On reply to your letter of yesterday's date, I beg to state that your information concerning Rabbi Eleazar ben Rabbi Simeon (between 165-200) is correct. He underwent an operation in the abdomen at the house of an otherwise unknown Shisha, after he had been given to drink a "portion of sleep"; his abdomen was cut open and baskets full of fat was removed. What the sleeping potion was, is not mentioned, nor suggested. Dr. Julius Preuss in his *Biblisch-Talmudische Medizin* (Berlin 1911), p. 276 refers to another passage in the Talmud, Baba Kamma 85^a where a painless removal of the hand after medicine is referred to. He mentions in the same context Pliny's mandragora and lapis memphicus as anaesthetics, and seems to suggest similar means for the Talmudic passages. I shall be pleased to give you any further information which you may require and I shall be able to offer.

You will remember that on September 13th. I sent you a copy of the correspondence and on October 12th. wrote you again pointing out that Dr. Desnos had sent a further reminder that he had received no reply.

The matter has now entered a new phase by the receipt of a letter from Dr. John Pardee, 77, Wimpole Street, W., the London Secretary of the Second International Congress of Urology, who explains that Dr. Desnos, despairing of receiving the information, has invoked his aid.

After dealing with another matter, Dr. Pardee's letter reads as follows :-

On investigating the matter re difference in the dates of birth and death of Jan Steen in "The Evolution of Urine Analysis," it appears that the matter arose in this way. The reference to Jan Steen in the body of the book itself was made long before the inscription on the coloured plate, and the dates of his birth and death were taken from Warne's Biography, ~~which~~ which gives them as 1636-1679. When the inscription came to be written for the picture a considerable time afterwards, the dates of Jan Steen's birth and death were looked up in Pilkington's Dictionary of Painters, where they are given as 1638-1689. Why two different dates should be given by two different authorities it is difficult to say. They may either both be right, or probably both be wrong, but, at any rate, they ought to be made to harmonise. How is it that your readers did not call my attention to the fact, when reading through the entire work when it was complete? If you will let me have the copy, I will alter it in any previous edition.

Mr. C. J. S. Thompson.

Many thanks for your note of May 31st. explaining how it was you came to make the mistake of giving two dates of birth and two dates of death for one man when supplying copy for the "Evolution of Urine Analysis". Of course, you also passed the mistake in the proofs.

I note you desire to call the work of the proof readers in question, but as the mistakes are true to your copy I am afraid I cannot follow you there. Our proof reader is not expected to verify dates as he reads them. That is clearly the work of the writer. Further, the inset was printed long before the body of the book and was a separate printing job. The frontispiece was not before the readers at the same time as the text. The reading staff took the greatest possible care with this as with all your work of which there is abundant evidence.

In your note you say that the dates may both be right, but this must be a slip on your part as the thing is impossible. If you will kindly let me know which dates of birth and death you decide to adopt for the future, I will see that your correction is put forward.

Referring to the matter of the error in the dates of Jan Steen's birth and death, you appear to be still under a misconception with regard to my note. I did not see the inscription under the coloured print, together with the pulls of the literary matter, therefore it was impossible to check them.

With respect to your note re proof readers not being expected to verify dates, I should not expect them to; but at the same time my experience of proof readers is that it is part of their duty to point out any discrepancies in dates or otherwise in any proofs they may have to go through.

It was the fact that you mention, that the inset was printed long before the body of the book, that has really caused the error. The frontispiece should have been presented to me as well as the reader, together with the proofs.

I hesitated to reply to your note of June 12th. regarding your mistakes in the dates of Jan Steen's birth and death, as I think no good can be served by continuing the correspondence.

As your last note, however, carries the suggestion of a reflection upon the proof readers, I am bound to reply that they are not expected to search for discrepancies in dates in different parts of one publication, although they would, of course, be expected to report them if they found them in the course of their work.

What they are required to do is to see that the author's copy is correctly rendered by the printer when reading the first proof, and further, to see that the author's proof corrections have been correctly incorporated in subsequent proofs. It is our practice to look to the author to look out for discrepancies in dates or correct any other mistakes of a like nature which may have been made in supplying copy.

I do not agree with you that the fact of the inset being printed before the body of the book caused the error. In my opinion what caused the error was the supply of wrong dates.

As this matter has been thrashed out so thoroughly, it might be as well to put on record that you supplied in all three inscriptions for the frontispiece having withdrawn the first and second owing to incorrect names having previously been given to the painter.

I am also returning the copy for the revised edition of the Missionary Book, which is now complete with the exception of the extra illustrations. I have a note from Mr. Wellcome stating that the Missionary Letter, of which you have a large quantity printed in stock, is to be inserted as a fixed inset in the revised version of this book. Please make a special note of this, and bring it before Mr. Linstead.

Mr. Wellcome has condemned many of the blocks in the last edition

of the History of Missions as bad, but this matter I had better go into with you later on, when the matter is more advanced.

Mr. Morris called here again at 6.30 last night, and reported to me his examination of Sir Courtenay Ilbert's "Life of Sir Henry Jenkins," from which I gather that the only value this book would be is in following to some extent the manner in which Sir Henry Jenkins boiled down his Law Reports, and, while retaining the essential points, reduced them to a minimum in length. This is the point Mr. Wellcome wishes to emphasise in writing the tabulated epitomes of the Colonies and Dependencies. I tried to instil this into Morris last night, but as you know, his style is just the opposite and very prolix, and he seems to find a great difficulty in reducing his verbiage to a minimum. As a model for all the other epitomes, I have drawn up a tabulated one referring to Malta, which he should take as a guide, giving the various points of information in the same order and in the same manner. Of course, larger and more important dependencies must have a little fuller detail and greater space, and be treated accordingly. If you will see that this is carried out in this way I will revise his copy directly it is ready.

