Dear Mr Wellcome

I have enquired about Diss ergot and find that it grows in large quantities all over the country. It has been experimented at the School of Medicine laboratory and is said to be approximately of the same strength and physiological action as rye rg ergot. It is reputed to cause abortion in cattle and the native women make use of it to procure abortion but not for any other medicinal purpose.

It is much larger than rye ergotthe spurs measuring 6 or 7 cm in length. I am promised samples tomorrow which i will send along and if there be any literature on the subject I will send you the references.

The season is rapidly approaching its close and in another three weeks or so I shall be travelling to Aix probably via Tunis as I have sold my car and am reduced to the vulgar modes of transport.

What do you think of my third edition on Algiers a copy of which I forwarded the other day!

Dear Mr Wellcome

I have just taken cognizance of a thesis defended before the Paris Faculty in I882cby Dr GERMAIX on Diss Ergot
which contains all that one can wish to know respecting this
substance. It is published by Davy Editeur 31 rue Monsieur
le Prince Paris but I hardly suppose that he will have any in
stock at this late date. You could however have it syn optised
or copied and if you have any difficulty no doubt I could
fix it for you. I enclose a copy of his conclusions.

I trust you received the sample of ergotised Diss grass dispatched a few days since. There appears to be plenty of it growing about the country (though Dr Germaix excuses the stall number of his observations on the ground that owing to the season he was unable to procure a sufficient quantity) but it is almost unobtainable in Algiers and I had to apply to a great many people before I could get that one sample.

A chemists assistant here however tells me his brother, a farmer, can get me as much as I like so I have commissioned him to set to work and no doubt I shall hear from him early in May.

Diss grass grows all over the place - though I have never yet recognized it but shall keep a look out in future.

I enclose a photograph thereof (your specimen) also one of the flower of the PHILODENDRON PERTUSUM, the fruit whereof is highly esteemed, just to show what results can be obtained by means of the tabloids photographic preparations. I was just wishing I had some by me because I am off to Constantine on the 20th whence I shall radiate to the famous ruins of Timpad, to Hamman Meskoutine (the celebrated boiling springs) and then on to Tunis taking much photographs on the way. But there is no time now so I must do as best I can with cumbrous solutions.

If there be anything more you would like to know pray command me. I can always work the oracle even at a distance.

I arrive at Aix about the 2nd prox where I shall be delighted to treat any friends of yours suffering from rheumatism gout &c. With kind regards believe me

Dear Mr Wellcome

I sent you yesterday from Marseilles a sample parcel of Diss grass just gathered. As soon as the fungus develops I have made arrangements for further samples to follow, that is to say in some six weeks. I find there are many acres of Diss in the immediate neighbourhood of Algiers so that we can keep its growth under observation. At the same time I am having enquiries made as to its existence in other parts of Algeria.

I am informed that the barley is badly infected there with (with ergot) in western Algeria and the military authorities have decided to refse all samples of barley containing more than 2 per cent of ergot so that no doubt plenty could be obtained by purchasing the bad barley at the price of good barley. That of course is a matter to be threshed out.

You will no doubt have received my letter from Algiers giving details of the bibliography of the subject with extracts therefrom.

I received on my arrival a letter from your literary department enquiring as to the corrected proofs of the French Hemisine booklet. This I corrected in the train on my way to Tunis and posted from El Guerrah under registered cover on or april about the 2Ist so it should have arrived long since. In the contrary event will they let me know and I will find out.

I had a splendid trip to El Kantara, Hammam Mesk utine
Constantine and Tunis and made a number of very interesting photo.

graphs which I developed on the spot so as to make sure. Tunis
in particular is a very interesting town and of natural pheno-

mena the boiling springs at Hammam Meskutine most excited my attention - a hundred million litres in the 24 hours of water at 96 C! and in such a licturssque neighbourhood too.

I find that enquiries have already been made of our Consul at Algiers concerning Diss ergot and I am writing him to get to know how far he got with his investigations so I may have more to say shortly.

You may perhaps like to have for reference a copy of Dr Gubb's letter of the 12th May which I send you herewith. I have told him that if he is agreeable we propose to keep the two sets of correspondence quite separate. For your information I would mention that I have asked him to get us the 20-lbs Diss Ergot which I asked him for on the 9th May in addition to any specimens he may be getting for you. I have also asked him for a substantial specimen of Barley Ergot and, if possible, also of Ergot of Oats which the British Consul mentioned to us some time ago should be available in the province of Oran.

Dear Sirs, Yours of the 9th inst. just to hand which, by the way, seems to ignore my previous correspondence with your firm on the subject of Diss Ergot, As Diss Ergot is not an article of commerce it is unlikely that any can be found on hand and it does not form until the end of June or thereabouts. I have the matter in hand and have made arrangements to secure specimens of the growing and the completely formed Diss Ergot as soon as available. I referred in my letter of last week (to Mr Wellcome) to the possible desirability of utilising barley ergot which I am told could be had practically at the price of barley. If you think proper I will see what can be done in the way of obtaining a substantial specimen. It is not a question of cost for it is literally a "drug in the market" except that it isnt in the market at all. I think I mentioned to br Wellcome that in the course of my enquiries I learned that enquiries had already been made some year or two since of the British Consul in reference to this very subject and I wrote him last week asking him how far he went with his enquiry and with what results. I shall await your reply to this and my previous letter before taking any further steps, I have placed you in possession of the literature and bibliography of the subject. Dear Dr Gubb,

During our interview the other day, you asked me to let you have a list of the queries respecting ergot, the answers to which might help to elucidate many obscure points in the history of the use of the drug. The following are some of the matters on which I should like to have light thrown:

- (1) Were barley and rye used by the Arabs at any time, and are they now used, and to what extent? have these grains been diseased or ergotised to any extent, and have the properties of the ergot of barley and rye been noticed, or have they been used medicinally or otherwise?
- (2) Is maize affected by any disease or fungoid growth in the North of Africa? Have the properties of this diseased maize been found to be similar to that of the ergot of other grains, and is this ergot of maize used medicinally or otherwise?
- (5) Were there any epidemics or plagues among the Araos in any way traceable to the grain eaten? Please get particulars of all grains which have been found to be ergotised, and the symptoms which the eating of the grain are alleged to have produced; the treatment, etc. Also to what extent they were used medicinally, and, if possible, the origin of their application in medicine and for what purposes.
- (4) Are there any obscure diseases at the present time known to be produced by grain?
- (5) In what form is ergot used by the Arabs, and for what purposes?
- (6) To what extent is ergot derived from each of the following grains respectively, Diss, Wheat, Barley, Rye, Oats, etc., and/or any other grains.
- (7) Any particulars about its use in antiquity by the Arabs.
- (8) What is the geographical distribution of the ergotised grains in Northern Africa, and to what extent have any epidemics, such as

Page 2. 20th October, 1908. St Antony's Fire, etc., etc., corresponding geographically with the localities in . which the grains are ergotised, and respectively which grains? (9) Are there any antient Arabic M.S.S. or printed works relating to this subject? If so kindly procure what is possible in this direction. Also any historical relics of pictures associated with the subject. (10) What legends or traditions are there amongst the people or the native medicines on this subject? This is only a very rough and hasty memoranda of the principal points, and some of them, as you will observe, overlap. However, they will give you, I think, a pretty general idea of the information I am seeking. I am sorry not to have seen more of you, but I have been specially pressed with work just before my long journey abroad, and I know you have not been idle.
