I am sorry but these are of very little use to me, firstly, because they are of so late a period, and secondly, because they are only in the form of petitions for money. They are of practically no use to me. I am sorry you have had the trouble of copying it all out, and think perhaps it would be well in future before you copy out to let me have some exact details of the subject matter, so that I can see if it is worth your while doing so. Hum. 19 September 1913. Dear Mr. Hore, Referring to our conversation yesterday I can now give you

the names of the early apothecaries concerning whom I want references and any other details possible.

The earliest I have notes of is Richard Fitznigel who is said to have been anothecary to Henry II in 1145. Any record or details concerning him would be useful. Then comes Courses de Cangeland who was an apothecary to Edward II in London in 1345. Pierre de Montpelier and John Falcand de Luca, apothecaries to Edward III in 1357, are mentioned by Friend in his 'History of "hysic" but he gives no references or authorities.

It would be worth while if you could do so to investigate the records of the Grocers' Company which was incorporated in 1428 and is still in existence in the City. If you can get access to their records it would be very interesting to know the drugs in which grocers dealt.