The best books for reference are Hazell's annual for 1911, which I gave him last night; Meiklejohn's British Empire, last edition, for which I have sent a requisition through to be had from Simpkin Marshall's immediately, and come to you to-day; and any Baedeker's Guides, that we may have in Mr. Wellcome's Pedestal Bookcase, which bear on the places themselves.

MALTA.

A Crown Colony, anciently called MELITA. An island situated in the Mediterranean, about 58 miles south of Sicily. Has had an eventful history, and been the scene of frequent invasions in ancient and modern times. Was successfully held by the Phoenicians, Carthaginians, and Romans, conquered by the Vandals, and again wrested from them by the Arabs, A.D. 870. In 1090 was captured by Roger the Norman, and during succeeding centuries frequently changed hands. In 1530 Charles V. gave it to the Knights Hospitallers on their expulsion from Rhodes, who held it till 1695, when it was surrendered to the French. Captured by the British during the Napoleonic wars in 1800, and its session was formally confirmed by the Treaty of Paris in 1814, and the Congress of Vienna in 1815.

DATE OF ANNEXATION. 1800.

AREA. Including two small islands, 117 sq.miles.

CLIMATE. Warm, resembling that of Africa more than Europe. During the prevalence of the sirocco (S.E. wind) the temperature rises to 95 deg. fahr.

POPULATION. 215,870, excluding the garrison, 8,926. Malta alone contains 138,000 inhabitants.

CAPITAL. Valetta, pop. about 31,000. A fine city commanding two spacious harbours, and surrounded by massive fortifications. Picturesque but antiquated. Malta is the chief coaling station of the Mediterranean Fleet, and is provided with extensive dock-yard accommodation.

GOVERNMENT. It is administered by a Governor (military), advised and assisted by an Executive Council. Legislation is carried on by a Council of Government consisting of the Governor (President), the Lieut. Governor and Chief-Secretary of Government, the Crown Advocate, with other official and elective members.

LAWS AND CUSTOMS. In the Middle Ages the Knights of St. John introduced a code of laws based on that of the Romans and Canon Law. This was revised by the Grand Masters of the Order, and was afterwards modified by successive British Governors, also by the local Legislature, and confirmed by the Sovereign. Trial by jury introduced in certain criminal cases in 1829; its scope was extended in 1844, and since 1855 it has been applied to all crimes. From the Civil Law Courts there lies an appeal to His Majesty's Council. There are no direct taxes in Malta, revenue being derived from rates on Crown property, duties on imports, customs, tonnage, dues, licenses, etc.

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER IN CHIEF. General Sir Leslie Bundle, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., (salary £5000), Residences, Valetta, and Verdala Palaces.

LIEUT. GOVERNOR AND CHIEF SECRETARY OF GOVERNMENT. Sir E. M. Meredith, K.C.V.O., C.M.G.

RACES. The Maltese are a mixture of the Spanish, Italian, and French, but among the bulk of the population the Arab race and character predominate, influenced by contact with Sicily.

DEVELOPMENT. From the time of the annexation of Malta, which final transference took place in 1814, the inhabitants have enjoyed the rights and privileges of British subjects. The first Governor, Sir Thomas Maitland, in 1813. During the administration of Sir Frederick Ponsonby in 1826, a more liberal form of Government was introduced, and in 1849, the Government sent out new letters patent reforming the Council, a portion of which was to be elected by the people every five years. During the Governorship of Sir John Gaspard Le Marchant in 1852, the water supply, the planting of trees, the improvement of roads, the condition of the hospitals, erection of a good market, concentration of public offices, the deepening of the great harbour, the extension of the telegraph, and the erection of Pembroke Barracks, etc., was carried out.

RELIGION. Roman Catholic.

LANGUAGE. The vernacular is a dialect of Semitic origin, derived from the Carthaginian and Arabic tongues, but contains a large admixture of corrupt Italian terms. The better class speak English or Italian. Italian is the official language of the Law-courts, but parents of pupils in the public schools may choose whether their children learn English or Italian. About 96% learn English.

EDUCATION. Free in the day or night elementary schools (average enrolment, 19,100). Secondary education is provided at a moderate rate. The University is attended by about 240 students, and the Lyceum by about 600 boys. There are also many private schools.

PRODUCTS. Potatoes, onions, cummin seed, oranges, corn, cotton, tropical fruits, are the principal products that are exported.

However, it might have been more interesting, particularly to the British graduates, if you had known of the existence of a certain water-colour sketch which hangs in the surgeons' room at the Meath Hospital, Dublin, Ireland. 



Will you please ask the artist to make me another sketch of a conventional unicorn. The first sketch you sent me is of the type and character of the beast I want, but I want it to be still more conventional and in accord with heraldic usage, that is, I really want the imaginary beast.

Are the tufts of hair on the legs correct from a heraldic point of view? Will you kindly ask him? If so I should like them put in.

The tufts of the tail should be not quite so massive. The horn should be just a trifle longer. The tongue should be a little thinner.

Please ask the artist to kindly do me a finished line drawing with the head, neck, ears, horn and mane precisely as he has made them in sketch No. 1. In fact, everything about the neck and head in No. 1. is all right with the exception of the under jaw, which I should like slightly stronger. This jaw should be done with great care so as not to get it too heavy, but just sufficient to give it some force and strength.

I should also like the tail to be treated precisely as in No.1., with the same curves, tufts, etc., except that I should like the tufts very slightly reduced in heaviness.

With respect to the body and legs I should like them to be carried out exactly as in sketch No.2.
