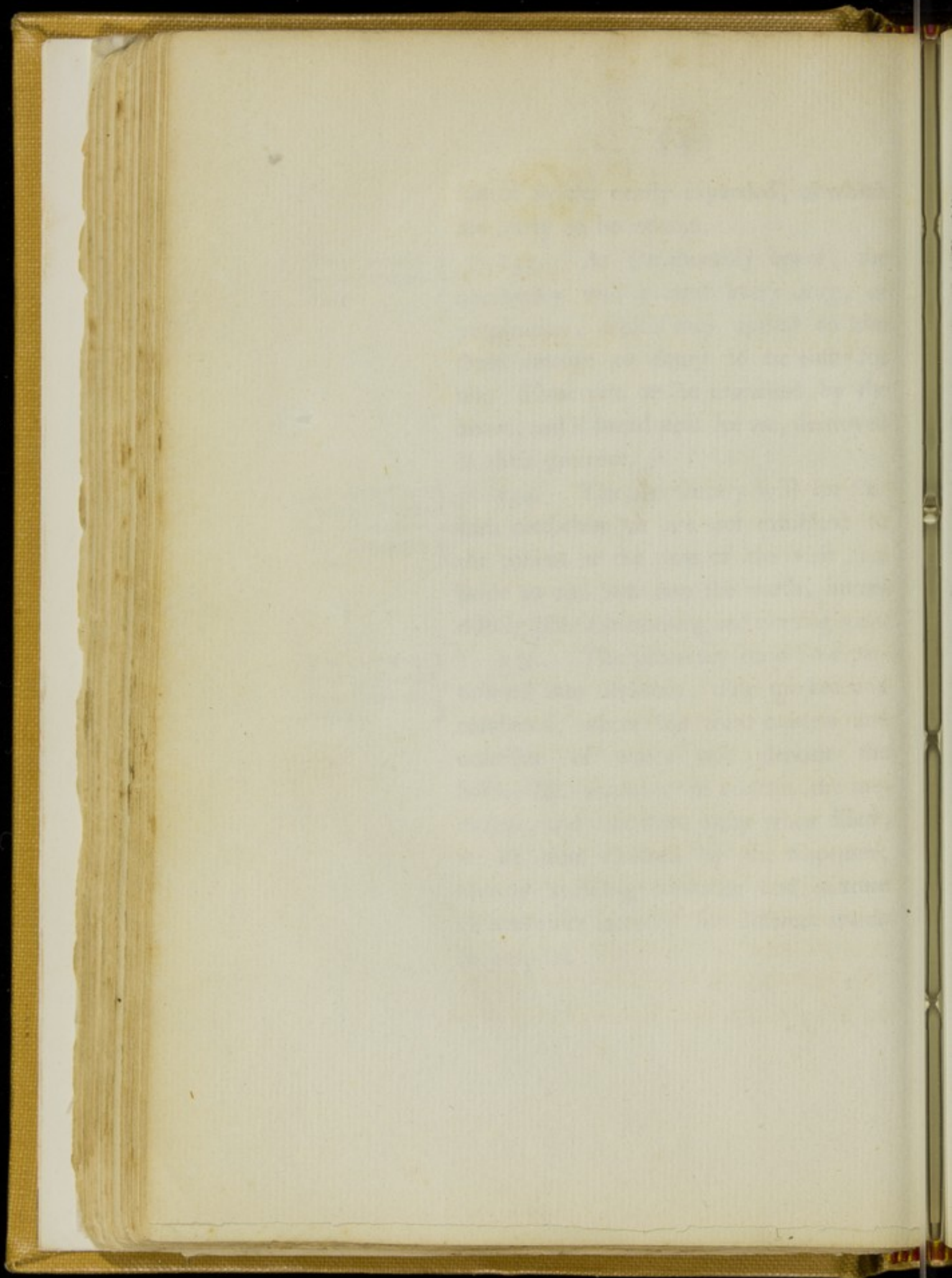

134. The Apothecary will see that such medicines as are not exhibited to the patient at the time of the visit, are made up and sent into the wards, immediately after the morning and evening visit.

The pharmacy should be partitioned into divisions, duly marked and numbered, where the ward masters and orderlies of wards will deposit the bottles &c. necessary to contain the medicines, and take them away when filled, at the time directed by the dispenser; thereby avoiding confusion and mixture of medicines intended for different wards in hospital.







136. All apothecary's or dispensers in charge of medical stores or depôts, are to transmit regularly to the Apothecary in Chief, returns of their stores monthly, and quarterly, and to obey every order they may receive from him.

