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My dear Thompson,

Much as I should like to help you, and proud a as I should be to be able to do something for Aegyptology, I am afraid Miss Murray's lapse of memory has prepared for me the humiliation of having to confess that I am not a photogram her. I have not a camera of any sort. Still I would get some tourist who is a good photographer to take the records you require if it were possible. But I am afraid it is not. Phile is under water. At Kom Ombo, Edfu, and Dendera we do not stop more than an hour. Nubia we do not visit. There remains only Luxor, and here, at any rate, a scaffold would be necessar ry to get opposite the scul ptures and inscriptions you want, for they are high up on a wall with columns close in front of them. They are also very indistinct and not well lit. I will put your problem to Mackay and Mrs. Brunton and see what they can suggest, and report to you if their suggestions strike me as being the least likely to lead to successfulresults.
