With reference to your letter of Dec. I7th to
Dr. Barnett, I wish to inform you that we have identified the objects proposed by Sir Aurel Stein for loan
to your Historical Medical Exhibition. We find however
that Sir Aurel did not obtain the sanction of the India
Office for their loan, and as their formal permission
must first be obtained, I regret that I am not able
to send the objects yet. I hope that official sanction
will arrive within a week or so, when I will at once
forward the objects.

In the meantime it may save you inconvenience to have some information as to their size. The medical "handbook" consists of IO bamboo slips or fragments, none more than 9" long or ½" broad; and the medicine chest/

chest cover measures 7" x $3\frac{1}{2}$ ". We shall send you descriptive notes of these when, on the form attached to your letter of Dec. 17th, when sending the objects.

I am sorry that this unforeseen delay hasarisen, and trust that it will not inconvenience you.