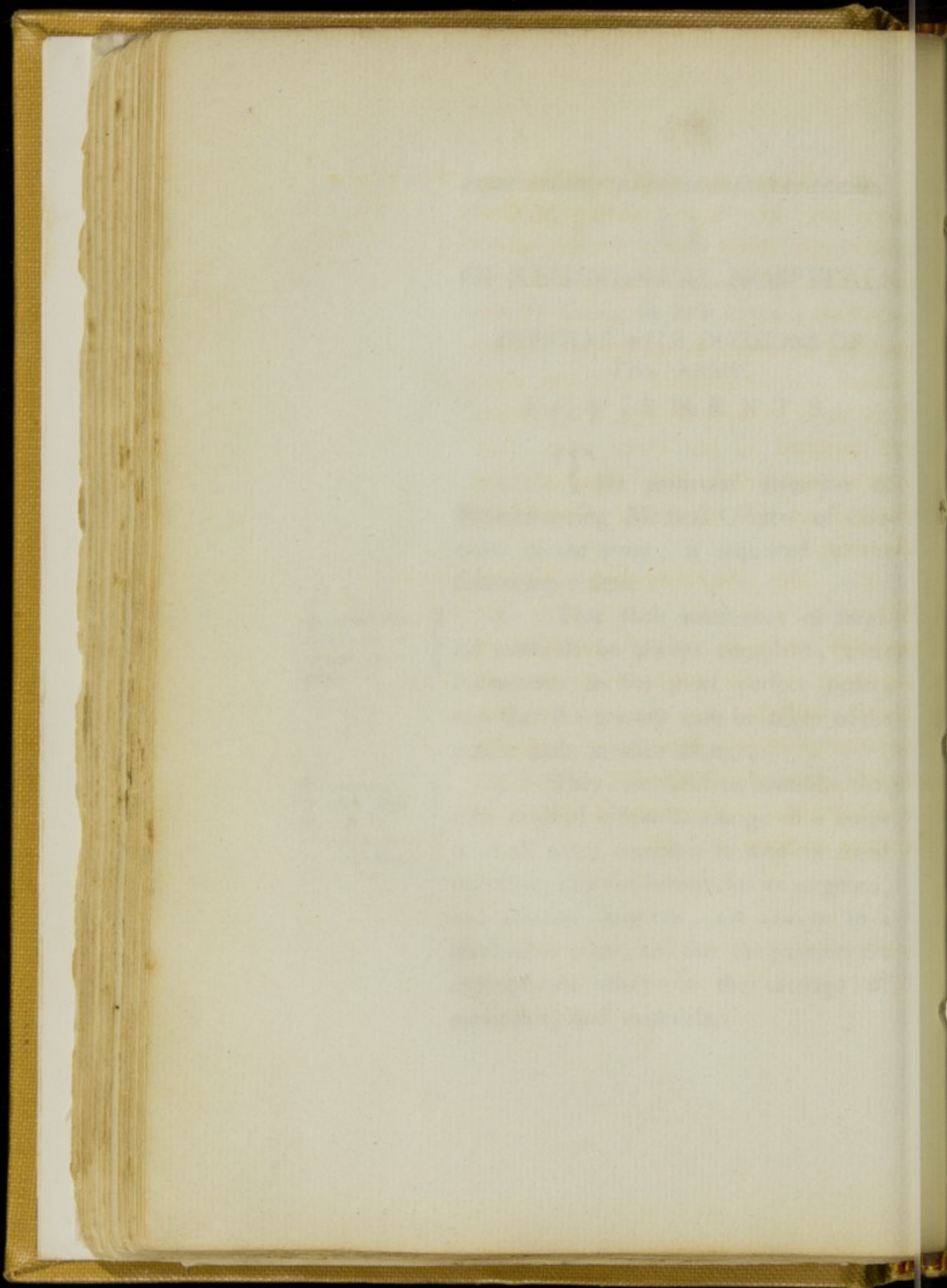

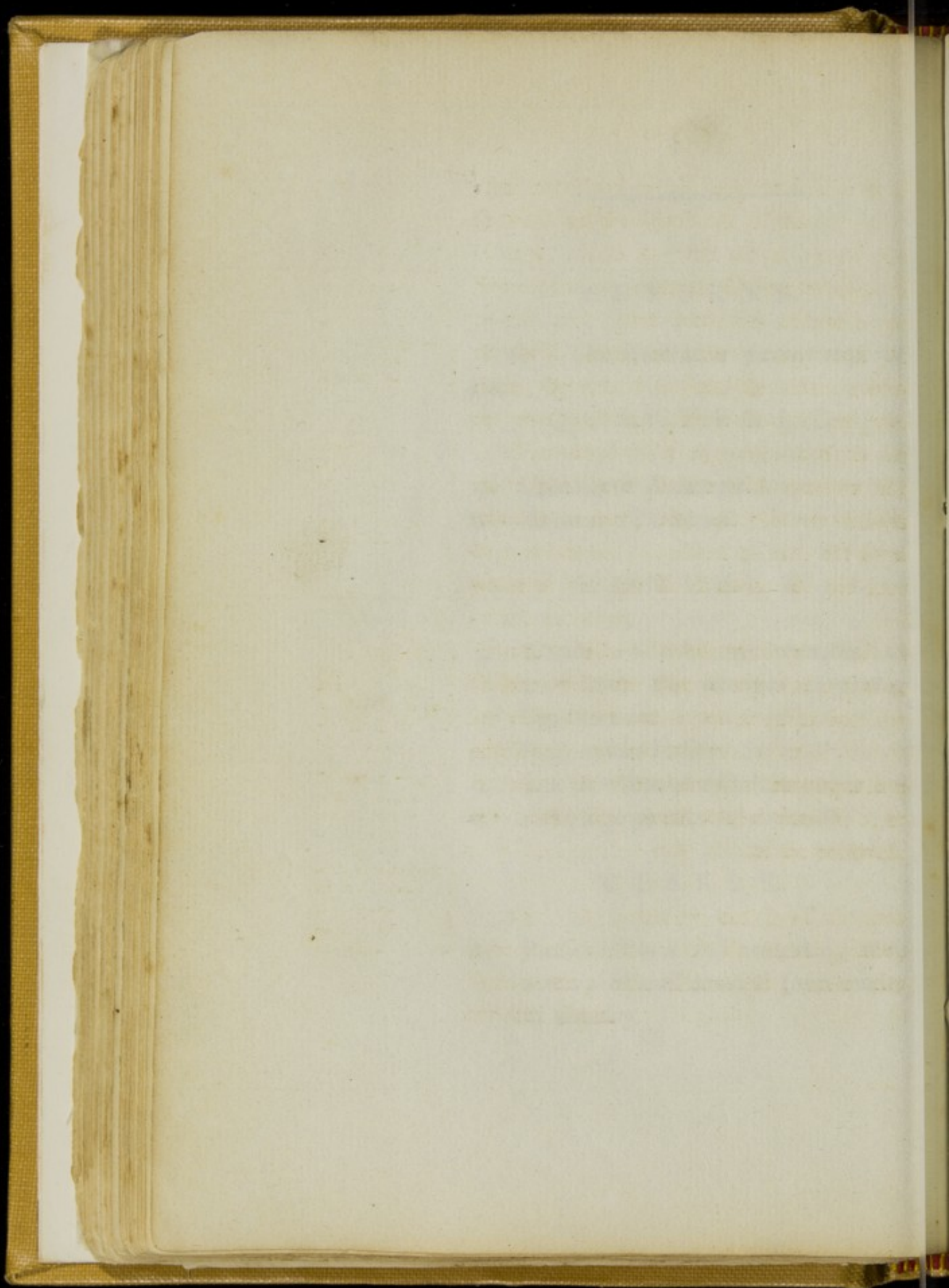

The Superintending Medical Officer will see that the contingent acco<sup>m</sup>pts of every corps in his division are made up quarterly, viz from the 25.<sup>th</sup> of December to the 24.<sup>th</sup> of March, 25.<sup>th</sup> of March to the 24.<sup>th</sup> June &c. and transmitted to the Inspector of Hospitals, as speedily as possible after they become due.

8. It is the order of the Secretary at War, that the surplus and deficiency of the hospital expences of corps abroad, should be paid into, or taken out of the military chest, instead of being remitted to, or drawn for, upon the agent for army hospitals.

9. Whenever a corps receives orders to leave this country, the Superintending Medical Officer of the division will direct the medical officer in charge to close his contingent acco<sup>m</sup>pt, which

14. The monthly returns from the divisions of the army, will specify the diseases of the admitted, and discharged, as well as of the remaining agreeable to Form N.<sup>o</sup> 15.

In the monthly return, the diseases of men transfered must be stated in the column of diseases discharged, as the total column transfered, is merely to shew, that of the number discharged, so many have been transfered to general hospital uncured. To this return is also to be added, a column to shew the strength of each corps present on the 20.<sup>th</sup>, a column of absent sick, and in a note at the bottom must be stated the number of sick sent from the division during the last fourteen days, and, the number of hospital servants.

