calling my attention to the interesting and ancient group in ceramic in the Museum at Nicosia. I do not know anything like it of the period judging from your description, and it appears to be a most interesting relic of antiquity. It seems probable that it may be a votive offering. We have a large collection of ex-votos in ceramic of the second and third centuries in this Museum, and I have pleasure in enclosing you a copy of the hand-book which illustrates one, but we have nothing illustrating a birth scene similar to the one you describe, with the exception perhaps of a native figure in clay from west africa which shows a similar scene.

Will you kindly ask the Director or the authorities of the Museum if they will allow a plaster cast to be made of the object for this Museum. If so we should greatly appreciate their kindness. We should be willing to pay for the cost of the cast, and

for it being packed and forwarded to England. Perhaps you would be good enough to take the matter up for us with the authorities of the Museum, or put me in touch with them so that I could write to them direct. In any case I should be glad to have the photograph for exhibition as you so kindly suggest, as early as possible.
