They were given to me by a leading physician in Rangoon (Burmah) in 1902 when I was acting as Honorary Secretary to the Victoria Memorial Fund which was formed for the purpose of instructing native midwives and trying to educate them in methods less barbarous than those depicted. The results in India and Burmah are very satisfactory and it is hoped that in the next generation of midwives, some improvement will take place.

I have noted in pencil on the back of the photos what they are intended to show. These methods are general both in India and Burmah at the present time.

This Agate, "grave in green", and of Roman Workmanship, common enough is at least of interest by the subject it represents: I believe it very rare not having come across it before in the infinite number of antique engravings that I have had occasion to see & study.

This Stone represents an operation of Surgery. A man seated, presents his foot, & indicates the God of the sick or menaces in his name the Doctor who is kneeling & preparing to operate. The Statue, can be attributed only to Aesculapius, by the character of the head & by the beard. This operation and the presence of Aesculapius is conducive to reflections on customs. One knows that the Moderns have exactly tripled the Empire of this God.

Formerly the same man practised Medicine, Surgery and Pharmacy, today these three parts belong to different professions. Are we better off to day? We ought to be reasonably speaking; I will not decide the question, but the Ancients have a strong hold on my sentiments. It should be an advantage that the same man should diagnose, operate & give the remedy, that he has himself devised & of which he should best know the effect, but one was content in former times and one is just as satisfied to day. In England the physician sees little of the sick. He prescribes for his patient on the report of an Apothecary: all is good when custom rules.