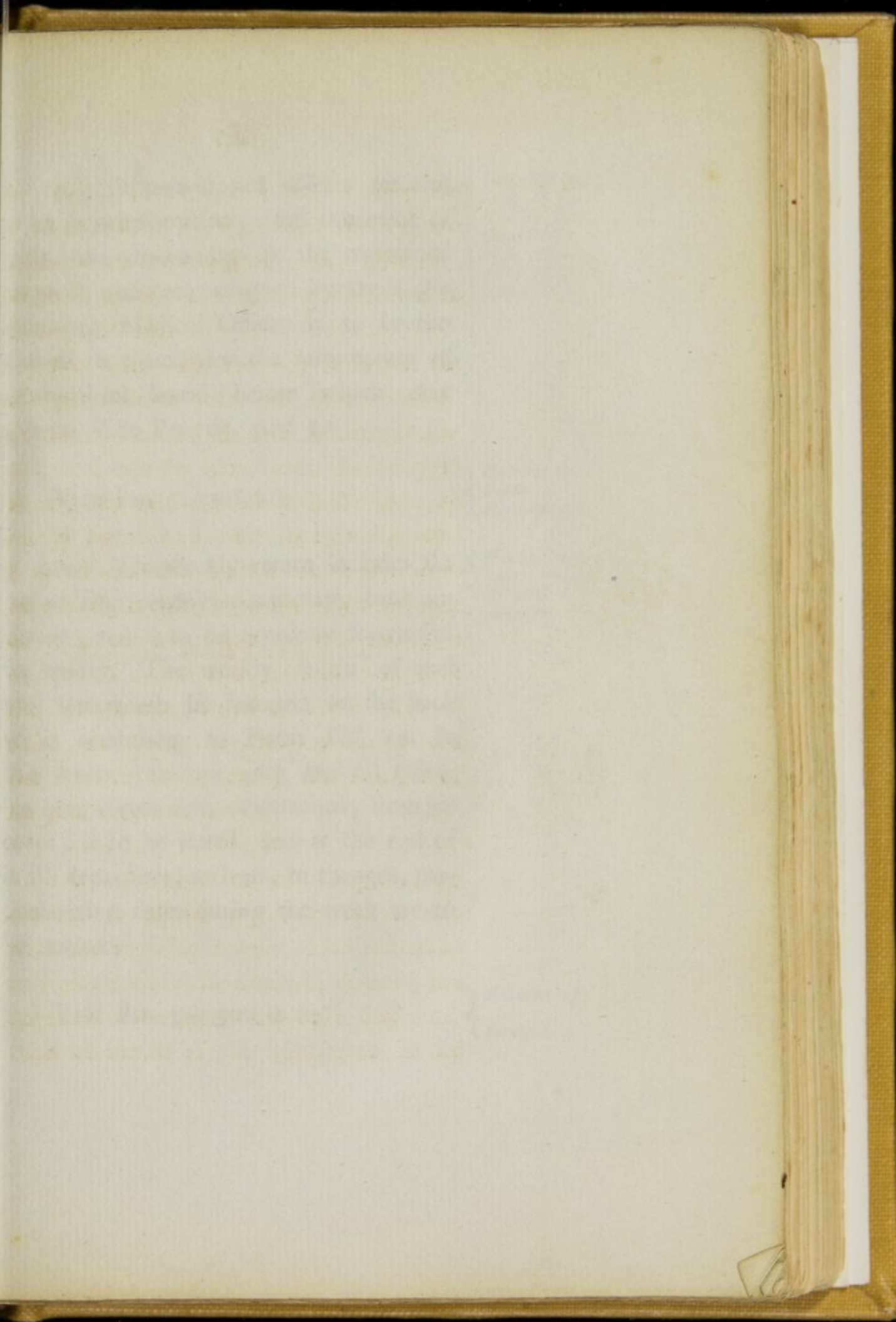

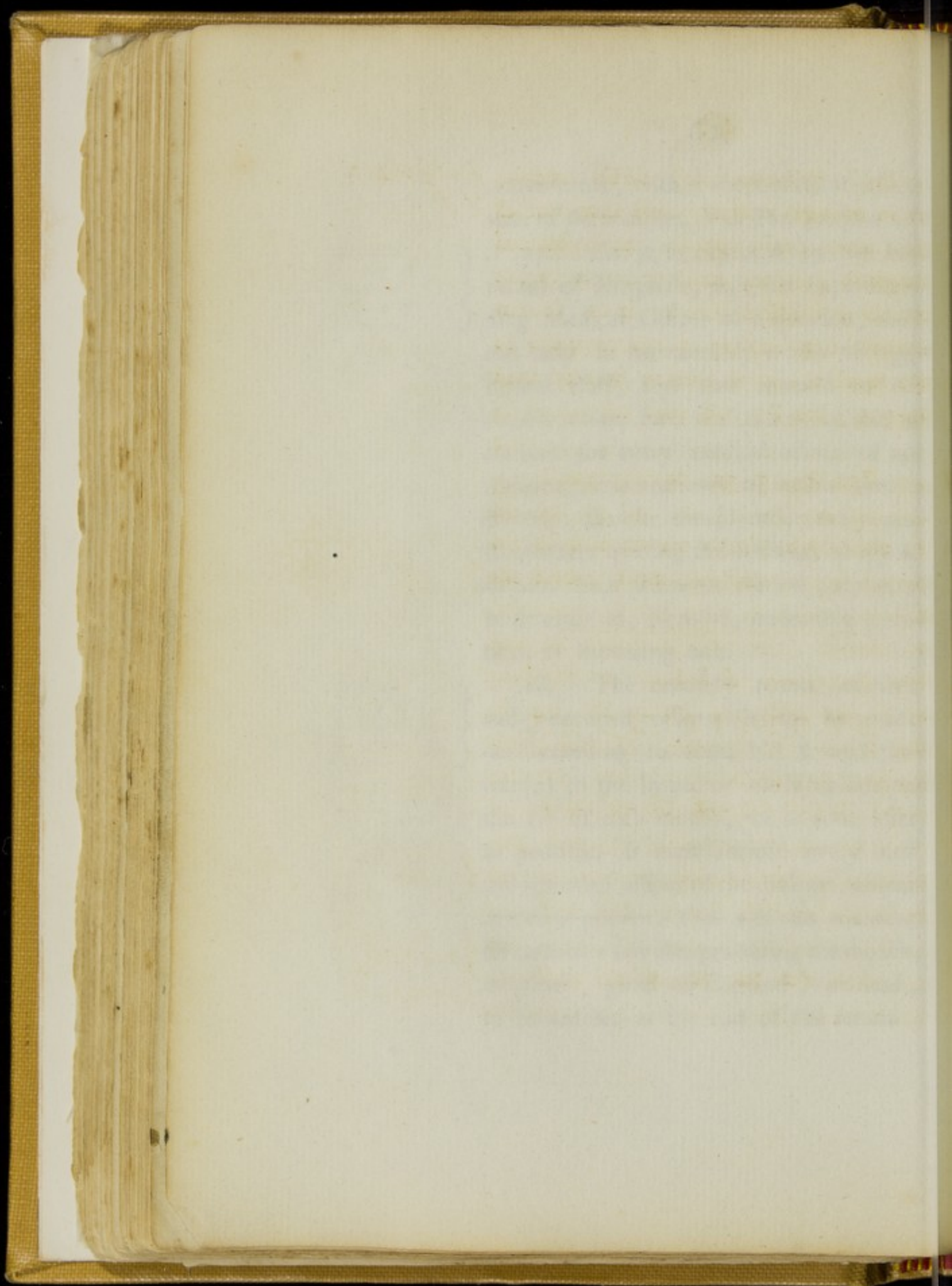
17. As it is expected by the Inspector of Hospitals, that the Superintending Medical Officer of a division, shall not only in his monthly return of regimental staff, and that annexed to his weekly return; but, at all times, be able to account for every medical officer of his division; it is necessary to enable him to do this, that he should order every medical officer quitting the division, to report to him from whatever station they may be detained at, likewise, on leaving a station, or becoming sick.

18. The monthly return of sick and wounded officers is to be made out according to form N.<sup>o</sup> 8. and forwarded to the Inspector of Hospitals on the 1.<sup>st</sup> of each month, or as soon after as possible. It must include every sick and wounded officer of the division, absent as well as present, if he is in this country; all casualties and changes during the month, as cured, gone to England, or dead, to be entered at the end of the return.







19. Whenever sick officers are sent to an hospital station, a full statement of their case drawn up by the regimental surgeon, and countersigned by the Superintending Medical Officer is to be furnished to them, for the information of the medical board before which they appear. In this return the time each medical officer has been absent sick, or detached, from his corps, is to be stated, and at the end of it all departures, arrivals, or changes, particularizing dates during the week are to be noticed.

23. However short the time may be that a corps may remain in one place, the medical officer should provide some

accommodation for what sick may occur, either in a house, tent, or hut.

24. At all times, and in almost every situation a temporary mattress may be formed from rushes, twigs of trees &c. and the exertions of the Medical Officer will always procure comfortable accommodation for the sick. When a corps halts therefore even for two days in one place, an hospital is always to be established.

*Division of hospitals in stationary quarters.*

25. But whenever a corps is in stationary quarters, and the sick are numerous, there ought to be the same division of hospitals, as directed in Par. 1. 2. and 3. of part 1.<sup>st</sup>

*Convalescents to be separated from the sick.*

26. It is indispensable that convalescents be separated from those labouring under acute disease, and they should also be classed and dieted, according to the degree of convalescence.

