

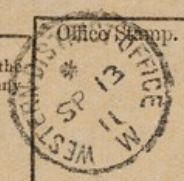

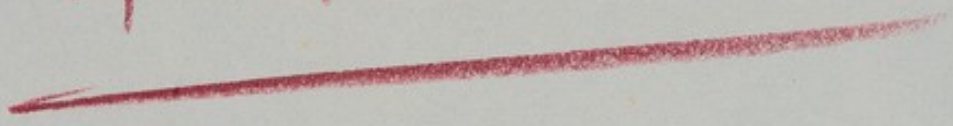

I am duly in receipt of your letter of the 5th. inst. and am pleased to learn that the picture arrived safely, as I was rather afraid that the moulding would come off.

The packing etc. only cost me 2/- do not trouble remitting as I will be over immediately after Christmas.

With regard to the picture in the Meath Hospital, Dublin, I went up today and with a little diplomacy induced the Registrar to let me see it. I then learned from him that it was really the property of Sir Lambert Ormsby, Merrion Square, Dublin.

I then went and had the usual interview with Sir Lambert, switched on to the little booklet we recently issued re Anaesthetics and mentioned that I had seen this sketch: he told me that it was presented to him by the late Dr. Rawdon Macnamara and that it is ^a true sketch of what actually took place.

Sir Lambert will have no objection to loan it to Mr. Wellcome, provided we give him a guarantee for its safe return as he values it very highly on account of it being a gift from such an old friend.

The picture is small about twelve inches square in a small frame, so that it could go nicely by post, or for safety I could bring it with me when crossing after Christmas.

Possibly it would be judicious for you to write personally to Sir Lambert Ormsby, thanking him and giving him a guarantee that it will be returned safely.

Sir Lambert will have no objection to us making a copy of it for future use in our publications provided we give it its title and use his name associated with the Hospital.

Dear Mr. Kirkpatrick,

Many thanks for carrying through the matter of the picture, which has now duly arrived safely. A portion of the moulding of the frame is loose, but I expected that from what you said in your letter, but nothing is really broken. Please let me know what we are indebted to you for packing, etc. and I will remit the same to you direct.

Now there is another matter to which we want you to give your best diplomatic attention. We have recently heard that there is hanging in the surgeons' room at the Meath Hospital, Dublin, a painting depicting an operation which took place previous to the discovery of anaesthetics, and represents a male patient struggling in the grasp of several assistants while a surgeon performs the operation. This sketch was hanging in the surgeons' room in 1884 and is probably there still. Could you make up some business to call there and get into this room, and then feel your way with whatever official would be most likely to know if they would loan it to Mr. Wellcome. If by any means you think they would be open to sell the same at a low figure, you might suggest it, but do not in any way broach the subject of purchase unless you feel on safe ground, as they might want a high price, and refuse to loan it.

If they will give us the loan of it, that is all that is necessary at the present time, but we should like to have it now, and, if not too large, perhaps you might send it on to us at once, as we are interested in it from the anaesthetic point of view. You will have to feel your way carefully.

I shall be glad to know as soon as you have seen the picture the result of your enquiries, and hope that you will be successful.
