Dear Mr. Thompson,

Many thanks for returning the two books. I do not know where the death mask of Harry is? I have always somewhat doubted if that was the original one, but rather a cast made by a Mr. Sir B. J. Richardson from the bust in the Monument at Kemptstead, if I remember rightly he never says - any of his accounts of it, if still - existance it is probably in the possession of his family. There is another account of it in the *Lancet* Nov 30. 1870. illustrated by 2 views of Kemptstead Church. East & West, the Harry vault showing upper; the monument showing bust, & profile of bust, which much resembles the death mask. The map of Kemptstead Church I know of is one engraved by Hare, but I have never been able to get one, although I have several times advertised for it. It occurs in Alfred Russell Smith's (penned) big catalogue of 10000 tracts & pamphlets & 50000 pieces &c. of typography 1870. The B. M. do not seem to have a copy but there is one in the final shelf Liby when I only consult it. The B. M. has up Sotherby's Catalogue down to 1901. Sotherby's 2nd (then there were priced copies, with

purchase some, about 20 per cent, but that I can see in the market.
if there is no copy of that part, there are probably some, I have always
started several 'part'. Don't forget the old Van portraits, when next
I wander up to Weymouth S.

Dear Mr. Badcock,

Many thanks for presenting us with a copy of the Harveian Oration of Ogle, which I feel sure will be very useful, and I am very pleased to have it.

I have read the note in 'The Asclepiad' with interest, and am returning it herewith together with the monograph on Alanson by Mr. Murray.

I suppose you do not know if the original death mask of Harvey is still in existence, and if so to whom it belongs? I think it would be a very good plan for you to photograph all the title-pages and frontispieces of the works of Harvey and have them bound together for reference. As you have a perfect and complete set of all his works, this can easily be done, and would be very valuable to other bibliographers.

With respect to our oil painting of Harvey dissecting the body of Old Parr, as near as I can recollect, it is six or seven years ago since I was told that it had been engraved and a copy was sold at Sotheby's. I do not know the artist's name as the oil painting ~~had~~ we have was offered to us privately. We have a num-

ber of portraits of Old Parr, but should be glad to have any that we have not got.

I am sending you of Parvula Post a copy of the

& appendices, the latter I think you may find very useful, if it is of any use


Dear Dr. Badcock,