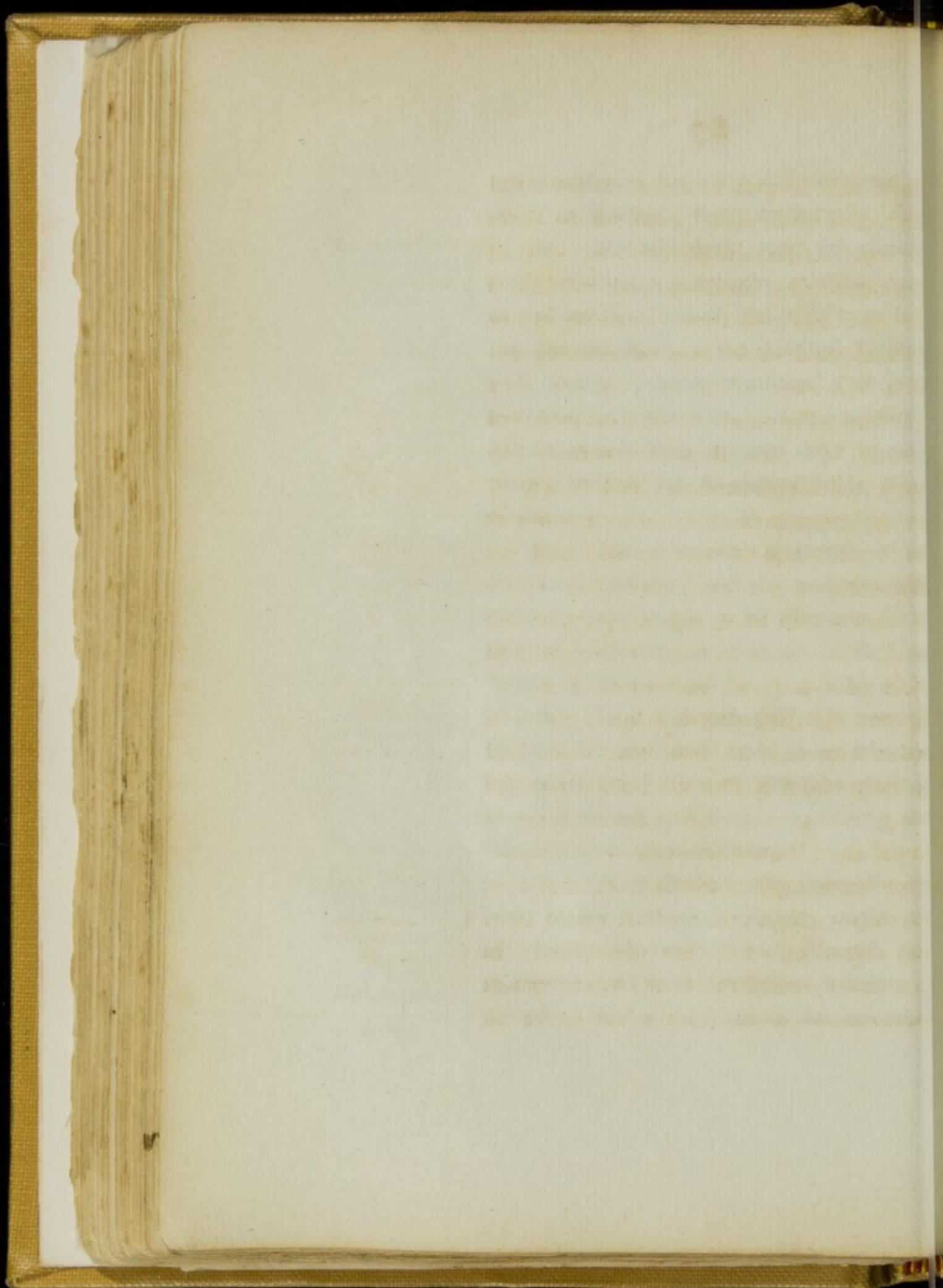
*Men affected with contagious disease.*

27. Men affected with Itch, Venereal, or any contagious disease, ought to be strictly separated, and allowed no communication with the other patients.

*No beds to lie on the floor.*

28. Every hospital is to be pro-





vided with bedsteads, and in no case must the beds of the sick be laid on the floor.

29. Every large ward ought to be provided with a bathing tub, but this is indispensibly necessary in wards appropriated to cases of venereal disease, and itch. *Bathing tubs in each ward.*

30. But when it is absolutely necessary that sick should be sent to the rear, the Superintending Medical Officer is held responsible for the nature of the cases sent, and of those retained with the regiment. *Superintending Medical Officer responsible for the cases sent to the rear.*

31. Whenever sick are sent to the rear, the returns required by General Orders of 17.<sup>th</sup> of December 1809. N.<sup>o</sup> 4 and by Department Orders Par. 23 must invariably be sent with them. To prevent the mistakes so constantly occurring, the greatest care must be taken to write mens names correctly in the admission ticket, and in the list of necessaries. *Returns to accompany them.*

32. A careful medical officer who is acquainted with the cases, and the treatment which has been pursued, should accompany them. This officer is to be *Duties of medical officers accompanying sick.*



instructed to see that they receive their meals on the road, as regularly and comfortably as circumstances will allow, to administer their medicines with regularity, and to procure quarters for them at night. He will also be particularly instructed to keep the cars or mules with the sick together, and that he is on no account to quit them on the road.

33. The Principal Medical Officer at every station, is directed to report to the Inspector of Hospitals, the state in which sick come from the divisions of the army, with the names of the officers in charge.

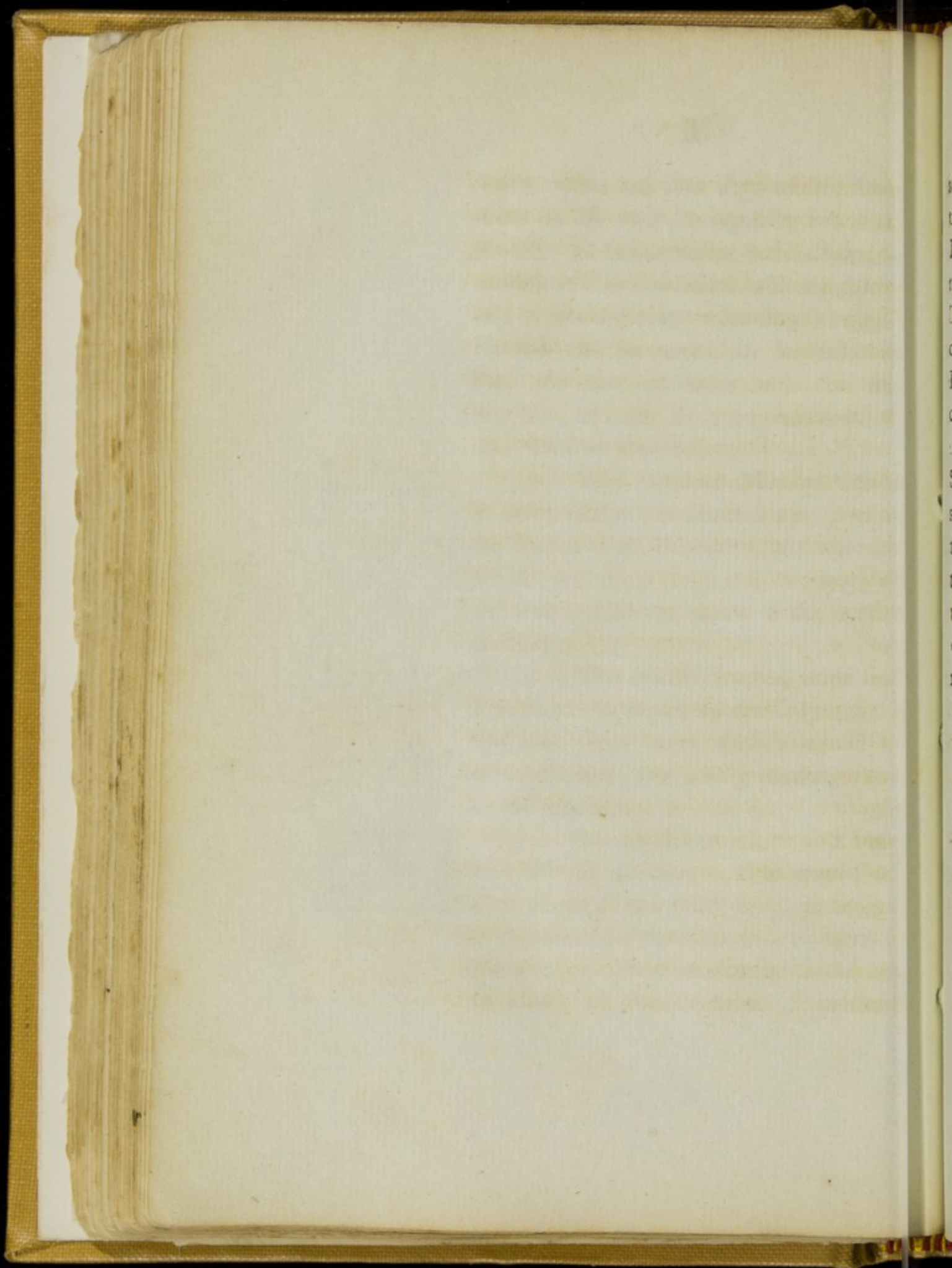

34. The officer detached with sick is required to report to the Inspector of Hospitals from every station where he halts with sick, but a daily morning state is not required.

