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



These are not unfrequent in the different stages of this form of mental disorder.

I consulted with O'Henryngton as to the uses of medical treatment and I quite concur in what has been done in this respect, and would advise the continuance of the remedies prescribed for a long time

He says frequently "There now," he wants me to cut so & so's throat, sometimes naming himself & sometimes naming other people, his conversation & behaviour are often most improper, his failure of memory if he chooses to take the trouble to recall any circumstance, if he will fix his mind to a thing he can understand it, but it is very difficult to fix his attention, & keep his mind of his own train of thought long enough to make him understand any thing complicated. Usually one has to return to the subject, twice or thrice at intervals before he can be said to have mastered it; if it is long.

His first attack followed very shortly after his having the measles severely, previous to which he had not seemed well for a long while, & he had had ~~so~~ some anxiety. Since his first attack

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though he got rid of his delusions, he has never been the same, but very excitable & nervous & irritable. His getting wrong again can not be accounted for

Since November he has been very restless, had bad nights has talked constantly to himself, has heard whispering & says he has seen the devil, that the birds & animals have said things to him.

Sometimes has seemed "bothered" in low spirits but usually in over high spirits.

Has taken an extraordinary aversion to shaking hands with, or touching any one.

His former attack was quite different from this, then he was really ill, & much more out of his mind than now. Then he used to complain that his head was full of sand, or smoke, & that he had a curious pain in it.

For one or two days there was a very slight thickening in his speech like a person who being intoxicated does not articulate properly.

His circulation was then as now bad, & his eyes very bloodshot.

Always temperate, used to take a fair amount of exercise, walking & particularly riding, but for the last year he has taken next to none,




