Dear Sir

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of July 11<sup>th</sup> asking for information as to the use of this hospital for lepers and the probable date when last used for same. I am sorry not to be able to give you any information which one can claim to be accurate as there seems to have been no records kept. The nearest I can give you is that the highest number of lepers here at any one time was 32. There is a flat stone in the church under which is buried one Lennard Lovelace 1671. He is believed to be the last man who ministered to the lepers. In the absence of any real proofs, this is the best information I can give you. I am however hoping to have something more reliable when times are better. Should any thing of interest be brought to light I will send it on to you.

Dear Sir,

I have been trying to identify for you if possible the frescoes on each side of the east window that I saw when I was last at St. Nicholas Hospital. It appears from Hastead's "History of Kent" that the church was built a century or two before the hospital was founded by Lanfranc in 1084. Therefore St. Nicholas was not necessarily associated with the lepers. On the other hand, the figure on the right of the window (which is evidently a female) with the large pitcher on the ground by her side seems to be very probably St. Elisabeth of Hungary, who at that time was much reverenced for bringing succour and relief to those afflicted with leprosy. She appears to be carrying something like a basket or box in her left hand, and the pitcher is always associated with her. Therefore I think you may say with a fair amount of certainty that the figure on the right is probably that of St. Elisabeth.

The figure on the left is most probably that of St. Nicholas who was a bishop. These seem to me the most probable descriptions of the frescoes.

I have not yet received the models of the lepers' alms box

and bowl, etc. from the modeller, but he tells me they are going on very well, and he hopes to make them exactly like the originals.