35. In many instances, the sick have been left in the most careless manner at some places on the route, by the muleteers of divisions. In some measure to obviate this great evil, it is recommended that on the return of the muleteers to the divi-

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sions, they be called upon, and obliged to produce a receipt from the Principal Medical Officer of a station, for the men they took with them from the division. The Superintending Medical Officers of divisions will report to the Inspector of Hospitals, whenever these men are unaccounted for.

36. A report is required from the Superintending Medical Officer of divisions, of all fatal cases which occur on the road to an hospital station, whether this information is obtained by them from the medical officer in charge, a military officer, or a non commissioned officer, if no commissioned officer proceed.

37. The Superintending Medical Officers of divisions, will give particular attention as to the propriety of issuing spirits to the sick going to the rear. If any is issued, a selection must be made of the cases, to which spirits may be given.

38. When Spanish Medical Officers are attached to a division, they are committed to the protection of the Superin-

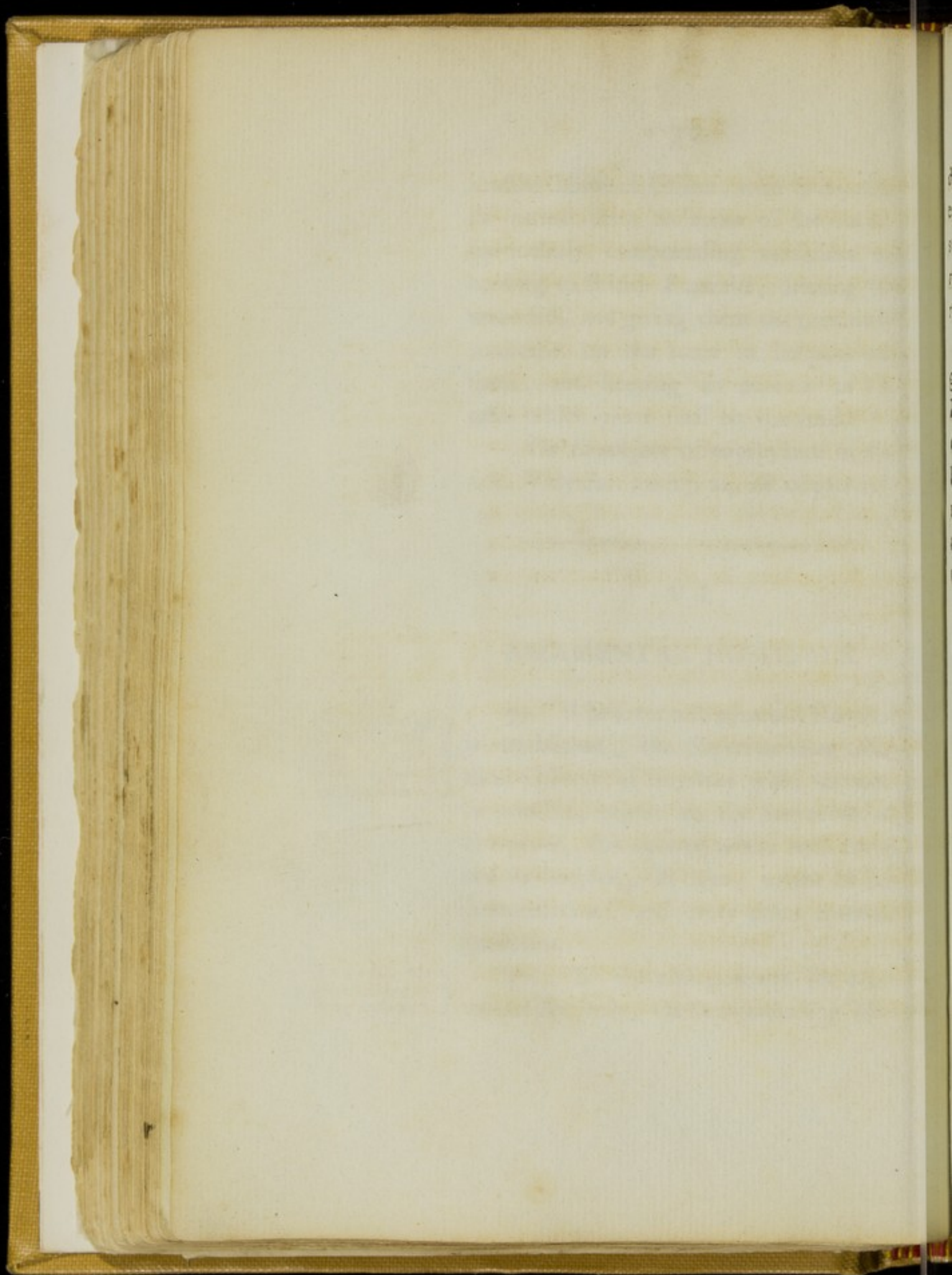

39. Whenever a Regimental Hospital is established, the Superintending Medical Officers of divisions will, as soon as possible, report to the Inspector of Hospitals, the quarter where each corps has its hospital, its scite, extent of accommodation, and every other essential particular.

dical Officers of divisions, will see that every part of His Majesty's Orders, as stated in the Book of Regulations for regimental hospitals, is enforced in their respective divisions.

41. The weekly return is to be regularly transmitted to the Superintending Medical Officer of division, by every officer in charge of a corps. It ought to be in every respect the same as that in use in England, with the exception of the detail of names; it being sufficient that the number of sick on each day be stated.

42. The regimental surgeon will draw a Stoppage of nine pence per day, for each man in hospital, from the paymaster of his corps.

43. If the regimental surgeon draws the whole ration, he will pay six pence to the Commissary, or a proportion of six pence for whatever part of the ration he may draw, at the following rate at which the Commissary General has valued the ration, viz, meat fourpence halfpenny, (4½<sup>d</sup>) per pound, bread one penny, (1<sup>d</sup>) per pound.

