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

My wife and I have just had the pleasure of visiting the Museum under your care for the first time. As the son and grandson of medical men, I found it extraordinarily interesting, and had no idea that the collection was of such magnitude. It would take many visits to examine it properly.

Since my visit I have been looking to see whether I have anything worthy of acceptance by the Museum. Though I have seen and possessed a certain number of articles of medical antiquarian interest, most of what I now own is not of importance, or is fully represented in your collection.

If of sufficient interest, however, I shall be very pleased to give to the Museum two stethoscopes. One is a very early pattern of the ivory-ended type, with a stem fully an inch in diameter, and, I think, a little earlier than those of the type shown at the Museum. The other is a later ebonite stethoscope, with the stem divided in the middle, so that the chest half can be inverted and screwed down over the ear half for convenience of carriage. This type is, I think, not shown at all.

I shall also be glad to give the Museum any of the following printed works which it may desire to possess. I have a number of early books but omit those which I happened to notice in the collection.
