Dear Mr. Hore,

Referring to our conversation yesterday I can now give you the names of the early apothecaries concerning whom I want references and any other details possible.

The earliest I have notes of is Richard Fitenigel who is said to have been apothecary to Henry II in 1145. Any record or details concerning him would be useful. Then comes Coursas de Gangeland who was an apothecary to Edward II in London in 1345. Pierre de Montpelier and John Falcond de Luca, apothecaries to Edward III in 1357, are mentioned by Friend in his "History of Physic" but he gives no references or authorities.

It would be worth while if you could do so to investigate the records of the Grocers' Company which was incorporated in 1426 and is still in existence in the City. If you can get access to their records it would be very interesting to know the drugs in which grocers dealt.

I also want information concerning the earliest records you can get of the "Spicers and Pepperers" a guild in London in 1180, the original founders, I believe, of the Grocers Company. I have a note to the effect that in the Pipe Roll 1179-1180 reference is made to the Guild of Pepperers of that period. I should like you to investigate this for me as soon as possible and let me know the result.

Dear Sir

I beg to submit for your perusal the enclosed rough draft of some extracts in my possession which I have made from the contemporary records of Department of the Royal Household during the seventeenth century. So far as I can ascertain there is no information to be found in printed books or publications relating to the establishment services of silver plate allotted by order of the reigning Sovereign to the medical staff of the Royal Household during their respective terms of office. In case I may be right in this deduction the enclosed may perhaps be interesting in connection with your Historical Medical Museum (which has been favourably noticed in the newspapers) and that you may know some one who would like to acquire the enclosed. Of course the subject goes back to earlier times and comes down to a more recent period than herein mentioned. And as to the official pay and emoluments of the Medical Staff of the Royal Household there are very full records extant which could be obtained, but I am myself utterly ignorant of anything pertaining to medical science, nevertheless in competent hands an interesting book could be written on the subject.