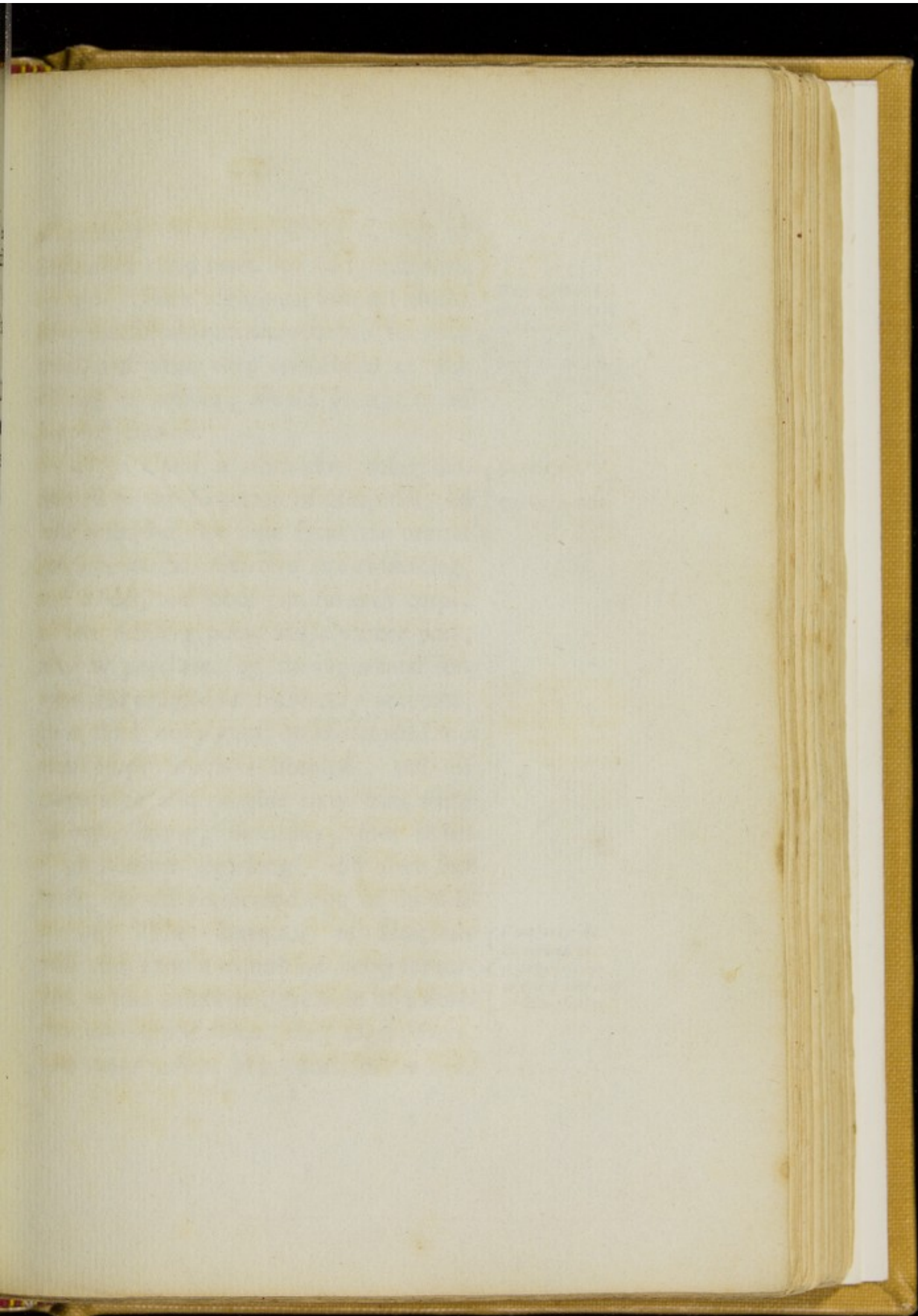

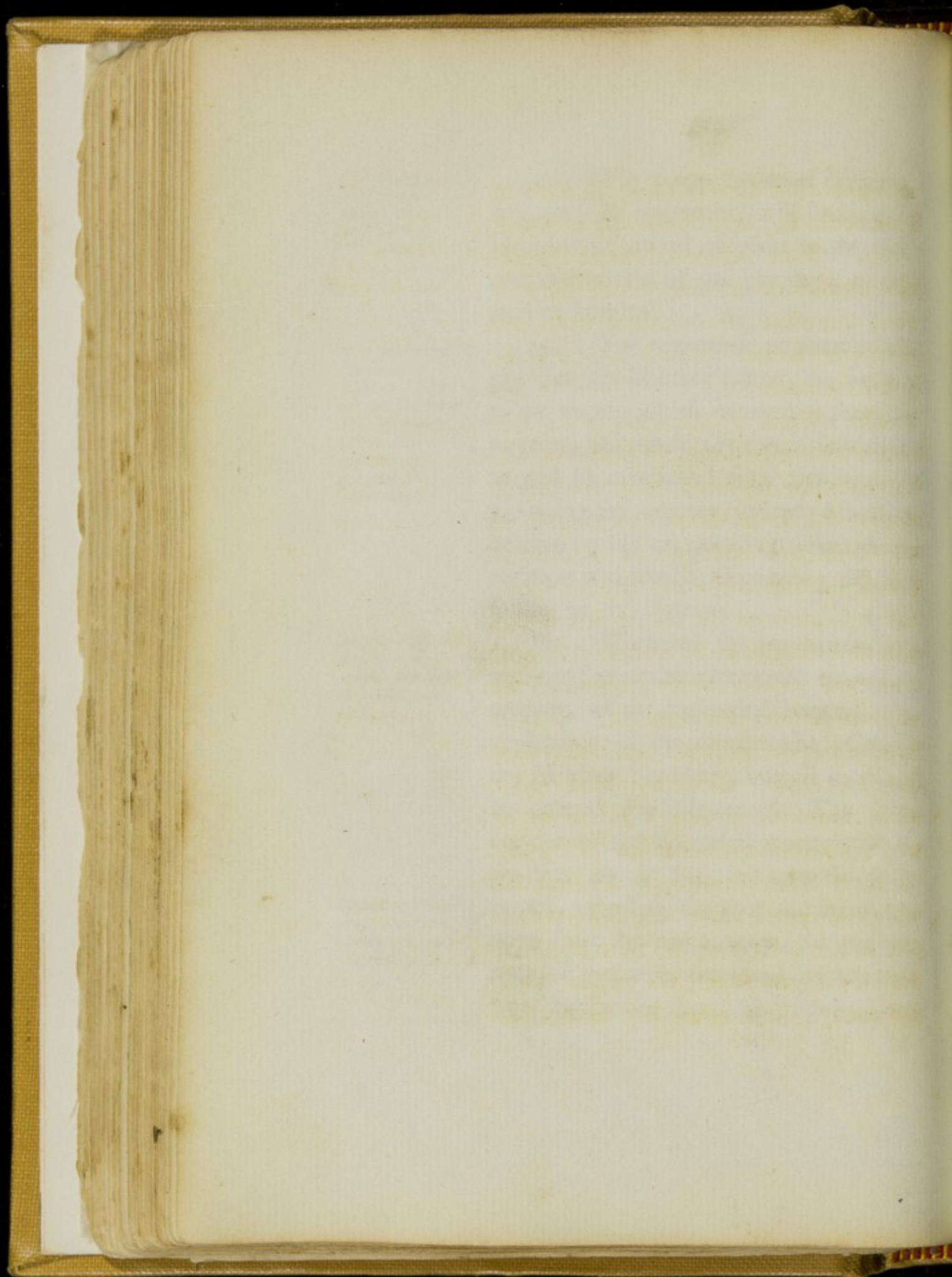
45. The regimental paymaster will pay into the Military Chest, the amount of the surplus which he receives from the surgeon, and should there be a deficiency, he will be reimbursed from the chest, on producing the surgeons quarterly accompts, certified by the commanding officer of the regiment and the Superintending Medical Officer of the division.

46. Whenever the paymaster of a regiment, is unable to advance money on account, of the regimental hospital; on application of the commanding officer to the Military Secretary, a small issue will be ordered for this service. The Commander of the Forces disapproves of the practice which has in some instances existed, of selling the meat and bread procured from the commissary, for the purpose of procuring comforts for the sick. The regulations on this head, and

particularly the General Order of 20.<sup>th</sup> of September 1809 must be strictly enforced.

47. Each regimental hospital should have comfortable accommodation for sixty men, and when once established no sick officer, or soldier, should be sent to an hospital station.

48. Upon a requisition being forwarded to the Inspector of Hospitals, he will authorise the issue from the nearest hospital station of twelve sets of bedding, and a bed, and stool pan for each corps; a few spitting pots, and chamber pots, may be purchased by the regimental surgeon and charged in his weekly accompt; close stool cases must be constructed by each corps for their hospital, and the corps must also provide sixty mats made of hay, straw, or rushes, four inches thick, seven feet long, and three feet wide, for the accommodation of the sick.

49. The Inspector of Hospitals will also upon a requisition being forwarded to him authorize, the issue of a small quantity of port wine, tea, sugar, sago, and other articles of comfort for the sick.

