I understand from one of my representatives that you have very kindly offered to loan to the Historical Medical Museum the Galometer and the Lever Splint invented by your father, and we should be very glad to have these objects.

I am very anxious to make the Museum a centre for the work of all early discoverers in Medicine, Surgery and the Allied Sciences, so that they may obtain proper recognition and the honour that is due to them.