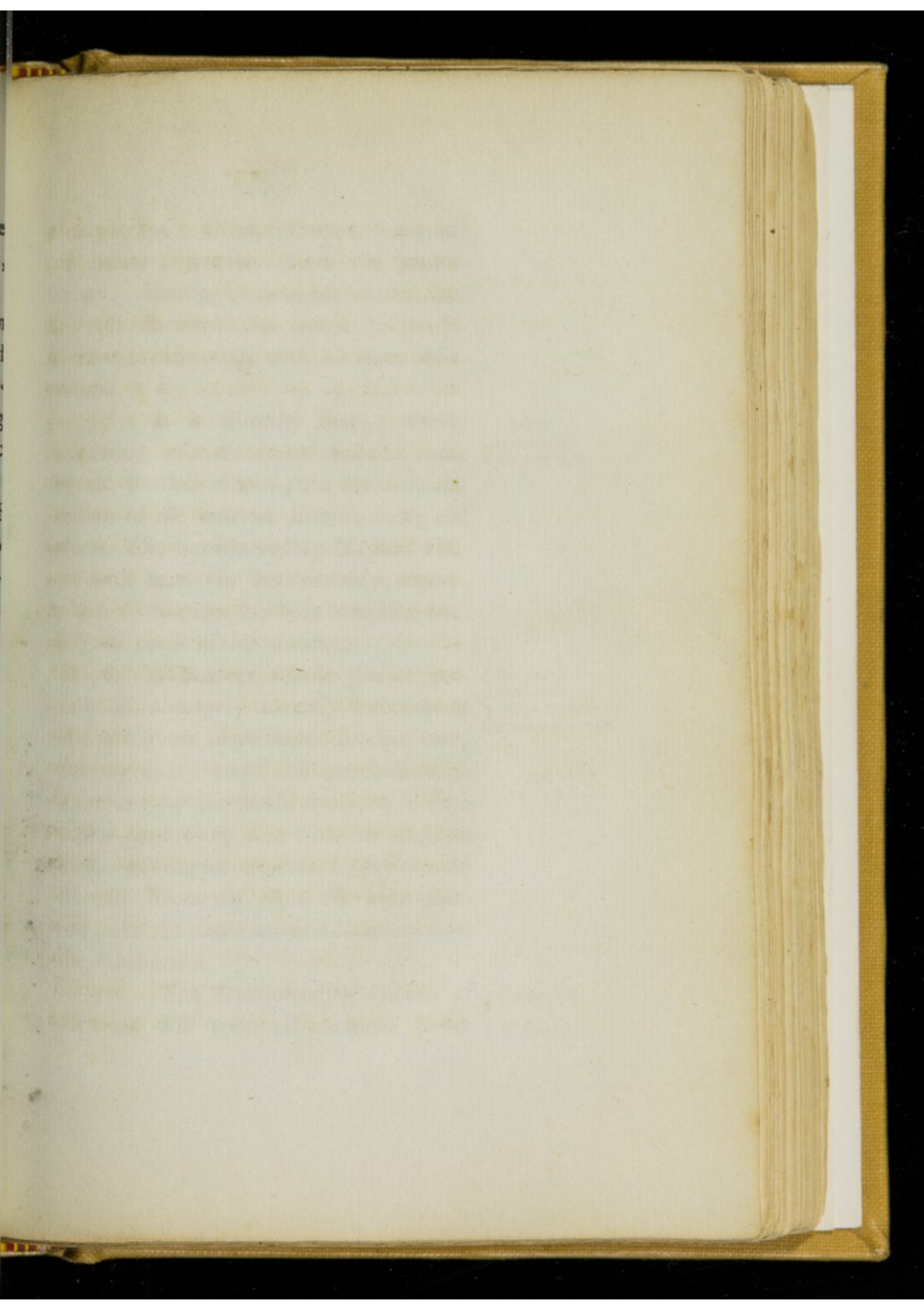
52. It will be at the discretion of the Superintending Medical Officer to increase, or diminish the number of servants employed in regimental hospitals; and he will be guided in this, by the hospital accommodation afforded to the sick in different corps.

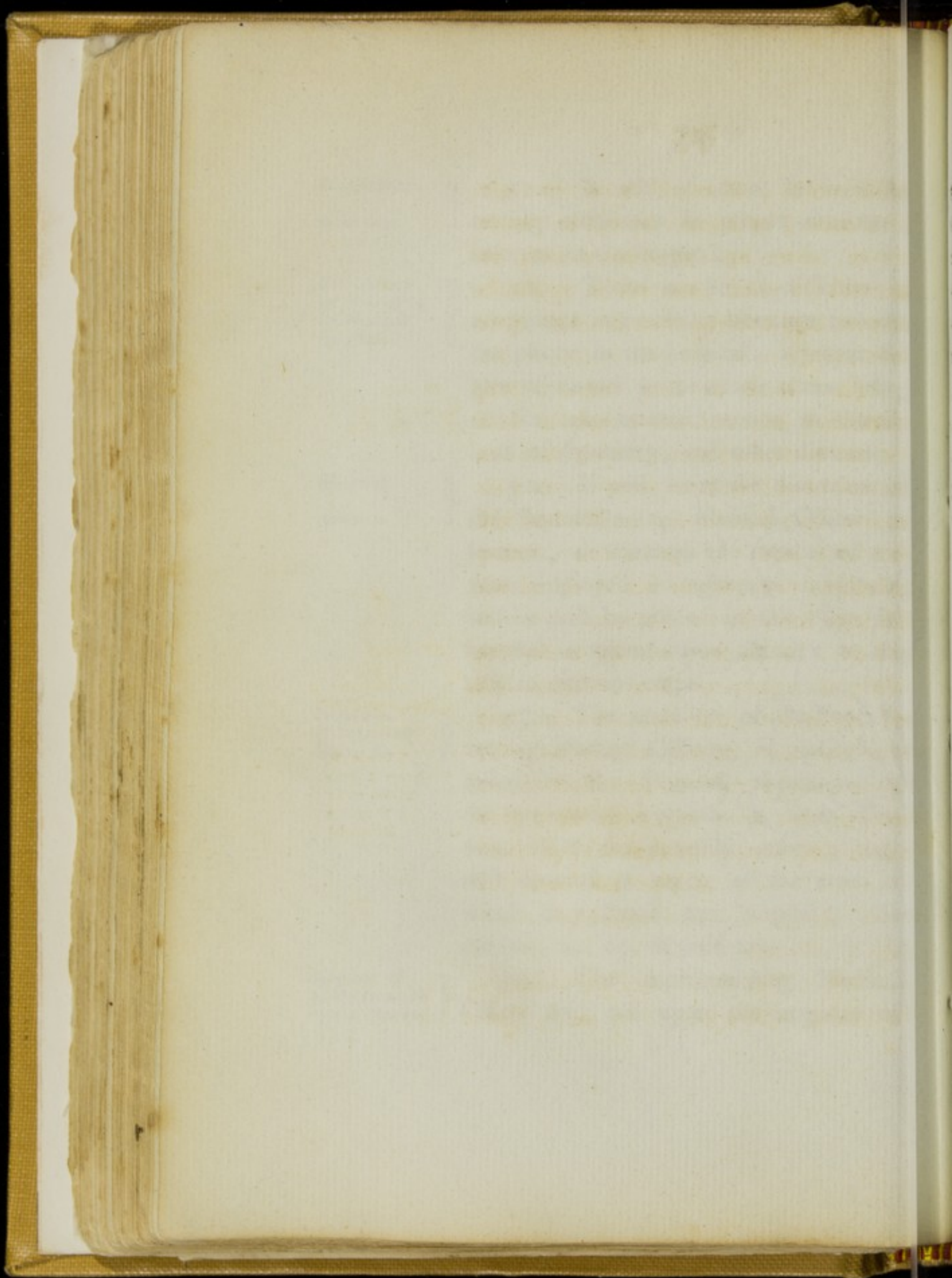

53. The attention of the Superintending Medical Officers, is particularly called to the frequent inspection of the regimental hospitals in their division. With the monthly return, they will forward a report of the state in which they found each hospital, vide par. 61. 62. 63. of part 1.<sup>st</sup>

54. The Superintending Medical Officer will call upon the surgeons of





sickly corps, to report upon the causes of disease; whether from the cantonments, cloathing, or other causes, and he will forward this report to the Inspector of Hospitals with his own observations.

55. It is directed that a weekly inspection of each corps shall be made by the medical officers, for the early detection of the venereal disease, itch, and ulcers. The Superintending Medical Officer will state in his monthly report, whether this order has been complied with in each corps of his division.

56. Whenever febrile disease prevails in a corps, its early detection is of the highest importance. In that case, the regiment should be inspected with great care by the medical officers at each parade, and every man with the slightest marks of disease selected. They should likewise frequently visit the mens quarters, for the detection of disease amongst the inhabitants.

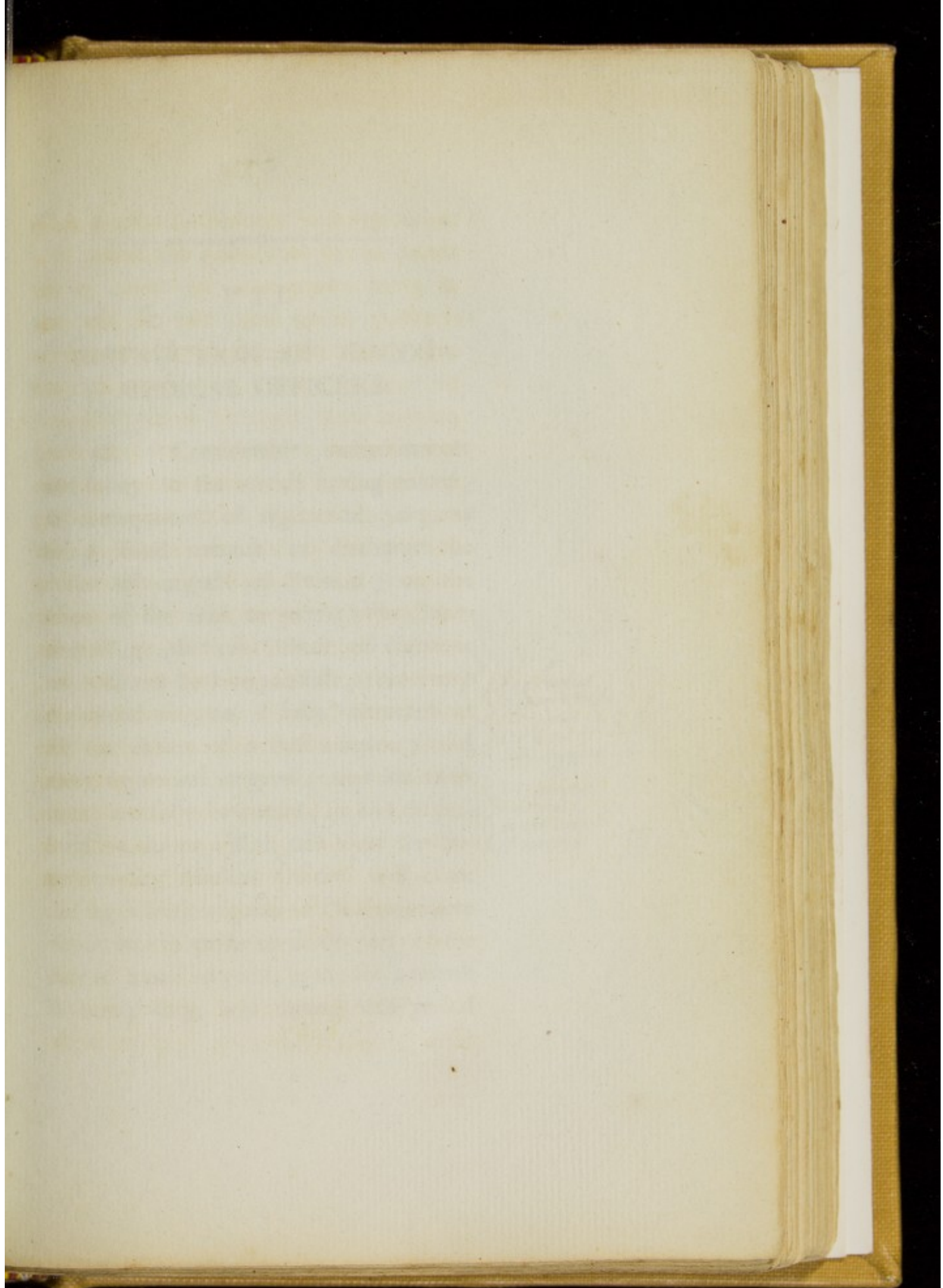

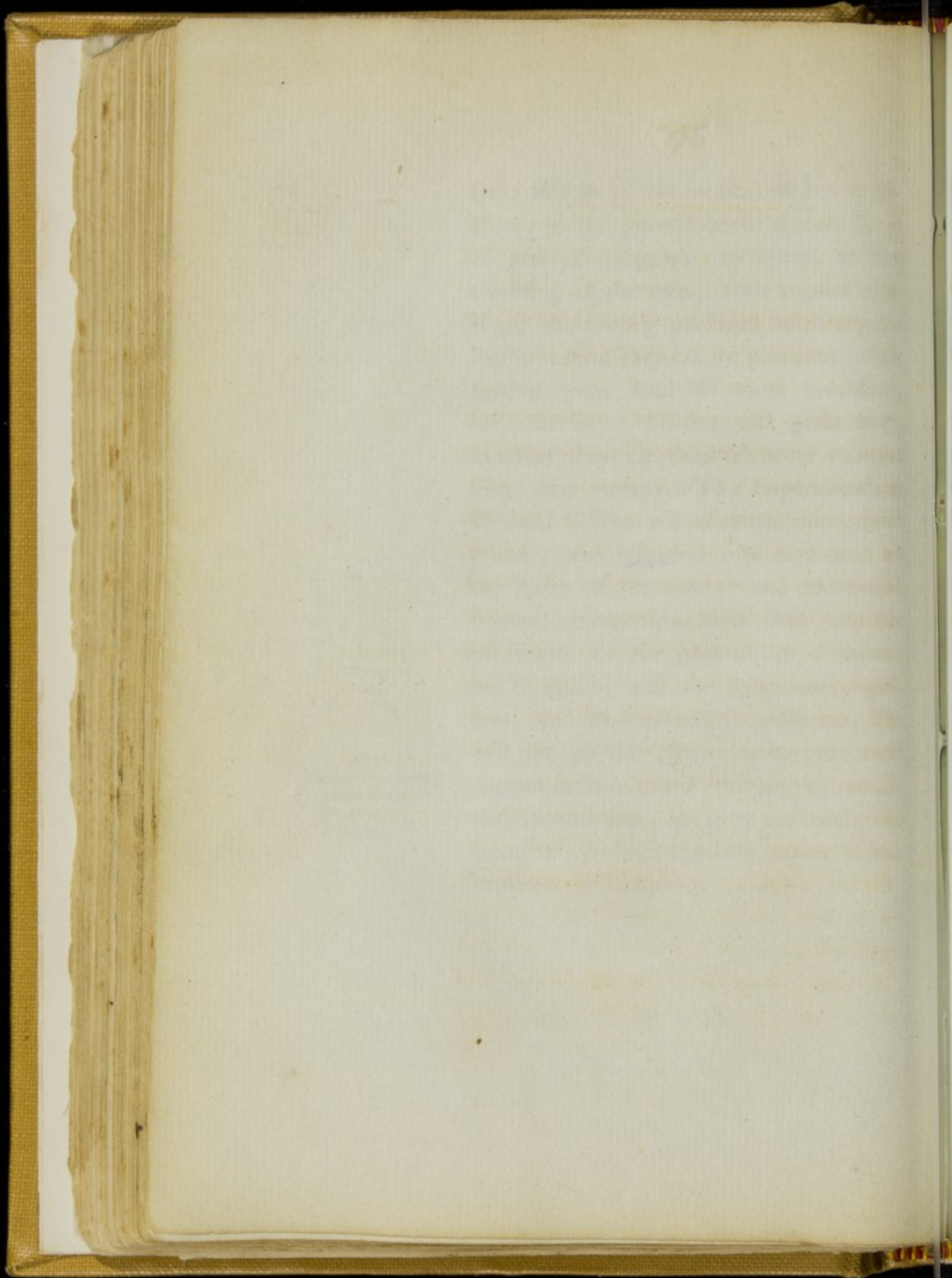

the attention of the medical officers under them, to the prevention of disease. It is of great consequence to attend to the cloathing of the men, their regular messing, their being provided with vegetables whenever they can be procured, their getting some kind of warm breakfast, their having a blanket and great coat, and that they clean out whatever quarters they may occupy. The Superintending Medical Officer will of course upon these points, and whatever else may tend to the health of the troops, and to obviate disease, communicate with, and state his sentiments to the generals of division, and brigade, and the commanding officers, and medical officers of corps. He will also on this subject make occasional communications; and on any extraordinary occurrences, as great sickness, or mortality, he will specially report to the Inspector of Hospitals.

58. Considerable embarrassment and injury to the service having ensued, in consequence of regimental surgeons being found unequal to discharge the duties of surgeon of division, on the illness of the staff surgeon; the Superintending Medical Officer of divisions are in future held responsible, that every regimental surgeon is fully instructed in all the duties of a staff surgeon; and every regimental surgeon, that his assistants, are fully instructed, in and do perform his duties. With this view the Superintending Medical Officers will cause the regimental surgeons of their respective divisions, to perform every part of the duty of a staff surgeon, each, for a month in turn; they will during this period
